BACK IN 1968, the name Spiro Agnew suddenly had a musical sound. How could anyone with such a preposterous name be anything but an ideal candidate for vice president? This was the logic that seemed to endear this man to the approximately 45 million voters who gave Agnew and Richard Nixon their first term in office.

Today, the name is the same—nothing has been changed—but suddenly the magic is gone from the name of Spiro Agnew. The same people who swept him into office are saying "With a name like that we should have known better."

WHO IS BEHIND the "Dump Agnew" movement? The Democrats? Probably. The Republican leaders. More than likely.

Agnew seems to have lost favor with the leaders of his party.

You'll remember that there was some talk about the possibility of replacing Agnew on the 1972 ticket. Even then there was talk about the possibility of replacing him with former Texas Governor John Connally, who had been named Secretary of the Treasury by Nixon in one of the many attempts to stabilize the economy.

But this did not happen. Perhaps it was because Connally had not yet made the big switch from the Demos to the Republican camp. At any rate, the president reassured Agnew of his support, and the team was re-united for the 1972 clambake.

Maybe it is the Democrats who are after Agnew, but we doubt it. We believe it is the Republican leaders who still doubt Agnew's ability to lead a presidential ticket in 1976, so they want to dump him and find a replacement with more "charisma," more personality, etc.—Someone like John Connally, for instance.

NOT IN RECENT times has there been such personal indictment of our national leaders. How many can recall even hearing the word "impeachment" used in connection with an American president, especially in the news?

It's more or less a sign of the times. Americans are fed up with the type of "people-planning" government they are getting, and they are demanding changes—from the top to the bottom.

If you doubt this, maybe you should ask Preston Smith, or Ben Barnes or Gus Mutscher what happened in 1972.

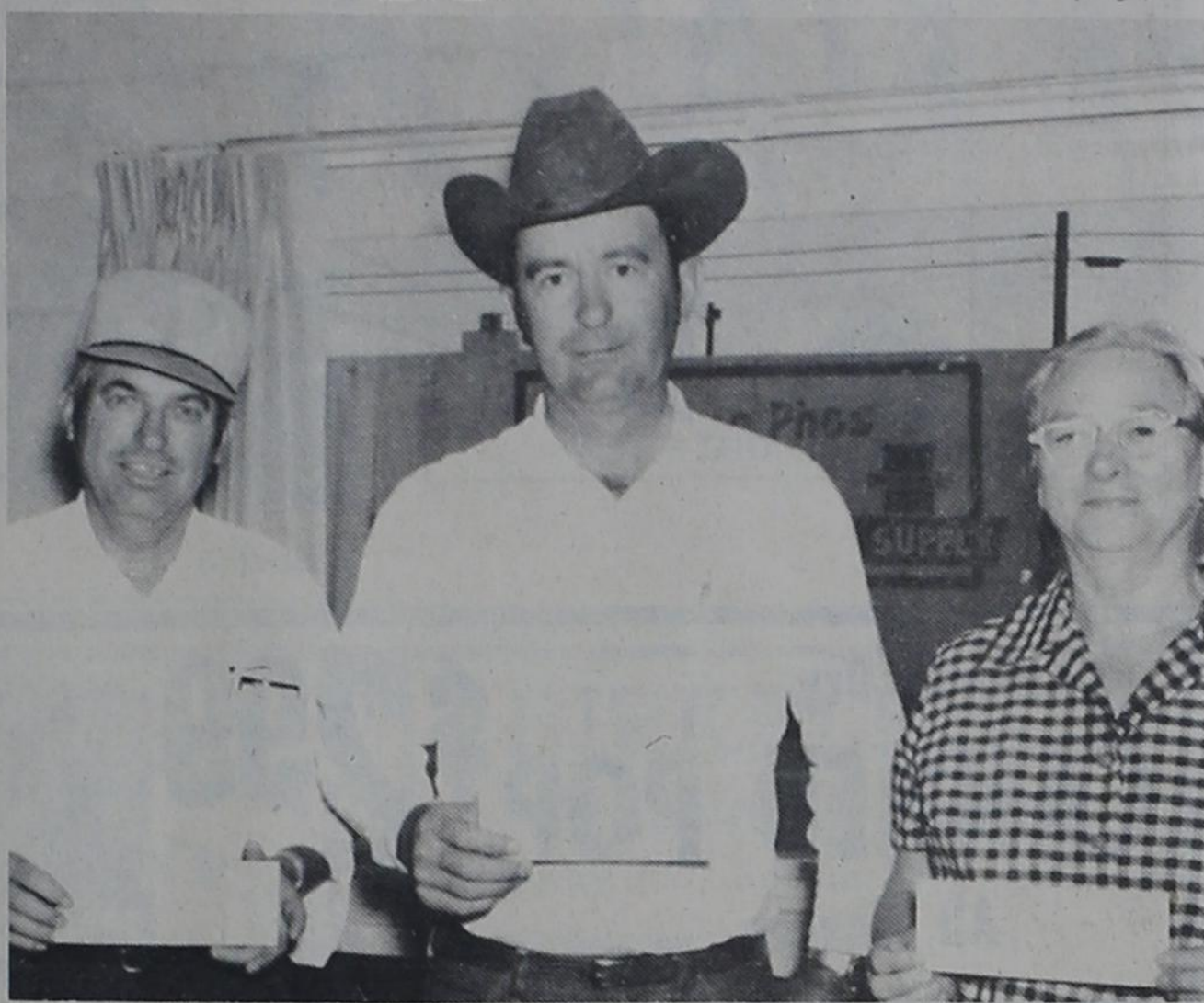
Texas were like citizens in most other states in 1972—they did some house-cleaning in their state government, if for no other reason than just to put some new faces in as leaders.

