Japs Used Live POWs For Bayonet Practice

TOKYO —(P)— The use of live Allied prisoners of war as bayonet practice targets, while Allied officers were forced to look on, has been fully established, General MacArthur's headquarters announced Monday.

The new record of atrocity was developed by the secret Allied translation and interrogation section of the Allied headquarters which worked through the war interviewing Japanese prisoners and sorting documents seized in battle zones. The secret unit, the existence of which was undisclosed until last week, included many Japanese-Americans and worked often while shells were still blasting across contested positions.

One of the worst of the bayonet practice atrocities occurred on Guadalcanal where two Europeans and one Eurasian were used as practice targets while Allied officers were forced to stand in line and watch for six and a half hours while the three were horribly mutilated and tortured by the stabbing, jabbing Nipponese, the announcement said. Enlisted prisoners periodically were paraded past the scene so they could see the death agonies of the three.

Records of the ATIS disclosed that one of the bayoneted prisoners had been recently married, another left a wife and two children while the third had a wife and one child. The translated diary of a Japa-

nese officer gave full details of the horrible scene.

Similar instances, in which Chinese prisoners were used as targets, were disclosed by the questioning of Superior Private Tokuhashi Nakino, who told ATIS agents after his capture that during basic training in China his company was provided with live Chinese prisoners on which to practice.

The Japanese officer's diary said that at Guadalcanal, the three prisoners used were thoroughly beaten and then led out with their hands tied behind their backs. They were fastened to a barbed wire fence and the bayonet practice started while the sickened Allied officers were forced to look on.

After hours of torture the three

targets finally died. They were cut down and hauled away by natives in an ordinary dirt cart.

Of the Chinese operations, Nakino said:

"It was so horrible it did not last long. The men could not stomach it. They could not sleep nights because of the nightmares."

Superior Private Saburo Sano told questioners he saw live prisoners used for bayonet practice in China while he was there from March 1941 to October 1943.

"My ferocious commander was captured by the Chinese guerrillas," Sano said. "They cut off his ears, his tongue and his nose. Then they put out his eyes, killing him only by degrees. It put grave fear in other Japanese officers."

Laval Is Shot After Suicide Attempt

PARIS —(P)— Pierre Laval was executed as a traitor to France Monday after failing to cheat the firing squad swallowing poison.

The man who collaborated with the Germans as chief of government in old Marshal Petain's Vichy regime died from a coup de grace, fired through his ear, when a volley from the firing squad did not kill him.

Doctors restored the swarthy traitor from effects of poison taken four hours earlier. He was led to the courtyard of the bleak old Fresnes Prison and died with a cry of "Vive La France" on his lips.

Final Request Refused

He was refused a final request to give the order for his own death to the execution squad.

Laval refused a proffered blindfold and said he would not be blindfolded.

These were his last words: "It is not the soldiers' fault. They know not what they do. Vive La France!"

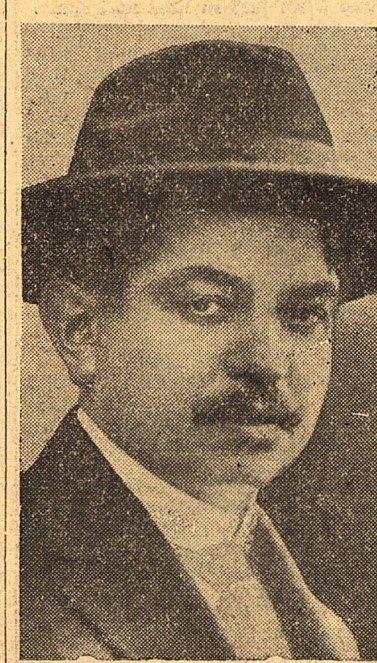
The twelve riflemen fired. Laval fell only to his knees.

Coup De Grace

An officer rushed up immediately aimed his revolver into Laval's ear and fired. The coup de grace dispatched Laval at 12:32 p. m. and he fell dead into the dirt of the courtyard.

