### TEN YEARS AGO

March 28, 1962  
James McLeroy has resigned as principal of Bovina High School effective at the end of school year in May.

He has accepted a position as superintendent of Union Independent School District which is eight miles south of Brownfield. In a special session Friday night, members of Bovina Schools board of trustees agreed to ask to purchase five government surplus two-bedroom houses.

The houses are located at Exell Helium Plant, 30 miles north of Amarillo.

Announcement of fire siren signals for Bovina was made this week by Fire Chief Bill Denney. One blast from the siren means its time for a fire meeting. Two blasts signal a fire in city limits. Three blasts a fire outside city limits. Continuous short blasts signal that severe weather prevails in the area.

Reason for the "holiday" is that district interscholastic league literary events will be conducted here that day. Students from Bovina, Happy, Hart, Lazbuddie and Nazareth will participate in the contests.

### SIX YEARS AGO

March 23, 1966

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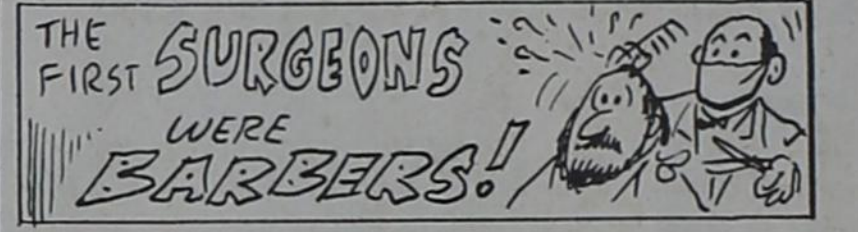
### Grab Him!

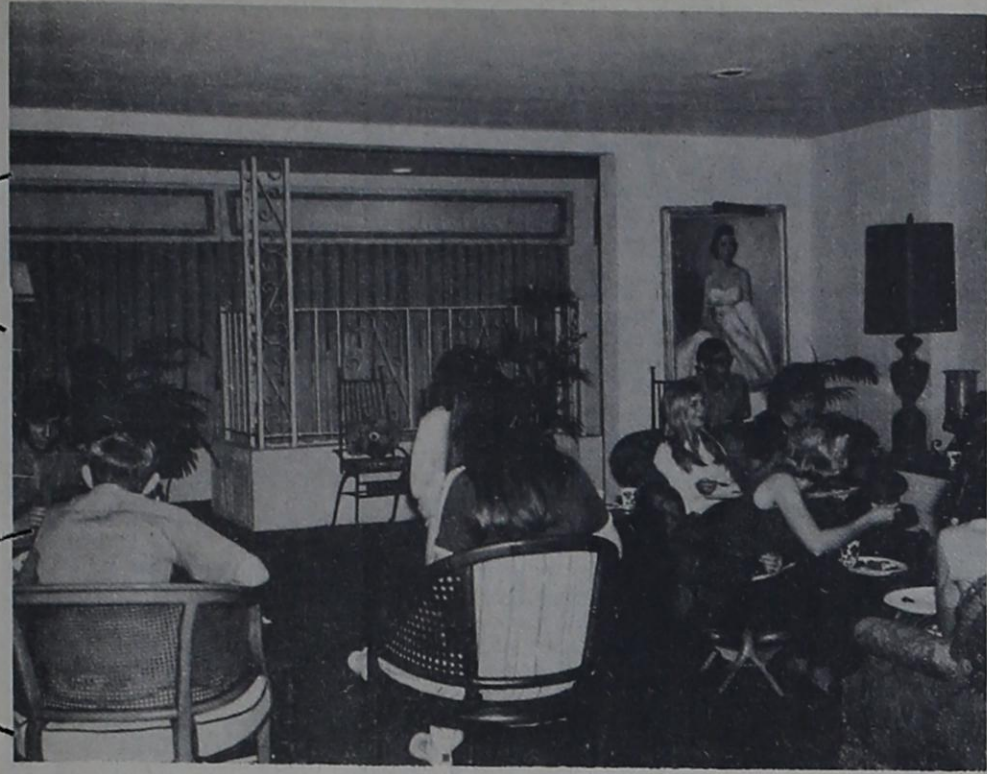

"Mildred, my left-handed widgeit flange was on the workbench last weekend. What did you do with it?"

