Be it good, bad or indifferent, Bovina's city sales tax goes into effect October 1. That's less than a month from now. The one per cent tax was overwhelmingly approved by city voters in a special election early in June. In a light turnout, the vote count was 106 for and 30 against.

For Mr. Average Citizen, there won't be any significant difference on the paying end. On the receiving end, though, the tax income will result in a better-financed city government which can offer increased and/or improved city services over a period of time.

The city tax will be added to the present state tax for paying and collecting purposes. The present rate of state tax on taxable items is presently 3.25 per cent. The city tax added on will make the sales tax total 4.25 per cent.

Back when the issue was being promoted, city leaders estimated that the city sales tax would create between \$10,000 and \$20,000 annually for the city till. Interesting it will be to see if the actual figure fits into that overly-general estimate.

The state has compiled figures about how much people in Parmer County spend. When that figure is used for a guide, the only unknown is what per cent of that is spent in Bovina.

The local tax will make trading at home even more important. The money spent here has always gone toward making this a better community, of course. After the tax goes into effect, the importance will be greater. Some town will benefit from your one per cent tax and it might as well be yours.

At least that's the way we see it.

In one way of looking at it, trading in a town other than yours is not unlike cutting off your nose to spite your face.

We're amazed at the number of people who don't seem to realize this simple fact.

Then, too, there'll be a change of pace along early in October. We'll get to watch baseball's World Series then.

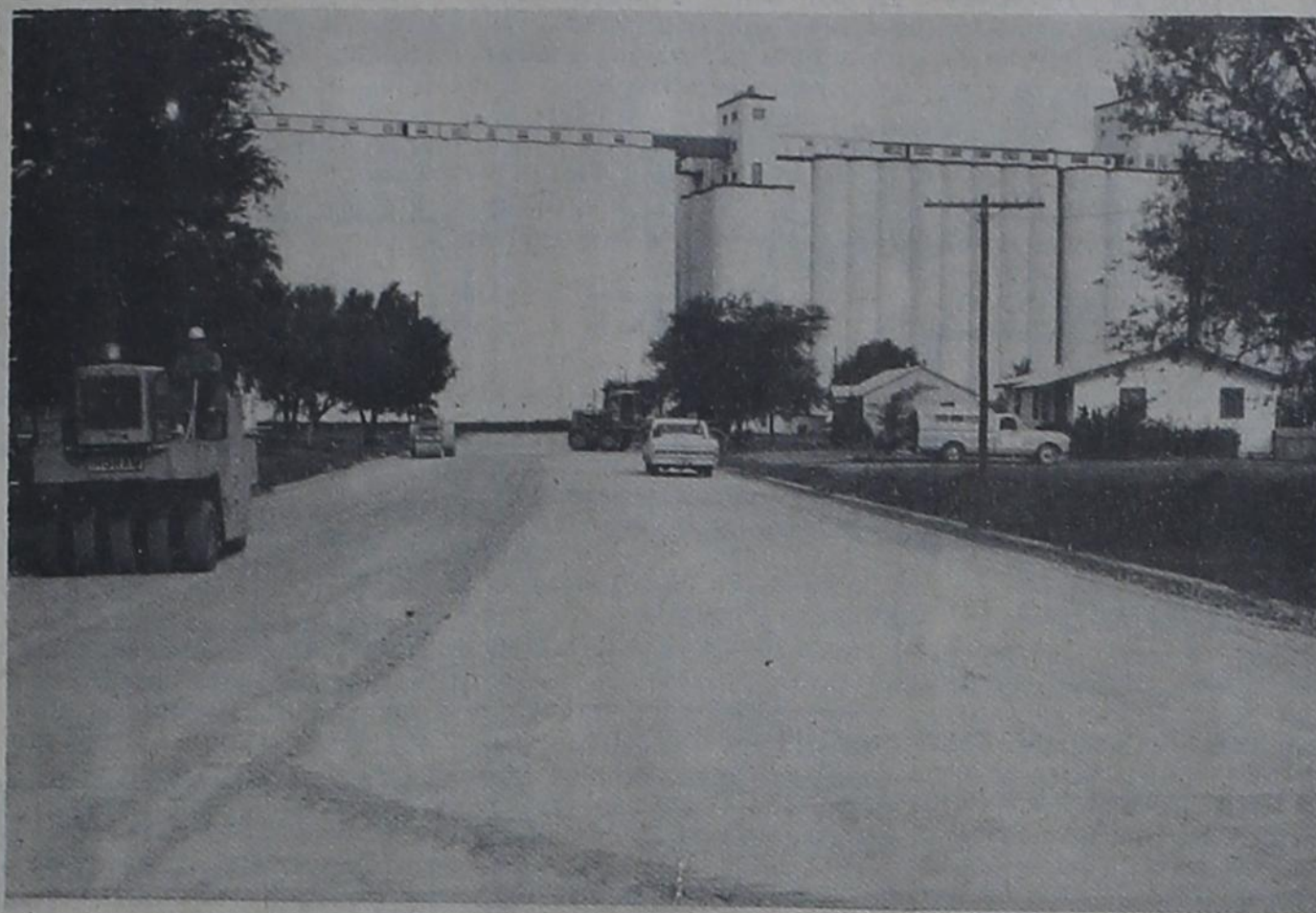
Television coverage of live sporting events is worth more, we'd guess, than another dramatic series showing the seamy side of life.

