It would not be concerned with domestic oil production in the United States, but sets forth the principle of equality of opportunity for nationals of both countries in exploration and development of oil concessions throughout the world.

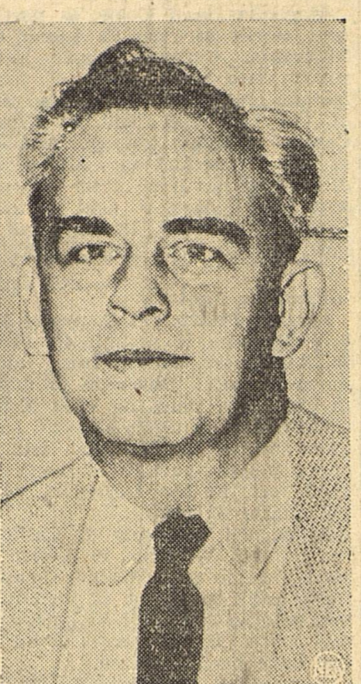
Cotton Ginning Falls Off Says U. S. Report

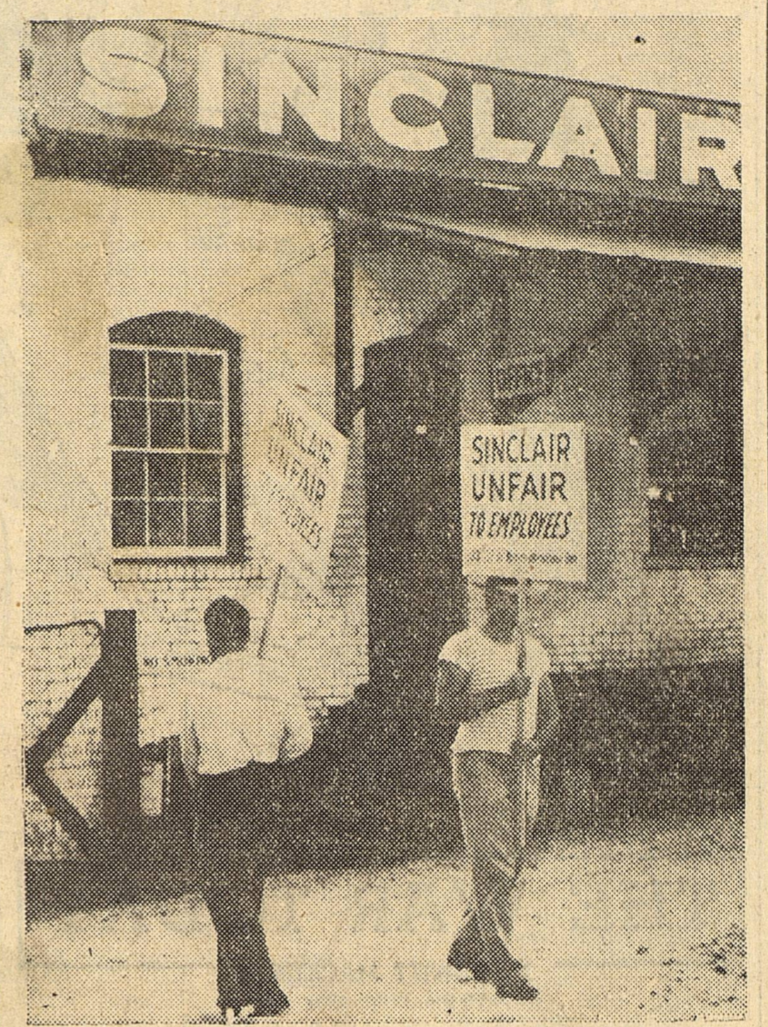

Lumbermen In Pacific Northwest, Building Employes In N.Y. Out

Two new disputes entered the nation's labor picture Monday, boosting the number of idle to more than 323,000 and reemphasizing the wage issue as the crux of most of the difficulties.

Some 348 mills and logging camps were involved in the lumber dispute, which revolves about union demands for a minimum hourly wage of \$1.10 as well as union determination to force industry-wide bargaining instead of individual company negotiations.

State Department Handles Surplus Disposal Problem

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman has decided to place the State Department in control of the gigantic problem of disposing of billions of dollars of wartime surpluses throughout the world.

Senators learned this Monday from John W. Snyder, director of war mobilization and reconversion, as he outlined administration plans for the disposal.

In Europe alone, Snyder told the Special Senate War Investigating Committee, there are some 6,000,000 tons of surplus materials worth about \$1,000 a ton.

Mined Zone Will Help Stop Food Smuggling

BRUSSELS—(P)—Allied plans to create a mine-zone, wire-enclosed prohibited zone along the Belgian-German border to halt food smuggling were disclosed Monday by Achille van Acker, Belgian prime minister and food administrator.

Belgian authorities have complained that British and American troops, sometimes accompanied by German girls, have driven Army trucks into Belgium and bought up quantities of food on the black market.

War Cost U. S. 11 Aircraft Carriers

WASHINGTON—(P)—The war cost the United States 11 aircraft carriers sunk.

