THE LATEST shortage which is being talked about in the papers may be the most serious to date—especially to those of us in the newspaper publishing business. (Have you ever noticed how things are more serious when they affect you directly?)

Yep, it seems that newsprint is currently the item on the "short" list, and while it has not affected the Bovina Blade as yet, we're not too overjoyed at the prospects of a shortage in this category.

A newspaper in Florida announced last week that it would be forced to reduce its size by 35 per cent, which would necessitate a reduction of 25 per cent in retail advertising.

The Arizona Republic announced that it would discontinue their early edition, and would also cut back the number of papers available on newsstands. Several Arizona newspapers said the situation is worse than during World War II.

We even noticed on the front page of the latest issue of "Grit" that the publication had been forced to reduce its size.

AT LEAST—we have already published our Bull Town Days edition this year, so we'll be back to "regular size" papers for a while.

Did you see the 150-page edition published by the Hereford Brand last week? Wow, what an issue. Made us tired just to think about it. The edition was published in conjunction with Hereford's Diamond Jubilee, which is underway this week.

Come to think of it, those folks may be the ones that caused the newsprint shortage. Think we'll report them to the Texas Press Assn.

WE DON'T LIKE to hear the word shortage, because whether or not you actually feel the pinch, from a scarcity standpoint, you can usually count on a price increase.

We tend to agree with Billy Whitecotton, who remarked to us that he thought certain items were being held off the market by manufacturers in order to force up the price.

That's a bad deal, but unfortunately, that's the way a lot of people play the game these days.

LATE NOTE—at the time we wrote the above, we didn't plan to be running only six pages this week, less than our average. While it looks like the newsprint shortage hit home after all, it's actually just a slack time for news and advertising—and will be picking back up [we hope] now that school has started.

Hickman. Some 599 students enrolled in Bovina Schools Monday with enrollment expected to increase in the next two weeks.

## 599 Report Opening Day

The 1973-74 school year got underway here Monday. Opening day enrollment figures in Bovina Schools was 599, according to L.F. Jacobs, superintendent. He estimates the total will increase during the next two weeks.

Last year's opening day enrollment was 594. In '71, the total was 632 on the first day of school.

This year's 599 total, broken down, shows 27 students in kindergarten, 251 in grades one through five, 150 in grades six, seven and eight, and 171 in high school, grades nine through 12.

The elementary total, broken down, shows 55 in the first grade, 44 in the second grade, 38 in the third grade, 68 in the fourth grade and 46 in the fifth grade.

Registration for high school and junior high students was conducted Friday. Also registering Friday were kindergarten and first grade students who had not pre-registered last spring.

While this is the first week of school for students, it is the second week for members of the faculty. They were in school Monday through Friday of last week for meetings and to make preparation for the new school year. The earlier reporting time for teachers is in keeping with the 1970 state ruling.

Superintendent Jacobs reported that Raymond Delgado had been hired as a custodian at the main school building. Jacobs said he is still seeking a second special education teacher at this time.

School officials released this week the eligibility standards for free lunches.

The following table indicates the family income limits for children in Bovina Schools in regard to the free school lunches. School officials have adopted this family size-income scale to assist in determining eligibility.

Families whose incomes are within the scale of those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships may apply for free lunches for their children.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office. Applications may be submitted anytime during the year. A copy of the policy is on file at the school and may be reviewed by any interested person.

# Mustangs Wind Up Pre-Season Sessions

Bovina's Mustangs, in preparing for the 1973 football season, get their second taste of outside competition at 11 a.m. Saturday when they host the Clovis Wildcat Junior Varsity at Mustang Field.

The ponies took on Class B Lazbuddie Longhorns there Friday night in the season's first scrimmage tilt.

"It was typical of a first scrimmage," says Head Coach Roger Ezell. "We couldn't tell much about our boys in that

first workout, but we expect to be tested more fully Saturday. Although keeping score isn't the object in scrimmage tilts, the Mustangs scored three times while holding Lazbuddie scoreless.

