MacArthur Institutes Program To Convince Japs Of War Guilt

TOKYO—(P)—General MacArthur instituted Monday a broad American information program to convince every Japanese of the empire's defeat, of its war guilt, to eliminate militarism and to encourage democratic principles.

The direct information program will employ the Japanese press, radio and schools.

The Army forces in the Pacific psychological warfare branch has been converted into an "information dissemination section" under Brig. Gen. Bonner F. Feller, MacArthur's military secretary.

Japanese Foreign Minister Resigns

TOKYO—(P)—Well-informed Japanese sources reported that Foreign Minister Shigemitsu, chief signatory of Japan's surrender, resigned Monday night and was succeeded by Shigeru Yoshida, former ambassador to London.

Yoshida, who lives in Oiso, was informed of his appointment by telephone and he accepted but it was too late for him to come to Tokyo Monday night.

The same Japanese sources said that Shigemitsu's resignation was requested by Premier Prince Naruhiko Higashi-Kuni because "the first stage of the Allied occupation is concluded."

Shigemitsu had served in one of the wartime cabinets of Hideki Tojo and also in that of Kuniaki Koiso and was considered to be responsible for many of Tojo's China policies.

These sources said Shigemitsu was appointed to the Higashi-Kuni cabinet because his past experience was necessary, since the cabinet was formed rather hastily in order to meet the requirements of the Potsdam declaration.

These sources said that the premier first asked Hachiro Arita, career diplomat and former foreign minister, to accept the post but that Arita declined.

Shigemitsu, who was Japan's principal signatory of the unconditional surrender on Sept. 2, has had a long and somewhat stormy career as an international diplomat. He is 58 years old.

Conoco To Drill Ward Wildcat To 5,000-Foot Level

Continental Oil Company has filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas to drill a 5,000-foot wildcat in Southwest Ward County, starting at once.

The project will be Conoco No. 1, F. H. Scott, 330 feet from southeast and southwest lines of section 33, block 33, H&G survey. It is almost on the north bank of the Pecos River and five miles southeast of Barstow.

The well is being drilled by the Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-A University, East-Central Crude Company exploration now in the Ellenburger, in section 33, block 31, University survey, ran a drillstem test for one hour at 100,000 feet. Recovery was 100 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil or gas. It is now making hole.

Atlantic No. 1 Iowa Realty Trust, North Pecos County wildcat in section 27, block 10, H&G survey, was drilling ahead under 6,180 feet, in line.

Swabbing New Holes

Amerasia Petroleum Corporation No. 1-A Jones, in section 3, block A-6, psi survey, in Northwest Gaines County, was swabbing on perforations at 11,380-420 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing had been shot with 2 3/4 holes. Packer was at 11,372 feet over plugged-back total depth of 11,422 feet. Some oil was being developed.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Buchanan, East Midland County prospector in Belvidere survey No. 3-6292, was swabbing on new perforations in 5 1/2-inch casing at 11,461-515 feet. Swabbing at 11,390-430 feet, had a slight show of gas, with no oil reported.

3-Q Tests Again

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company and Landreth Production Company No. 3-Q Schabarbar, Northwest Ector County wildcat in section 12, block A, psi survey, on north side of the Goldsmith field, was bot-holed at 8,050 feet, possibly in the Silurian, and attempting to take a drillstem test.

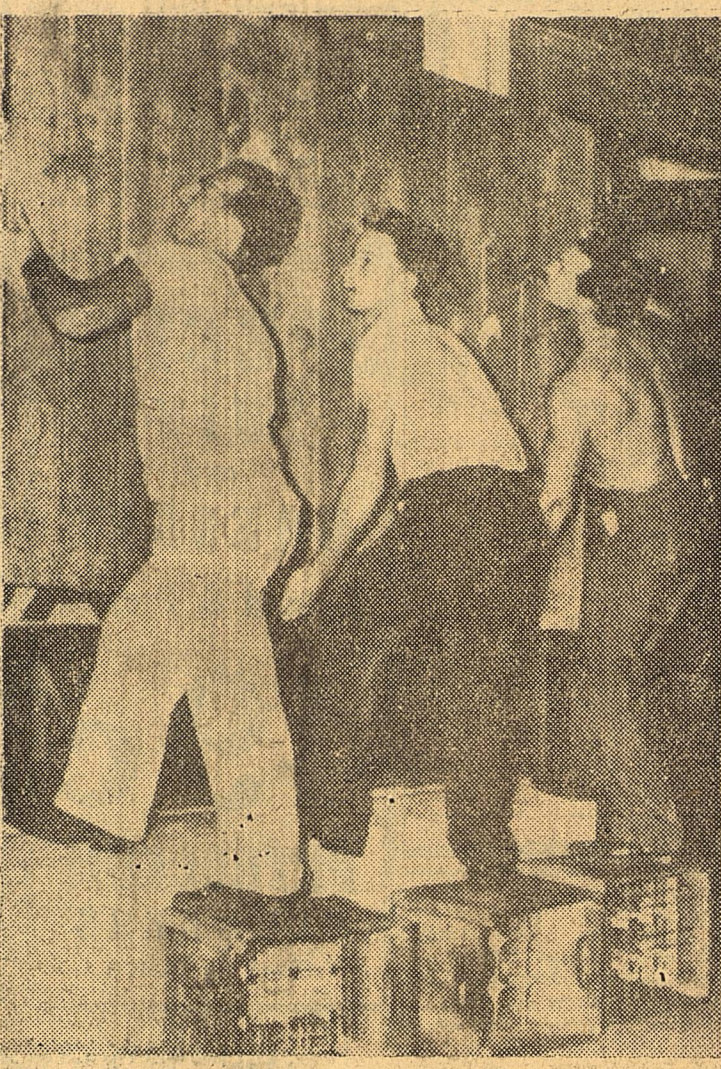
Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Hancock, in section 5, block L, psi survey, in Southwest Cochran County, was making hole under 4,560 feet, in San Andres lime, topped at 4,360 feet. Elevation is 3,796 feet.

