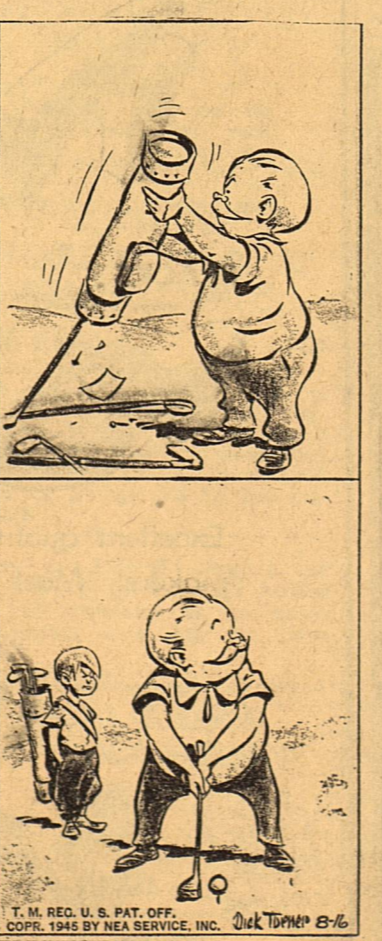


U. S. And British Discuss Palestine As State For Jews

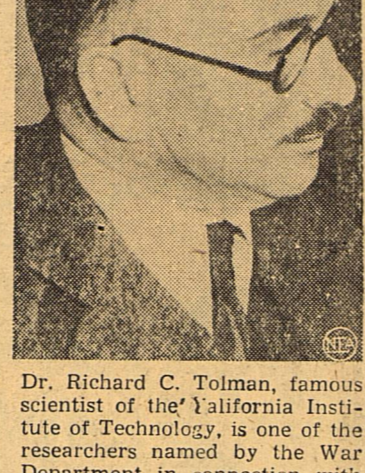
WASHINGTON (AP)—All Americans seem likely to get a cut in their income taxes after January 1. Perhaps several million will have to pay no income taxes at all next year.

Congress is coming back September 5 in a tax-cutting mood. Some of the best-informed tax experts in Washington think a reduction in personal income taxes will be enacted before Christmas.





Armed With Secret Of Atomic Fission, Democracy Steward Of Man's Future

By JAMES D. WHITE Associated Press Staff Writer SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Armed with the atom, English-speaking Democracy finds itself for the time being the steward of mankind's future.

Realization of this is inherent in President Truman's declaration Thursday night that the United States, Britain and Canada would not disclose the secret of the atomic bomb "until means have been found to control the bomb so as to protect ourselves and the rest of the world from the danger of total destruction."

The full meaning of the discovery of atomic fission and its control remains locked in the future, but one thing is clear already. The threat of utter annihilation to large segments of humanity, never before practicable, now can become a reality.

Shift In World Power Whether America is ready to accept it or not, this can mean a vast shift in the balance of world power, definitely toward the hands that hold this new threat.

It will take years perhaps to apply the principle of atomic fission to other uses, but it can scarcely be doubted that it will be done. The implications of atomic energy in peace eventually may be just as revolutionary. The possessors of atomic energy to drive industry

and communications will have an economic weapon which might well surpass in effectiveness this first child of the domesticated atom—the atomic bomb.

No nation without this power behind its factories, its carriers, its entire economy, could compete with those who use it.

Should We Keep Secret The question facing the English-speaking peoples today, therefore, is first, whether to share this great new secret.

Fast discoveries of comparable importance in their time—such weapons as gunpowder, the armored ship, radio, the airplane—were not kept secret.

Many of them never were secrets, but the spontaneity with which similar discoveries were made in many countries leading to the development of these weapons suggests that they could not have been kept secret long, if at all.

So the question is likely to boil down to how to share the secret in the end, because if we don't, the fact that we don't may stimulate others to match it or even exceed it.

"Live Or Die Together" Sen. Hatch (D-NM) says: "Now we either live together in peace or we die together. . . The world is going to have to accept the rule of law and justice or be destroyed."

The Democratic faith is that he can, by intelligence and good will, overcome his own shortcomings for the common good.

The Fascist idea, which should be discredited by now, is that there's no use trusting him.

