

### **Indoctrinating For Peacetime**

It is encouraging to learn that Lt. Gen. Lucian Truscott, in taking over General Patton's job as Third Army commander, has given early and serious attention to the problem of our troops' attitude toward the Germans in the American zone of occupation. He plans a program of instruction designed to counteract the over-friendliness which seems to mark the soldiers' present relations with the former enemy.

These relations, while potentially dangerous, are understandable. The veterans who fought the Germans, suffered as their prisoners, or experienced cruelty at civilian hands before the surrender, are coming home. They had reason to hate the Germans, and to treat them with the severe justice they deserve.

But their replacements are largely men who did not participate in the Battle of Germany. What they see is a peaceful Germany, peopled by pretty girls, cute youngsters, nice old ladies and a lot of other outwardly friendly people. And being young and American and probably homesick, they find it hard to dampen their innate friend-

liness and good nature. Thus they may fall prey to the subtle German propaganda, reported by so many American correspondents, which endeavors to build up sympathy for the Germans and to plant in our young soldiers' minds a distrust and contempt toward their country's wartime allies. Chief peddlers of this propaganda are, naturally enough, the pretty girls who are natural objects of the troops' friendiness-pretty girls steeped from childhood in the doctrines of Nazism.

The humane but hard-headed and hard-boiled attitude which marks General Eisenhower's dealings with the Germans will be required of the men under him if this propaganda is to be thwarted. But it will not be easy to

As the occupation continues, it is likely that the troops will include an increasing number of younger soldiers with no combat or, perhaps, even wartime experience. They will need to be indoctrinated as carefully as the fighting soldier was.

would seem that, while General Truscott's announced program is an excellent idea, the instruction he suggests might better start earlier than the time of the soldier's arrival in Germany. Certainly it is important enough to require a thorough exposition.

Unless the Third Army replacements are schooled in an attitude toward the Germans that is convincing and enforced, the Nazi remnants in Germany have a chance to Sigma Chi Holds achieve the goal of their propaganda efforts: a sympathy toward Germans and Germany which, as after the last war, could persuade public opinion that restrictions on German industrial practices and growth were unjust and unnecessary.

As General Eisenhower has said: "The success or failure of this occupation will be judged by the character of the Germans 50 years from now." oose. He told a reporter: Calls Committee Un-American "A large number of us have op-posed this committee right along, because it has a record which is

un-American. 'We are thoroughly sickened with it now, and it seems appropriate to act when the committee starts to move in on our fundamental free-

Commenting on the move by Patterson and Hook, Rep. Rankin (D-Miss) declared: "These attempts to abolish this important committee will fail, as they have in the past. We are doing an important work and these people just don't like it because it hits some of their friends.

Rankin led the fight in the House last January to set up the group as a successor to the committee formerly headed by Rep. Martin Dies



### GE Invents X-Ray Machine That May Split Atoms Cheaply

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE Associated Press Science Editor NEW YORK —(P)— A hundred million volt X-ray machine, far the most powerful ever made, was announced Saturday by the Gen-eral Electric Company. The previous top has been about 20,000,000

This machine called a betratron, is a new tool for some of the unanswered questions about how to produce useful power, instead of bombs, from uranium and other

The beratron is a big glass vacuum tube, shaped like a flattened doughnut, six feet in diameter. It is set between the two poles of a huge electromagnet. It sits like a griddle on a stove, one pole below it, the other above, and both poles are even wider than the tube. May Help Split Atoms

What the scientists would like to discover is some method by which the atoms of common and plenti ful elements can be made to split profitably. At present no atoms can be split, except those used in the atomic bombs and also thorium, which has the same handicap as uranium and plutonium in being both rare and expensive.

It is hoped, the General Electric announcement says, that the beatron will produce cosmic rays in the laboratory. Cosmic rays are atomic particles traveling at tremendous speeds. Their speed is the only difference from other atomic particles already in laboratory use. But this speed, if it can be produced in a laboratory, may help to unlock the secret of splitting the atoms of cheap elements.

One hundred million volts is just inside the lower brackets of cosmic ray energies. Some of these rays in space reach energies of 10 to 15 billions of volts.







### Texas Soldier Kills Wife In Presence Of Another Girl In Car

LITTLETON, COLO. -(AP)- "I chought it would come to this sooner or later."

Those words, District Attorney Richard H. Simon said Saturday night, were uttered by 23-year-old Catherine Desrosiers a few mom-ents before she was shot to death by her husband Thursday night in the back seat of an automobile. A horrified eyewitness, Marie Woidill, 26, of Atlantic City, N. J., heard the statement, Simon said, and turned around from the driver's seat to see Desrosiers fire a bullet into his wife's head.

Miss Woidill told officers, Simon related, that she met Joseph Desrosiers, 26, a discharged soldier from San Antonio, Texas, in a tavern and he asked her to drive him in her car to a drug store to meet his wife. Desrosiers Produces Gun

When they reached the car, Simon said she continued, Desrosiers produced a gun, forced her to drive to a suburban area, where he raped her, then commanded her to drive him to his appointment with his

Then, with herself at the wheel and the couple in the back seat, Miss Woidill was quoted, Desrosiers pointed the gun at his wife. Simon said the girl gave this ac-

count of the conversation:
"Are you afraid?" Desroisers denanded of his wife. "No," she replied. "I thought it

would come to this sooner or later.' After riding on a little longer, Desrosiers again brandished the gun and asked his wife, "Do you think this is loaded?" There was no reply

"I'll show you," the ex-serviceman muttered.

