Psychobureaucracy

Judge Jerome Frank of the Federal bench thinks he has a remedy for most of the ills that bureaucratic flesh is heir to. He suggests "not jocularly," he assures us—that the cure for Potomac fever, swelling of the ego, red tape before the eyes, and such, lies in psychiatry.

"Why should not those holding major administrative posts in government be required periodically to consult government psychiatrists?" he asks. "The best of men at times become creatures of inner drives and obsessions of which they have no awareness. An occasional chat by an overworked official with a government psychiatrist would make government run more smoothly."

At the risk of being called reactionary, we'd like to raise a couple of doubts. In the first place, we think that Judge Frank's insistence on "government" psychiatrists is wrong. When you put these specialists in the subconscious on the government payroll, their intrinsically intimate business would become the taxpaying public's business.

A harassed cabinet member couldn't sneak off to his own private adviser. No, he'd have to make his appointment with the government's cerebral sawbones in a government building on the government's time, and probably face a battery of the press as he emerged.

"What's the verdict, Mr. Secretary?" we can imagine a brash young reporter asking. "Did that dream you had about muddy water mean you've a frustrated desire to support a new power and irrigation project, or was the doctor's interpretation more Freudian and sinister?"

And think of the opportunity for scandal. Let us suppose that Senator Blooper is having a fight with Chairman Doakes of the O.P.X.

"My neighbor's oldest son goes with the receptionist who works for Doakes' psychiatrist," the senator is telling a friend, "so I know what I'm talking about. Boy, what a case history that Doakes has got. Talk about psychoses! For instance, listen to this . . ."

Furthermore, Judge Frank admits that psychiatry is an art rather than an exact science. Thus practitioners are bound to disagree. And it's highly possible that government psychiatrists, lined up as advisers on opposite sides of an interagency feud, might start a learned professional quarrel of their own over the proper way to exorcise a bureaucratic neurosis.

No, we can't agree with Judge Frank that a regiment of psychiatrists would flood Washington with sweetness, light and soothing syrup. Rather there lurks in our minds the suspicion that some of the bureaucrats might drive the psychiatrists themselves a little screwy.

Try The Criminals

Under most civilized law, a person accused of crime is presumed innocent until proven guilty. For that reason the rights of the accused are protected by an elaborate system of safeguards and delays which, though often abused, are retained to guard against a miscarriage of justice.

And for the same reason it seems pointless to debate whether the Nazi criminals should be tried by ordinary judicial procedure, or to haggle unduly over the definition of a war crime. These are not ordinary cases or ordinary criminals. There is no injustice in presuming such men as Goering and Doenitz guilty before trial.

Goering's order for the obliteration of surrendered Rotterdam, Doenitz's order for the slaughter of seamen who survived U-boat sinkings—these are blatant crimes in defiance of international agreement that do not need the nicety of legal definition.

It is time to end the debate and start the trials, before delay becomes softness and forgetfulness. Whatever the form of the tribunal the purpose of the trials is to carry out the urgent need to remove the unwholesome presence of some monstrous criminals from the face of the earth.

Investigation Of UNRRA Is Asked

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. Thomas (R-NJ) Thursday called for a congressional investigation of the UNRRA. He termed the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration "the focal point for the communist party in the United States."

Thomas said in an interview he would ask the House Committee on Un-American Activities, of which he is ranking minority member, to make the investigation.

The law-maker disclosed at the same time that the committee, set up as the permanent successor to the old Dies committee, will begin hearings June 20 to investigate what he termed "the dissemination of communistic propaganda" by an employee of the New York CPA office.

Other committee members revealed that investigators have been checking on the vice administration's New York office since last month and said Chester Bowles, CPA head, would be the first witness when the hearings start.

THE WAR TODAY

One of the questions most often asked me by readers of this column, as the Allies close in on Japan, is whether Russia is going to join us in crushing the brigands of the Pacific.

That's not an easy query to answer in view of the fact that there has been no official pronouncement for guidance, either from Moscow or the other Allied capitals. Marshal Stalin as usual has been exploiting his nickname of "The Sphinx" by playing his cards close to his chest. For this reason any guess as to whether the Soviet Union will make war on Japan must be based on two things—logic and significant trends.

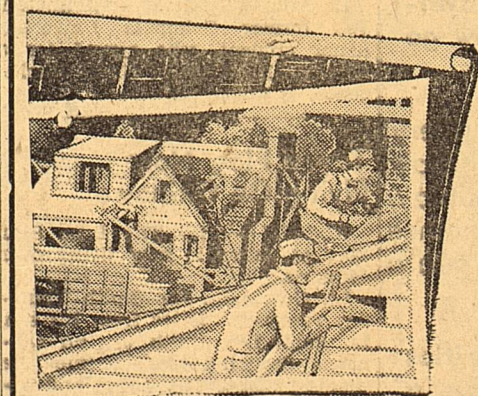
On both counts, as I see it, the probabilities are that the Muscovites will come into the war.

When? Well, the bulk of their fighting strength in all categories is in European Russia. We must allow time for the shifting of much of this strength to far-off Siberia—a titanic undertaking. It might be several months before Moscow felt sufficiently well set—perhaps late summer or autumn.