It always seems the most important tool a home hobbyist has is the one he can't find when he needs it. And no one is more aware of the frustration of misplaced materials than the hobbyist's wife who usually gets blamed for secreting a way paraphernalia she can't even pronounce.

Lack of organization can make a man's hobby a nerve-grating venture for everyone in the family, and can add unnecessary headaches to the already considerable job of home management.

Help is available, however, in the form of a labeling system that makes it easy to organize hobby work rooms and to identify tools and their storage areas. # 13 Accidents In February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of February, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1972 shows a total of 27 accidents resulting in no persons killed, and 14 persons injured. The rural traffic accident

summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1972 shows a total of 478 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 233 persons injured as compared to February, 1971 with 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured.

The 15 traffic deaths for the month of February, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Wise, three; Hale and Lubbock, two each; Garza, Lamb, Lynn, Carson, Donley, Moore, Swisher, and Wheeler, one each.

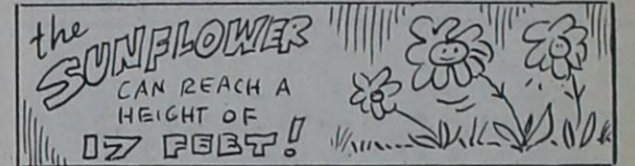
Speakers will include a physician and two respiratory disease therapists. A question and answer session will follow the presentation.

among high-risk groups, including low income population, food stamp recipients and hard core poverty neighborhoods where TB flourishes.

Hereford will be included in the survey, says Mrs. Cervantez, and is considered of particular importance because of the migratory nature of TB. According to association officials, the survey can affect the TB picture ranging from the Rio Grande Valley to Kansas and on north.

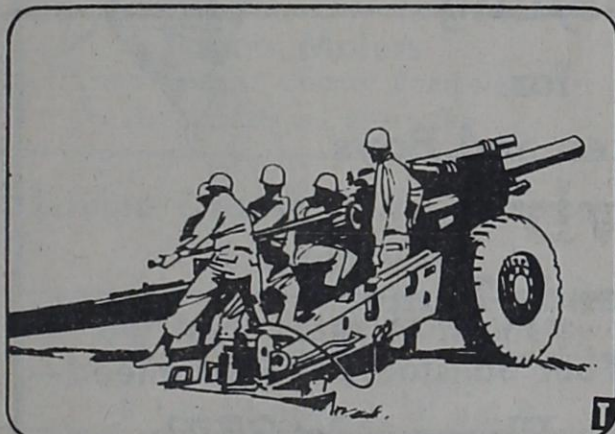
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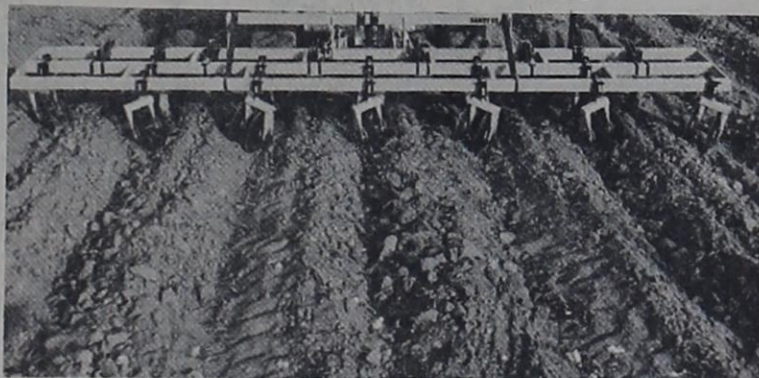
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### Celebrate Anniversary

In announcing the appointment, Dr. John E. Hutchison, Extension Service director, said that Riethmayer will fill the vacancy created when Ed Garnett was appointed area 4-H and youth specialist. The new specialist will continue the educational programs presently underway in farm and ranch management, including the Panhandle Economic Program. He will also give leadership to expanded educational efforts to boost the economy of the 22-county Panhandle area, added Hutchison.