Now Three Headquarters --

SWPS Consolidates Offices Of Divisions

Southwestern Public Service Company will reduce its number of division offices to three with the consolidation of the Southern and Plains Divisions into a single division, headquartered at Lubbock, it has been announced by Roy Tolk, president of the electric company.

Faster transportation, improved communications, advanced technology and better trained and more skilled employees at the local office level were cited by Tolk as reasons for the consolidation.

"When we put this company together in its present form 28 years ago we had six division offices. In the mid-50's we reduced that number to five and last year we cut it down to four. The purpose of the division office has always been to lend staff and administrative support to the local office, the one which serves the customer. We can get around faster

now, we can talk more quickly on radio or telephone and we have better equipment and better employees. That lets us concentrate more on serving the customer more efficiently and economically and directly through local offices," Tolk pointed out.

Tolk said the reorganization had been planned for October 1 when J. M. Collins, who had been Plains Division manager for 25 years, was scheduled to retire. The action has now been moved forward because of the untimely death of Collins on August 23.

Under the consolidation program, which had been the Plains Division headquarters, will continue to be a district office. Clee Maharg, who has been district manager at Plainview since 1963, will continue in that post.

The three divisions under the new alignment will be the Panhandle, headquartered at Amarillo; the Southern with Lubbock as headquarters; and the New Mexico Division, with the division office in Roswell. The Panhandle Division will include the Kansas and Oklahoma communities Southwestern serves and the Texas cities north of, and including, Friona and Happy.

This alignment puts Bovina in the Lubbock division.

The remainder of the Texas cities served will be in the Southern Division, while the New Mexico Division will be made up of all the communities in that state that Southwestern serves.

"When you look at a map of our service area, each of the cities serving as a division headquarters is about as close to the center of the territory it serves as it is possible to be and offers the best location for transportation and communication facilities. This should improve our ability to serve our customers," Tolk said.

R. H. "Bob" Brummal, who is well known in the Plainview area and through his civic and business activities, who has been Southern Division manager since 1963, will be man-

Add Teacher --

First Week Increase In School Enrollment

Enrollment in Bovina Schools has been on the upswing since classes began the first of last week. Total enrollment early this

week was 656, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs.

This is an increase of 66 over the number of students en-

rolled the first day of school. That total was 590. The number of first graders went over the amount expected by school officials and another

first grade section has been added. Mrs. Phyllis Steelman, who had previously been assigned to a second grade section, was named to teach the added class. Named to take Mrs. Steelman's second grade was Mrs. Connie Johnson of Friona.

As of early this week, the total number of first graders was 74.

Also, a second grade section was moved to the main school building. The six classrooms at Ridgelea Elementary are now occupied with a kindergarten class, three first grade sections and two second grade sections.

Broken down, the 656 total enrollment shows 152 students in high school, 158 in junior high, 328 in elementary, 12 in kindergarten and six in special education.

Supt. Jacobs says there is a need for substitute teachers. People who are interested in substitute teaching are asked to contact him.

First holiday of the new school year will be Monday, Labor Day. School will be dismissed at 2:30 Friday afternoon. Classes will resume on schedule Tuesday.

Labor Day Semi-Holiday In Bovina

Labor Day, Monday, September 7, will be a semi-holiday in Bovina.

A majority of the businesses will be closed. However, some businesses, including service stations, are expected to remain open.

The Labor Day holiday is as late this year as it can possibly be. Set up for the first Monday in September, the holiday was shoved back to the last day in the first week of the month by the calendar this year.