The man who before the war had thrice been premier of France and a dozen times a member of her cabinets was condemned by the High Court of Justice last week — the same court which condemned former Marshal Petain and Joseph Darnand, the head of the Vichy militia.

President Confers With WLB On New 'Little Steel' Formula

WASHINGTON —(P)— President Truman may tell the War Labor Board Monday to fashion a postwar wage formula similar to its wartime "little steel" yardstick.

Six members of WLB—which had considered itself a dying war agency until a few days ago—had a White House date to talk over the present rash of management-worker unrest.

Earlier Truman had instructed WLB to liquidate as soon as possible.

The group summoned to the White House was led by Acting Chairman Lloyd K. Garrison, former University of Wisconsin law dean who succeeded Chairman George W. Taylor. The latter left the government Friday due to what he thought was the imminence of WLB's liquidation, to write a dissertation on the "Little Steel" formula.

Schwelbach Favors Plan

Taylor wrote that decision in the "Little Steel" wage case during the war. It later was made to apply to all wartime wages. It limited basic increases to 15 per cent above the rates prevailing Jan. 1, 1941.

Secretary of Labor Schwelbach is among those believed to favor reviving WLB to process quickly a parcel of reconversion disputes in order to match up all such decisions in a post-war wage pattern.

NEW YORK —(P)— All radio networks have arranged to broadcast Gen. Douglas MacArthur's address, in which he will discuss "military phases of occupation," at 5 p. m. (CST) Monday. Previously listed programs have been cancelled for that time.

MAAF Will Become Separation Center Under New Program

The Army Air Forces has instituted a new program for the separation of surplus personnel eligible for release from the service under forthcoming directives.

Midland Army Air Field will be one of the new sub-separation centers. The revolutionary procedure eliminates trips to separation centers as personnel may be discharged directly into civilian status at the separation stations. The eligible personnel stationed at MAAF now will be processed and discharged here and will not have to go through pre-processing lines at the Midland field and then travel several hundred miles to separation centers to repeat the process.

Explosion Adds Six To Okinawa Dead

All from the typhoon which whipped across the West Pacific last week stood Monday at 23 U. S. Navy personnel and seven Japanese prisoners of war on Okinawa, and 184 persons in Western Japan.

Meanwhile, Fleet Headquarters at Pearl Harbor said six enlisted men were killed and 23 injured in an unexplained explosion at a Navy receiving station on Okinawa Friday. A court of inquiry began an investigation.

Nearly 200 members were already registered for the four-day meeting, first general convention since the start of the late war.

TOKYO —(P)— The newspaper Yomiuri Hochi said Monday Japanese government officials secretly began peace negotiations last July 13 but the Japanese army did not learn of the effort until Aug. 9, and then advocated a fight to the finish.

Texas Mill Workers Get CIO Support

HILLSBORO —(P)— Paul Schuler of New Orleans, regional director of the Textile Workers Union of America, said that "union employees of the Hillsboro, Itasca and Mexia cotton mills have been given the support of 35,000 organized CIO workers in North Texas to go on strike."

The CIO support was given employees of the three mills, largest cotton textile mills in Texas, following a seven-hour meeting Sunday of the joint board of the North Texas Textile Workers Union of America (CIO), he said.

Five Held For Trial In Mass Slayings

NEW LAREDO, MEXICO —(P)— Five persons have been ordered held for trial in the mass slayings of Mexican laborers whose bodies have been recovered from the Rio Grande.

Authorities here reported Sunday the number of bodies of victims recovered from the river which marks the boundary between Texas and Mexico has reached 48.

TEXAN AMONG OFFICERS DECORATED BY DUTCH

THE HAGUE —(P)— The Dutch government has decorated 22 officers who were members of Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force and of the United States missions to the Netherlands.

Made members of the order of Orange-Nassau with the degree of officer swords: Capt. Doyle Hicks, Medicine Mound, Texas.