A navy recapitulation Monday showed that all but one of the 11 support carrier Block Island—was sunk or damaged by Japanese air, surface or submarine attacks. The Block Island fell victim to German submarine torpedoes in the Western Atlantic.

Wildcat In Crane Tests 60-65 BOPH From Ellenburger

The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1-A University, East-Central Crane County wildcat, in southeast quarter of section 33, block 31, University survey, indicated production of at least 60 to 65 barrels of oil per hour, natural, from 10,377-427 feet in the Ellenburger.

The project filled 4,555 feet with fluid, stung a one-hour drillstem test, and all of that was oil and gas except last two stands, which was drilling mud, heavily cut with oil and gas. That was with a 5,000-foot water blanket in the pipe.

Most observers think it would have shown for considerably more production if it had not been so heavily loaded.

There was a strong, steady blow of air throughout the test period. The well headed continuously while drill-pipe was being pulled.

Operator plans to drill a short distance further and then run an electrical survey. The section at 10,333-377 feet, had already shown free oil in the Ellenburger.

Flowing Water—And
In addition, the wildcat has indicated heavy natural production from the Devonian between 7,900 feet and about 9,000 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Buchanan, East Midland County wildcat, in Baldridge survey No. 32-692, flowed water, with a slight trace of distillate, on a drillstem test of perforated sections in the casing at 11,380-515 feet, after treating with 5,000 gallons. The packer for the test was at 11,300 feet. Gas came to the surface after the tool had been open for one hour. So far as known Monday morning operator was still testing on that horizon.

H. W. Snowden, Dallas, filed application with the Railroad Commission to drill a 4,000-foot wildcat in Rannels County. It will be Snowden's No. 1 A. S. Bright, and is 380 feet from north and 1,520 feet from east lines of section 36, COSD & RGNG survey. It is two miles south of Bright's store and will drill with rotary.

MISSISSIPPI TO LEASE SUBMERGED COAST LAND

JACKSON, MISS.—(P)—Submerged land on the Gulf Coast will be leased from oil exploration at an Oct. 4 meeting of the Mississippi Lease Commission. The tract of 400,000 acres is half of the state's 800,000 acres of land on the Gulf Coast.

Billions For Britain

American thinking has changed considerably since the day when President Calvin Coolidge over-simplified the complicated matter of Europe's war debts by observing, "They hired the money, didn't they?"

Twenty years ago the entire nation would probably have screamed like a tribe of tattooed Indians at the mere thought of a foreign power asking this country for an outright grant of money, or a loan without interest. But today Lord Keynes is over here making such a request for Britain.

We have learned that the Coolidge country-banker philosophy, though morally sound, didn't solve the intricate involvements of world economy. We have learned that when a major power can't or won't repay a debt there is little recourse which would not be harmful to the creditor in the end.

And we have learned, or are learning, some lessons at home that can apply to international problems. Gradually we have come to realize that slums depress and threaten a whole community's living standard and impede its progress.

But that does not mean that this government must give England a gift of money and a pat on the head. For if America does that for England, she will be expected to do as much for France, Russia, China and all the other countries that have suffered grievously in the recent conflict.

The Seeds Of War

A brief news dispatch from London the other day carried a statement by Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Harris on war and peace that was perhaps more important and certainly more profoundly true than all the reams of speeches and discussions at the San Francisco Conference.

