PLAINS at Farwell --- The Steers will improve, but Plains reportedly has a good team.

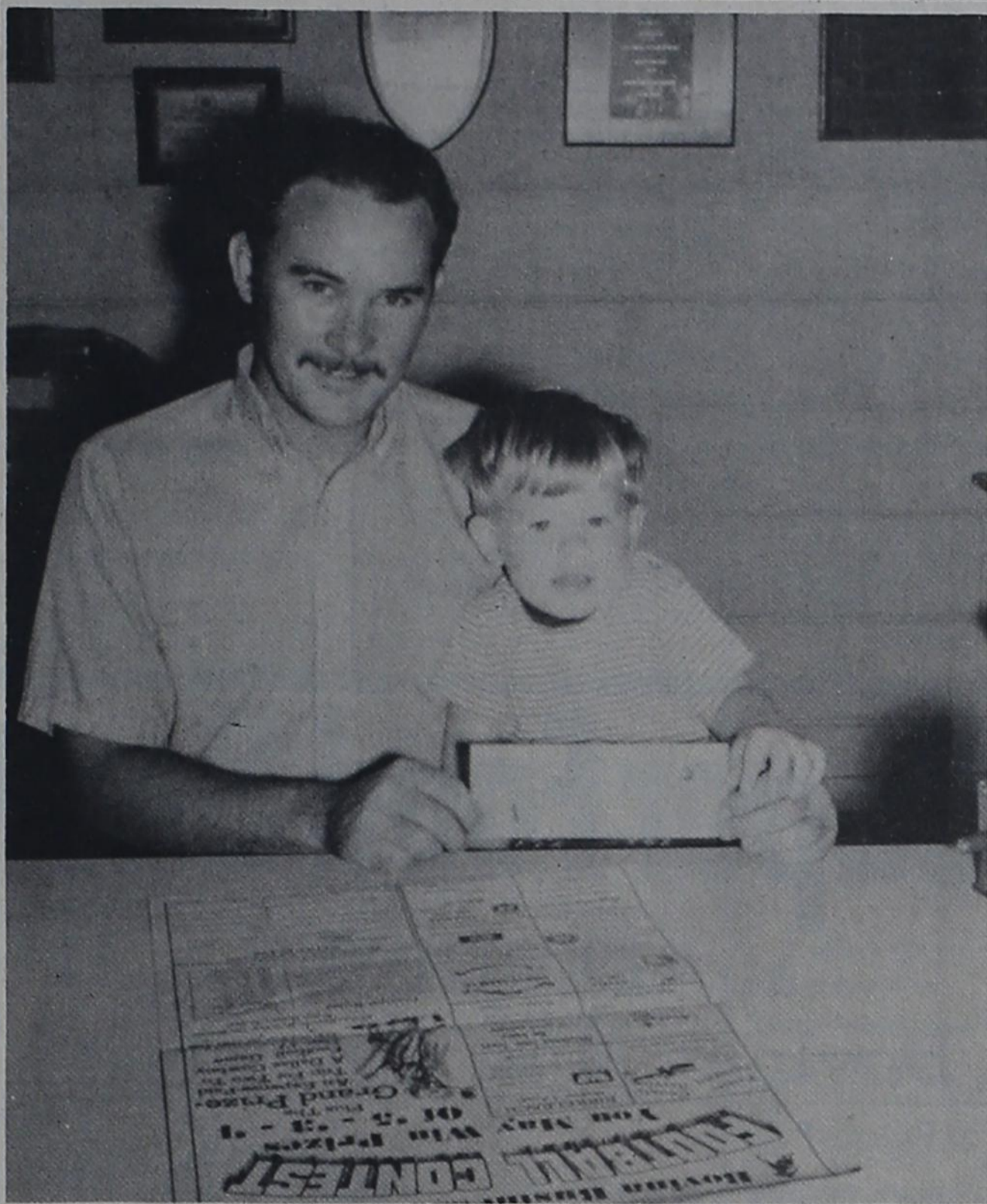
Anton at SUDAN --- It's time for the Hornets to win one and they have the homefield advantage.

Venable Takes First In Weekly Contest

Radford Venable turned in the best of 225 entries in the Bovina Businesses 1972 Dallas Cowboy Football Contest last week.