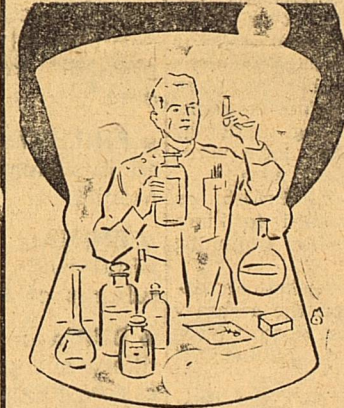

## ENTIRE MEMBERSHIP ATTENDS GARDEN ADDITION CLUB MEET

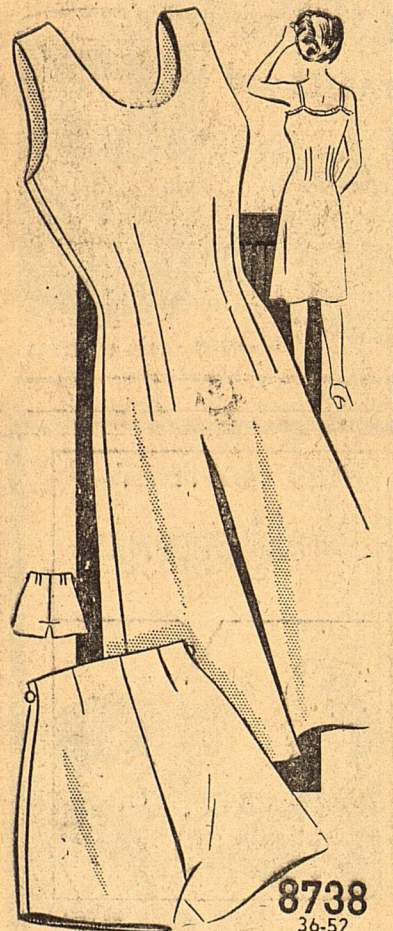

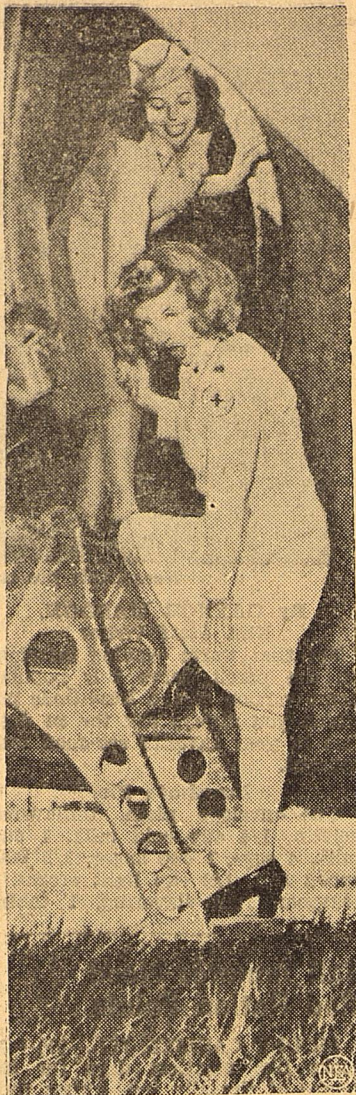

The meeting was closed by the group repeating the Lord's prayer in unison. Refreshments were served by the hostess.

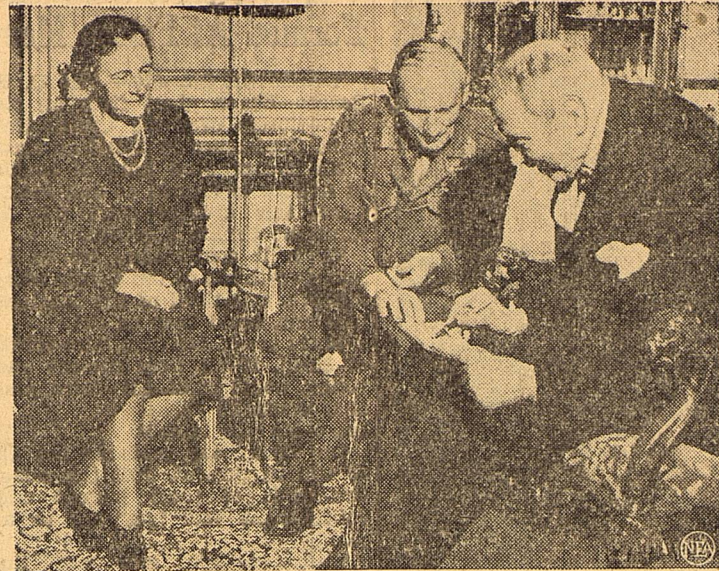

McLain heirs, as a 6,000-foot wildcat in Central-North Pecos County. Located 660 feet from north and west lines of north half of north-west quarter of section 7, block 2, E&TC survey, the exploration is to start with rotary by June 10. The project will be about 11 miles southeast of Imperial and about four miles east of the Abell-Perman field. Several companies are interested in the spread surrounding the drillsite. Included are Amerada Petroleum Corporation, Forest Development Corporation, Gulf Oil Corporation, and Magnolia Petroleum Company.

Skelly Oil Company filed application to possibly continue drilling on No. 1 Fraser, in southwest corner of east half of northeast quarter of section 29, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, to a destination of 10,000 feet. This exploration is a diagonal northeast outcrop to Rowal, Drilling Company No. 1 TXL which extended the producing limits of the TXL Devonian area at least three miles to the south.