Traditionally, the Labor Day holiday marks the end of the summer season. This may not be the case this year, however, as the beginning of school, which curtails many summer activities, came two weeks ahead of the holiday.

Nonetheless, many families will probably take advantage of the long weekend for end-of-summer trips and other activities.

There will be no school here Monday and classes will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. Friday prior to the day off.

Activities are expected to return to normal Tuesday morning.

Student Council Prexy Home From Nat'l Meet

Meloney Marshall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Marshall and president of Bovina High School Student Council, recently attended National Student Council Leadership Conference at Cheley Camp, Estes Park, Colo.

Under direction of Dr. Earl Reum, activity director of Denver Schools System and nationally known for his work with student councils, the six-day conference was conducted in the form of workshops, councils and discussion groups with 241 student council representatives from 36 states participating.

Those attending were selected from applications by the staff on the basis of leadership, scholarship and student council experience.

Denver school officials and teams from the Drug Center, including a drug addict, doctor and policeman, gave talks each day with question and answer sessions following presentations.

"We were taught that communication was the vital thing between school administrations

and student councils," commented Miss Marshall. "Black militants, Chicanos and other minority groups were represented and were trying to find ways to avoid riots and trouble in their schools this fall. We don't have many of the problems larger schools do," she continued.

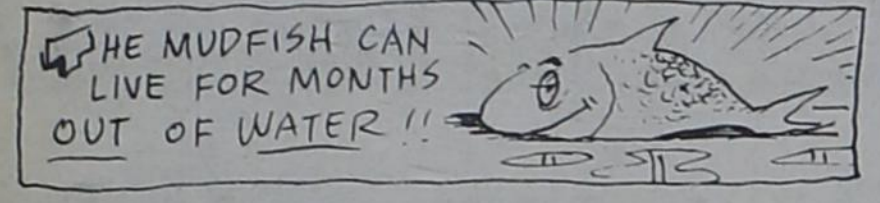

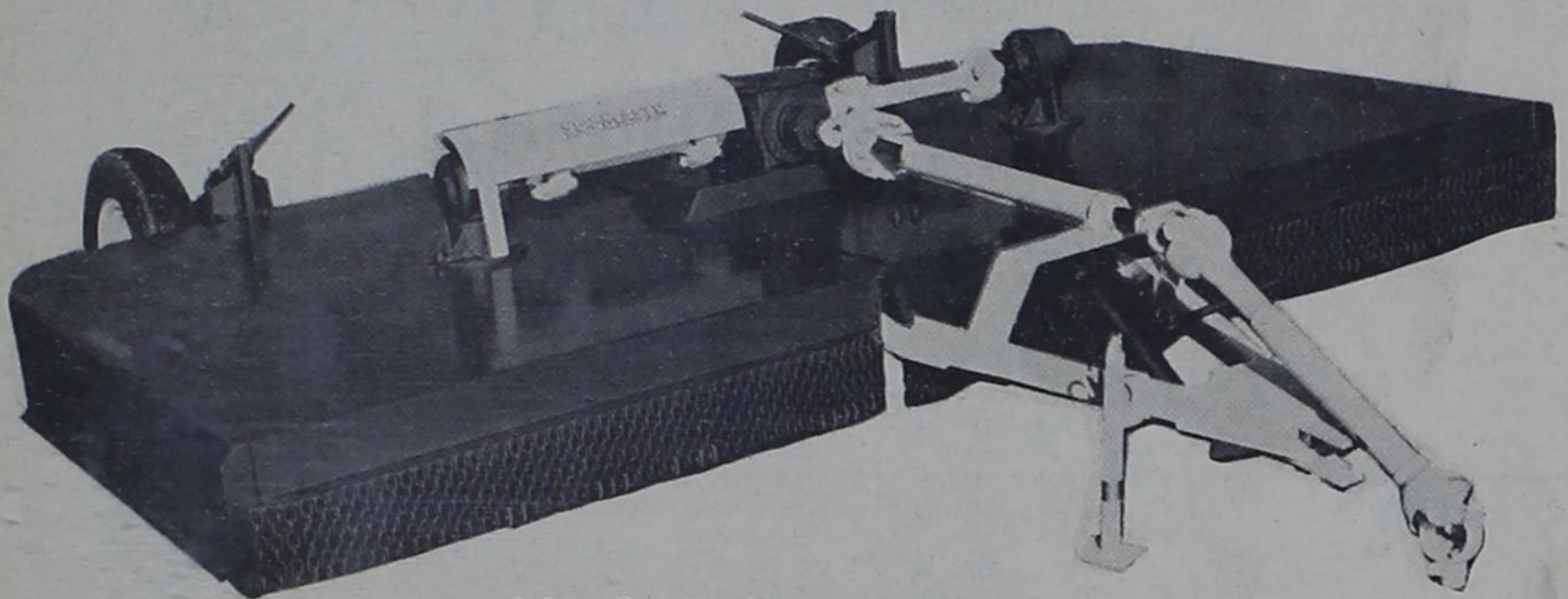

At Home In Parmer County

If your freezer stops, don't panic but get into action.