The Shelby brothers teamed up for all three scores with Elbert Shelby, a sophomore, scoring from 50 yards out and Bill, senior quarterback and halfback, scoring from 10 and 45 yards out.

"Our main problem right now

is experience," commented Ezell. "However, we have several quality people back from last year. The success of our team this year depends on how our younger players come around and fit in with our more experienced people."

By Monday morning, 41 candidates had reported for workouts. Of that 31, nine are returning lettermen. Ezell noted that he had only four offensive and four defensive starters returning from last

year's District 3-A co-champions.

The Mustangs lost 10 men from the roster last year to graduation, seven of those starters on offense or defense, a loss Ezell feels hard pressed to replace.

Of the nine returning lettermen, seven are seniors, one a junior and one a sophomore. Seniors this year are Danny McKay, Billy Shelby, Tony Serna, Joe Delgado, Chuck Gilbreath, Terry Sherrill and Roy Hartzog. Bryan Fillpot is a junior and Elbert Shelby a sophomore.

Although Springlake-Earth has been picked by some area football magazines to walk off with the title in District 3-A, Ezell says he expects Vega to have one of the tougher teams in the district. "They have counted us out, but I believe

## IN RATE

# Pioneer Requests Increase

Bovina was one of the cities approached Wednesday when Pioneer Natural Gas Company made application to all incorporated towns and cities served by its West Texas Transmission System to change the cost-of-gas adjustment provision of the general service rate, according to an announcement by K. Bert [Tex] Watson, company president.

For the last three years, the general service rate has been adjusted annually in April to reflect increases in the average cost of gas for the prior year. Pioneer's request would allow making this adjustment each month for the current monthly average cost of gas. According to the company, this change would more closely meet the objective of the original adjustment provision.

"Annual cost-of-gas adjustments," Watson explained, "will shortly penalize the company for aggressive competition for new gas supplies because of the lag between increases in the average cost of gas in the field and the time these increases may be passed on to the customers."

Watson made note of the increasing demand for natural gas and the critical gas supply

shortage which has developed within the last few years. "There is increasing demand in the company's gas supply area for new gas that is being developed at much greater costs than existing supplies. Pioneer must be able to buy this new and more expensive gas and participate in more costly drilling and exploration activities in order to assure an adequate gas supply for its system customers. Fortunately, Pioneer has pipelines into two areas of good potential gas supply, and since the acquisition of new gas will be necessary to continue serving existing customers, this advantage should not be lost to Pioneer's service area by failure to meet going prices," Watson said.

If approved, the effective date of the new rate adjustments would be October 1, 1973, and the first adjustment would be applied to all bills rendered on or after that date. Since the end of 1972, the company's cost of gas has increased by 2 1/2 cents per thousand cubic feet [MCF] and the first adjustment would therefore be about 3 percent of the average domestic price.

"In 1970, when we reached the original agreement on a

cost-of-gas adjustment with the cities, it appeared that an annual adjustment would be