Democracy then, armed with the first forging of history's most potent weapon, faces its greatest test as a working principle.

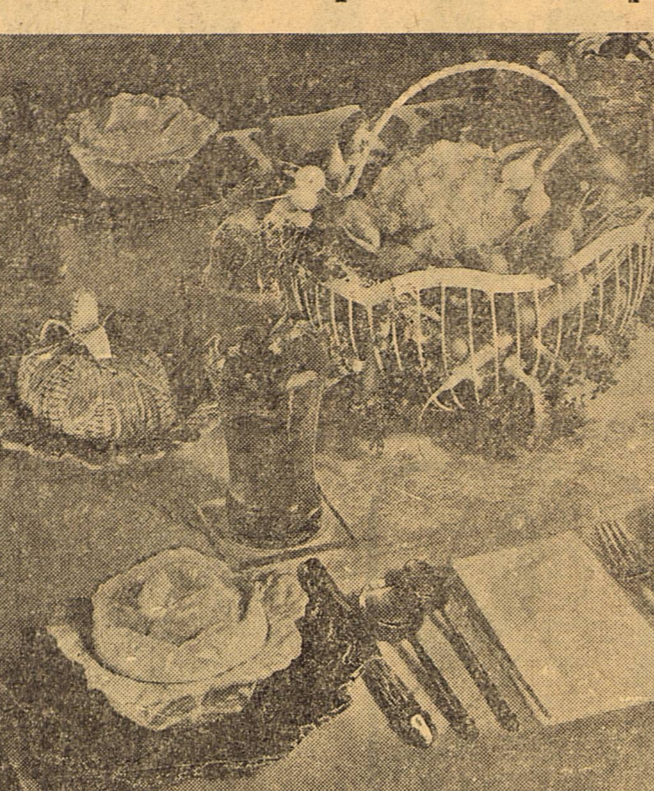

Give A Victory Garden Party

The Victory Garden is in full fruit, a proud time for the amateur gardener. He can now justify his boasting by having all his friends in for a vegetable dinner of rare flavor.

Chicken Livers, Broiled Tomatoes (Serves 6)

One pound chicken livers, 1/4

pound mushrooms, 3 tablespoons fortified margarine, 1/8 teaspoon garlic salt, 1 tablespoon curry powder, 2 tablespoons wine, wine vinegar or lemon juice, dash of finely powdered thyme, 6 half-ripe tomatoes, 1/4 cup bread crumbs.

Wooden skewers may be obtained from your meat market. Divide the chicken livers between six of these skewers, threading on a liver, then a piece of mushroom. Mold in smooth drumstick when skewer is filled. Melt the margarine, add garlic salt, curry powder, wine, vinegar or lemon juice and the thyme. Mix. In this sauce, marinate the filled skewers for about an hour, turning occasionally or basting with the sauce. Then arrange on a broiling grid. Wash and cut tomatoes in half. Sprinkle each cut half with extra salt. Add bread crumbs to marinating sauce and mix. Spread over tops of tomatoes. Grill under slow heat until chicken livers and the tomatoes are well cooked.

Squaw Corn Ten to 12 ears corn, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 3 tablespoons fortified margarine, paprika, 1 teaspoon honey or corn syrup.

Cut corn from cobs. Melt the margarine in a heavy frying pan. Add the minced onion and corn. Saute gently to golden brown. Add honey or corn syrup.

The Long Way Home

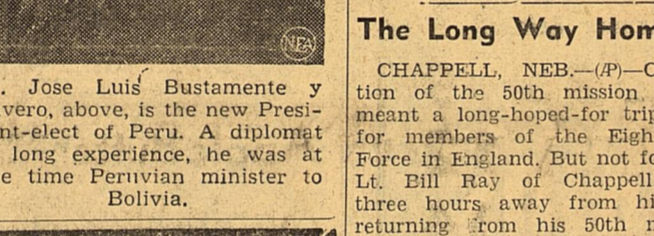

Attlee Is Solid Like Truman; Lacks Bevin's Pugnacity And Glamor That Was McDonald's

The following article was written by Milton Bronner, veteran foreign correspondent and former European Manager of NEA Service, who watched Prime Minister Clement Attlee's slow but sure rise from his early Limehouse years to the political heights.

