Construction of the Bovina bull statue is coming along according to schedule

We got that encouraging report this week from Cash Richards, who is sort of the liason man between Bovina and the builder of the bull in Lubbock. who is a son of Richards' nephew. His name is James Richards.

The original deal was for the bull statue to be ready for mounting in Bovina by the end of July and Cash says there's no doubt in his mind but what that deadline will be met.

The bull statue will be lifesize or maybe some larger depending on your conception of how big a life-size bull is, He'll have a concrete-like, sculptured finish and his breed will be a cross between a Whiteface and a Longhorn, more or less, according to our understanding. The idea is to have the kind of ball that was used on Plains ranches back in the early days. Hereford bulls became popular later on, but at the time of the original XIT days and Bovina's beginning there probably wasn't enough purebred bulls to go around and some hybrids were used in the successful effort to improve the Longhorntype cattle.

Anyway, the Bovina bull has a metal construction and is made of pretty sturdy stuff, according to our informant. The hornspread will be in the neighborhood of 40 inches, which

Total deposits for the First State Bank of Bovina as of June 30 were \$2,253,029.58, slightly higher than last year's mark. The statement of financial conditions was recently released by the bank.

Deposits last year at this time were \$2,127,933.64. This mark was down somewhat from the 1967 reading of \$2,155,307.77.

Total loans for the fiscal year just completed registered \$1,680,029.79, a substantial increase over the \$1,406,384.27 mark of last year. Loans during fiscal 1967 were \$1,-562,283.89.



Bovina's present key rate is 41 cents. The first thing that must be done before this rate is lowered is that the city must have dual 500 gallon per minute water pumps at its main water station. Presently, we have one 500 gpm pump and one 350 gpm pump, Cost of changing over could be as much as \$2000. Caldwell believes, and it could be less.