The Texas Company No. 1-B Farmer County fee, in labor 12, league 317, Farmer County School Land survey, in Southeast Gaines County, ran a drillstem test for one hour at 5,280-5,417 feet.

Tropical Hurricane Reaches Carolina As Fury Lessens

MIAMI, FLA.—(P)—The tropical storm that swept Southern Florida with an estimated \$50,000,000 property damage has moved across the coast to South Carolina with the center near Parris Island, the U. S. Weather Bureau in Miami reported at forenoon Monday.

The storm appeared to be losing its fury as it headed north, and the weather bureau said hurricane warnings would be lowered at noon Monday south of Cape Hatteras to Brunswick, Ga.

"Storm is now centered over land about 30 miles west of Charleston, S. C., moving almost due northward," the advisory said.

80,000 Detroit Workers Idle

DETROIT—(P)—More than 80,000 workers were idle in the Detroit area Monday as the huge automotive industry and the powerful United Automobile Workers (CIO) Union headed for a showdown on the union's demands for a general 30 per cent wage increase for the industry.

Strikes and layoffs idled 70,000 in Detroit and 10,000 in nearby Windsor, Ont., while UAW-CIO leaders went ahead with plans for possible strike votes affecting 500,000 throughout the nation's auto plants.

Former Premier Of France Dies

MARSEILLE—(P)—Andre Tardieu, 68, former premier of France, died Saturday night at his home at Menthon on the Riviera.

Tardieu was prominent in letters and journalism as well as in politics. He served in four governments before becoming premier in 1929. His own cabinet fell in less than four months.

Wainwright's Texas Aides Arrive Home

DALLAS—(P)—A young Texan who was captured on Corregidor with Lt. Gen. Jonathan Wainwright and who served as his orderly during the long, hopeless, horror-filled years in Jap prison camps, came home Monday.

Sgt. Hubert Carroll, of Paris, Texas, flew to Dallas en route to visit his sister, Mrs. F. M. Osborn, of Paris. He plans a long rest after his three years in prison.

Texas To Receive Federal Road Aid

WASHINGTON—(P)—Texas has been allocated \$28,765,549 annually for three years by the Public Roads Administration to receive the largest share in the greatest road-building program in the history of the west.

The bureau extended the storm area northward from Virginia capes to Block Island, R. I.

TOKYO—(AP)—The newspaper Asahi reported that Lt. Gen. Yoshio Shinotsuka, member of Japan's supreme war council, committed suicide Monday by cutting his throat with a samurai sword. Shinotsuka formerly was president of the Army Officers' School, the "West Point" of Japan.

LONDON—(AP)—The General Assembly of the United Nations organization will be convoked in London, if possible, not later than Dec. 4, the executive committee of the Preparatory Commission decided Monday.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman urged Congressional leaders Monday to redouble their efforts to expedite the broadest possible unemployment compensation bill.

Congress To Speed Army Enlistments

WASHINGTON—(P)—Apples and brickbats dotted the Congressional scene Monday.

The apples—figurative ones—are inducements the House Military Committee wants to hold out to men now in uniform to sign up for another hitch in the Army or Navy. The inducement bill comes up for House action Monday. It may touch off a full-scale draft-demobilization fight.

The brickbats—verbal ones—were tossed out by Senator Clyde M. Reed (Calif.). His target: the often swiped-at jobless aid bill. It comes up in the Senate Tuesday.

Meanwhile, President Truman—back from a weekend in Missouri—called these Capitol Hill legislators to a morning conference at the White House to go over the whole legislative picture: Senate Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky, Senate President McKellar of Tennessee, Speaker Rayburn of Texas and House Majority Leader McCormack of Massachusetts.

Otherwise Congressional attention was divided between:

1. Taxes—How much to cut present wartime rates? And what to do about those often "frozen" payroll levies?

2. Pearl Harbor—Will the 10-member investigating committee be able to tell its findings in one report, or two conflicting ones? Here's the story:

Enlistment inducements—the House Military Committee—beset last month by cries for an end to the draft and speedier discharges, decided on an entirely different tack. It reasoned that if enough men could be persuaded to stay in uniform after they have been offered discharges two things would happen:

A. Draft calls could be cut more and more, finally abolished.

B. More men could be released faster because ample replacements would be available.

Hence the committee drafted a bill which would cut the enlistment period to two years (now the Army hitch is three, the Navy's four), provide government-paid-for trips home before returning to service; let a man draw his mustering out pay before re-enlisting; assure him provisions of the G. I. Bill of Rights after he gets out again. There are other features, too.

Young Named Head Of Midland Geologist Group

Addison Young, research geologist for Phillips Petroleum Company, was elected president of the Midland Geological Society for the coming year at a meeting of the organization Monday noon in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Schabarbar.

W. Henry Conkling, of Sun Oil Company was named vice-president. Miss Mary Louise Rhodes of Standard Oil Company of Texas was selected secretary-treasurer, and Karl A. Myrdal, of The Pure Oil Company, was made program committee chairman.

A proposal to merge the Midland and the West Texas Geological Societies was discussed and it was voted to table action on that matter until after it had been passed off by the West Texas society.

George R. Gibson, retiring president, was in charge.

Substitute Teachers Are Needed Badly

Substitute teachers are needed badly for Midland's schools, Superintendent Frank Monroe said Monday.