According to unofficial information the Skelly development, which has not released any markers, is supposed to be checking satisfactorily with the Rowan producer, and it is due to produce in the Devonian, but owner filed the supplemental application to go ahead through the Silurian, and to the Ellenburger—just in case.

Continental Oil Company No. 1-D Seidles, South Howard County exploration, in section 133, block 29, W&NW survey, now testing at 8,910-50 feet, in the Pennsylvania, was recovering some new oil while swabbing near bottom of the hole, at 2,950 feet.

Outpost Completing Giles Service Oil Company No. 1-A Thomas, in southwest corner of section 8, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, due east outcrop to the TXL field Devonian discovery, is reported to be completing after testing for 129 barrels of oil for a 24-hour period.

The pay section at 7,870-8,030 feet, had been treated with 1,500 gallons, 1,500 gallons and 8,000 gallons of acid through 679 casing perforations in 7-inch casing. Standoil Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Presidio Trust, in section 99, block 3, D&P survey, was making new hole below 2,951 feet, in lime.

At 2,674-2,730 feet a one-hour drillstem test was taken. There was a steady blow of air throughout and recovery was 150 feet of drilling fluid. No pressures, and no shows were reported.

Another In Martin The Texas Company No. 49-A Mabee, in northeast corner of section 32, block 39, G&MMB&A survey, T-2-N, in Southwest Martin County, one location from production in the Mabee field, has been completed for a 24-hour pumping potential of 284 barrels of 32-gravity oil, with a gas-oil ratio of 104-1, from pay at 4,675-4,718 feet, after a 170-quart shot.

George P. Livermore, Inc. No. 1 Alexander, Floyd County wildcat in J. C. Cooper survey No. 345, had reached 2,474 feet, and was drilling ahead.

"Sit In The Picture" DeKalb Agricultural Association, Inc., No. 1-C Lockhart & Brown, in southwest quarter of section 12, block A-41, psi survey, outcrop to discovery well for the Martin pool, in Southwest Andrews County, was going ahead under 4,080 feet, in lime and shale. Top of brown lime had not been encountered. No definite correlations had been released. It is understood that the project is "still in the picture."

Lesco, Inc., No. 10 University, section 17, block 14, University survey, in the shallow Crockett field, in Northwest Crockett County, which missed regular pay between 1,100 feet and 1,300 feet, and then found indications of oil around 3,000-2,150 feet, in drilling to total depth of 2,906 feet, plugged back to 2,185 feet, and tested.

A Hole Full Of Water Casing was perforated with four shots to the foot at 2,010-2,185 feet, and project developed a hole full of water. Operator is to squeeze off and test in another zone.

Frank and George Frankel No. 1-J University, Devonian development between the Fullerton "3500" producing area and the Standoil Oil & Gas Company No. 1-P University, recent discovery, about four miles south, had reached 3,885 feet, in anhydrite and was going ahead.

Top of anhydrite was at 1,670; top of Yates at 2,930 feet, and elevation is 3,288 feet.

Senate Must Approve Any League Of Nations Formed At Frisco Meet

WASHINGTON—(P)—The U. S. Senate—like a ghost from an old play—hovers over the United Nations Conference in San Francisco. No matter what kind of league of nations is formed at San Francisco, this country can't join it until the Senate approves.

When it comes time for us to join, two-thirds of the Senate must approve. One-third of the senators, plus one, could keep us out. There are 96 Senators. Two-thirds of them, if all were present and voting, would be 64. One-third, plus one, would be 33.

On voting day probably not all 96 will be present. Just the same, two-thirds of those present and voting must vote "yes" for us to join. That two-thirds rule was the bedrock on which our chance of joining the old league of nations was broken and destroyed.

That rule gives the Senate terrific power, so much so that even though the majority of the American people wanted this country to join the new league, a handful of senators—one-third, plus one—could keep us out.

There has been strenuous agitation in the past two years to abolish the two-thirds rule.

Some congressmen wanted a simple majority vote of both houses—the Senate and House of Representatives—to be all that was necessary to ratify a treaty.

The Senate is still in the saddle.

Filipino Woman Masquerades As Man To Help Americans

By JAMES HUTCHESON WITH THE 38TH DIVISION ON LUZON—(P)—Marita—all 110 pounds of her—had been carrying supplies to American troops in the Sierra Madre mountains for two months before an officer discovered her masquerade.

Then Lt. Anthony Cancelosi of Nutley, N. J., the 38th Division's civil affairs officer, uncovered the story of how this 18-year old girl, inspired by a consuming hatred of the enemy, plodded up mountain trails daily with burdens of half her own weight and how she had become Maritina's most vindictive Japanese killer.

Filipino men and boys, who find it difficult to keep up with her on the trail, tell of the time Jap snipers were harassing the "human pack train" in the hills. An American patrol went after them. But while the soldiers were advancing slowly, Marita spotted the two snipers and killed them both with her rifle. In all, she says shyly, she has killed several.

Cancelosi first became suspicious of the sex of the barefooted trousers-clad girl when he noticed her long fingers as she reached out for her week's pay. A battered cap covered her close-cut hair.

Marita, he found, is poorly educated and speaks very little English. But in her heart is a hatred of the Japanese that gives her strength and courage.

