Clayton Talks Water At Annual Banquet

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake, known as "Mr. Water" to residents of the High Plains, spoke to the crowd attending the 12th annual Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet

Thursday night on his favorite topic -- water. Clayton, who is executive director of Water, Inc., spoke

on water resource development and uses and changes of water from the beginning of the great age of change in the world in 1945 to the present. "It's a changing world we live in and it is a fast and remarkable world," said Clay-

ton. "We need to find out more about our natural resources, particularly water, to avoid further social unrest. "Those who seek no water resource development simply do not realize the significance

of water in our lives. In water resource development, it takes a long time to achieve goals.

"Since North America is the bread basket of the world, we need to look at some of the changing factors in food production. This has become a subject in sharp focus because one half of the world's population is hungry tonight."

Some of the present statistics pointed out by Clayton included the facts that the United States consumes one-third of total world resources, that one-half of the world's petroelum supplies have been used since 1956 with the U.S. still importing more than ever before and that today it takes over 4,000 head of beef per day to serve a scant five ounces of meat to metropolitan New

"The theory that we might be able to harvest enough food from our oceans to feed our growing population is a hoax," Clayton stated.

"Water use increases with the growth of population. Water use has now become national and regional in scope where it used to be only local. We will exist or become extinct by our very actions with water."

Clayton pointed out the great change in this area came about by water development and one of the greatest changes in the past decade has been the growth of cattle feedlots,

He spoke of the need to involve the thinking and talents of our young people in water resource development, "We must have the imagination and energy of our future leaders. We must involve them in our greatest problem of conserv-

ing water resources." Clayton was introduced by master of ceremonies Neal Mager, past president of the organization.

At the conclusion of his speech, Clayton was presented a painting of a windmill by the chamber. The painting was done by Billy Whitecotton of Bovina.

5. Promotion is supported only by testimonials, with no research-backed data.

6. Overselling techniques are used to compensate for the lack of performance informa-

Few people who buy quack products ever complain because they want to avoid ridicule from their friends and neighbors for having been taken by such a scheme. Unfortunately, promoters prey upon the consumer's attribute of hope and faith that miracles do happen.

Consumer protection and regulatory agencies are doing much to curb quack products, but they can perform only within the framework of their resources and supportive legislation. Each consumer must do his share by refusing to buy unproved products and by actively supporting regulatory activities that offer consumer

When purchasing products to care for your lawn and garden plants, ask your nurseryman or garden store operator for official recommendations that are based on research and are kept current each year.

In arguing with an intelligent individual, remember that he's right as often as as you are, and that you're wrong as often as he is.



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