Venable was the only contestant to correctly predict the outcome of all 10 games in the contest. The effort earned him the weekly first prize money of \$5.

Five contestants picked nine of the 10 games correctly, making it necessary to resort to the tiebreaker score to determine the second and third place money winners.

Jerry Roach of Aiken took the \$3 second place prize money by being only six points off the score of the Bovina-Friena game. Roach missed the outcome of the Vega versus Sunray tilt as did most contestants.

Hears Student Progress Report --

School Board Adopts New Busing Policy

A new policy in regard to the riding of school busses by students who live outside the city limits but less than two miles from school was adopted at a meeting of the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District Monday night. Under the new ruling, students

residing outside the city limits will be permitted to ride busses even though they do not live two miles from school.

Stanley Robinson met with the board, requesting a more lenient busing policy.

Students living on Highways 60 and 86 must catch the bus on the side of the highway on which they live, Supt. L. F. Jacobs explains, because, as a safety precaution, the busses will not cross the highway or stop for students to cross the highway.

Students living outside the city limits but not on one of the two

major highways may board the bus or leave it at designated stops as regular bus students do.

The new policy was put into effect on a temporary basis, Jacobs says.

Another stipulation in the policy is that the busses must have room for the students who live within the two-mile limit of the school.

In other business, board members heard a student progress report from Charles Turner, school counselor.

Based on results of tests given over the past four years, Bovina Schools students equalled the national average in "almost all subject areas."

The board approved the employment of Mrs. Christina Garza Quintana as a teacher aide for kindergarten.

Rejected by the board was a request from student body representatives, Heidi Corn and Sonja O'Hair, to allow school facilities to be used for student dances.

After Long Wet Spell --

Rainfall Stops; Farming Starts

The area's "monsoon season" has evidently ended and farming activities have returned to normal, except that they're late for the time of year.

The three-week long wet spell had one last flurry Tuesday night of last week. Since then, clearing skies and ground-drying sunshine have prevailed.

As much as an inch and a half of rain was recorded across the area Tuesday night. The rainfall began here shortly after 8 p.m.

The dry weather is welcomed by most farmers.

The recent rainfall has slowed down the sowing of the winter wheat crop. Also delayed by the

moisture was harvesting of vegetables and cutting of ensilage in the area.

The moisture total during the rainy spell wasn't particularly excessive --- in the neighbor-

hood of four inches --- but the duration was creating problems from an agricultural standpoint.

The cotton crop still has time to mature, where it didn't receive hail damage, providing September and October continue hot and dry and the first freeze of the Fall holds off to a normal date.