When efforts were made Sunday to obtain the services of a substitute teacher school officials learned all on the present substitute list were either working or out of town.

Monroe requested citizens who are willing to be placed on the substitute list to telephone him at 287.

Navy To Discharge 839,000 By Christmas

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Navy promised senators Monday it will put 764,000 enlisted men and 75,000 officers back in civilian clothes by Christmas.

This pledge was made by Vice Admiral Louis E. Denfeld, chief of personnel, as the Senate Military Committee resumed its inquiry into why service discharges aren't coming faster.

Denfeld said that demobilization is moving as swiftly as military needs, transportation and separation facilities will permit.

Other Troops To Be Sent Home As Ships Available

TOKYO—(P)—History's greatest military gamble—the American landing in armed Japan—has paid off so handsomely that occupation forces probably will be cut to not more than 200,000 within six months, General MacArthur said Monday.

As a result of the successful penetration of this conquered nation, he added in a formal statement, troops will be returned home as rapidly as ships are made available. Regular Army forces, he said, probably will be able to maintain unaided the 200,000-man force—"which will permit complete demobilization of our citizen (drafted) Pacific forces."

"There was probably no greater gamble taken in history," his statement explained, "than the initial landings" where ground forces were outnumbered 1,000 to one by armed Japanese. "But," he added "the stakes were worth it."

MacArthur's estimate of 200,000 occupation troops is just half the number which Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, commander of the U. S. Eighth Army, recently said would be necessary—and Eichelberger's figures were at that time considered low. At the start, some 800,000 men—including air forces—were scheduled to participate.

Only Saturday, however, Eichelberger forecast that the entire occupation might be "washed up" within a year if it continued as smoothly as it had started.

MacArthur's statement said that the unknown quantity at the outset of the occupation was whether a military government would have to be established. This would have involved several million troops, he said, but by working with the existing Japanese government, purposes of the surrender terms can be accomplished with only a small fraction of the men, time and money originally projected.

Success Assured

"This situation involved an initial risk but successful operation now assures success," he said. "Once Japan is disarmed (Continued on Page Five)

Brooklyn Boy Who Sent Corregidor Flashes Freed

MANILA—(P)—The boy from Brooklyn who was Corregidor's final link with America is free again.

From the depths of Malinta tunnel on the shell-battered fortress in Manila Bay, as the weary, discouraged American garrison of Corregidor waited after Wainwright's surrender for the Japanese to arrive, the young radioman, Cpl. (now Sgt.) Irving Strobob, tapped out such messages as these:

"They are not here yet. We are waiting for God only knows what. How about a chocolate soda?"

Strobob is in an Army barracks here now, released from a Japanese prison camp. He remembers how he tried to fill in his time before the Japanese came into Malinta tunnel on Corregidor three years ago sending such unofficial messages as:

"They are breaking up the rifles. 'Wainwright Right Guy'." "General Wainwright is a right guy. We are willing to go on for him."

The surrender had been signed at noon, May 6, 1942. Strobob had sent his last official message and was waiting for the Japanese.

"A guy at the Army station in Honolulu wanted to know what things were like," he recalls. "I was telling him."

"Shells have been dropping all night. Shells . . . all night," he tapped out.

"I am sick at my stomach. They are bringing in the wounded. And the dead."

Corregidor used to be a nice place. I know how a mouse feels in a trap."

"My name is Irving Strobob. Get this to my mother—Mrs. Minnie Strobob, 605 Barbey St., Brooklyn . . . Give my love to Joe, Sue, Mac, Garry, Joy, Paul."

"God bless them all."

The message, Strobob says, was relayed.

He kept one other remembrance through his years in the four prison camps at Bilibid and Cabantuan in the Philippines, at Moji, Osaka and Omi in Japan. It was the ring his mother gave him when he was confirmed in the Jewish faith 12 years ago.

Famed Irish Tenor John McCormack, Dies In Dublin

DUBLIN—(P)—John McCormack, 61, whose great tenor voice won him world acclaim as the "golden voice of Athlone," died late Sunday night at his home in Dublin.

A week-old cold which last Friday developed into bronchial pneumonia caused his death.

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Tidwell Explains Fire Alarm System

Jackson Plans To Open Nazi Trials By Nov. 1

NUERNBERG—(P)—Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief U. S. war crimes prosecutor, says the United States expects to be ready to begin trials of Nazi war leaders by Nov. 1 and may proceed on its own if the other Allied Nations are not prepared to go ahead at that time.

The discussions were scheduled against a background of tense power politics.

At this point there appears to be agreement among the Big Five foreign ministers on only one aspect of the boundary dispute—that the port of Trieste should be ruled so it can serve Czechoslovakia, Austria and Poland as well as Italy and Yugoslavia.

This would mean either a free port arrangement or internationalization of the port itself.

On the administration of the city of Trieste, the Italian Peninsula and the whole province of Venezia Giulia, however, there is a basic conflict.

The Yugoslavs claim all this territory. The Italians claim the same area which was theirs before the recent war.

The Russians are expected to support the Yugoslavs, while the Americans and British are believed to lean toward the Italian view.

The vital question of who will rule the Italian colonies has been left for the time being to the Big Five deputies. The problem was referred to them by the foreign ministers with the charge to make fullest possible use of the American plan to let the United Nations appoint administrators of the colonies.

Lord Haw Haw Is Brought To Trial

LONDON—(P)—William Joyce, known to millions of Britons as the "Lord Haw Haw" of the German radio, was brought to trial in old Bailey Monday on a charge of high treason and answered "not guilty" to three counts.