Although Riethmayer was born in Lamesa, he grew up on a farm near Friona. He is a graduate of the local high school where he was active in the Future Farmers of America, receiving both the Lone Star Farmer and American Farmer degrees. He also participated in 4-H Club work.

diseases and other maladies. Although difficult, it's important that consumers be able to weed out products that do not meet all the advertised claims.

Beware of the following advertising approaches:  
1. Manufacturer or promoter claims that the product will cure all difficulties associated with plants.  
2. Claims are made that are not shown and supported in the product's label.  
3. The product is so new and revolutionary that research agencies have not tested it.  
4. Active ingredients of the product are not shown. If this is the case, it probably has none.  
5. Promotion is supported only by testimonials, with no research-backed data.  
6. Overselling techniques are used to compensate for the lack of performance information.

Few people who buy quack products ever complain because they want to avoid ridicule from their friends and neighbors for having been taken by such a scheme. Unfortunately, promoters prey upon the consumer's attribute of hope and faith that miracles do happen.

Consumer protection and regulatory agencies are doing much to curb quack products, but they can perform only within the framework of their resources and supportive legislation. Each consumer must do his share by refusing to buy unproved products and by actively supporting regulatory activities that offer consumer protection.

When purchasing products to care for your lawn and garden plants, ask your nurseryman or garden store operator for official recommendations that are based on research and are kept current each year.

In arguing with an intelligent individual, remember that he's right as often as you are, and that you're wrong as often as he is.