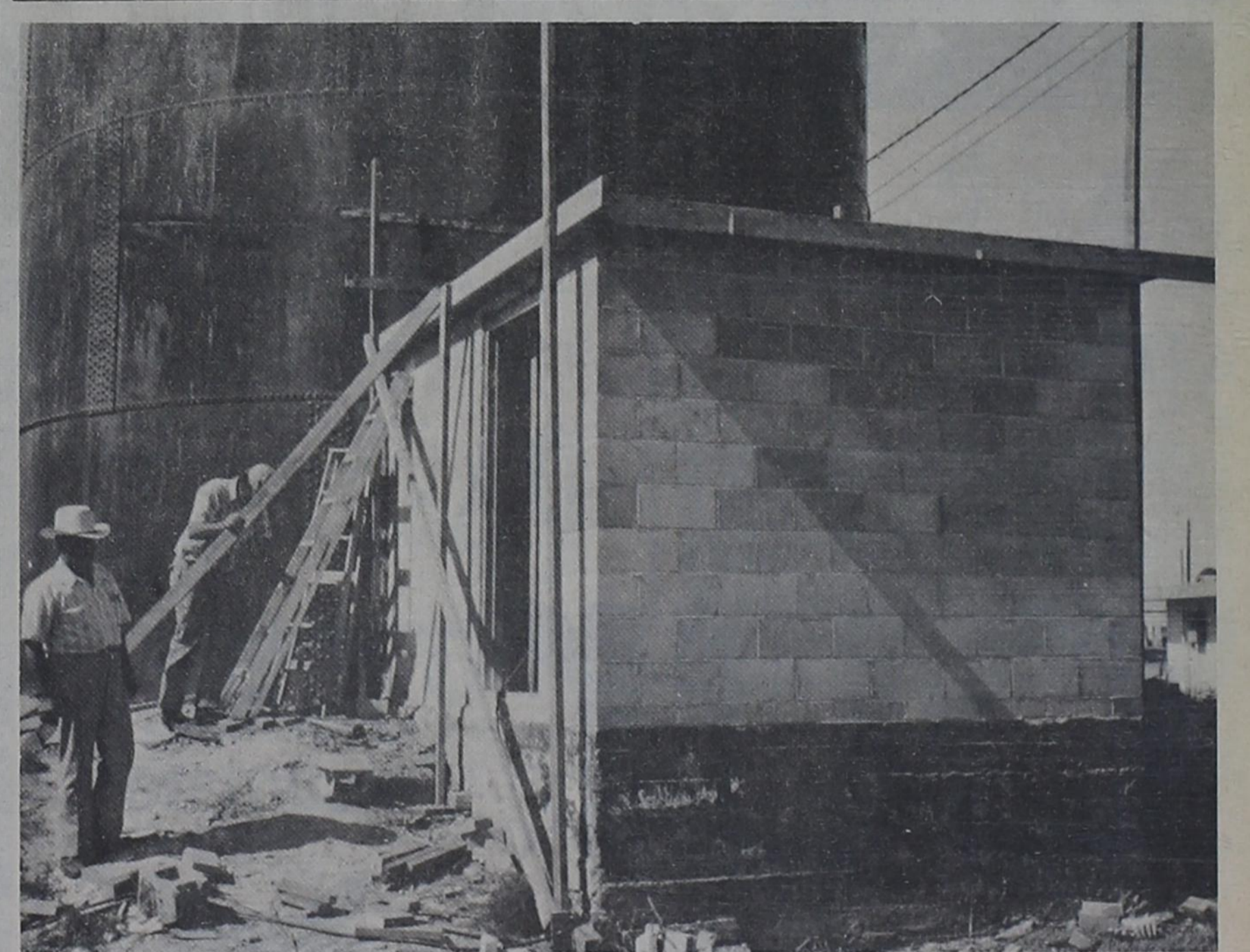
The moisture was probably beneficial to the grain sorghum crop, which is in the maturing stage now.

Nine Injured --

17 August Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of August, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no deaths and nine persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1972 shows a total of 102 accidents, resulting in three persons killed, and 64 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in August of 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured as compared to the same month

in 1971 with 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 12 more accidents, three more fatalities and 41 less injured in 1972, at the same period of time.

Wise, Yoakum, and Briscoe, one each.

Ensilage Harvest Creates Problems

Ensilage harvest in Parmer County is about complete, according to Herb Evans, conservationist for Parmer County Soil Conservation Service. "This has been an unusual year for ensilage harvest," said Evans. "A large portion of the early harvest was done with the ground too wet and in some cases, tractors were used to pull trucks through the fields," Evans commented.

SCS officials are concerned because of compaction caused by trucks and tractors on the wet soil causing conservation and pollution problems.

Farmers who harvested ensilage while the soil was too wet are encouraged to treat this area with special concern, Evans stated. Adding large amounts of organic matter is one type of treatment and another accepted treatment is to grow a close-growing fibrous rooted crop, the SCS official said.

"If there are any problems or questions on any particular farm, we suggest you contact the SCS in Friona," concluded Evans.

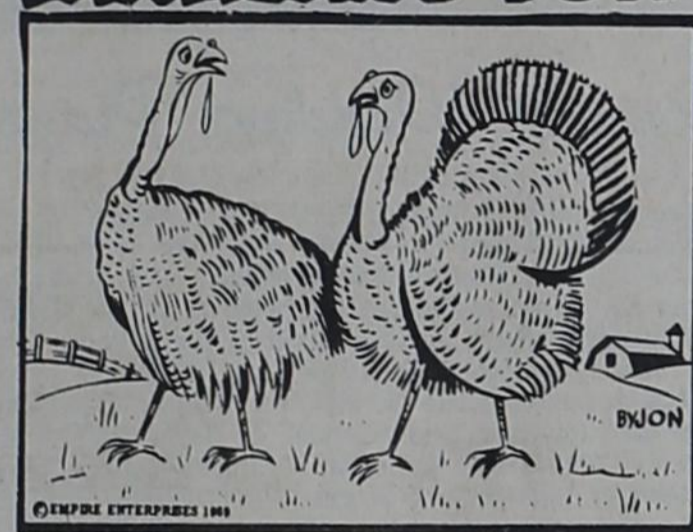

CHICKEN ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

- 1 onion

2 flat cans chopped green chilies

- 1 T. butter
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 soup can milk
- 1 boned cooked chicken
- 1 pkg. tortillas (10)