Yanks Beheaded And Fliers Killed In New Atrocities

Five Americans were killed simply because they were fliers, and three others were beheaded after they were marched through Japanese streets bearing signs "these are the American devils who bombed us," Maj. John A. Singlaub of Sherman Oaks, Calif., related at Hong Kong Monday in one of a series of fresh atrocity stories.

An Australian Army intelligence report issued at Melbourne said that of 3,550 British and Australian prisoners taken to Borneo, only six are known to be alive.

Last January, the Melbourne report said 253 prisoners died of 450 sent on a death march through the Borneo mountains. Another death march claimed 353 lives out of 536 men and the others died later or were killed.

Workers Still Wanted

Officers in charge of Army separation centers say many veterans, particularly younger men, are not taking advantage of the Army's job-counseling service and seem to be in no hurry to find work.

This is natural. These men need a time for rest and readjustment. Most of them have been through several varieties of hell. They have been long away from families and sweethearts, from soft beds and home cooking and the delightful privilege of doing what they please when it pleases them. And those without immediate family responsibilities can't be blamed for taking a little time off to catch up.

A lot of war workers must feel the same way. Of course, nobody has shot at them. They haven't suffered exposure to tropic heat and arctic cold. They haven't gone aching, danger-filled days without sleep, or slept in rain-filled foxholes when a chance for rest came. Their lot can't be compared with the combat soldier's or sailor's.

But for many workers, the war years were no picnic. They made good money, but they worked hard and long for it. Many moved far from home to live in temporary, unattractive, uncomfortable dwellings. In spite of absenteeism, the majority of them stuck faithfully to their important work. Holidays and opportunities for recreation were few. Much work and little play may have made a good many Jacks and Jills prosperous, but they also had a tendency to make them weary and impatient.

So now most of the war work is finished, and whole-house layoffs, have commenced. With them have come war workers' weariness and impatience. There is a tendency to seek unemployment compensation and let job hunting go till later. There is also a tendency toward strikes, in spite of the President's request that an interim no-strike pledge be observed.

On the other day there were 50,000 people in the unemployment file. But there were also 10,000 jobs begging for takers.

It is hard to understand the weary war workers' attitude. It is neither is it hard to see that protracted strikes will add difficulties to this period of economic readjustment.

The country has the ingredients for its first postwar boom—a pent-up demand for scarce goods, which to buy them, industrial capacity, and a labor force. But this stimulant, to be effective, must be administered as quickly as possible.

Many Midlanders perhaps never will realize the full extent of the contribution made here by Army people. They have been cooperative and progressive.