The first thing to remember is to keep your freezer closed. How long the food will stay frozen depends on the amount and type of food in the freezer. A full freezer will stay cold many hours longer than a freezer only a quarter full. Meat will stay frozen longer than will baked food. And, the larger the freezer, the longer it will stay cold.

Twenty-five pounds of dry ice should hold the temperature of a half-full, 10 cubic foot freezer below freezing for two or three days. Put heavy cardboard directly on the packages of frozen food and then put the dry ice on top of the cardboard.

For added protection, cover the freezer with blankets, quilts or some other covering. It will also help to put crumpled newspaper or excelsior between the cabinet and the blankets. Don't cover up the air vent openings because the power may come on unexpectedly and ventilation will be needed.

If the freezer will be out of operation for more than three days, take frozen foods to a locker plant as soon as possible. Thoroughly wrap the food and make the trip from the freezer to the locker as quickly as possible.

If food has partially or completely thawed before you discover that the freezer is not operating, you may refreeze foods if they still contain ice crystals and are still 40 degrees F. or below. Meats and poultry become unsafe to eat when the color or odor is poor or questionable. You should get rid of them. The condition of vegetables, shellfish and cooked foods can't be determined by odor so if in doubt, get rid of them too. Don't use melted ice cream since milk products spoil rapidly.

Refreeze thawed food quickly, and it is wise to run your freezer between 10 and 20 degrees below zero during season when power failures may be frequent.

With the beginning of school comes the beginning of monthly 4-H Club meetings. All six of the clubs in the county will be having meetings and getting their local club activities in full swing.

A county-wide event this coming week is the 4-H Fair in Friona. This is only the second year for this activity. It gives 4-H members a chance to exhibit some of the things they do in 4-H Club work. It also gives them a chance to develop some of their leadership abilities. Members have the responsibility of taking the entries and running the concessions. It is their fair, and they work at making it a success.

The 4-H Bake Show will be held with the fair this year. The 4-H girls entering this event must turn in a foods project record and two baked products. This year the products will be two-crust pies and batter rolls. The girl with the highest score on these products and record will be eligible to enter the District Bake Show, September 19, in Amarillo.

The products are exhibited during the Tri-State Fair. On Rural Youth Day September 26, the District winner will be announced.

October 4 - 10 has been designated as National 4-H Week. The theme this year is "We Care." Watch for more news about 4-H'ers and their activities during this week.

To climax 4-H Week, the annual 4-H Achievement Banquet will be held on Saturday, Oct. 10. This is one opportunity to recognize the 4-H'ers and their outstanding work.