Saute chilies and onion in butter. Break tortillas in pieces and layer with chilies and onion and chicken. Heat soup and milk to boiling point and pour over layered ingredients. Bake 30 to 45 minutes at 325 degrees. Served 8.

Cheddar cheese may be grated on top of casserole 10 minutes before done. Freezes real well.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

- Bring to a boil:
- 1 c. water
- 1/2 c. shortening
- 6 T. cocoa
- 1 stick oleo

Pour over: 2 c. sugar, 2 c. flour. Beat well and add: 2 whole eggs, 1/2 c. butter, 1 t. soda, 1 t. vanilla.

Pour into pan and bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Batter will be real thin.

ICING
Bring to a boil:
6 T. milk
1 stick oleo
4 T. cocoa
Add 1 box powdered sugar and beat until smooth. Add 1 c. chopped nuts and pour over cake while still hot. Real moist.

Record Now 1-1 --

Mustangs Drop 26-6 Decision To Friona

A few bad breaks and a lack of offensive punch gave the Bovina Mustangs a 26-6 loss to the Friona Chieftains at Friona Friday night.

The Mustangs were never able to get their offensive machine in gear and it was the defense

which racked up the six points for the Bovina boys ---- on a 93-yard return of an intercepted pass by Linebacker Kim Rundell.

The Class AA Chieftains scored a touchdown in each of the four quarters, Bovina's tally came in the third period of play.

The loss brought the Bovina team's season record to 1-1. The Chieftains are 2-0 with wins over Farmer County rivals, Farwell and Bovina.

For the Mustangs, the best consolation to come from the game was that their loss to Friona was less than Farwell's of the previous week.

Rundell's long run for the six-pointer was the biggest thing Bovina fans had to cheer about during the tilt. It came late in the third period as Friona, which already had a 20-0 lead, was threatening to score again.

Faced with a third down situation on the Bovina seven yard line, Friona Quarterback Johnny Bandy threw in the left flat.

The receiver got his hands on the ball, bobbling it in the air. That's when opportunist Rundell grabbed onto the ball and was loose on the 93-yard jaunt with plenty of Mustangs to provide protection for him as he made the run.

That cut Friona's margin to 20-6, after the running attempt for the dual extra points failed, and there was hope at that point that the Ponies could get back in the ballgame. The hope went for naught, however, as the favored Chieftains put the game out of reach with their final tally early in the final stanza.

This one came on a 61 yard dash by fleet halfback Louis Lee, who the Mustangs did a good job of containing for the most part.

The Friona team got the edge early in the game with an almost unbelievable 80 yard punt.

The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and punted on a fourth-and-one situation from their own 40. The defense then held the Chiefs deep in their own territory.

The Friona team had a fourth and 13 situation from their own eight yard line. After a bad snap from center, Bandy got the kick away, got the benefit of a good roll and the ball stopped on the Bovina 12, 80 yards away.

Again, the Mustangs couldn't move the ball and a normal punt by Jeff McCormick gave the winners possession on the Bovina 42 ---- a 50-yard gain on the punt exchange. From there, the Chiefs drove for the initial touchdown in eight plays. Kevin Wiseman kicked the extra point to make the count 7-0.

The second quarter counter came on a one-yard plunge by Fullback Mario Perea, capping a 25-yard drive which required five plays.

Lee, the Friona speed merchant, set up the third quarter score with a 58-yard return of the second half kickoff. He

brought the ball from the 25 to the Bovina 17 before being knocked from his feet. That gave the Chiefs the momentum they needed to get the tally, however. Bandy went across the goal line five plays later for the six points and Wiseman added the extra to make it 20-0 with 10:27 remaining in the third period.