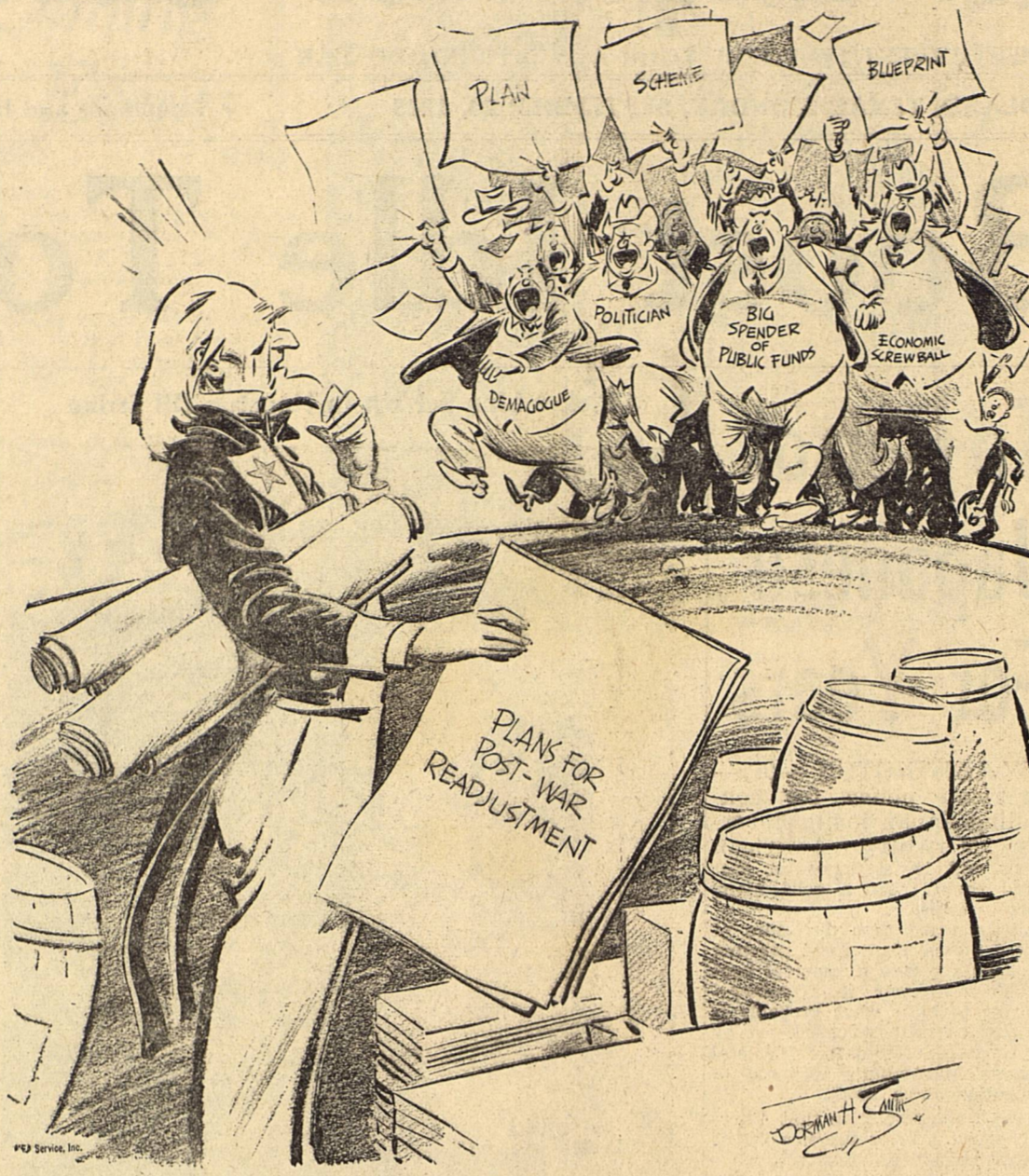
Those words ought to be locked in every human heart and pondered by every human mind. They are not new words, but they have been neglected and forgotten. Mankind is building a world police force which it hopes will control the crime of war.

Souvenirs Of Death

Appearing with disturbing frequency in the recent news have been the reports of tragedies resulting from the explosions of souvenirs brought back from the wars. A somewhat typical instance occurred in Ohio a few days ago.

The situation will be infinitely worse than the aftermath to World War I. As long as 20 and 25 years after the end of that struggle, explosions of souvenirs were killing and maiming.







State Attorney Rules Age Law Self-Enacting



After Dick Siebert was purposely passed, George Kell stroked the payoff poke, a single to right which sent Kish over the plate with the winning run.

Washington tagged no-hit Dick Fowler for three runs in the third inning of the nightcap. After the As again came from far back to tie the game, Washington won it in the eighth on successive doubles by George Case and George Myatt. Marino Pieretti, celebrating his 24th birthday, was the winning hurler. . . . The Tigers were tamed by Nelson Potter, veteran St. Louis right-hander, who handicuffed them with two safeties in registering a 5-0 shutout for his eighth straight victory and his fifteenth of the season.

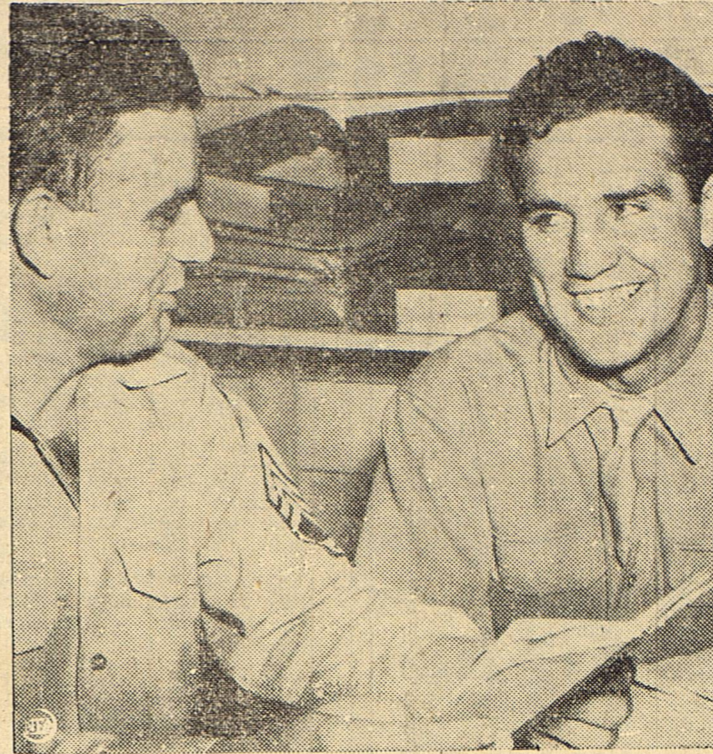
Cubs and Cards Win