Clement Attlee might be called the Truman of the British political upheaval. Just as Truman got the Democratic nomination for vice-president as the result of bitter rivalry between Byrnes and Wallace adherents, so Attlee became the titular leader of the Labor Party because of the bitter rivalry between Ernest Bevin and Herbert Morrison. Just as Truman has Wallace and Byrnes in his cabinet, so Attlee has named Bevin and is sure to name Morrison for high posts in his new administration.

While the bulk of the Labor Party organization and much of its voting strength comes from the actual laboring class in recent years, there has always been a considerable high brow element which genuinely believes in socialist doctrines. Attlee is one of that category, being one of the few leaders who has enjoyed a university education.

Popular Candidate He was graduated from Oxford University, taking class honors in modern history. Afterwards he was called to the bar in the famous Inner Temple. Soon he became a lecturer on social science in the London School of Economics.

Entering politics, he chose to run in the Limehouse district of London's crowded East End, a typical working class area, many of whose residents are dock workers. Chosen in 1922 a member of the House of Commons, he has been so popular with critical constituents that he has been re-elected ever since. In addition he was elected to two terms as Mayor of Stepney, a typical working class borough of greater London.

As Speaker in the House of Commons, Attlee had none of the pugnacity of Bevin nor the fire of Morrison. Both men are great stump speakers, as are so many parliamentary labor leaders having fought their way up in labor union politics.

Studebaker recently has disclosed plans for an early return to passenger car production. Until recently all facilities were occupied with volume output of Flying Fortress engines, heavy-duty military trucks and the versatile tracked carrier, the Wenzel.

Pilot Falls Into Sea 50 Yards From Japan On Rescue Mission

WITH HALSEY'S THIRD FLEET—(P)—It shouldn't happen to any aviator—but it did to a Navy Kingfisher pilot who started out to rescue another pilot. He fell into the ocean 50 yards off the Japanese island of Honshu and saw his plane taxi away without him.

A third Navy pilot then rescued his two mates with the Japanese doing a lot of fancy shooting; but hitting nothing.

It happened this way:

Lieut. (jg) Vernon T. Coumbre, Lombard, Ill., was shot down by ack-ack Aug. 9, during an attack on an airfield near the Omimoto Naval Base on Honshu. He attempted to paddle out to sea in his life raft, but he was washed ashore on the island. He hid in a clump of trees for the night.

The next morning he saw two fighter-escorted Kingfisher planes approaching. He attempted to put out in his raft, but was washed back ashore. Then, one of the Kingfishers, piloted by Lieut. Ralph J. Jacobs, U.S. Navy, came in for a landing. As he did Japanese shoreguns opened up on him.

Jacobs taxied to the edge of the breakers, about 50 yards offshore. "I saw Coumbre would be unable to make his way through the surf," Jacobs said, "so I stood up and tried to toss him a line. Just then an unusually heavy breaker shook the plane violently and threw me out of the cockpit into the water."

As he fell Jacobs' foot hit the throttle and the pilotless plane turned into the wind and started off across the bay with the Japanese still shooting at it. Evidently they hadn't seen Jacobs fall into the water.

Lieut. (jg) Almon P. Oliver of Hayward, Calif., veteran of 14 months fighting in the Pacific, the second Kingfisher pilot, saw Jacobs plane taxing across the bay, and thought it was trying to take off.

"When I failed," Oliver said later, "I went down to investigate and saw the cockpit empty."

Oliver went back to investigate, saw the two stranded pilots and made what he described as a "lucky landing" in exceedingly rough water with the Japanese taking pot shots at him. He taxied inshore and pulled the two pilots aboard.

Oliver managed to get his plane in the air, returning to his battleship with his gas tanks nearly empty.

Popovers A Luncheon Treat

They call for three eggs and are easy on the butter supply. Serve them piping hot with a fresh garden salad and homemade jam, jelly or marmalade.

Bran Popovers (Yield—8 Popovers)

One-quarter cup bran, 1 1/4 cups sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, well-beaten, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon melted butter or fortified margarine.