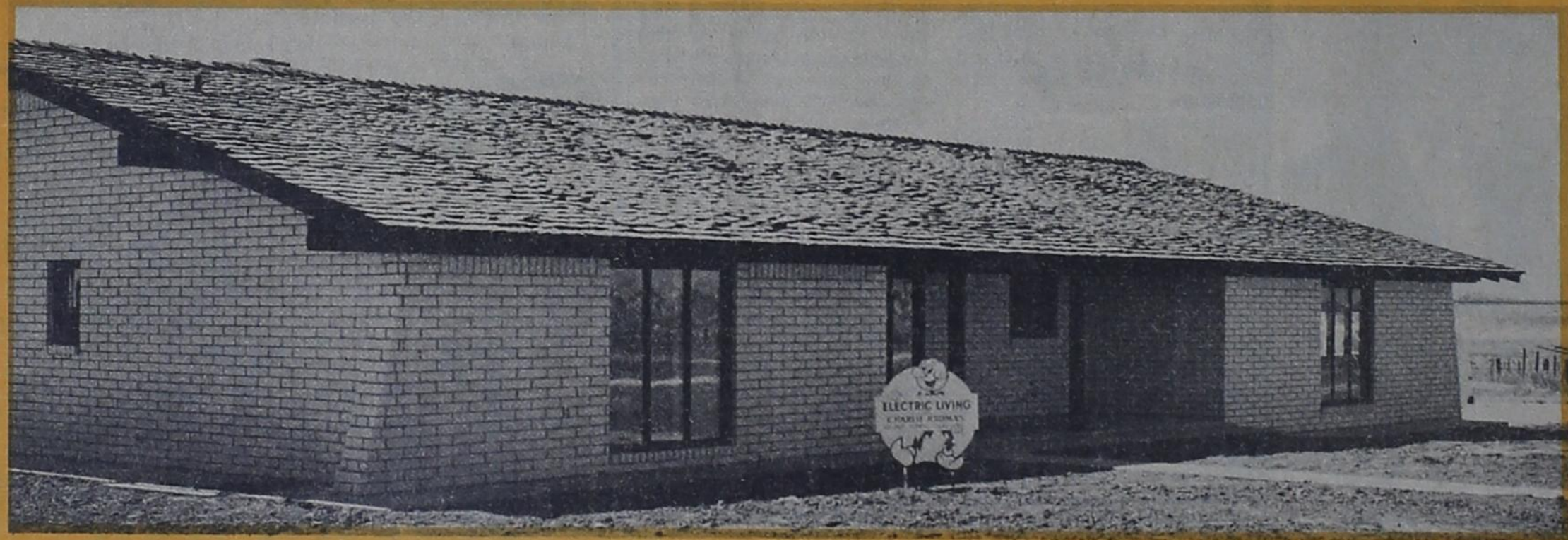

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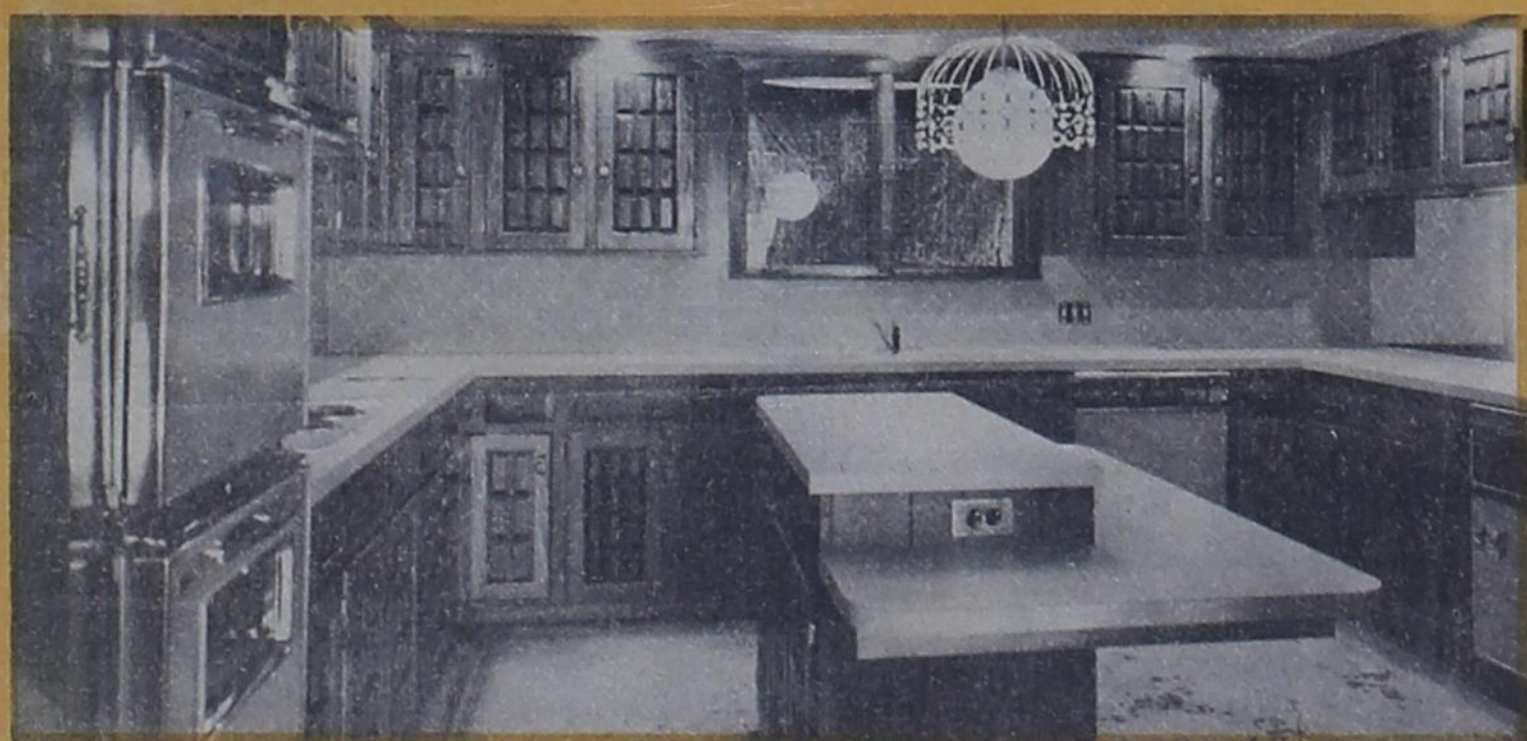


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