The Mustangs picked up only two first downs during the tilt. Both of those came in the first half. Bovina went to the air three times with no completions.

The Chiefs hit on seven of 14 passes for 80 yards through the air.

With a 1-1 record on the ledger after two clashes with Class AA teams, the Bovina Mustangs will take advantage of an open date this week to prepare for their first game against a Class A foe, Sanford-Fritch of District 1-A, and Head Coach Roger Ezell says, "Thank goodness."

Ezell indicated that the Mustangs would use this week to work on fundamentals and begin preparing for Sanford-Fritch Monday afternoon.

"Defensively, we didn't do that bad a job against Friona," said Ezell, "but we just didn't play as a unit on offense."

"Their middle linebacker (Mario Perea) did most of the damage to our offense Friday night. We just didn't block him out, our line missed too many assignments."

Two players quit the team Monday morning, according to Ezell. They were Eddie Pesch and Arty Kunselman.

Pesch, a senior, had been the primary ball carrier for the Mustangs in the first two games of the season. The 165-pound tailback broke into the starting lineup in the Farwell game last year and had been a workhorse for the Ponies. Kunselman, a junior, had started at offensive and defensive guard in the scrimmage sessions and the Boys Ranch game. He had been moved to tackle, backing up the injured Danny McKay.

The Mustangs came through the Friona conflict in good physical shape, said Ezell. Larry

Wiseman, who began workouts only last week, saw a great deal of action on defense in the Friona game and is expected to be back in the offensive backfield against Sanford-Fritch. "Mike Ware should be ready to go by the first district game," said Ezell.

The Marrons will face Sanford-Fritch and Plains during the next two weeks before district action begins with Vega coming here on Oct. 13.

Plains has been designated as the homecoming game for the 1972-'73 season.

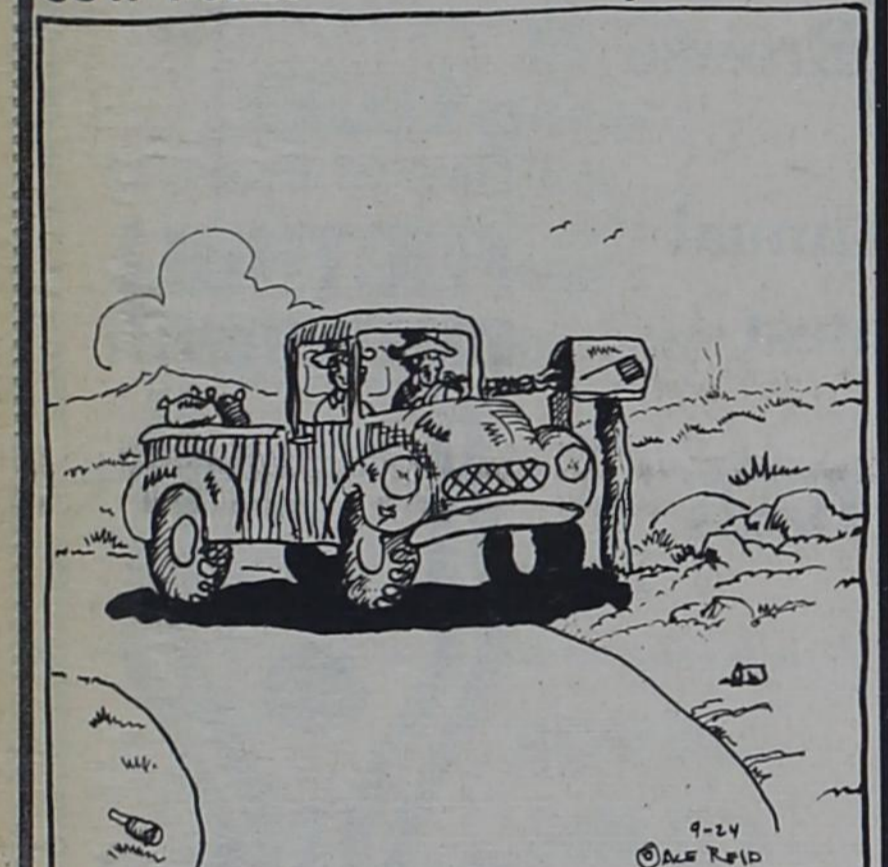