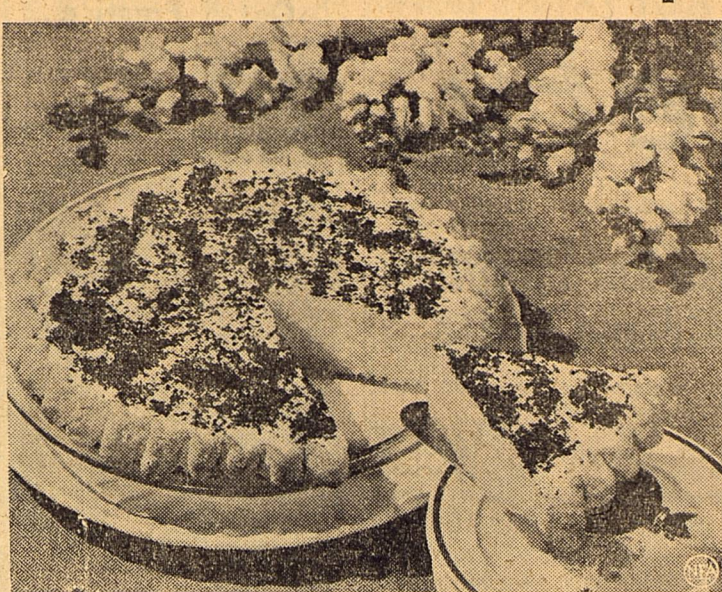

For that warm evening informal on the porch, serve this popular home version of the Nesselrode pie which you always ask for as dessert in your favorite sea-food restaurant.

Nesselrode Pie One envelope plain, unflavored gelatin, 1/4 cup cold milk, 1 cup milk, 4 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup light cream, 1 teaspoon rum flavoring, 1 table-

spoon finely chopped maraschino cherries, 1/3 cup chocolate chips. Soften gelatin in cold milk. Scald 1 cup of milk and add slowly to slightly beaten egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar and salt which have been combined. Cook in top of double boiler until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool and add cream and rum flavoring. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which remaining 1/2 cup sugar has been added, and the chopped maraschino cherries. Pour into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill until firm. Sprinkle top of pie with chocolate chips just before serving.

Either iced coffee or iced tea—strong and freshly made—goes well with this dessert. To make iced tea for 5, follow these tested directions:

Iced Tea Scald teapot with boiling water. Measure 10 teaspoons tea into pot. Bring 5 cups freshly drawn water to a galloping boil; pour into teapot. Cover; let stand 3 minutes; strain. Pour hot tea infusion over ice in tall glasses. Serve with lemon slices. Serves 5.

Bretton Woods Agreements Due To Be Approved

By FRANCIS M. LE MAY WASHINGTON—(P)—Overwhelming House approval of the Bretton Woods agreements apparently was assured Thursday. The chamber came to a vote on the most far-reaching legislation for postwar international cooperation yet to reach Congress.

A test late Wednesday showed 120 to 18 for ratification, and opponents conceded they did not expect more than 25 or 30 of the 433 House members to vote "no" on the final roll-call.

The agreements, drawn by representatives of 44 nations meeting last summer at Bretton Woods, N. H., propose to establish a \$9,100,000,000 world bank for reconstruction and development loans and an \$8,800,000,000 fund for international currency stabilization.

Rep. Sumner (R-Ill.), a leader of the opposition, said the legislation will pass the House but added: "It will be a different story when the bill goes to the Senate."

AUSTIN—(AP)—A mistake of the Legislature in submitting a constitutional amendment may cost the taxpayers \$200,000.

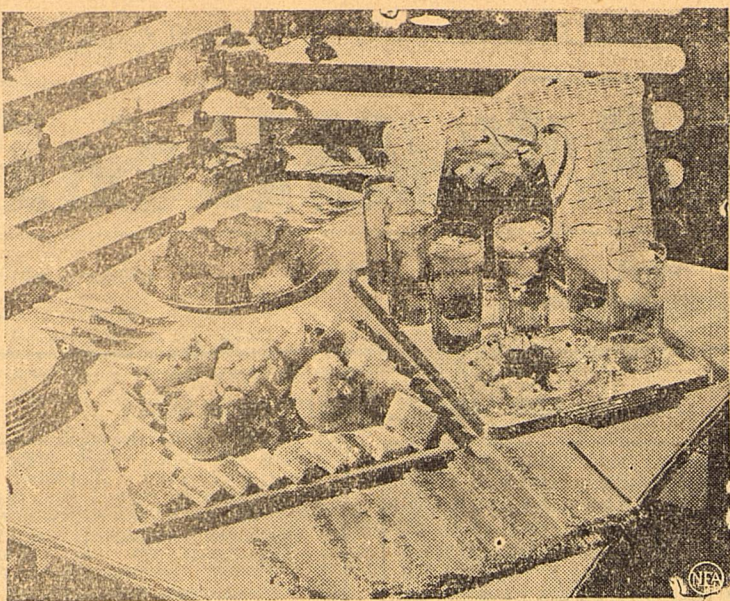
That's Secretary of State Claude Isbell's estimate of the cost of a special election for voting on an amendment.

The Legislature intended to submit the amendment at the Nov. 5, 1946 general election. The resolution submitting it ordered the election on the first Thursday in November, 1946. That's Nov. 7, 1946, two days after the general election at which three amendments will be submitted.

Four more amendments will be submitted at a special election Aug. 25 of this year.

### Use Orange Shells To Hold Salad

It's going to another stay-at-home summer. Gasoline will still have to be husbanded. Government officials are repeating their pleas to civilians to stay off trains. Restaurants are crowded and understaffed.