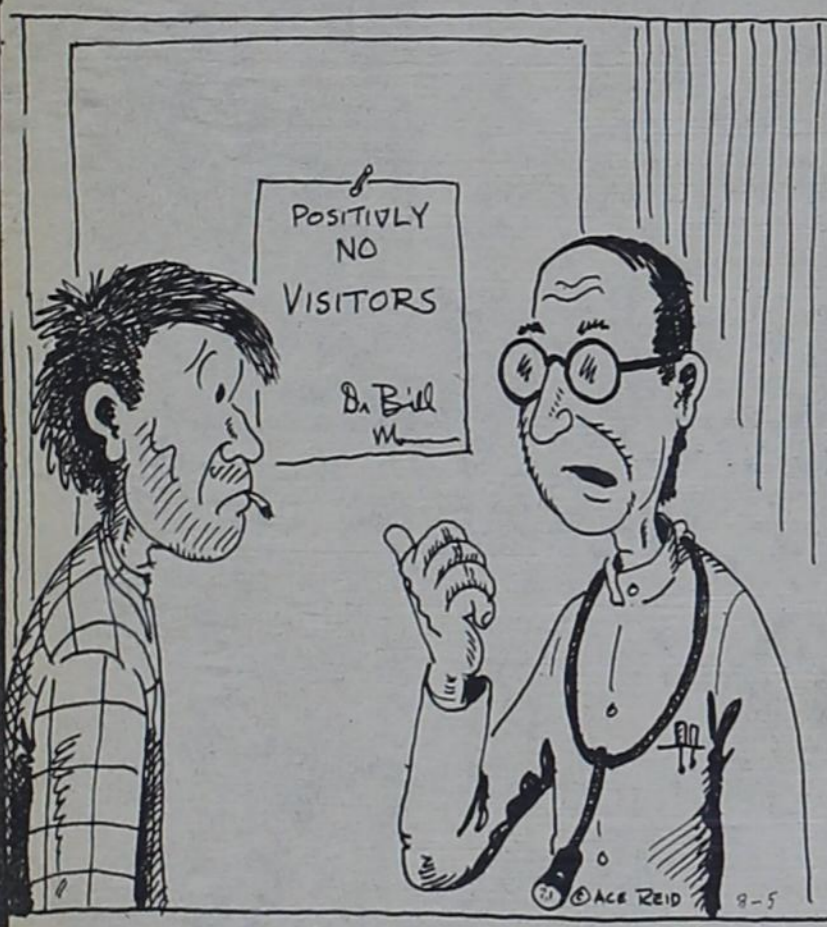
# Reflections From The Blade

**FOR WHEAT FARMERS**

**Grain Situation 'New Ballgame'**

Wheat producers are weighing some unaccustomed alternatives as they make decisions about what level of wheat acreage to plant in 1974.

The present grain situation appears to be a "new ballgame" for wheat growers, who are being asked for production expansion by the consumer at home and abroad, and by provisions of the new Farm Bill with producer income production in case of over-production and cost increases, says Dr. Roland D. Smith, grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Many farmers, he said, are viewing the situation with "cautious restraint" in an effort to prevent over-production and price declines.

"Wheat producers are skeptical that prices will remain at profitable levels through the harvest of 1974. These growers vividly remember the mid-1960's when they were asked for maximum production which ultimately led to several years of depressed prices.

"Some major reasons for apparent changes in the world wheat situation include the opening of markets in the USSR and China, the changing international money values favoring U.S. products, and the rapid economic growth allowing more of the world's people to upgrade their diets. These factors are causing strong consumer demand for wheat and other products abroad," Smith said.

A key variable in regard to foreign demand is world-wide weather conditions, which could improve to the extent that foreign trade of wheat might decline significantly, Smith added.

The new farm program, with the target price of \$2.05 per bushel for wheat, should help remove some of the risk of price declines similar to those occurring in earlier decades, he emphasized.

Texas producers are currently planning for next year's crop. Some are considering shifting "set-aside" acreage back into production which may be relatively expensive. A thorough analysis of the alternatives is recommended by Smith before growers make their final crop plans.