Dutch Indies Leader Offers Rebels Truce

BATAVIA, JAVA —(P)— Dr. Hubertus Van Mook, lieutenant governor of the Dutch East Indies, acted Monday to quell uprisings which imperilled one of the richest colonial empires in the world and offered to negotiate a truce with Indonesian rebel leaders.

Aneta, official Dutch News Agency, quoted Dr. Van Mook as stating that he was willing to meet with leaders of all groups in Indonesia, including Soekarno, self-styled president of the "Indonesian republic."

(In a dispatch from The Hague, Aneta said that A. W. L. Tjarda van Starkenborgh Stachouwer had resigned as governor general because he was "unable to be the bearer of the government policy" in the Indies. He arrived in the Hague early last month after being liberated from a Japanese prison camp.

30,000 Dutch Cut Off

(A Reuters dispatch quoting Batavia reports said 30,000 Dutch women and children had been "surrounded by wildly excited Indonesians in the area of Batavia and were completely cut off from Allied forces." The dispatch added that the natives "are said to be inspired by the Japanese.")

(An authoritative source in London said the British government had agreed to "make ships available" to rush Dutch troops from Europe to Java.)

New outbreaks were reported from the interior of Java, as armed rebel bands closed upon this city. Acting to maintain order, British Maj. Gen. D. C. Hawthorn, Allied commander, invoked a death penalty in Batavia for looting, sabotage, the bearing of arms, or refusal to surrender arms.

Indonesian nationalists ordered a general work stoppage in Batavia. Aneta said Dr. Van Mook took a press conference Holland would keep a 1942 pledge to give the Indies freedom in internal affairs within the Dutch Commonwealth.

Bloody skirmishes were reported from widely separated areas as the insurgent nationalists implemented what they called "a Mohammedan holy war against the Dutch infidels." Indonesian headquarters ordered seizure of all private property—corporate or individual—throughout Java.

(Two distinct factions exist among the Indonesians, the Hilversum radio reported. The broadcast said that Dutch dispatches from Batavia indicate last Saturday's "declaration of war" against Holland was issued by the Indonesian Peoples' Army Headquarters and not by the Soekarno Nationalist movement, which previously was believed to be behind the outbreak.)

Insurgent forces are armed with weapons ranging from guns to poisoned darts and snakes, nationalist sources disclosed.

The treasury secretary testified before the Senate Finance Committee, renewing the recommendations he made originally to the House Ways and Means Committee for a 1946 tax cut of \$5,175,000,000.

"The House bill," he said, "grants so that amount for 1946, and so that amount for 1947."

"But without further Congressional action, the provisions of the House bill would operate to grant reductions of more than \$7,000,000,000 for the calendar year 1947. It would write into law about \$2,000,000,000 of tax reduction over and above the \$5,000,000,000 reduction applicable in 1946."

Against Setting 1947 Tax Needs

The Aftermath Of London

The gloomy fiasco of the Council of Foreign Ministers in London has presented two facts which are clearly visible even at a great distance and through a veil of secrecy: there must be a new attempt to reach agreement on peace terms; and before that attempt can even approach success, the differences that split the London meeting must be resolved.

Whether the next attempt is another foreign ministers' conference, a Truman-Stalin-Attlee meeting, or a full-dress conference of the United Nations depends on the Big Three. But the form is less important than the need for a basic Big Three agreement.

Much has been made of the fact that Secretary Byrnes came to the recent unsuccessful meeting as an unprepared "amateur." But it is doubtful that an American delegation armed with the most meticulously prepared protocol would have fared much better. For Molotov presented a hardheaded program based on a political and diplomatic philosophy that is diametrically opposed to most Anglo-American beliefs.

It is clear that the Soviet Union does not believe in equal sovereignty: the Big Three won the World War and so must dictate the world peace, without allowing the small nations a voice in their own destiny.