Miss Woidill said she turned around in the driver's seat just in time to see Desrosiers fire point blank at his wife's temple. The bullet pierced one side of her head and came out the other, said the Held In Jail

Both Desrosiers and Miss Woidill. are being held in the Arapahoe County jail—the latter as a mate-

rial witness.

Miss Woidill told authorities Desrosiers raped her twice—once before they picked up his wife and later in the front seat of the car after the shooting, while his dying wife groaned on the floor in back. acquaintance with her in a downown tavern and persuaded her to drive him to "visit friends." Once in her car, he pulled a gun on her, she said.

Miss Woidill said she finally escaped from Desrosiers after the car became lodged in a ditch near Aurora, a Denver suburb. She reported to police headquarters in Denver and 20 peace officers found Desrosiers crouched beside his wife's body when they reached the

"I would have been dead, too, if my gun hadn't refused to work.' he told officers. He added that his mother in law's interference with his marriage was the reason for the tragedy.

Winter cover crops are being planted by several farmers who have conservation agreements with the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District, Herd Midkiff, district

supervisor announced Saturday. These crops help protect the land from blowing and can be used as soil building crops by plowing under in the spring. In favorable years the crops can be grazed in the winter if livestock are taken off in time for the crops to make a good growth to be turned back

Terry Elkin planted barley and oats on one 58-acre field of grain sorghum by broadcasting and cov-

S. O. Golladay is planting a mixture of barley, rye, oats, wheat, and vetch with a drill on about 125 acres for grazing and winter cover Golladay tried a small plot of vetch last year and believes it will grow well in a mixture of small grains. Plants Sweet Clover

Frank Elkin has planted Hubam sweet clover in his oats this fall. Elkin tried cover crops of crimson clover and oats on his vineyard and orchard last year and reports improvement in his fruit crop as a result. ### 3rd Fought On Every Front In Europe

On VE-Day the Third Infantry Divisiion was at Salzburg, and was using as a mess hall the dining room of the Schloss Klessheim, where Hitler once housed his more



important guests But the doughboys of the Third had walked a long and blocdy trail to reach Salzburg. This division. which earned the nickname "Rock

of the Marne" because of its impregnable stand in World War I, is the only American division which fought the Nazis on every front in Europe—North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany. It had more casualties—nearly 35,-000—than any other division, and it holds the record for high combat citations, no fewer than 29 of its officers and men having won the Medal of Honor

The Third's first D-Day came in 1942, when it spearheaded the landing near Casablanca. The division's capture of Palermo, after a D-Day landing in Sicily, was sensational. When the Anzio campaign was launched, the Third again drew the "short straw." Its men slashed ashore in the first wave, and it was here that the Third stablished the record for the most casualties suffered in any one day. In its first 24 hours on French soil the division took more than 1,000 prisoners. It raced to Avignon and the Rhone Seventh Army, the Third drove

It may be that these new opportunities for gadgets will spur the inventive minds that turned to other things during the war. Certainly the U.S. Patent Office had not been worked to death up to V-J Day.

In fact, the number of patents issued weekly during the war averaged less than 500, in contrast to peaks of up to 900 a week in pre-



The Indian Heads resumed their march, spilling into Germany, and VE-Day found them in Czchoslovakia.

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
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
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

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### Describes Pre-D Day Activities

TEMPLE -(A)- When the Marines stormed the beaches of Guam Aug. 21, 1944, the welcome mat was

Actually, there were signs along the beaches: "Welcome, Marines, to Guam." Each was signed UDT.

Those were the Navy's underwater demolition teams, the men who went into battle days and sometimes a week before D-Day, who cleared obstacles the Japanese had built to rip holes in American landing boats, who fought clad in nothing but swimming trunks, a mask on their faces, a knife in their belts and charges

of TNT tied to their backs. Speed and organization were the things that mattered, says Lt. Harry Q. Cole, 26, of Temple, Texas, one of the officers in charge of

UDT No. 6 at Guam. "We didn't consider nerve; that's

automatic," Cole said.

Twelve men placed 25-pound charges around 100 obstacles at Guam the night before D-Day, working along the reef 500 yards off the beach while Japanese mortar fire kicked up the water and fragments from fire support from our own bombardment fleet feil round them.

"Pretty Rugged" "Yeah, it was pretty rugged," was all Cole would admit.

The UDT men, carried aboard a converted destroyer, brought with hem maps and charts of the landng beaches. They had spent an entire month at the Naval Demolition Base at Moai, territory of Hawaii, staging mock invasions on beaches duplicating as nearly as

possible their assignment. Once the fleet was anchored off Guam, on August 14, a week before D-Day, the destroyer with the UDT ment aboard moved inside the guarding ships and in full sight of the enemy disgorged them into the

"We worked by daylight because was easier to see what we were doing," Cole explained. "Fire we just had to ignore. And as for sharks, they're over-rated. Ten or twelve used to follow me into the beach, but they never did bother

"The closest call I ever got." Cole went on, "was at Guam about D-Day minus three. Three gun emplacements ashore were spattering fire around us. I swam back to the rubber boat to the walkie talkie and called our destrover for fire support. Sixty of our planes swarmed overhead, but they dropped larger bombs than we expected and frag was mightly close. All we could do was stay under water while it was on."

Within 200 Yards of Japs
Bombardment usually kept Japanese from rebuilding the obstacles the UDT men had stroyed. At Guam, however, men who had cleared "Red Beach" one day and "Blue Beach" the next, went back to "Red Beach" to find all obstacles had been rebuilt. "The Japs and we had been working all day within 200 yards