But hospitality is one thing that has not been rationed. Plan your party supper for the garden or terrace. Or on a screened porch or in your cool dining room. Give your guests a simple meal.

If your party is relatively small, say a dozen persons, you can use the iced tea recipe for an individual serving, merely multiplying it by the number of glasses you think will be needed.

Use 2 teaspoons of tea, or 2 tea bags, for each glass. Always use bubbling, boiling water and pour it on the tea. Steep for 3 minutes. Fill the glass about 2/3 full of ice and pour the tea over it.

To combat the sugar shortage,

you might use a bit of orange juice, which will sweeten the tea, or make a sugar syrup, which will help the sugar go farther.

#### Orange Cup Salads

Twelve orange shells, 1 cup diced grapefruit sections, 1 cup diced orange sections, 1 cup sliced bananas, 3 cups pitted sweet cherries, melon balls, blackberries (or any fruit in season), 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries, 1/2 cup salted peanut meats, mayonnaise or salad dressing, watercress.

Cut thin slice from bottom of orange, so orange will set level. Cut thicker slice from top; scoop out pulp. With scissors make fancy edges on orange shells. Mix fruits and nuts; drain off liquid. Add enough mayonnaise to moisten. Put fruit into orange shells. Arrange on large serving plate; garnish with watercress. Serves 12.

#### Cottage Cheese and Chive Sandwiches

Mix together 1 1/2 cups cottage cheese and 1/4 cup finely chopped chives. Season with salt and pepper. Spread on 6 slices wholewheat bread. Top each with another wholewheat bread slice. Remove crusts; cut each sandwich in 4 squares. Makes 24.

### GI Resourcefulness Playing Important Part In Pacific War

GUAM—(AP)—In the Pacific war, the tremendous distances put such a strain on movements of men and supplies that the good old American trait of resourcefulness plays a vital part.

Illustrative in a small but meaningful way are the queer little windmill contraptions you see everywhere at the Naval Air Base. Naturally things like laundries take time. A man has to be his own washwoman.

At the Navy air base, Americans who in their youth fashioned scooters and foot-pedaling automobiles out of bits of this and that have used the same ingenuity to utilize the wind in washing their clothes. The crude windmills are attached to metal plungers; the clothes put in box type tubs; and the washing goes on while the airman is on duty.

Larger Scale  
You can multiply that resourcefulness on a larger scale. It made possible the bustling base of the Air Transport Command of the Army Air Force on Guam. Last November, a bare five months ago, a group of around 150 men looked upon an area allotted to them which was barren except for coconut palms.

There was construction to be done. They were not essentially constructionists. They were bakers, mechanics and all the varied types of trade to be expected among any similar group of Americans.

Now the ATC is a village unto itself with an administration building, a depot, quonset huts, storage facilities and a hangar. The men built everything but the hangar. They were their own "Seabees."

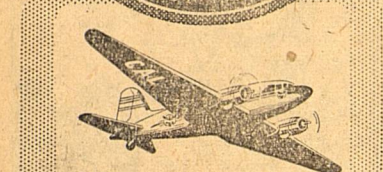

# Marriage is a Serious BUSINESS

## Taking Stock Of Your Marriage

PERIODICALLY, every business organization pauses to take stock, to balance its books, to see what its profits are and what its liabilities, to search out the causes of the deficits and look for methods of operating that will be more efficient.

Marriage could profit by this method of stock-taking, and certainly there is no better time for doing so than on wedding anniversaries.

Some years ago, G. V. Hamilton and Kenneth Macgowan set out to query married couples, with a view to finding what was wrong with marriage. Like so many investors, they learned that women are far more dissatisfied with marriage than men.

The reasons put forward by women for their dissatisfaction, in the order of their importance, were: sex demands of husband, temperament, domestic slavery, and economic troubles. The men's reasons, in the same order, were: temperament, sex, lack of personal freedom.

First among the grievances of wives and second among the grievances of husbands is the problem of sex. American husbands are not, in the great majority, good lovers. Women are dissatisfied because their husbands either do not know how or do not care to make themselves loved physically. Men are dissatisfied because their wives do not give them the kind of response they desire.

## Payoff Comes Next In War Against Japs

WASHINGTON (AP)—The impending conquest of Okinawa winds up, military observers believe, the long, arduous "island-hopping" which started with the invasion of Guadalcanal in 1942.

The next American move in the Pacific, in the opinion of these experts, will be the payoff.

With the Philippines, the Marianas and Iwo Jima, they say, American forces now have ample bases from which they can mount a major thrust against either China or the Japanese home islands.

Some minor island still may be seized to provide air strips, but the big job of winning the land masses necessary as staging areas for the invasion air fleets and ground troops is over.

Enemy Can Guess Just which way the next blow may fall is up to the enemy to guess.

At the present time, experts estimate, the air campaign against Japan is about as far along as the aerial war against Germany was in February, 1944, just before the Luftwaffe was effectively paralyzed.

Japan, however, is considered more vulnerable than Germany at the same stage, and reduction of Japan's war potential may be achieved in relatively shorter time.

Any landing in China presumably would be made somewhere in the Hong Kong area, since that is the sector from which the Chinese army could be supplied most easily.