The Russian government is responsible to no one but itself. It is not elected, and it does not countenance serious domestic criticism of its policies. This it obviously believes to be a good method, hence its insistence on a wall of secrecy around the fateful Big Three discussions.

The Russian interpretation of "democracy" is quite different from the Anglo-American conception. The first test of the new "democratic" governments of European countries within the Russian orbit has been their acceptability to Russia, not to their own people. Major opposition there has been lumped together as "fascist" and bloodlessly purged. Talk of "free elections" has remained talk.

All this does not necessarily mean that Russia is traveling a cynical road toward world domination. Quite possibly the Russian government, in its own eyes, is acting fairly, justly and democratically. The trouble is simply that Russia's whole course of action is repugnant to the western democracies. And those democracies, whatever their faults, have had a longer, more peaceful and more successful experience in government of, by and for the people.

And so there must inevitably be a showdown. Perhaps the United States needs better preparation before the next peace meeting. But certainly this government will need to exercise its strength and world prestige more vigorously.

We have three strong weapons in dollars, a great productive capacity and an atomic bomb. Russia wants some of the first, needs the help of the second and respects the third. Backed by these weapons, American statesmen should be able to effect the compromise necessary to turn world events from their present dangerous course and toward recovery and peace.

The little procession went to nearby Thiais Cemetery and there Laval's coffin was lowered into the ground, close to the grave of Darnand.

Next to Laval's plot was a grave marked:
"Here lies an unknown collaborator."

Grave diggers immediately began covering Laval's coffin with dirt. About 25 spectators watched silently.

The grave was left unmarked. It was believed, however, that his family will be given the right to move the body or place a tombstone over it.

No medical report was released immediately concerning the exact condition of Laval when he was executed. Two men had supported him on his last walk to face the firing squad.
Doctors worked on Laval with a stomach pump for two hours before the decision was made to proceed with the execution.

Gen. Breene Honored On Leaving AAF Post

RANDOLPH FIELD—Maj. Gen. Robert G. Breene, former commanding general of the AAF Central Flying Training Command, was honored with an aerial and ground review at Randolph Field recently, marking his departure from the Command.

Rains Improve Ranges In West Texas Area

AUSTIN—(P)—Texas will produce more oranges and grapefruit during the 1945-46 season than last year; the commercial vegetable outlook is generally good, but the general harvest outlook for miscellaneous crops is not so good, the United States Department of Agriculture said Monday.

There was a sharp decline in the condition of range and pasture feeds during September, but rains early in October came soon enough for grass to make in West and South Texas, the USDA said.

Conditioning of cattle dropped three points to 82 per cent as of Oct. 1, and sheep and lambs were 82 per cent of normal compared with 84 per cent a month ago.

Indicated production of cotton, corn, sorghum for grain, rice, sweet potatoes and peons on Oct. 1 was below that of Sept. 1, because of September's weather adverse for growing crops. Harvest conditions were ideal, however.

Meeting Of War Crimes Tribunal Is Delayed

BERLIN—(P)—The first formal session of the international war crimes tribunal, which was to have received indictments against 24 top-rank Nazis Monday, has been postponed for three days at the request of Russian representatives.

R. A. Rudenko, chief prosecutor for the Soviet Union, notified the court Sunday it had been impossible to complete translation of the 35,000-word document in time and asked for a delay.

Joe Louis Signs To Defend Title In June

NEW YORK—(P)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis Monday signed a contract to defend his title in June, 1946, under the auspices of Promoter Mike Jacobs.

The champion agreed to meet Billy Conn, now considered the leading contender, or any other suitable opponent designated by Jacobs. The exact date and the site of the bout will be set by Jacobs at least 40 days prior to the fight.

Returned POWs To Get Top Discharge Priority

RANDOLPH FIELD—Returned prisoners of war will be given top priority in shipments of AAF military personnel to Army Air Forces separation centers, according to a recent announcement made at Randolph Field Central Flying Training Command headquarters.