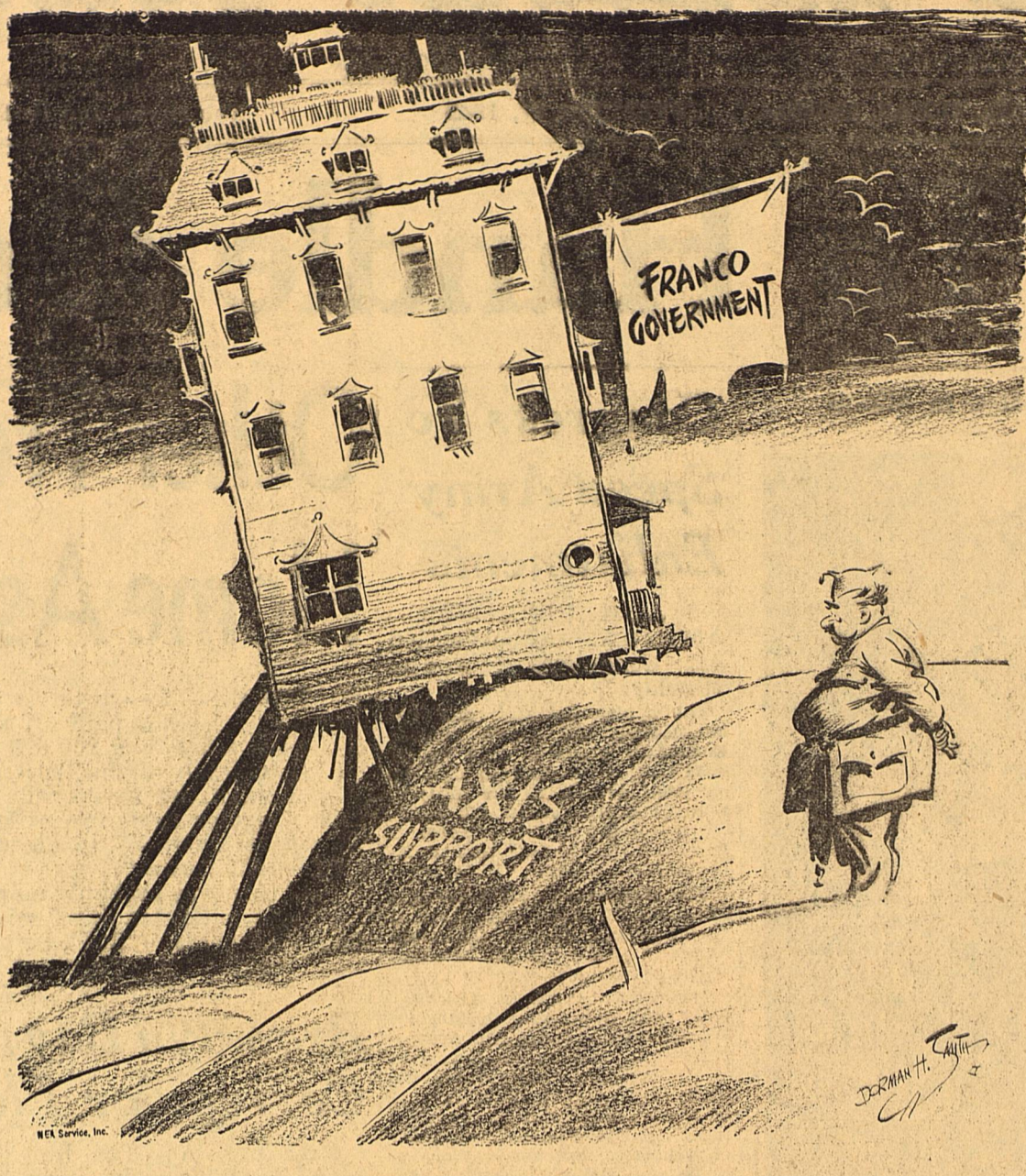

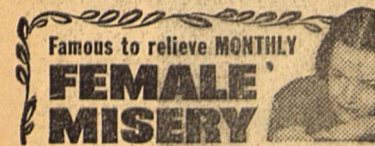
New officers were elected as follows: Glenda Hambleton, president; Donna Rae Dunn, vice president; and Jane Umberson, secretary.

