Germans Planned Third World War

Thursday it has obtained secret German documents showing how the Nazis intend to "hide" in strategic industries while planning "a third attempt at world conquest."

The announcement was made by Chairman Kilgore (D-W Va) of the War Mobilization Subcommittee of the

Senate military group. Kilgore said his committee will open hearings Monday "on the economic base for German aggression" and that additional facts will be brought out.

The announcement contained a report on a meeting of German industrialists at Strasbourg, Aug. 10, 1944, intended to make postwar

"Masquerading as neutral businessmen without political allegiance, the German industrialists have already conceived vicious plans for third attempt at world conques,t' Kilgore said.

The document on, the secret meeting quoted a Dr. Scheid, as saying that "each industrialist must make contacts and alliances with foreign firms, but this must be done suspicion.

At another meeting, Kilgore said, the Nazis told the industrialists that the war was lost and "they must prepare themselves to finance the Nazi party which would be forced to go underground."

It was suggested further that the big firms set up small research units not connected with their factories, adding:

"These bureaus will receive plans and drawings of new weapons as well as documents which they need to continue their research and which must not be allowed to fall into the hands of the enemy."

United Nations Charter Designed To Provide Peace

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER SAN FRANCISCO-(A)-A charer embracing the views of 50 United Nations was wrapped up Thursday into a world document designed to maintain peace.

President Truman, now taking a brief holiday in Washington state, will bring the United Nations Conference to a formal cicse with a peech on international affairs Tuesday afternoon.

Until that time the delegates of individually and without attracting the 50 nations represented here will be busy with a variety of technical problems and speechmaking sessions. But the real work of the conference is accomplished.

Midland Exceeds Large Quota In War Bond Drive

Midland went over the top Thursday on its over-all quota in the Mighty Seventh War Loan campaign but is still far short of meetng its Series E quota, Mayor A. N. Hendrickson, War Bond chairman nnounced.

Midland County now is credited with \$1,427,052.25 of War Bond purchases. The quota was \$1,425,000. Series E Bond purchases total \$359,508.75 with a quota of \$600,000. Hendrickson received letters Thursday saying the Seaboard Oil Company had allotted \$15,000 in War Bond purchases, and the Sheil Oil Company Incorparted had allocated \$10,000 to Midland County.

Expendable Scientists

From time to time in the past year there have been warnings of a growing shortage of students in the fields of science and technology, and of the serious long-range dangers that may be expected in consequence.

These warning have been issued piecemeal by leaders in various scientific professions. Now comes a joint report by the American Council on Education and the National Research Council, covering the entire subject of this warinflicted deficiency. And while the separate earlier warnings were disquieting, it must be said that the impact of the whole situation is greater than the sum of its parts.

The report indicates that if present enrollment rates in medical schools continue, there will be 19,000 fewer doctors for civilians after the war than before. It states that although an annual enrollment of 3,000 new dental students is estimated to be necessary for the country's needs, our dental colleges expect only 360 freshmen this

In other fields the situation seems quite as alarming. The college enrollment of student engineers is 64 per cent below the 1939-40 level; the enrollment in pharmacy is off 73 per cent; in mining. 84 per cent; in agriculture, 89 per cent; and in forestry, 91 per cent.

A long and total war such as this is tremendously depleting to a country's resources, whatever its military fortunes. The nearness of victory increases, rather than lessens, its demands and depletions.

Yet there is evidence that our military authorities have failed to recognize these obvious facts. Not only have the pleas of educators and scientists for an adequate nucleus of present and future replacements gone unheeded, but there have been conflicts with civilian government agencies over replacement materials for such basic war essentials as transportation, farm machinery, and heavy industrial equipment.

Russia, Britain, Canada and other Allies, the joint renort points out, have not only maintained but in some instances increased their reserve of technical and scientific students. Our government has not done this. On the contrary, it has cut deferments sharply and increasingly curtailed college training under military auspices.

This policy may be short-sighted for the present as well as the future, since modern war can use almost all the scientific training needed for peace. And it will certainly increase the war's price if, after winning the war, we find ourselves with inadequate health protection, and an inadequate body of trained scientists to maintain and advance our domestic prosperity and our world position.

Some of that added price seems inevitable. Yet it is not too late for the military to moderate its apparent insistance upon throwing the country's entire reserve of potential scientists into the front line of battle and thus jeopardizing the attainment of a victorious peace.





New Bill Seeks Expansion Of GI Bill Of Rights

pansion of educational benefits under the GI "Bill of Rights" is proposed in a bill introduced by Senator Pepper (D-Fla).

Pepper said in a statement that the legislation embodies recommendations of the American Legion and National Educational Associa-

It proposes an increase in dependency allowances for veterans ob-taining an education under the GI bill. They now are allowed \$50 a month for subsistence while studying if single, \$75 a month if responsible for one or more dependents. Increase Allowances

The Pepper amendment would in crease this to \$100 a month for two dependents, \$125 for three, and \$150

Men over 25 no longer would have to prove that their education was interrupted when they entered service, but would be entitled to the same benefits as veterans under 25 Veterans would be able to take advantage of the educational provisions later than the current twoyear deadline, if they wished, giving them a chance to obtain jobs

The maximum benefit now is four years of education. The Pepper proposal would grant qualified students in professional courses up to seven years.



American Soldier Is Held By Buddies As German War Prisoner

FRAMINGHAM, MASS .- (P)- A 7-year-old American soldier spent the "30 most harrowing days" of his life when he was captured by his own troops and held as a wounded 'German" prisoner of war.

Cpl. Gilbert J. Beamesderfer of Ephrata, Penn., a Cushing General Hospital patient recently granted a 90-day work furlough, was a squad leader in the 35th Division of the Third Army before events became

too confused for comfort.

He remembered leading his men against a German machine gun nest in France and being hit in the left arm.

Then apparently he got mixed up with some captured Germans and when he awoke he was in a hospital. Just before they gave him ether,

a surgeon spoke to him reassuringly in German. Beamesderfer, who speaks German, grinned and answered in the enemy language. Ignored By Officer

Hours later an American lieuten-ant passed by, and Beamesderfer asked: "What happened? Have we been captured?"
"Be quiet," the lieutenant said.

'You're all right. You're with your "Buddies, hell!" Beamesderfer screamed. "Get me out of here. I'm





Technically Efficient Warburton said the two newes Japanese fighters have several developments which increase their maneuverability and technical ef-ficiency. Both are imperial navy planes, euphemistically called the

"George" and the "Jack."

The two high-speed fighters are based upon German design, he added. But the Japanese have added their own developments and improvements.

"Japan's biggest trouble, is the lack of mechanical safety," Warburton continued. "They sacrifice safety for the decreased weight that will permit greater speed and mancuverability.


