The spectacular fire, a few blocks from the city's center, raged uncontrolled through Saigon's largest market place—a colorful collection of booths and sheds.

Gen. 'Ike' Summons Patton To Report De-Nazi Progress

-(A)— Gen. Eisenhower summoned Gen. George S. Patton Wednesday to make a personal report on deNazification progress in Bavaria.

Lt. Gen. Walter B. Smith, Eisennower's chief of staff, announced that the supreme commander had called for an immediate report on Nazis still holding office in Third Army territory and also had requested Patton to give a personal accounting of his stewardship in Bavaria early next week.

At a press conference called as the result of Patton's recent remark "Nazism might well be compared to any political parties at home—Republican or Democratic," Smith said Eisenhower would permit no modification of his order that Nazis be removed "ruthlessly from public office, regardless of general efficiency."

The Message That Wasn't Sent

So it turns out now that Lt. Col. (then Major) James Devereux and the Marine garrison on Wake Island didn't send that radio request for "more Japs."

There is yet no indication of the message's source. It's most unlikely that it was circulated as a joke, for Heaven knows the American people and their armed forces weren't feeling jovial in December of 1941. More likely it was an instantaneous and inspired bit of propaganda designed to bolster morale and typify the American spirit in the face of difficulties.

It was a courageous, audacious message-but it wasn't as complimentary as intended. The Marines on Wake showed a bravery that equaled and surpassed the sentiment of the message they didn't send. But it was a desperate and doomed bravery.

Overwhelmed by superior force and superior equipment, they weren't foolhardy enough to radio for more Japs. But it is evident from Colonel Devereux's story that they considerably reduced the number of Japs con-fronting them in spite of frightful odds, and would have kept on doing so as long as there was a man left to fire a gun if their commanding officer had permitted it. As it at 4 p. m. was, Colonel Devereux had to give the cease firing order three times before it was heeded.

Perhaps "Send us more Japs" served its purpose in 1941. It showed the quality of our comparative handful of Pacific defenders. It gave to us at home a moment of pride and cheer. It exemplified, for all the fictional, melodramatic bravado so out of key with the true situation, the spirit which was so evident all along the bitter

There came a time when our men could perhaps call for more Japs. But before it came there must have been many times when the real cry was "Send us more men and guns and planes and ships."

That request surely was in the minds and on the lips of Wake's defenders. And because it could not be granted. there were Americans who died needlessly and tragically there and at other Pacific outposts, or died a slower and painful death in Jap prison camps, or survived the enemy's torture and starvation for nearly four years.

So "Send us more Japs" will not go into the history books with other military epigrams. But history will record the true American situation in the Pacific in December, 1941. And that situation will be, or should be, remembered by all of us when the inevitable agitation for a small Army and Navy and a small military budget begins

It will be, or should be, remembered by our military leaders when opposition to a unified command increases, and pleas are heard for continuing the separate services whose confusion, conflict and lax operation led to the horrible awakening at Pearl Harbor and the urgent necessity of uniting as a team to save the country.



Pipeline Proration

FORT WORTH -(P)- Pipeline proration, resulting from the strikes in Texas Coastal refineries, continued to spread Wednesday in West Texas. Reductions by pipeline and purchasing companies in the allowable as the result of the strike now amount to approximately 65,000 barrels daily, with indications that it will be increased substantially should the strikes continue several more days.

Latest to join in the pipeline proration are the Atlantic Pipe Line Company and Stanolind Pipe Line Company, with Magnolia Pipe Line Company expanding its curtailment of purchases.

Atlantic reduced its runs in the Pe well and Seminole pools 50 per cent, amounting to reductions of 6,000 and 5,560 barrels, respectively. Stanolind installed pipe line proration in the Slaughter pool, cutting pipe line runs 50 per cent, or 2,700 barrels daily.

Magnolia expanded its previously announced pipe line proration which at first applied to only sweet crude areas. It reduced its runs 50 per cent in the Slaughter pool, from which it previously had ferried 30,920 barrels daily. It also cut 50 per cent at Seminole, where runs had averaged 9,720 barrels

Wednesday's reductions amounted to 34,580 barrels dialy, while previously announced cuts had totalled 30 380 barrels

Picket Corpus Plant strikes have closed three plants at Houston, seven at Port Ar hur, three at Texas City, two at Beaumont and one at Corpus Christi, an estimated 22,000 workers are off the job.

About 30 members of the Sinclair group of Local 343, Oil Workers International Union (CIO) began to picket the Corpus Christi plant of the Sinclair Refining Company in their strike for higher

The picketing was being conducted without disorder. The Sinclair plant has made no gasoline since Monday. About 325 mechanical and operating workers

are taking part in the strike which was voted Friday. E. B. Killick, superintendent of the Sinclair Refining Company plant at Corpus Christi, said many government orders will be delayed and civilian consumers soon will experience a gasoline shortage if stoppage at the Corpus plant and

other refineries continues more than a few days. All other Corpus Christi plants in this area are still working.