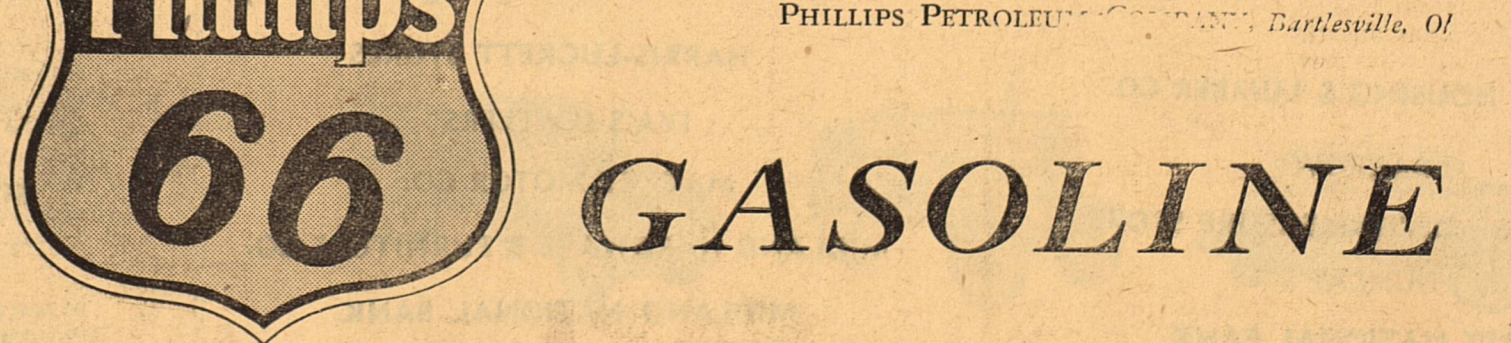

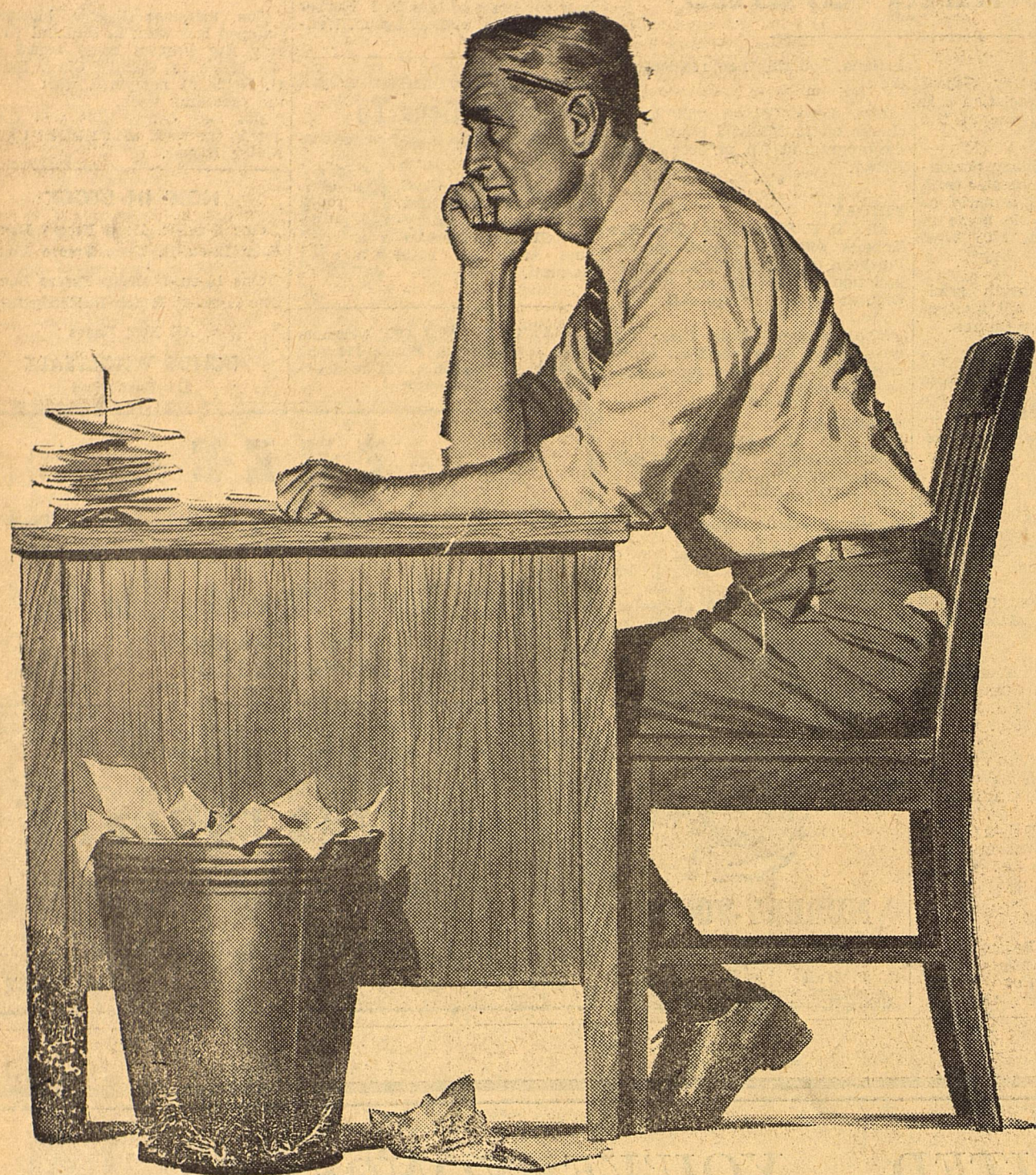

(Continued from Page One) phasized, a force of 200,000 troops "will be sufficiently strong to insure our will."

Questions involved in the strength of occupation forces, the supreme commander explained, are entirely independent of the future Japanese politico-governmental structure.

(Shanghai dispatches Monday said that the swift, quiet expansion of American naval occupation along Shanghai's waterfront was expected by Wednesday.

U. S. Eighth Army headquarters reported that roundup of the 46 war-crimes suspects wanted by MacArthur was proceeding with equal smoothness.

General MacArthur, from his new headquarters facing Japan's imperial palace, announced that the 31st, 37th and 38th American Divisions would go home soon from Manila.

Earlier MacArthur summoned Japanese Premier Higashi-Kuni to his headquarters where he is believed to have informed the premier bluntly that Japan is not an equal and has not yet proved her right to be treated as one.

To convince Japs the general Monday instituted a thorough American information program, utilizing Japanese press, radio and schools, to convince Japan of its defeat, its guilt, and to eliminate militarism.

Admiral Halsey's naval forces meanwhile speeded Japanese disarmament by smashing 25 big coastal defense guns fringing Tokyo Bay and scuttling 51 midget submarines, 103 suicide boats and 103 man-guided torpedoes.

With an estimated half of Japan's 3,000,000 homeland soldiers now disarmed, the second great Allied task—evacuation of prisoners of war—proceeded while fresh atrocity reports rolling in hourly.

Twenty-seventh of the war-crimes suspects to be taken into Allied custody was Vice Adm. Ken Terashima, minister of communications and railways in former premier Tojo's wartime cabinet.

Japanese officials surrendered him to American custody Monday. Now 63, Terashima retired from active naval service in 1934. He served as chief of staff of Japan's second, first and combined fleets, later commanding the naval training

Oil Allowable Order For October Delayed

AUSTIN—(AP)—A statewide oil allowable order for October probably will not be announced for two weeks, Chairman Olen Culberson of the Railroad Commission said Monday.

Culberson said commission engineers were making a close study of all fields with special attention to marginal and submarginal pools before writing a new production schedule.

He added the objective of the October order would be to allocate production so that each operator would have a fair share of market demand, based on his ability to produce. The order, he continued, will seek to prevent selective buying.

The October allowable almost certainly will be reduced below September, said Culberson, although he would not venture a forecast on the amount of reduction.

At last week's statewide production hearings before the commission operators generally sought smaller allowances for next month, based on decreasing military requirements and an increase in crude oil storage.

Oil Pact Will Not Provide Controls

LONDON—(AP)—Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes said Monday he did not expect the projected American-British oil agreement, now under discussion, to provide either price or production control.

"We want this to be highly competitive," said Ickes, who is here as United States petroleum coordinator.

Asked if there was a plan to put oil reserves in the disposal of the United Nations organization, Ickes replied: "I doubt very much whether the oil industry in the United States will be willing to subject the industry to any national or international organization. In fact, I know it would not."

(Continued From Page One) 600 prisoners of war graves in Kuching Cemetery" had killed himself with a table knife at Army headquarters.

Major Singlaub, who led rescue paratroopers landing on Hainan Island Aug. 27, so befuddled Japanese officers in a battle of wits that he and his men gained command of their prisoner of war camp after they had been threatened by bayonet-pointing Japanese.

The commander of Australian prisoners, Col. W. J. R. Scott, said Major Singlaub's coup at the Hainan Island camp was one of the coolest and most courageous he had ever seen.

As the Japanese started "taking us prisoners," Singlaub instead ordered them "to guard our parachute medical and food supplies."

"This so shocked them that they did their colonel sent his chief of staff to investigate but as the latter was only a captain Singlaub ordered him around."

Singlaub insisted that the Allies had defeated them and they comply with his orders. They took the prisoners to the camp and provided food and medicine, which they hadn't had.

Texan Exhibited Singlaub said Capt. Merrit Lawler, Indianapolis, and Staff Sgt. Benjamin Muller, El Paso, Texas, Yanks rescued by his paratroopers, were jammed into cells only two by three feet in size after they had been handcuffed and paraded on the streets.

The handcuffs were only removed the first five days for beatings," said Singlaub. "The officer was ordered beaten daily, but the guard tired after the first five. He was given a dozen beatings afterwards."