The number of divorces that have been based on trifles thin as air is almost incredible: a woman's habit of appearing at breakfast with her hair in curlers; a man banging doors and tracking mud into the house and dropping cigar ashes on the rug; a woman never having dinner on time. Unimportant? Far from it.

Criticism, pointing out little habits that are sources of irritation, can be done with humor and tact.

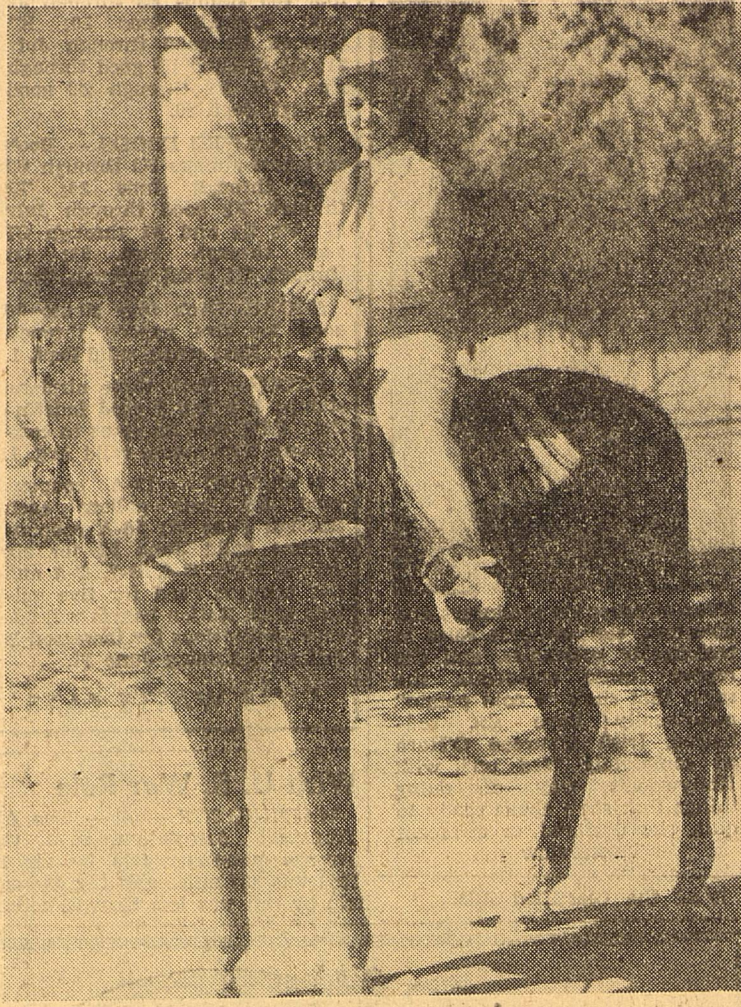
Another of these irritants is a woman's mistake in complaining at the dinner table over the problems of the day. Her husband has problems too, and he is tired. Make dinner something to look forward to and save the complaints for later on.

"We haven't anything to talk about," married couples complain. That is grave indeed. It means that you are not really friends, that you have no common interests. But the events of the day, trivial as they may be, concern you both, and they can be made amusing, with a little effort. You make them amusing for others. Why not for your married partner?

## Lone Submarine Makes Surface Attack On Escorted Jap Convoy

PEARL HARBOR (AP)—Every submariner knows that you can't put a lone submarine up against an escorted convoy in an attack on the surface and get away with it. It is certain suicide.

But Commander Lawson P. Ramage did it, sank four Japanese ships, and got away without a scratch.

That's why Commander Ramage, of New London, Conn., holds the Congressional Medal of Honor and one of his war patrols ranks as one of the greatest feats ever performed by an American submariner.

The submarine was the Parche, and she had the Japanese crazy. She fired 19 torpedoes in 46 minutes and she scored 15 hits in what the Navy is pleased to call a "brilliant night surface attack."

The Japanese were dumbfounded when they found the Parche inside their protecting warships. They were so astonished they fired at each other. They sought to ram the Parche and they came within 50 feet as Ramage maneuvered her out of the way. The warship and the Parche were so close the crews of the two ships shouted insults at each other—in English and Japanese.

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Chinese Forces Advance To Futing

CHUNGKING—(P)—The Chinese High Command announced Thursday that Chinese forces pursuing Japanese troops withdrawing northward along the Fukien coastal highway had reached the suburbs of Futing, 105 miles above Foochow and less than 10 miles from the Chekiang border.

The announcement said the Chinese were heavily attacking enemy positions in the town and it was believed here that a Japanese retreat to Wenchow, 65 miles north of Futing, was imminent.

Bombers Blast Japs In Eastern Kwangsi Province, where American and Chinese reports said the big former 14th Air Force base of Luichow was back in Chinese hands, American planes in direct support of ground troops struck at the northward fleeing enemy in the triangle formed by Luichow, Pinglo and Kweilin, the provincial capital.

Other American planes struck at the Japanese in wide sweeps which ranged all the way from Peiping in the north to the coastal railroad of French Indo-China.

The Chinese High Command said Chinese planes scored direct hits on 10 trains on the Peiping-Hankow railroad, vital artery of the Japanese corridor. They also struck in Honan Province.

