

Co. of Bovina for construction of a medical clinic here, culminating the work and dreams of Bovina citizens during the past few

Announcement was made Tuesday morning by Bedford Caldwell, chairman of the building committee, in conjunction with the temporary executive committee.

J. E. Sherrill, owner and operator of Sherrill Lumber Co., had submitted a bid of \$26,262,90 for constructing the clinic building to be located near the Oklahoma Lane road in the south part of town, Caldwell said the interior petitions and other work will cost about \$15,500, bringing the total cost of the medical clinic to approximately \$41,700.

The plans for the clinic, based on ones furnished by Sears Roebuck Foundation, call for space for two physicians, treatment rooms, lobby, laboratory and rest rooms, in addition to space for receptionist, bookkeeper, etc.

Sears Roebuck Foundation is now at work contacting prospective physicians who might be interested in moving to Bovina. However, there is no promise that one will be secured by the time the clinic building is completed, but hopes are that one will be. The longest a clinic has remained unoccupied is three years, but most have been supplied fairly soon.

Leroy Lance Winner Of Cotton Bowl Trip

Wendell Garner, at 92. Mrs. Cumpton had been tied or led the contest since its beginning. Lance began moving up a few weeks ago after Mrs. Cumpton had led at one time by six points. Inching closer each week, he tied her last weekend, In the final contest, he named seven winners, while Mrs. Cumpton picked six. Gatner, who was one behind, also named seven to tie for second in the overall contest. Lance's winning percentage was .715 the lowest in the eight-year history of the event.

Taking first place in the final week and \$5 was Kenneth Webb, who picked nine and came closest to the tie-breaker. Second place, \$3, went to Barty Bartlett and third, \$1, to George Baca. Barty also named nine correctly and Baca picked eight. The tie-breaker also placed



Voter Registration

Less than two months remain now for voters in Texas to qualify themselves to vote.

This citizenship responsibility may be taken care of now by filling out a voter registration certificate and taking it or mailing it to the county tax assessor-collector.

This registration business is still new enough in Texas to make mention of it important. Since the poll tax is now obsolete and out of the picture, some people may be under the impression that they are automatically qualified to vote.

Not so.

Still it's necessary to register for the voting right or privilege, depending on how you look at it. Frankly, there's little difference in registering and getting the old poll tax receipt -- except the \$1.75 charge which is, fortunately, no longer a part of the deal.

There's an application for a voter registration certificate in this week's issue of The Blade. People are encouraged to fill it out and mail it to Hugh Moseley, Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector, at Farwell.

Another change in the voter qualification law is that everyone must register. Under the old poll tax system, persons over 60 years old were exempt from paying the poll tax and therefore didn't have to do anything to be eligible to vote except sign an affidavit at the polls saying they were over 60 and otherwise qualified. This was true in counties with less than 10,000 population.

Under the new set-up, though, everyone must register, regardless of age. That, too, is something we feel that should be pointed out.

If the citizens aren't aware of these changes, there will be, no doubt, some disappointed potential voters come election time.



The spirit of Christmas brings out, not only the desire to share and make loved ones happy, (which is good) but it can cause us to lose touch with re-

ality.
"Christmas comes but once a year" - is an often spoken phrase. As long as one can afford it money-wise or weightwise, why not? This is good and

What about the ones who can't afford the over-indulgence, either money-wise or weight wise? Generally we end up paying four our foolishness for months. That's when one awakens to the difference between "reality" and "fantasy" sometimes too late.

A spending plan (for those not blessed with ready cash) may be the answer. Make it flexible but stick to it and you won't end up with those after Christmas blues.

NEWS ABOUT FOOD en turkeys that have a built in thermometer that will pop out truly roasted turkey this is a great advantage where thermometers are not available. Many people are inclined to think the


turkey is done when it's very brown-result is "under-done", In the last half of roasting time, turkey breast should be covered (loosely) with oiled cheese cloth or a piece of foil to prevent over browning. Low temperature (275 degrees or 300 degrees) is the secret in roasting. Another tip too - never puncture puncture skin with a fork when roasting-it lets the juices out and meat will be dry instead of moist. Use mitts and move turkey gently when turning - if needed.