Crush bran into fine crumbs and mix with flour and salt. Combine eggs, milk and melted butter; add to flour mixture. Beat with rotary beater until free from lumps. Fill heated greased heavy iron muffin pans or ovenware custard cups 2/3 full and bake in hot over (450 degrees F.) about 30 minutes; reduce heat to 350 degrees F. and bake 15 minutes longer. Cut slit in side of popover to allow steam to escape.

For a special August breakfast treat, here's a new recipe:

Blueberry Muffins

Two cups enriched flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3/4 cup milk, 1 beaten egg, 2 tablespoons melted and cooled fortified margarine, 3/4 cup cultivated blueberries.

Sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Add washed and well-drained blueberries to dry ingredients. Add milk and egg all at once; then immediately add margarine and stir only until ingredients are blended but not smooth. Fill greased muffin tins 2/3 full and bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 25 minutes.

Great Migration Of War Workers Starts With Peace

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON (P)—With the end of the Japanese war, war workers will start moving. The great migration begins again.

Since the end of gasoline rationing—as announced Wednesday—war workers with cars will be able to move faster and shop around, if they wish, for a new job and a place to stay.

There certainly will be a large movement as soon as the war plants shut down. It probably won't equal the greatest migration in our history—the wartime shift between 1940 and 1943.

It was the high-paying jobs mainly that drew families, many of them clear across the continent. Millions of those jobs will end with Japan's end.

Motives for Moving

There will be two main motives behind the big move:

1. Workers, with their war plants closed, will have to look elsewhere for jobs.

2. Lots of them have saved money and will want to go home and settle down in the places they came from.

No one knows exactly what the total migration has been between 1940 and 1945.

The census bureau, which is the real authority on population, has

no figures on migration later than 1943.

In 1940 the bureau's figures showed that the population was in that year by states. The population of those same states in the war year of 1943 could be determined by rationing registrations.

Between those years—1940 and 1943—thirty states suffered a net loss of 3,400,000. The other 18, plus the District of Columbia, gained.

But this doesn't begin to tell the whole story of the true size of the migration in wartime. There are no figures to show the movement back and forth across state lines and within states.

So the figures wind up merely showing so many more in this state in 1943 than were there in 1940, and so many less in that state at the same time.

They don't show the total number which left one state and the total number which moved in while those others were moving out. Nor do they show the number which shifted around within a state.

People Left South

People moved from the Central and Southern areas, primarily agricultural areas. The South lost more than 1,000,000 people although some southern cities may have gained.

They went westward toward the Pacific Coast, north toward the Great Lakes, and toward the northern and southern ends of the Atlantic Coast: Florida and Delaware, for instance. In short, they went where war jobs were.

In the 18 states which gained, here is the net increase as given by the census bureau:

California, 1,388,000; Michigan, 280,800; Washington, 244,900; Maryland, 235,400; Ohio, 231,000; Florida, 186,700; New Jersey, 184,900; Virginia, 154,700; Oregon, 138,200; Connecticut, 127,400; Indiana, 79,000; Arizona, 76,700; Illinois, 68,600; Massachusetts, 37,000; Utah, 32,400; Rhode Island, 29,500; Nevada, 26,900; Delaware, 19,400.

The District of Columbia gained by 205,000.

The five biggest losers through migration were: New York, 223,000; Arkansas, 225,400; Kentucky, 262,700; North Carolina, 262,800; Oklahoma, 303,500.

Stilwell Drove 400 Miles In Three Weeks To Open Burma Return

BURMA, one of the important keys to victory in the Pacific, was a good-sized war in itself. Burma's war was different. Burma's climate and terrain and Allied ingenuity saw to that. Early in 1942 the British left Rangoon in a hurry, and the Japanese overran the country with relative ease. In 1945 the British came back into Rangoon so fast that they actually ran down a Japanese traffic cop with a tank. But in 1942 the picture was dark. The Japanese were supreme in the oil fields of Southeast Asia and the springboard to India.

Burma was also a mass of jungle-covered north-south mountains, lashed six months of the year by some of the world's heaviest rainfall. If India fell, the Japanese might make a junction with the Germans in the Middle East.