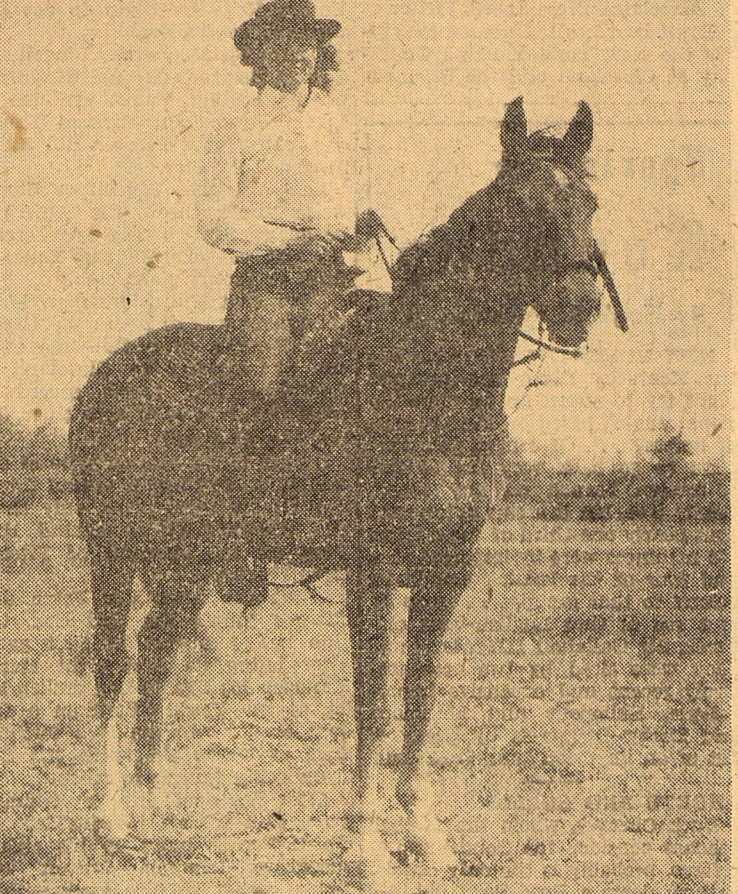

By FRED HAMPSON LUZON—(P)—It was a bum souvenir cave which Staff Sergeant Anthony J. Malinowski, New Britain, Conn., of the 25th Division, blasted shut when he saw a Japanese soldier near the mouth. Later he dug it open. Inside were 18 Japanese, all smothered. He got one captured American rifle.

Surprise Meeting Pvt. Murray Craft of the 32d Division, overseas three years, ran into Pvt. Samuel B. Kohn, overseas 16 months, during a lull in Luzon fighting. Both live at the same address in New Jersey. Kohn and his wife rented part of the Craft home after Craft came overseas.

Kohn gave Craft some fairly recent information on his son whom Papa Craft has never seen. A guerrilla force working with the Eleventh Corps on Luzon got into a Japanese supply dump east of Manila, captured five reels of motion pictures.

Thinking they might have some valuable information they rushed the celluloid to G-2. A screen was set up. The pictures: Chapters one to five inclusive of a "Junior G-Man" serial. All Doing Fine Pfc. Bert Johnson, Mannsville, Okla., a medical corpsman with the 43d Division, was accosted by a Filipino whose wife had become ill as they were making their way through the lines.

It took Pfc. Johnson half a second in the twilight darkness to diagnose the case. The wife was about to have a baby. There were no doctors nearby.

Pfc. Johnson and the husband got her into a Nipa hut. With the aid of a portable gas stove, a flashlight, over-heat tank, which the expectant father kept dropping—and first aid equipment Johnson ushered the youngster into the world and in the morning supervised moving of mother and child, a 9 1/4 pound boy, to a hospital. The doctor called it a perfect job—"mother, child and medic doing fine."

Inscribed on the denture was "Willie Jackson, 34510733." Willie got his dough!

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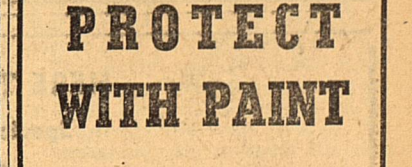

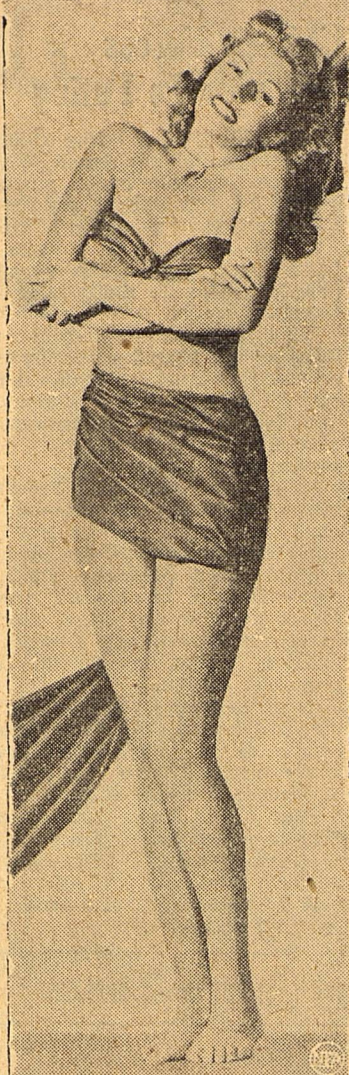

**Hoop Jr. Sets Fast Pace In Derby Workout**

 LOUISVILLE, KY.—(AP)—Hope springs eternal in the breast of a proud owner of a thoroughbred filly.  
 Arthur Rose of Mt. Clemens, Mich., is no exception.  
 Rose, secretary of the Michigan Racing Commission, is the proud owner of Misweet, least talked about nominee of the 17 possible starters in the 71st Kentucky Derby Saturday. She's going to run come rain, mud or a fast track.

