



# Reconversion Director Snyder Removes Bans Effective October 15

WASHINGTON—(P)—Reconversion Director John W. Snyder Tuesday announced the lifting of all restrictions on construction of private homes and other buildings, effective October 15.

Snyder announced a six-point program designed to speed the expansion of the building industry, but his plan did not include ceilings on the price of new homes, for which OPA has pleaded.

Simultaneously, the War Production Board disclosed that its famed order "L-41" will be revoked as of Oct. 15. It limits the building of stores, office buildings, hotels, apartments and public works, as well as dwellings.

Price Administrator Chester Bowles, only an hour before Snyder's action, urged Congress to authorize price limits on new dwellings.

Otherwise, Bowles told a Senate small business subcommittee, home prices will go sky-high in "the biggest price boom ever."

Snyder's six points: 1. Inter-agency action will be taken to increase the supply of scarce building materials and, if necessary, to grant price and wage increases and priorities to break bottlenecks.

2. WPB will strengthen inventory controls to prevent hoarding of building materials "so that building will not be delayed by artificially created shortages." 3. To counteract inflation.

4. The Office of Price Administration will strengthen price control of building materials to counteract inflationary pressure. 5. The federal credit agencies will cooperate to "discourage excessive and unsound lending on mortgages" and enlist voluntary cooperation of private lenders "to minimize the danger of inflated prices due to excessive demand."

6. Representatives of real estate, building supply dealers and contractors will be called to Washington to chart a voluntary program to increase production of materials and facilities needed for expanded home construction and to fight inflated building and real estate costs.

7. The National Housing Agency will cooperate with industry to provide advisory service on home values, whether or not the home buyer obtains federal financing assistance.

Snyder's announcement came after a meeting with William H. Davis, economic stabilizer; WPB Chairman J. A. Krug, Bowles and Housing Administrator John B. Blandford, Jr.

## The Dangerous Little People

The little people of Japan are bending over (not backward, but far forward) to show the occupying forces their willingness to cooperate. They are saying that they think democracy is a fine, desirable thing. So sorry, please. Shake hands like after tennis match. No hard feelings.

The polite little people of Japan are being revealed as unspeakably barbarous by newly released Allied prisoners who, day after day, tell new stories of brutality, burning, suffocation, torture and indignities which debase the word "civilized"—a word once applied to the Japs.

These polite little people are showing their conviction that their emperor's order, and not superior force, ended the war. One reporter in Tokyo says they feel embarrassed now, but that "next time they will do better." He describes their feeling of the present defeat as being a "breather between rounds."

The sultan of Johore says the Jap commander of Singapore told him he hoped the peace would last for 20 years—"and then we will be back."

Japanese industrialists blame defeat on the Tokyo bureaucrats, and on the failure of the army and navy to cooperate. Next time they, too, hope that the difficulties will be ironed out.

In short, the little people of Japan are showing themselves to be a hypocritical, deceitful, vengeful tribe who don't know yet they've been licked. And while it's too early to judge, it doesn't seem that our occupation thus far has done much to change their minds.

American reporters were turned back from their first entrance into Tokyo because the Army didn't want the press "spearheading the occupation." Yet the Domei news agency was still poisoning the polite little people's minds against the Americans until General MacArthur clamped a tight censorship on this sort of business.

Of course these slight fumbles aren't too important. Once General MacArthur is firmly established in Tokyo, the re-education process will surely get under way.

Obviously the guilty war lords of Japan must stand trial, as must the Nazis responsible for the European war. Obviously there must be an eventual, radical change in the Japanese system of government.

And throughout all this time there must be constant vigilance by this country and its present Allies, no matter how large an occupying force is required. Japan already has shown that, given a chance, she will prepare for the next war as Germany did in the two decades after 1919. We must not become unwary and satisfied with "routine" occupation.

The United Nations Organization will only have power to intervene at the threat of hostilities. It will be up to us to guard against the preparations which would make such a threat possible.



## Hearing On Production Of Gas Opens Tuesday

KANSAS CITY—(AP)—The first in a series of hearings conducted by the Federal Power Commission to get a complete picture of the nation's gas production and consumption opens here Tuesday with officials from seven states in attendance.

Gov. Andrew Schoepel of Kansas, chairman of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, has been designated as the commission spokesman and will open testimony by outlining the commission's viewpoint that natural gas is a state resource, not a public utility.

Production in Kansas will be the chief subject for discussion at this first meeting. On Oct. 9, a second will be held at Oklahoma City, then the commission will go to New Orleans and on Nov. 27, to Dallas. Commissioner Nelson Lee Smith, who will direct the hearing said "the purpose of the investigation is to advise Congress what is being done to conserve natural gas and what natural gas is being used for at the present time."



## Showdown Looms In Detroit Employees' Demand For Raise

By JAMES MARLOW  
DETROIT —(AP)—Right now Detroit is a city of watchful waiting. Quiet. But the stage is being set for a showdown. A big one.

Lengthy strikes break out in the big auto plants here this country's reconversion gets a bad bang on the head.