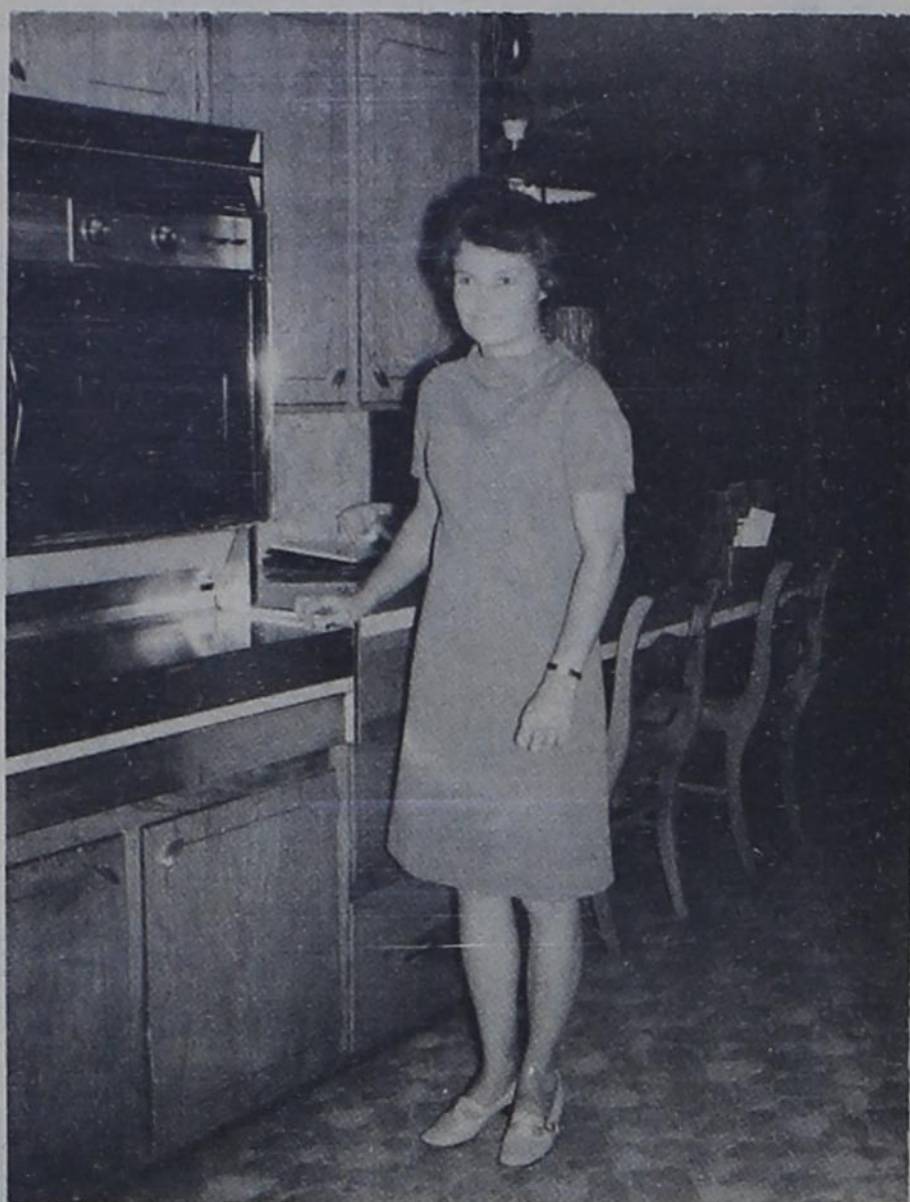

ICEBOX COOKIES

1 c. brown sugar
1/2 c. white sugar
1 1/2 c. shortening
1 t. soda
1 t. salt
2 t. cinnamon
4 c. flour
1 c. pecans
Cream shortening and sugar together, then add eggs. Sift dry ingredients together and mix with shortening mixture. Last add pecans. Roll in waxed paper and store in refrigerator until firm. Slice and bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees until golden brown.

VANILLA ICE CREAM

2 c. sugar
6 eggs
1 can condensed milk
1 can evaporated milk
1 t. vanilla
1/4 t. salt
1 pkg. Dream Whip (small)
1/2 gallon sweet milk
First mix Dream Whip as directed on package and add condensed milk. Then add sugar and eggs. Next, add salt, vanilla and evaporated milk. Pour these ingredients in freezer can and finish filling with sweet milk. Perhaps it may take a little more than 1/2 gallon of milk or it could take a little less. Freeze. Makes one gallon.

RECEPTION SALAD

1 pkg. lime gelatin
1 1/4 c. hot water
1 pkg. cream cheese (small)
1 large can crushed pineapple
1 c. celery (finely diced)
1 c. chopped pecans
1 c. cream or 1 small can of evaporated milk
juice of one lemon
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Melt the creamcheese in the warm gelatin. Let set slightly. Whip your cream and let chill until gelatin is set. When gelatin is partially set remove and whip. Add whipped cream and mix well. Then add drained pineapple, celery, pecans and lemon juice. Chill.

PRUNE CAKE

2 1/4 c. flour
1 t. soda
1/4 t. salt
1/2 t. cloves
1 t. allspice
1 t. cinnamon
1/2 c. butter
1 1/4 c. sugar
2 eggs
1 c. sour milk
1 c. cooked prunes
1 t. vanilla
1 c. nuts
Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs and prunes. Mix dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk. Bake in three eight inch pans at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes.

ICING

Mix one box of powdered sugar, 1/4 c. of butter and prune juice saved from prunes used in cake.