Even the blazing workout of Hoop Jr., one of the favorites, Wednesday, failed to frighten Rose or his trainer, Lee O'Donnell. Hoop Jr., one of a trio of eastern threats, carrying the Derby weight of 126 pounds, thundered around the Churchill Downs track to hit the mile post in 1:38 3/5 and sped on for another eighth to finish in 1:51 3/5, fastest time since Johnstown turned in a pre-Derby mile in 1939.

**Filly Won Once**  
 Seventy times the Kentucky Derby has been decided and only once has a filly's nose come down in front—Regret 30 years ago. Forty-five other fillies vainly have attempted to triumph through the long years. It has been nine years since a filly even started.  
 Misweet, purchased for only \$1,650, and winner of nearly \$9,000 in her first year of racing, has started nineteen times and never has worse than fourth.  
 Louisville began to boil with Derby excitement Thursday. Every hotel is jammed to the roof with no rooms to be had. The last reserved ticket has been sold. Col. Matt Winn, managing director of Churchill Downs, predicts a crowd in excess of 70,000.

**Policeman's Life Is Not Happy One For German Cops Anyway**

 GERMANY—(AP)—That whimsical Gilbert and Sullivan line "The policeman's lot is not a happy one" could be applied with sardonic emphasis to the German civilian police under American military government.  
 Many of them are still under 70, some perhaps only 50, but alongside the strapping young American MP's they look singularly old and tired.  
 One reason for the grandfatherly impression they make as a group is that the Germans put practically every able bodied man into the Army, leaving a rather elderly lot for police duty. When the military government took over there was a rigorous weeding out of all Nazis from the municipal provincial police forces. To fill the ranks of the new civilian police the military government had to reach back for veterans of the retired list, some of whom had not walked a beat since Hitler came into power.  
 None of these policemen is permitted to carry arms. In some towns they function in the same uniforms as before the American occupation but with the white MG arm band. In most places they work in civilian clothes and the white armband is their only insignia.  
**Real Power Is Military**  
 The real police power in the American area is military. But there are not enough MP's and security guards to perform all the police tasks so the military government leans on the German civilian police force to maintain order among civilians, including foreigners classified as displaced persons.  
 There is where the headaches begin for the unhappy police. Among their fellow Germans they manage fairly well, but to many of the recently liberated foreign workers the German policeman is just another German. The Russians are particularly contemptuous of these white arm banded patrolmen.  
 The spectacle of a small group of unarmed German policemen trying to handle a crowd of looters of mixed nationalities by threats and persuasion is pathetic. The wise ones show discretion and simply run for help to the American MP's or the military government officers.

**Dog Abandonment Is Violation Of Law**

Complaints have been received by County Attorney Joe Mims from residents of rural areas that the practice of dumping and abandoning dogs in the rural section has been increasing.  
 Mims called attention to the fact that Article 1734 of the Texas Penal Code provides for a fine up to \$200 for this offense.  
 The county attorney expressed the opinion many persons who found it necessary to leave pets behind thought if they left the pets out in the rural areas someone would adopt them, but more often than not the pets starve. Instances have been called to Mims' attention of the starving dogs attacking and destroying sheep.  
 Chief of Police Jack Ellington reminded dog owners if they cannot take care of their dogs the animals can be taken to the city pound, which is better for the animals than abandoning them.

 portant industrial producer, within a month.  
 High explosive bombs centered on the Osaka arsenal sent Japanese scurrying to air raid shelters before the fire-bombing B-29s started new blazes burning in the industrial section where more than 11 square miles were blackened in previous strikes. A Japanese communique said that blazes started in the daylight attack were being "steadily brought under control."  
 Heavy overcast prevented American bombardiers from observing results of their attack, a departure from recent all-incendiary raids.  
**Important Arsenal**  
 The Osaka arsenal is one of Nippon's most important producers of medium artillery and small arms.  
 Osaka is only 750 miles northeast of the Naha airbase, one of the first Japanese-built fields the Americans have ever captured. It was overrun Wednesday by Marines of the Sixth Division, who found it overgrown with grass, littered with the wreckage of some 70 enemy planes, and pepper-marked by great craters.  
 Engineers immediately began putting both the field and Naha harbor, the best port in the Ryukyu Islands, into shape for American use.  
 Despite the rains which severely hampered the advance, a few more Japanese planes were able to get through in their persistent attacks on U. S. shipping. Two more vessels were damaged. About 60 have been hit altogether but enemy sources indicated the Americans were perfecting an effective defense against the kamikaze (suicide) aerial attacks.  
 Tokyo reported 40 American fighter planes from Okinawa raided suicide air bases on Southern Japan Thursday and scattered propaganda leaflets.  
 Emperor Hirohito got a report on the nation's unstable political affairs from Premier Kantaro Suzuki, including a wholesale shakeup of the munitions ministry and resignation of the vice speaker of the house of representatives.  
 "There was perhaps greater cause for Japanese worry in an announced conference at Manila between Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, commander of U. S. Army Ground Forces, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, joint commander with Admiral Chester W. Nimitz for the invasion of Japan.