The effect will be felt: Among the automakers and auto-workers and down the line—from the small plants, which make parts for the big ones, to the steel mills.

The CIO's United Automobile Workers (UAW) is doing the stage setting. The UAW takes this position:

1. Wartime overtime pay is ended. Workers in peacetime therefore will have much less pay to take home.

2. While the basic pay of workers was held down during the war, living costs climbed and haven't dropped at all.

3. So UAW wants a 30 per cent pay increase for its members to make up for higher living costs and smaller peacetime take-home pay.

Yet OPA wants to keep the price of new cars down somewhere around the price paid for new cars in 1942.

UAW says prices still can be kept down even though automakers should give UAW workers that 30 per cent increase.

Chief targets of the UAW are the three big automakers: Ford, Chrysler, and General Motors, which is biggest of the three.

Trics General Motors First  
UAW is trying out its 30 per cent demand against General Motors first.

UAW officials say the union will strike against General Motors, if necessary, while letting the other automakers continue to turn out cars.

None of the Big Three has yet made any statement about UAW demands. They're letting UAW do the talking at this time.

But these two big questions hang in the background:  
1. Will the Big Three get together for joint resistance to the UAW? They haven't acted together in peacetime before.  
2. If they do get together, what form will their resistance take?

Meanwhile, the Ford Company, which has acted independently of the other big three members in the past, acted on its own again. It has laid off 40,000 workers in the Detroit area and 10,000 in some of its other plants.

The Ford Company gave this reason for its action:  
A number of strikes—16 as of now—are going on in independent plants which supply the Ford Company with parts; those strikes have so crippled the flow of parts to the Ford Company that it can't continue turning out cars.

ernments, which he termed Democratic.

"We Soviet people think there are countries in which the question of changing governments is not only ripe but urgent," he said. "We do not think this applies to Bulgaria, Romania and Hungary."

There was every indication that Molotov was referring to the government of Greece, although when asked to name the regimes he believed should be changed, he said:

"I'll have to think about it." He said the Russians had placed a memorandum on Greece before the Council of Foreign Ministers, where the United States is represented by Secretary of State James F. Byrnes.

"You may rest assured that the Soviet Union feels that the sooner an actually democratic government is set up in Greece, the better it will be for Greece and her Allies," Molotov said.

TOKYO —(AP)—General MacArthur suspended the influential newspaper Asahi for two days Tuesday after publication of editorials declaring the United States violated international law with the use of the atomic bomb.

The project had sulphur water below that horizon and plugged back and swabbed some oil after treating with 500 gallons of acid. Apparently the plug-back had eliminated the water.

PORT ARTHUR —(AP)—CIO union employees of the Gulf Oil Corporation will seek a conference with Gulf officials Tuesday to present demands of the union, after the members of the Oil Workers International Union, CIO, voted 91 per cent in favor of a strike at the refinery.

Union demands are for a closed shop, payment of late-shift differentials, and 52 hours pay for a 40-hour work week. They also seek to bar outside maintenance repair and replacement contractors from the plant unless they employ CIO labor.

The countries which are hardest hit may see civil upheavals. Perhaps some of us may have become rather too complacent about the position in Europe, because there has been no great explosion thus far. But we should remember that during the warm summer months fuel and clothing aren't so much of a problem, and food is easier to find. It's now, as we head into autumn and rapidly approach the killing cold of winter, that the dangers become acute.

# THE WAR TODAY

Europe's dangerous shortage of food was emphasized again Monday when forty-seven American organizations petitioned President Truman for quick shipments of foodstuffs to avert starvation.

The President later issued a statement saying "this government is bending every effort to find solutions to this problem" and reaffirming his pledge at the time of the Potsdam Conference: "If we let Europe go cold and hungry, we may lose some of the foundations of order on which the hoped-for worldwide peace must rest. We must help to the limits of our strength. And we will."

He added, however, that "much suffering may be expected during the coming winter in certain areas of the continent."

This isn't a new crisis, but one with which the Allies have been struggling ever since the collapse of Nazidom. However, it is rapidly approaching its peak, which will be reached after winter has the unhappy continent in its icy grip. That is, it will reach its peak of suffering—but none can say what chaos may be let loose as the result of hunger.

Herbert H. 





## KANSAS PRODUCTION LEADS OIL REPORT

TULSA, OKLA. —(AP)—Kansas daily average crude oil production came up 18,400 barrels to 273,600 in the week ending Sept. 15 as the country's output as a whole increased 10,850 to 4,536,800. The Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

California also gained, picking up 2,850 barrels for a total of 883,250, but the eastern area dropped 8,650 to 60,000 and Illinois slumped 3,600 to 201,450. Oklahoma increased 800 to 392,050.

The Rocky Mountain area of Colorado, Montana and Wyoming added 2,650 for a total of 139,800, and Texas was unchanged at 1,889,500. Louisiana inched up 550 to 363,200. Mississippi produced 53,700 barrels compared with 55,750 last week.