Next on the priority list are personnel with highest adjusted service rating score, while surplus categories, including bombardiers, navigators and bombardier-navigators follow next in line.

Fifth priority was allotted personnel being released because of age, length of active duty, and marital status or dependent children according to current directives. Priority number six went to those eligible under War Department Circular 290, substantiating release because of "undue hardship" suffered through retention on active duty.

Large backlogs of low priority personnel will be alleviated by filing quotas with the largest low priority category when no high priority men are available. Surplus cadets and enlisted reserve personnel eligible for separation will be given discharge priority consideration at a later date.

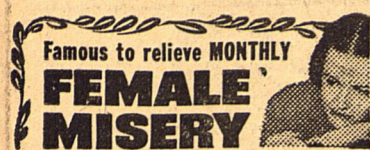

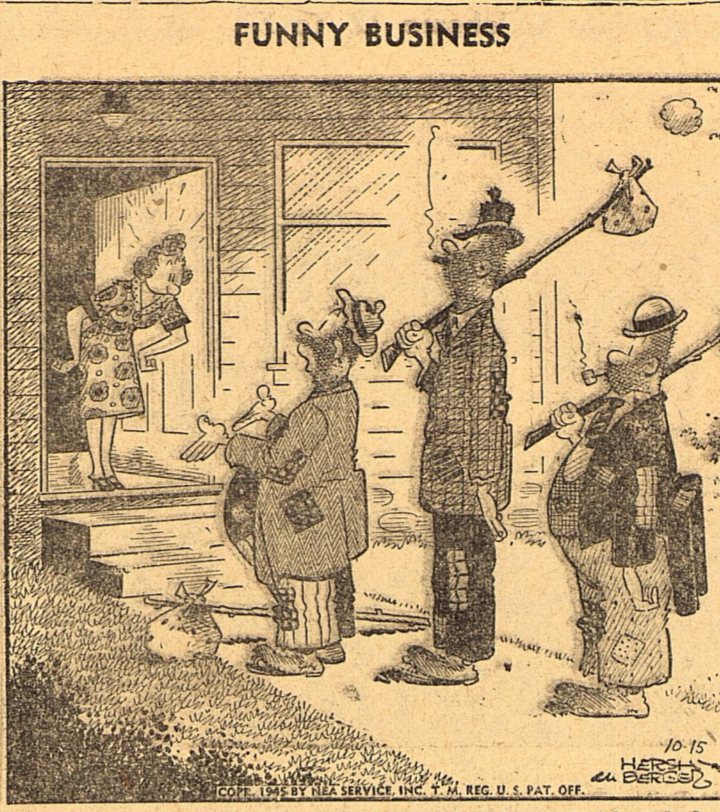

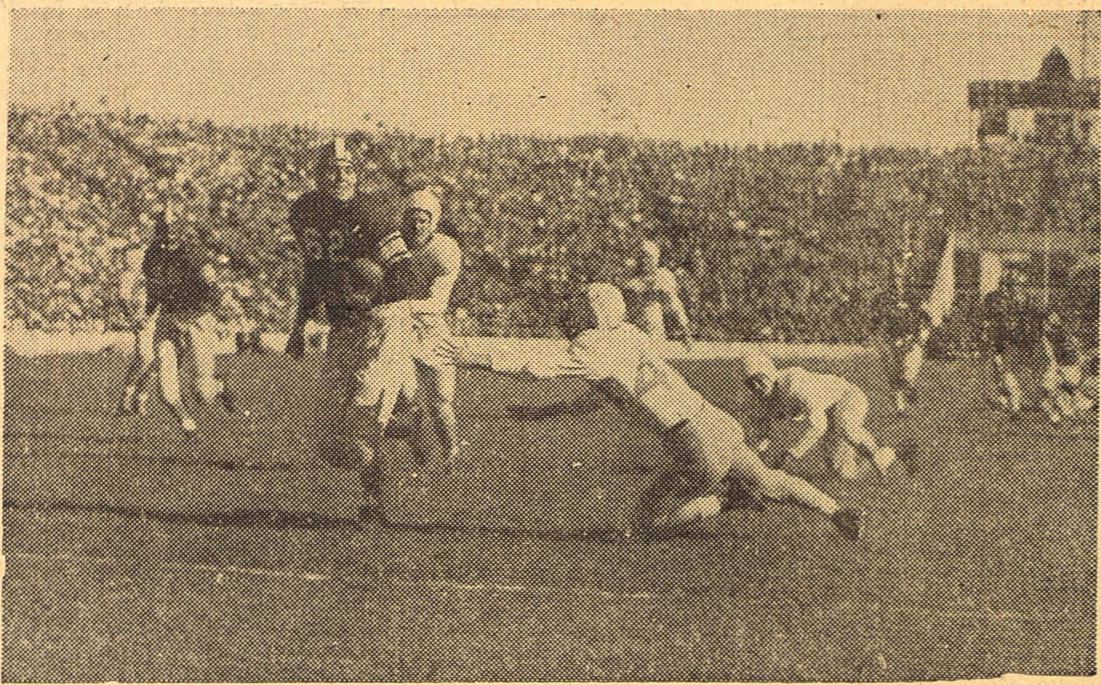

By The Associated Press Breaking even in inter-sectional strife through an expected gift from the Rice Owls, the Southwest Conference swings full speed into its family row this week. Four teams—Rice, Southern Methodist, Texas and Texas A. and M.—play their first conference games.