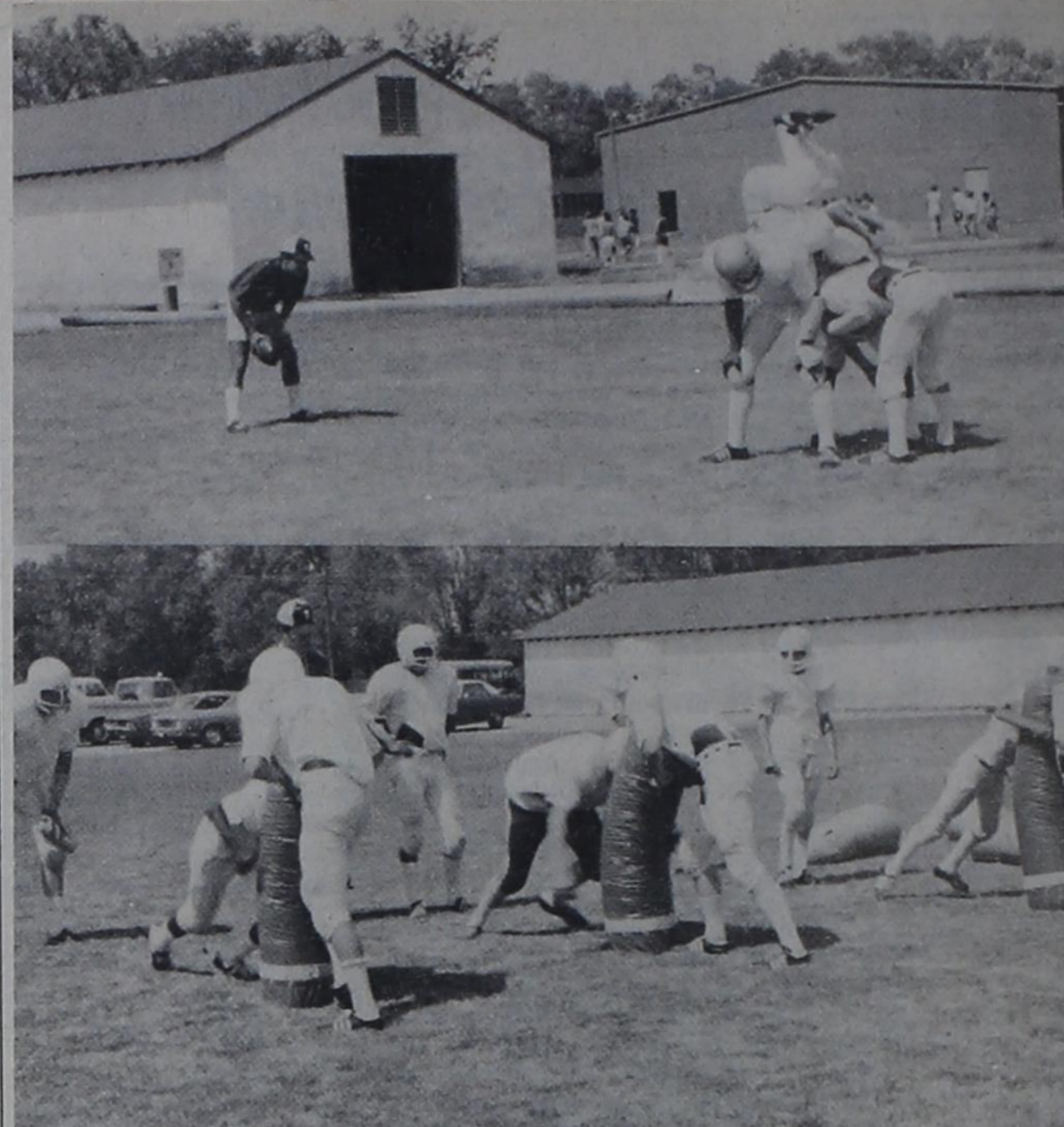

The winning band will then be announced during intermission and the selected group will entertain the crowd until 1 a.m. Saturday.

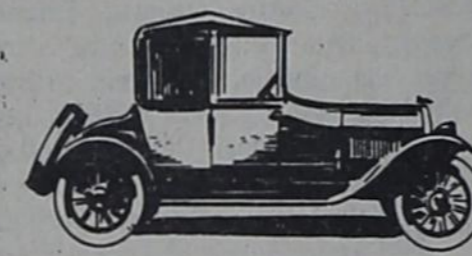

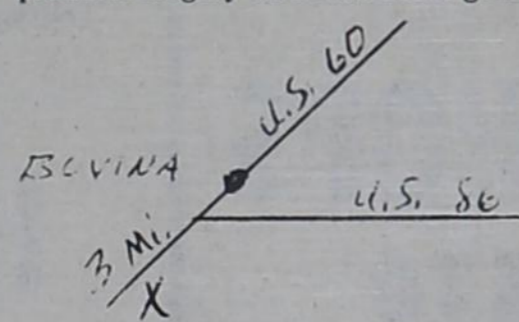