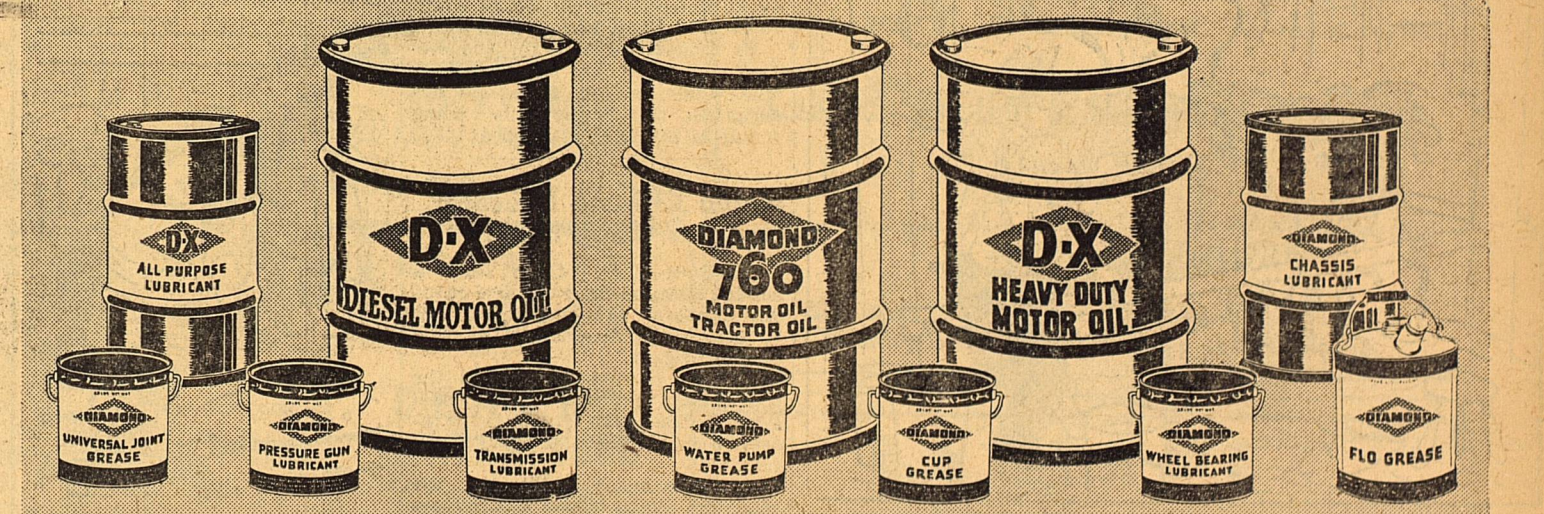

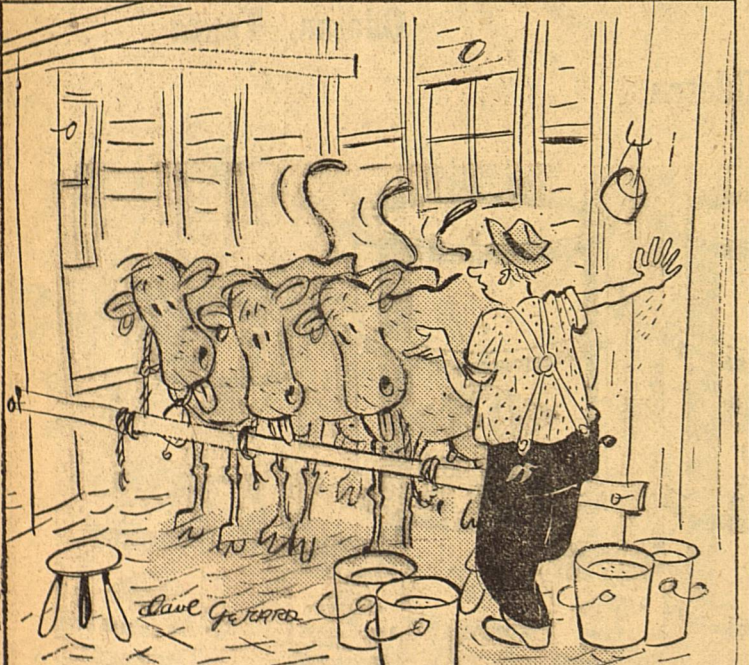

LONDON—(P)—Chen Yuan, a leading Chinese educator, said Monday Emperor Hirohito "must not be used as an instrument in controlling Japan."

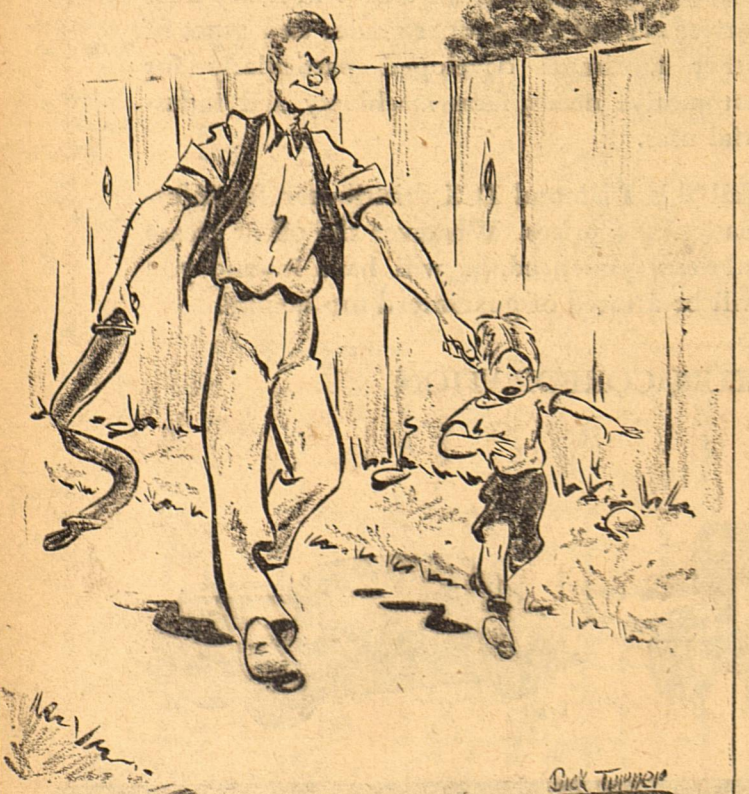
Worship of the emperor is the foundation of Japan's educational system, "the most complete preparation in existence for war," Chen said.