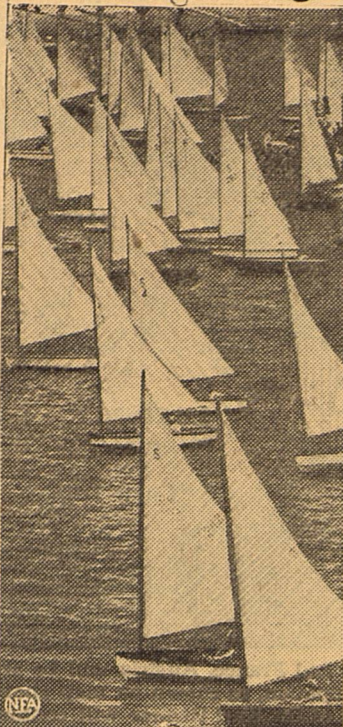
'Hell' In Burma
"I claim we took a hell of a beating," said Gen. Joseph T. Stilwell as he walked out of the jungle into India in those dark days.

The road back would be long and tough, he said, but the only thing to do was to go back in and run the Japanese out. In Assam, Stilwell trained and equipped the Chinese army which had retreated with him. He started back from the Himalayan hamlet of Ledo, back down through the leech-and-malaria-infested jungle.

The British, meanwhile, started working back down the Arakan coast on the west, headed back toward Rangoon, Burma's capital and chief port. Stilwell aimed at completing a cut-off road to China which his American engineers were building. Early in 1944 the threatened road began to worry the Japanese, but they had no answer to Allied air supremacy, which made its construction possible by destroying Japanese supply in the rear.

So the Japanese launched an ambitious campaign northward in the edge of India. There, on "Imphal's bloody plain," they learned that the British lion can lash back. In a terrific battle they lost an estimated 40,000 men. British and American strategists,

meanwhile, had cooked up something new. Native Chindits and other aerial task forces were dropped deep in the jungle behind the enemy's front lines. They wrought havoc with supply and communications, already paralyzed by bombing and strafing. Later, the Japanese repeatedly found themselves cut off by such jungle "air-heads." The 10th American Air Force and the Royal Air Force supplied advanced troops with supplies and reinforcements and evacuated the wounded.

The Tide Turns
The Chinese fought westward out of Yunnan and formed a junction with Stilwell's Chinese to complete the cut-off supply road to China. Stilwell had been recalled by this time, but they named the road in his honor.

The British fought southward out of Manipur and down from the cut-off. They landed in force on the Arakan coast.

Roads, Employment, Taxes, Crime Are Postwar Functions Facing State

AUSTIN —(P)—The end of the World War will affect Texas' state government in numerous ways, although probably none will be precipitate.

The speed with which postwar influences will touch the functions of state government depends largely upon actions of the federal government and its agencies.

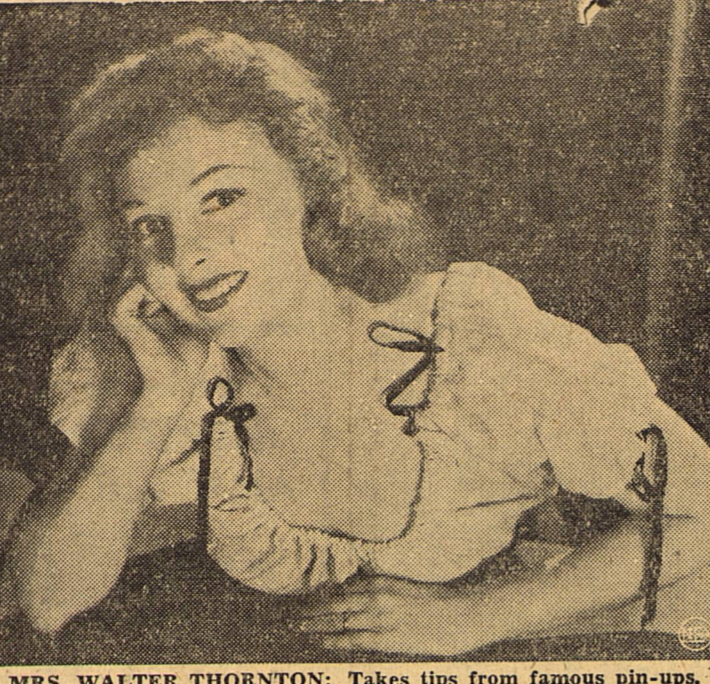
Here are some of the postwar prospects regarding functions of the state:

Highway Construction — Will be accelerated when the federal government releases its matching share of \$174,000,000 which will finance road building in Texas in the first three postwar years. The State Highway Department has plans completed for \$85,000,000 worth of roads and \$30,000,000 available for matching. Farm-to-market, urban and arterial highways will benefit.

