UAW Outlaws Wildcat Strikes At Ford Plants

DETROIT—(A)—A union plan for curbing "wildcat" strikes and slowdowns paved the way Tuesday for wage talks with the Ford Motor Company, only member of the automotive "big three" still under union contract.

The Ford Company's favorable reaction to the proposal also raised the possibility some similar method might be used in solving other car industry labor dead-Countering a management demand for "company se-

An unauthorized interruption of work was described as one resulting from a dispute which could be settled by the impartial umpire or, if not in this category, an issue not approved by the international union. Local Union Investigation Any employe ordered discharged

by the umpire could demand an investigation by the local union, and on proving his innocence could have a grievance processed. If a settlement then could not be reached the dispute would go back to the umpire for decision.

The fines-\$3 a day for the first offense and \$5 for the second—would be deducted from the worker's pay and donated to the President's infantile paralysis fund.

Capital Stock Of First National **Bank Is Doubled**

The comptroller of the currency in Washington Tuesday authorized an increase in the capital stock of the First National Bank of Midland to \$200,000, making it the largest capital structure bank on the Texas & Pacific Railroad between Fort Worth and El Paso. The capital stock of the bank

has been \$100,000 since 1896 and the authorization Tuesday doubled the amount. The authorization was received by M. C. Ulmer, First National president and board chair-Resources Total \$16,750,000

The bank now has a capital stock of \$200,000 surplus of \$300,000 and undivided profits of \$177,000 for a total capital structure of \$677,000. Resources of the First National Stockholders of the First National

Bank, which has served Midland for more than 55 years, voted at a special meeting Dec. 4 to increase its capital stock by \$100,000, subject to the approval of the comptroller of the currency. The increase was by capital stock dividend.

At that point, Marshall went to the Army Pearl Harbor investigating board and in a secret session explained "magic." It did not become part of the record, however Marshall said around that time

Electrical Appliances For Christmas?

Chances are a hundred to one that no more electrical appliances will be shipped to Midland before January 1. Refrigerators, ranges, washers and other appliances were scheduled to be shipped as they came off the assembly lines. Then the government announced a substantial reduction in the excessive profit tax for the year 1946.

Many of the large manufacturing concerns already had a large excess profit structure. Anything shipped before the first of the year simply would increase this. By waiting until January 1 to ship the new merchandise, they would save approximately 18 per cent on the excess profits tax due to the lower rates for 1946.

Customers have been clamoring for toasters, mixers, waffle irons, washers, ranges, refrigerators, vacuum cleaners and scores of other items, which retailers claim are ready for shipment and could have been in the hands of merchants before Christmas. These merchants have been struggling along for three or four years without State Middleweight enough of this merchandise to sell to pay overhead expenses. XXVI BURMA FALLS

THE reentry into Burma was the most ambitious campaign yet waged on the end of an airborne supply line. From the first advance by the Chinese into the Hukawng Valley in October until after the fall of Myitkyina town the next August there were at all times between 25,000 and 100,000 troops involved in fighting and dependent largely or entirely on food, equipment, and ammunition that could be air-supplied, either by parachute, free drop, or air landed.

The air supply was maintained by troop carrier squadrons, British most difficult of the war. He was and American, commanded by Brig. Gen. William D. Old, under the direction of General Stratemeyer's Eastern Air Command. Night and day troop carrier C-46's and 47's shuttled from numerous bases and air strips in the Brahmaputra Valley to points of rendezvous with the Allied ground columns in the Burma jungles. Each trip had to be flown over one or more of the steep spines which the Himalayas shove southward along the India-Burma frontier to establish one of the most formidable barriers to military operations in the world. ing time is 120 hours. At two critical stages of the campaign the troop carrier squadrons assisted by Air Transport Command planes made major troop movements in a matter of required weeks and months by surface transport.

The first was the movement of British and Indian troops to meet the threat of the Bengal-Asaam Railroad at Dimapur. The second was the movement of two Chinese divisions, the 14th and 50th, from Yunnan, China, across the Hump to the troop carrier base at Sook erating, in Assam, India. This operation was accomplished in just eight days. The mission that the Joint Chiefs of Staff had given General Stilwell in Asia was one of the out at the end of the thinnest supply line of all; the demands of the war in Europe and the Pacific campaign, which were clearly the most vital to final victory, exceeded our resources in many items of materiel and equipment and all but absorbed everything else we had. General Stilwell could have only what was left and that was extremely thin. Nevertheless General Stilwell sought with amazing vigor to carry out his mission exactly as it had been stated. His great efforts brought a natural conflict of personalities. As a consequence it was deemed necessary in the fall of 1944 to relieve General Stilwell of the burden of his heavy responsibilities in Asia and give him a respite from attempt-

New Assignment for Stilwell

No American officer had demonstrated more clearly his knowledge of the strength and weakness of the Japanese forces than General Stilwell and the steps necessary to defeat them in Asia. He was brought back to the United States to reorient the training of the Army Ground Forces for the war against Japan. Then after the death of General Buckner on Okinawa he was returned to the field to command the U.S. Tenth Army

The Burma campaign continued with intensity during the monsoon season of 1944. Chinese, American, and British troops were then disposed along the Chindwin River north of Kalewa and from the upper Irrawaddy to Lungling. 11 was planned to drive southward through Central Burma to Mandalay, and Admiral Mountbatter. prepared for operation DRACULA. to seize Rangoon amphibiousi; from the south. At the close of the monsoon, Chinese, American, and British troops under the immedi ate command of General Sultar advanced southward astride the Irrawaddy, captured Shwegu in early November, and by Decembe: had cleared the projected trace of the supply road to Bhamo.

The Japanese in Burma had never recovered from General Stilwell's thrusts and from the losses inflicted by British and Indian forces on their 15th, 31st, and 33d Divisions in their abortive effort to sever the Bengal-Assam Railroad. As fast as the combat forces moved ahead, United States Engineers, commanded by Brig. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, shoved the road forward behind them, operating their bulldozers so far forward that they were frequently under fire. On 28 January 1945 a convoy of American trucks and materiel from India crossed the well Road was open.