Texas figures in the headlines. The undefeated, united Longhorns, back in favor as the No. 1 outfit after a lot of jockeying around by the critics, journey into the Ozarks Saturday to meet the crestfallen Arkansas Razorbacks at Little Rock.

Arkansas, riding high after a victory over Texas Christian, ran into all sorts of trouble at Waco Saturday and thus was tumbled from its perch as the youthful Golden Bears blastered on a 2-13 defeat.

A & M to Play TCU Texas A. and M., which fell from the unbeaten ranks last week by taking it on the chin from Louisiana State 31-12, will open the title race on the road, meeting Texas Christian at Fort Worth.

Rice, which shocked most everybody by trimming Tulane 13-7 after having lost three straight games, will call on Southern Methodist's downtrodden Mustangs at Dallas.

Baylor, back in the race with its victory over Arkansas, takes a rest from conference warfare. The Bears travel out to Lubbock to meet Texas Tech's Red Raiders in a night game.

Texas staged a garrison finish to beat Oklahoma 12-7 last week and thus is the only undefeated eleven left in the conference. The Longhorns finally shook off the injury shackles and showed a fine football team to 45,000 fans at Dallas.

Texas Christian didn't play last week but Southern Methodist continued on the dismal trail by taking a licking from Oklahoma A. and M. 26-12. The Mustangs play Rice.