BARBECUE CHICKEN

First prepare the following barbecue sauce in a pan.
1/4 c. vinegar
1/2 c. water
1 t. salt
1/4 t. red pepper
1/4 c. butter
2 T. sugar
1 T. mustard
1 t. black pepper
1 large onion (diced)
juice of one lemon
Simmer for 20 minutes. Remove from heat and add 1/2 c. catsup, 2 T. liquid smoke and 2 T. Worcestershire sauce.
Place one medium sized cut-up fryer in oblong baking dish. Pour sauce over chicken and bake in oven for 30 to 40 minutes at 350 degrees. Baste often.

Second Scrimmage Session Set For Friday Afternoon

Bovina's Mustangs, in preparing for the 1970 football season, get their second taste of outside competition Friday afternoon. The team goes to Claude for a scrimmage session with Claude, a Class A squad.

The Ponies took on the Clovis High sophomore team here Friday night in the season's first scrimmage tilt.

"We were encouraged in place-

es," Gib Hough, head Mustang coach said following the session.

The Mustang mentor pointed out that the team "did a pretty good job defensively, but sputtered offensively and it looked like a typical first scrimmage." The coach said the defense was outstanding at times.

In the first string competition, the Mustangs outscored Clovis, 1-0, but keeping score

isn't one of the long suits of scrimmage competition. The Mustangs' scoring play was a long pass thrown by Quarterback Mike Hough to Halfback Jimmy Harris.

One of the major improvements which needs to be made before the Claude scrimmage and especially before the season opener with Boys Ranch here September 11 is in the offensive line, Coach Hough says. He indicated this weakness was evident in the Clovis scrimmage.

"Primarily, we need to develop consistency with our offense," the coach says.

The Claude scrimmage will begin at 4 p.m. The team will leave here about noon for the encounter which is the second and last outside competition before the bell rings for the start of the 10-game season.

Coach Hough anticipates no starting line-up changes for the Claude session. Physically, the Ponies came out of the Clovis match in good condition.

Two additional players have joined the varsity squad since last week's report. They are both juniors. James Ritchie is a 180-pound tackle and Roy Ramirez is a 120-pound guard.

This makes a total of 29 players listed on the varsity roster.

The Mustangs play three non-district games before jumping into District 3-A competition. The "warm-up" opponents are, in addition to Boys Ranch, Friona and Lazbuddie. The latter two games will be played on the opponents' homefields.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD
County Agent



SWINE PRODUCTION IN PARMER COUNTY

Today the cost price squeeze situation so commonly talked about is bringing about a change in the thinking of our farm producers in the High Plains. This change in thinking is encouraging the production of red meats. Swine production has an excellent opportunity in contributing to the growth of this red meat production.

There are two factors that make swine production very suitable for Parmer County and the High Plains.

The first and probably most

important factor is the availability of grain. Since grain makes up about 75 per cent of swine rations, this availability factor is very important. Parmer County and the High Plains are the leading grain sorghum producing county and area in the state. Approximately 152,000 acres of grain sorghum was planted in Parmer County in 1969.

Approximately 5000 head of hogs are produced in Parmer County yearly. This 5000 head of hogs is represented by all breeds. However, most producers are using crossbred sows in their operations.

Swine is one of the major livestock projects participated in by 4-H Club members in Parmer County. Some 4-H'ers are in the sow for pig production project while others enjoy showing and feeding out market hogs.

There are many essentials considered to be necessary to profitable swine production. Among these essentials are: (1) a desire to raise hogs (2) start small and grow into the business (3) get in and stay in (4) carry out a complete program (5) control diseases and parasites (6) adequate housing (7) produce hogs the market demands (8) raise large litters and (9) feed for rapid efficient gains.

Combining the advantages of having an available feed supply, and ideal climate, and striving to accomplish the nine essentials just mentioned, Parmer County and the High Plains can make swine production a profitable enterprise.

Dr. Kay received B.A. and M.A. degrees from Eastern New Mexico University and an LL.D. degree from Oklahoma Christian College, Okla. City. He served as head of the Department of Religion at West Texas State College in Canyon from 1954 to 1957. Since that time he has been affiliated with Lubbock Christian College and has served as assistant vice president of that institution since 1966.

Dr. Kay has received over 40 citations and awards for his work in public affairs, including four "George Washington Medal of Honor" awards from Freedoms Foundation, a special citation from former President of the United States, the late General Dwight D. Eisenhower, and an "Outstanding Alumni Award" from ENMU. He has also been selected to appear in the 1970 edition of "The Two Thousand Men of Achievement" published in England and distributed to every country in the world.
