

The hero of Corregidor arrived at the Capital's National Airport at 11:26 p. m. (CWI). His wife, "Kit'y" was waiting to greet him as he stepped from an Army transport command plane. It was their first reunion in over four years. General George C. Marshall, Army chief of staff, accompanied Mrs. Wainwright.

Australia Says Japs **Butchered Yanks And** Ate Flesh While Alive

American forces, warned by General MacArthur against "undue oppression", quietly occupied the length of Japan and South Korea Monday-while a Chungking source reported a post-surrender Japanese massacre of French in Indo-China, and Australia said Nipponese captors had eaten the flesh of living Americans.

Mac-Arthur's policy of softly-firm control-permitting the Japanese to retain their own government, subject to his orders—drew sparks in Korea, where residents had expected a quick end to Nipponese officialdom. Australia's press and public also scored what it called the "kid glove" peace policy, stressed new atrocity stories, and

cheered the blunt statement of their commander-in-chief, Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, who told capitulating Japanese at Morotai:

"I don't recognize you as an honorable, gallane foe, but you'll be treated with due courtesy in all

Despite his power, Tojo's downfall was a foregone conclusion to the Japanese after the loss of Saipan. These sources said that for days after the island was lost, Tojo's telephone rang and anonymous voices asked his wife, "hasn't Tojo committed hara kiri yet?

Even thus in disgrace, however, the man who began the war made one final gesture to try to keep Japan fighting.

One of the conspirators who killed the commanding general of the

Imperial Guards Division in an effort to prevent surrender news from reaching the public was Tojo's son-in-law. When the plot failed and Major Koga himself committeed suicide, Tojo's wife said, "He did a brave, honorable thing. It seems evident that under the clannish family relationships exist-

ing in Japan, Tojo himself had directed Major Koga's actions. When we arrived at Tojo's house our interpreter wrote our names on a card and asked the young man to deliver it to Tojo. He departed

with a deep bow, but returned quickly to say that Tojo would not see us. could have thrown him readily into secret torture chambers. Carrying the card, he walked into the garden and motioned us to

follow. Tojo, sitting on his chair, had his back to us and was unaware of our approach until we were within a few feet. Kasai then told him

Tojo shook his shaven head vigorously. His face was set and stern. We stood there.

Finally Permits Interview

Finally, with a slight shrug he permitted introductions and held Kasai refused to take no for an answer from the man who once out his hand. This would-be Napoleon of the Orient is only 5 feet, 4 inches and

Living With The Atom

It is already evident that Americans are not going to be scared to death by the atomic bomb. Maybe we ought to be sitting in anguished uneasiness on this earth which has suddenly become a powder keg.

But Americans, by and large, are taking the atomic age in their stride. We seem to be accepting it as we accepted Coueism, technocracy, mah jong, Mae West and the Dionne quintuplets. We are beginning to make jokes about it and exploit its commercial possibilities.

Puns are putting in an appearance—puns of such a nature as to make any self-respecting electron break loose from its orbit and run for cover: up and atom, Eve the first Atom-smasher, and so on, to the point where one has atomic ache.

The atom will inevitably appear in a popular song, if it hasn't already. Equally inevitable will be a lot of pictures of bathing beauties, pin-up girls and other curvy creatures, captioned "Anatomic Bombs'

At least one cafe has brought out the Atomic Bomb Cocktail, price 75 cents, and positively only one to a cus-

The sober fact that one atomic bomb is more than sufficient for 50,000 customers is beside the point. For today the atom bomb is a catchword as well as a terrifying, mystifying result of man's wisdom. It has caught the public fancy, and so long as it holds that fancy it will help sell merchandise, from cocktails to adventure stories.

So what? It isn't that Americans, even the punsters and the promoters, don't realize that the harnessing of atomic power is no joke. It isn't that we are completely irresponsible and senseless. Rather it may be that we are showing realistic courage.

The bombing of Hiroshima was one of the stiffest, most sobering jolts that the world of thinking men ever received. Yet a couple of weeks later we Americans were making jokes about it. And perhaps that is just as well.

Atomic power is here to stay, for better or worse, and has got to be lived with. At its worst, it is only another threat of death. And men live with that threat every day, as they have since the beginning of time.

Men stand today on the threshold of what they hope will be a better world. To achieve it they need hope and courage as well as wisdom. And while wisecracks and promotion may not be the ideal means of achieving those qualities, they are certainly preferable to utter discouragement and paralyzing fear.

Balloon Bomb 'Bust'

The characteristic inconsistency of the Japanese in their squawks about the "inhumanity" of the atomic bomb has been emphasized anew by the disclosure that at least 225 of their balloon bombs reached the American continent during the final nine months of the war.

It is true, of course, that the balloon bomb did not compare with the atomic in its destructive potentialities. But the manner in which the ballon weapon was used by the enemy was infinitely more barbaric.

Not even the enemy made any claims as to accuracy for their balloon bombers. The Japs simply released the balloons hoping they might explode with damaging effect somewhere. They knew that the mathematical chances were several thousand to one against them exploding on any military objective. Bringing Them Home

The wartime story of the great ships Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth is a dramatic one. Converted from luxury to drab-hued service early in the war, they crossed and recrossed the Atlantic in black-out secrecy, eluding and outrunning the submarines for which they would have been prime targets.


Now, as a fitting climax, they sail proudly into New York with flags flying, bearing home as many as 15,000 cheering American soldiers in one trip.


It is inevitable that the two great Queens should get a good deal of publicity, in picture and story. But we should not forget that these liners are doing only a small part of the job-less than 10 per cent, as a matter of fact.

The great bulk of our men returning from the European battlefields are aboard a never-ending procession of American ships. They are smaller and less famous than the Queens—passenger liners, converted Liberties, Victories, G-type freighters and tankers.

Maybe they aren't very fast or very comfortable. But they are numerous, and they are doing the only job that is important to the men on board. They're bringing

Marines Want To See Tokyo Rose, Inspect Palace, Climb Fuji

By DUANE HENNESSY WITH U.S. MARINES, JAPAN —(P)—Most of all, Marines want to see "Tokyo Rose" — the radio announcer who tried to tear their hearts out and only cheered them with swell jive music.

Her walking effortlessly under a back-bending burden may have opened this soldier's eyes wide, but it doesn't surprise posture experts. They say the balancing of weight, which gives you less of a load (your own heft) to carry, is the secret of

good posture. Remember this when you have to stand in line or want to lick fatigue during miles of walking. Imagine that your weight is a yoke or head-borne basket of clothes. Do this, and you can't possibly shirt weight from its steady see-saw level.

But to maintain this yoke-line balance in motion, hew to a line when you walk. That line should run parallel between your feet. Down there, put the burden of your weight on the outer border of your



Gen. MacArthur Clamps Board Suspends Three Censorship On Press And Radio Of Japan

TOKYO —(A)— Censorship was clamped on the press and radio of Japan Monday by General Mac-Arthur in a directive in which he also observed that there "should be an absolute minimum of restric-

tions upon freedom of speech." The directive was delivered to the Japanese government and at 2:15 a. m., CWT. short-wave broadcasts from Tokyo stations were reported by MacArthur's public relations officers to have gone off the air. A previous Domei announcement said Japanese overseas broadcasts had ceased by order of Mac-

The directive informed the Japanese government that MacArthur would suspend any publication or radio station publishing untrue information or creating unrest.

One of the first newspaper articles censored was in the Nippon Times, printed in English. The editorial censored said that there had been amazingly few cases of rape by American troops in Japan.