If you are a gravy lover and wonder where juice for stock will come from - try chicken bullion cubes and stocks from boiled giblets and necks. 



The Apostle Paul makes a statement (11 Cor. 5:10) that should cause us to think soberly on what we have done, on what we are doing, and on what we intend to do hereafter. Paul had made reference in the previous verse to their labouring to be accepted by God; then with the thought in mind of acceptance by God, he speaks of the day of judgment. Other passages also tell us that the day is coming when all mankind will stand together before the Lord to hear one of two things said unto them -- invited into heaven or banished into hell. Here are some of these other passages: Romans 14:11--12; Matthew 25:31-46, and John 12:48, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him; the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." The thing that will measure us in the judgment is the Word of God, so then we must accept Christ by accepting His Word.

This getting right with God because there is coming a judgment day is the very thing Paul was talking about in the first passage suggested, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, whether it be good or bad," Now, in view of the judgment and all eternity thereafter what did Paul say that he and other preachers, did? In the very next verse, "Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord, we persuade men;" What did they persaude men to do or be? Did he ask them to join some denomination? Which one? No church existed then that one could join; however, one (and there was only one) did exist that God added men to when

they believed and were immersed in water, Acts 2:38-47. The Apostles persuaded men to be Christians, Acts 26-28, "Then Agrippa said unto Paul, almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Now, if the Apostles did not try to get men to join a denomination, why should I or any other


preacher try to get people to be more than a Christian? The people that I preach for have not joined anything. They have just believed and been baptized, and according to Mark 16:16 are saved; therefore God has added them to the church.





MOTORCYCLE DRIVERS LICENSE REQUIRED

For the first time a Texas motorcycle drivers license will be required of all persons who operate a motorscooter, motorcycle or motorized bicycle. A special restricted drivers license may be issued to teens between 15 and 18 years old for operation of a motorscooter having 5 brake horsepower or less. The minimum age for operation of a more powerful motorcycle is 16 with driver education and 18 without.

This portion of the new traffic law becomes effective January 1, 1968, and the TEXANS FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY urge compliance with the new law as a positive accident-preventing measure.



On The Farm In Parmer County

> By RONNY McNUTT County Agent

Several farmers in the county have indicated that they are getting some damaging infestations of greenbugs. Some farmers have taken control measures.

These plant lice suck sap from the small grain plants. Infested fields may have small deadened areas at first that continue to increase and soon spread throughout the field. Greenbugs cause more damage when small grain crops are suffering from deficient moisture.

The greenbug reproduces rapidly at temperatures between Freshmen, Ellen Denney, 55 and 75 degrees. Its natural enemies however, reproduce

very slowly when the temperatires are below 65 degrees. Thus, in cool weather the greenbug may increase to enormous numbers while its natural ene-

mies multiply slowly. According to Norris Daniels, Entomologist at the Bushland Station, build-up will continue when the days are warm (55-75 degrees) and even though nights are cold. Daniels indicates that it will take 20 degrees or below weather for several days to actually stop reproduction.

In the southern states this insect passes the winter in the active nymphal and adult stage

feeding on the stems of plants and giving birth to living young during the warmer periods of weather. In about two weeks after hatching females begin giving birth to living young. They continue reproducing for

about 20 to 30 days. With very young small grain plants, occasionally populations of 25 to 50 greenbugs per foot may warrant treatment. Normally in the winter months 100-300 will probably warrant control. It is important to make counts and keep a close check on fields at this time of the

If methyl parathion or parathion are used it is recommended to use at least one-half pound

It is recommended to leave cattle off pasture at least 14 days following application of the two above materials.