Other Construction — Release of materials will facilitate construction of two new state office buildings. Purchase of buildings originally constructed by the military, also may help relieve the need for more state buildings.

Taxes and Spending — There will be no major changes in state taxing and spending before 1947 barring a special session of the legislature. State appropriations have been

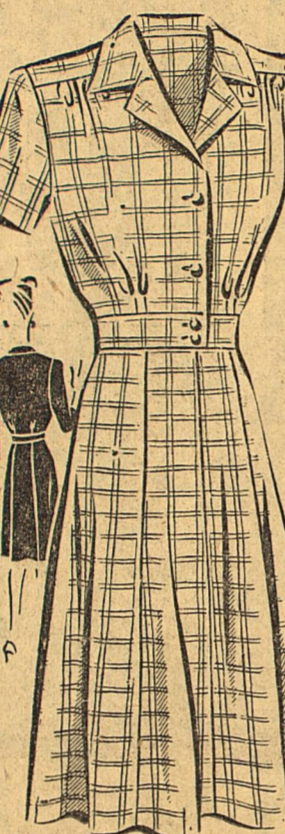

FORT WORTH —(P)—If there were more people like H. C. Moten of Fort Worth, those big fruit companies would have to start importing something besides bananas from the tropics.

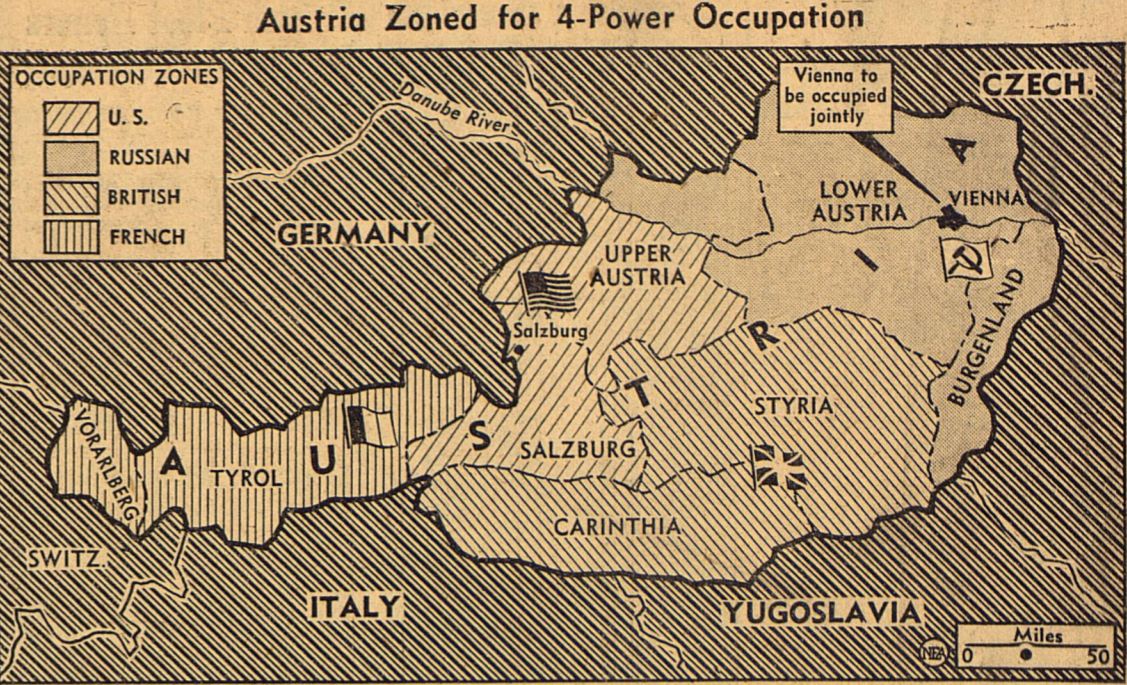
Moten likes bananas. When the war practically stopped the importation of bananas, he decided to grow his own, climate or no climate.
