Yep, it seems that newsprint is currently the item on the "short" list, and while it has not affected the Bovina Blade as yet, we're not too overjoyed at the prospects of a shortage in this category.

A newspaper in Florida announced last week that it would be forced to reduce its size by 35 per cent, which would necessitate a reduction of 25 per cent in retail advertising.

The Arizona Republic announced that it would discontinue their early edition, and would also cut back the number of papers available on newstands. Several Arizona newspa-

Sales of blind-made products held by the Lions Club in the past have proved successful and McDaniel expressed confidence in another successful sale this year.





Astronaut To Gas Increase --




Astronaut Edgar D. Mitchell will be returning to his native soil on August 29 when he visits the Hereford Texas Diamond Jubilee Celebration.