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Detroit And Cubs Practically Sweep Into World Series

It looks like Detroit and Chicago, after a 10-year wait, will meet again in the October World Series. Time is running out on their rivals. With but two weeks of the current campaign remaining, it appeared Monday that only a spectacular spurt by either of the two runner-ups, Washington's Senators or St. Louis' Cardinals, together with a complete collapse on the part of the leaders, could eradicate the leads of the front running Tigers and Cubs who last met in the 1935 classic.

Including Sunday's double triumph over Brooklyn, 3-2 and 4-2, which incidentally erased the Dodgers last mathematical chance for the National League pennant, the grizzly Bruins boasted a four-game lead over the World Champion Redbirds, with each team having a dozen games left on the calendar. Of these, five are against each other.
Tigers 2 1/2 Games Ahead
The Tigers own a two and a half game edge over the Senators in the American League, with nine games left to play and six for the Nats. . . Chicago's twin-victories before a crowd of 40,187 came as St. Louis was splitting two games with Philadelphia and marked the Cubs' eighteenth sweep of a doubleheader this season to better the old major league record of 17 held by the Cubs.

Neither triumph was easy for the Cubs. In each contest they were forced to break a 2-2 deadlock to win. Ray Prim and Hank Wyse were the winning hurlers, the latter becoming the first Cub pitcher to win 20 games in a season since Claude Passeau did it in 1940.
The Phillies came from behind to edge out the Cards, 4-3, in the opener, when Manager Ben Chapman singled in two runs in the role of pinch hitter. The Cards won the nightcap, 10-3, clubbing five Philly hurlers for 15 hits.
The Tigers chilled Washington's pennant hopes by halving the doubleheader with their chief rivals. With a throng of 29,590 cheering them on, the Capita City challengers downed Detroit's southern ace, Hal Newhouser, in the opener, 3-2, but the Bengals barged back to squeeze out a 5-4 decision in the closer and take a 3-1 edge in the series.
Browns Split With Yanks
St. Louis' Browns retained their one-game lead over the Yankees in their battle for third place by splitting two games with New York. The Sewellmen won the first 6-2 behind Bob Muncie. The Yanks won the second, 5-4 to give Spud Chandler, his first triumph for the McGarrymen since his recent Army discharge.
After Steve Gromek had won his seventeenth game for Cleveland, shutting out the Philadelphia Athletics 3-0 in the first game, the Mackmen came back to win the second, 7-5, with a five-run fifth inning.

The New York Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates also split. Jack Barrett's fifteenth homer won the first for the Pirates, 3-2, but Jack Brewer's four-hitter gave the Giants a 9-2 nightcap win.
Dave Ferriss failed to win his twenty-second as the Chicago White Sox hung a double defeat upon the Boston Red Sox, 5-3 and 6-1. Thornton Lee annexed his fifteenth for the Pale Hose in the opener, while Orval Grove bested Ferriss in the nightcap.
The Braves and Reds divided their pair. Boston rallied for three runs to grab the first, 4-3, while the Reds copped the second, 5-4, in 11 innings after scoring four times to deadlock the game in the ninth.

Snead Wins By Nine Strokes At Tulsa
TULSA, OKLA.—(AP)—Sam Snead, winner of the Tulsa Invitational, headed northwest with other top money players Monday to play at Spokane, Wash.
Snead, turning in 277 for 72 holes at Tulsa's Southern Hills Club, out-distanced the field so badly he likely will be a favorite at Spokane. Sunday he finished nine strokes under the 286 turned in by Ben Hogan and Vic Ghezzi for a second-place tie and seven below par for four rounds.
Byron Nelson, golfdom's top money winner of the year, was fourth with 288.

THE WAR TODAY

America's proposal, now before the Big Five Council of Foreign Ministers in London, that Italy's colonies be placed under international trusteeship of the United Nations looks like a master stroke in the interests of world peace.
The Mediterranean theater is one of the most important zones strategically on the face of the globe. Throughout the centuries the nation or alliances which has had the upper hand in the Mediterranean also has had a mighty grip on Europe. The blue waters of this great sea have contained the elements of both peace and war—to be conjured up to suit the desire of the power in control. That is as true today as it was before the Hitlerian conflict produced epochal changes.
Is Danger Spot
Thus, if the Allies now can insure that this great water highway is bordered by territories pledged to peace, one of the worst danger spots will have been removed from the Eastern Hemisphere. It will be hard on Italy to lose her African possessions and the Dodecanese Islands, but she certainly can't be surprised if that's the price she is made to pay for Mussolini's gamble with the devil.
Now is the time for the peace-seeking United Nations to erect their safeguards against any future Mussolini. So it is encouraging to see the proposition of international trusteeship being considered by the Big Five Council.

Certainly Libya should be under United Nations control, especially the eastern section where lies the famous port of Tobruk. Tobruk Harbor is small, but it's the best natural harbor on the north coast of Africa.
That's half the story. The other half is in the big island of Crete, which lies some 200 miles north of Tobruk. These two positions "straddle" the main sea lane where the Mediterranean narrows — that is, they dominate it militarily. They must be under United Nations control.