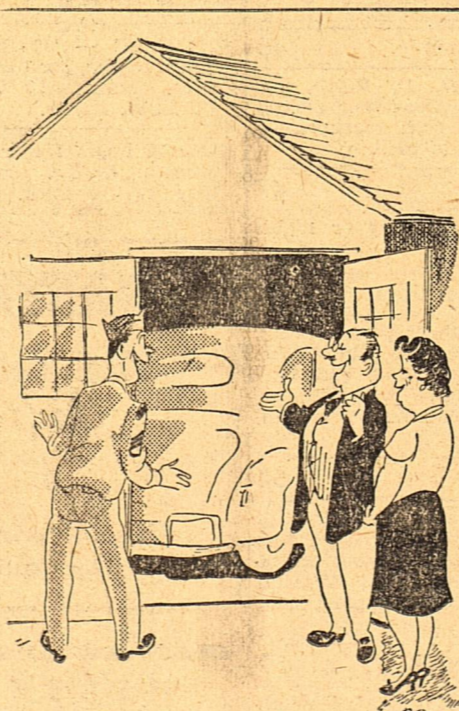

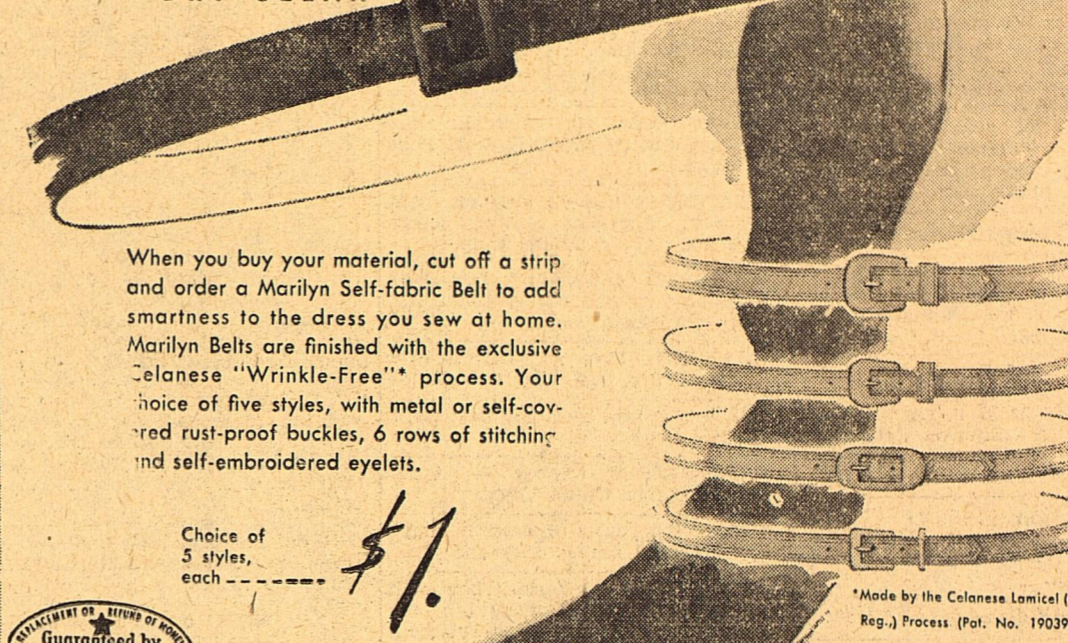

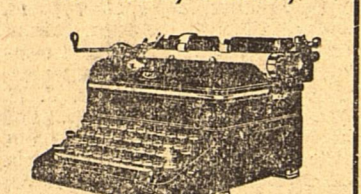

MACKENZIE'S COLUMN

The rebellions in Java and Indochina, aimed respectively at French and Dutch rule, strike me as symptomatic of a trend which is part of our new era—and that is the transformation of the European nations' empires into commonwealths.

In short, empires as such are on their way out. Britain long ago recognized the signs and outdistanced time by inaugurating the British commonwealth of nations, to which she now is planning to add mighty India. Within this commonwealth the dominions have sovereignty, but are linked together by ties of blood and mutual interest. There can be no doubt that other imperial governments must follow suit.

My idea that commonwealths are logical successors to the empires is based on the thought that the little countries—like Java, for instance—which are now dependencies, will still need the economic and military support of the "mother" country.

Java is a rich prize. It is a slim island but extends for 622 miles, and into this tight space are packed 45,000,000 people, of whom some 200,000 are Dutch. This tropical country produces rubber, tin, sugar, oil, quinine, coffee and many other things. It is the business center for all the Dutch East Indies.

Babe Didrickson To Enter Women's Open FORT WORTH —(AP)—A field of 152 players from 12 states moved out Monday in qualifying rounds of the Texas Women's Open Golf Tournament with Mrs. Babe Didrickson Zaharias and Betty Jameson heading the list of nationally-known stars.

It will be a week-long event with match play to begin Tuesday. Qualifying Monday is over 18 holes. The championship flight will be limited to 32 players. All other flights will carry 16.