Due to the Watergate episode, and the Agnew affair, this could possibly be the trend in national elections during the next few years.

The only trouble is, that the problems can't be solved by one election, or by two or three. However, if the people remain patient, they might someday regain their say-so in their government, like they were promised under the constitution.

A FRIEND SUGGESTED the other day that with our modern technology, with computers that can tabulate votes and have the results of a national election completed within hours, that matters of national interest and importance could—and should—be presented to the voters for their mandate, rather than to congress, which doesn't always reflect the will of the people.

# 4th Contest Draws 22 Perfect Entries

The winner's circle returned to town last week in the fourth round of the Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest with all the prize money being won by home-folks.

However, it was a "dilly" of a contest with 22 contestants turning in entries with 10 correct predictions. Three contestants tied for the prize money by being only three points off on the tiebreaker score between Sanford-Fritch and Bovina's Mustangs.

Sharing the money once again this week is H.J. Charles, who has won prize money three of the four weeks of the contest and moved into sole possession

of the lead for the grand prize in the contest.

Also three points off on the tiebreaker score were Mrs. Hattie Burnett and Houston Bartlett.

Charles predicted the score at 33-6, Sanford-Fritch. Mrs. Burnett and Bartlett had identical scores predicted, 35-6, Sanford-Fritch.

Also picking 10 correct games, but missing out on the money because of their tiebreaker predictions, were Frances Allen, 14 points off; Laura Bartlett, nine; Eugene Boaz, 27; Joyce Boaz, 17; Tom Bonds, 10; Wesley Cockerham, 31; Sam Ellis, six; Genevieve Ezell, 27; Greg Hromas, 15;

Mrs. Albert Johnson, 20; Albert Johnson, 10; Jeanne Kerby, 17; Roberta Mager, 10; Brenda Newbrough, 10; Norma Noyes, 20; Jennifer Reed, 40; Jay Sherrill, 20; Kenneth Whitecotton, 10; and Mary Jane Wilson, 12.

Of the 165 entries last week, 38 had nine correct predictions, 37 had eight, 40 had seven, 15 had six, 11 had five, one had four and one contestant had three correct predictions.

The most frequently missed

games on last week's slate were the Littlefield-Muleshoe and Texas Tech-Texas University tilts. A number of contestants also failed to predict correctly the outcome of the West Texas-Northern Illinois game.

Charles, with 10 points added to his total, now has sole possession of the lead in the contest with 37 points, a .920 percentage.

## RECORD NOW 0-3

# Undefeated Eagles Claw Ponies, 34-8

The undefeated District 1-A Sanford-Fritch Eagles racked up 20 points in the second quarter Friday night and held the Mustangs at bay as they coasted in for a 34-8 win before a homecoming crowd at the Eagle stadium.

The Eagles struck for four touchdowns in the first half to go out in front 28-0 before the Mustangs could break their scoreboard goose egg.

The loss was the third of the season for the Ponies of Coach Roger Ezell in his second year as head coach.

The Eagles scored on their first possession of the game after receiving the opening kickoff from the Ponies. Starting from their own

32-yard line, the Eagles scored 13 plays later on the Mustang three-yard line with Mike Wofford going over for the counter. The Eagle drive was assisted by two offside penalties against the Ponies. Wofford snagged a pass from Quarterback Zane Ross for the extras and S-F owned an 8-0 lead with 6:35 remaining on the clock.

The Ponies began their offensive strike from the Bovina 31-yard line, only to lose the ball five plays later on a fumble in the Pony backfield, giving the Eagles possession on the Mustang 40-yard line.

However, the Ponies got the ball back when Ray Martinez intercepted a Ross pass on a

fourth down try with the Ponies putting the ball into play on their own 26-yard line. Three running attempts gained only a yard and Roy Hartzog punted the ball 43 yards.

The first quarter ended with the Eagles in possession of the ball on their 40-yard line. Three plays later, the Mustang defensive line rose to the occasion and held the Eagles on a fourth and one situation and the Ponies took over on their own 38-yard line. Four plays later, punting into a strong north wind, Hartzog got off a punt that went straight up and took an Eagle bounce for a minus-five yards on the punt. The Eagles put the ball into play on the Mustang 35-yard

line and four plays later, facing a fourth and 11, Jim Witt broke through the line for a 36-yard scoring jaunt. The extra point attempt failed as a Ross pass fell incomplete.

The Mustangs again failed to rack up a first down, punting to S-F. Two plays later, Terry Edmonson got behind the Bovina secondary, snagged a Ross pass and sailed untouched into the end zone for a 74-yard scoring play. The running attempt at extra points again failed with the Eagles leading 20-0 with 6:15 left on the clock in the second quarter.

A pass interference call against the Eagles got the Ponies out of trouble on their next possession, when they were faced with a third down situation and 26 yards to go for a first down following two five yard penalties against the Ponies and a loss of six yards in a running attempt. Hartzog again punted, this time from the end zone into the strong wind, and the Eagles took over on the Mustang 23 yard line.

Five plays later, Ross plunged along the line on a quarterback-keeper from the one yard line and the running attempt for extra points succeeded to make the score 28-0 at halftime.

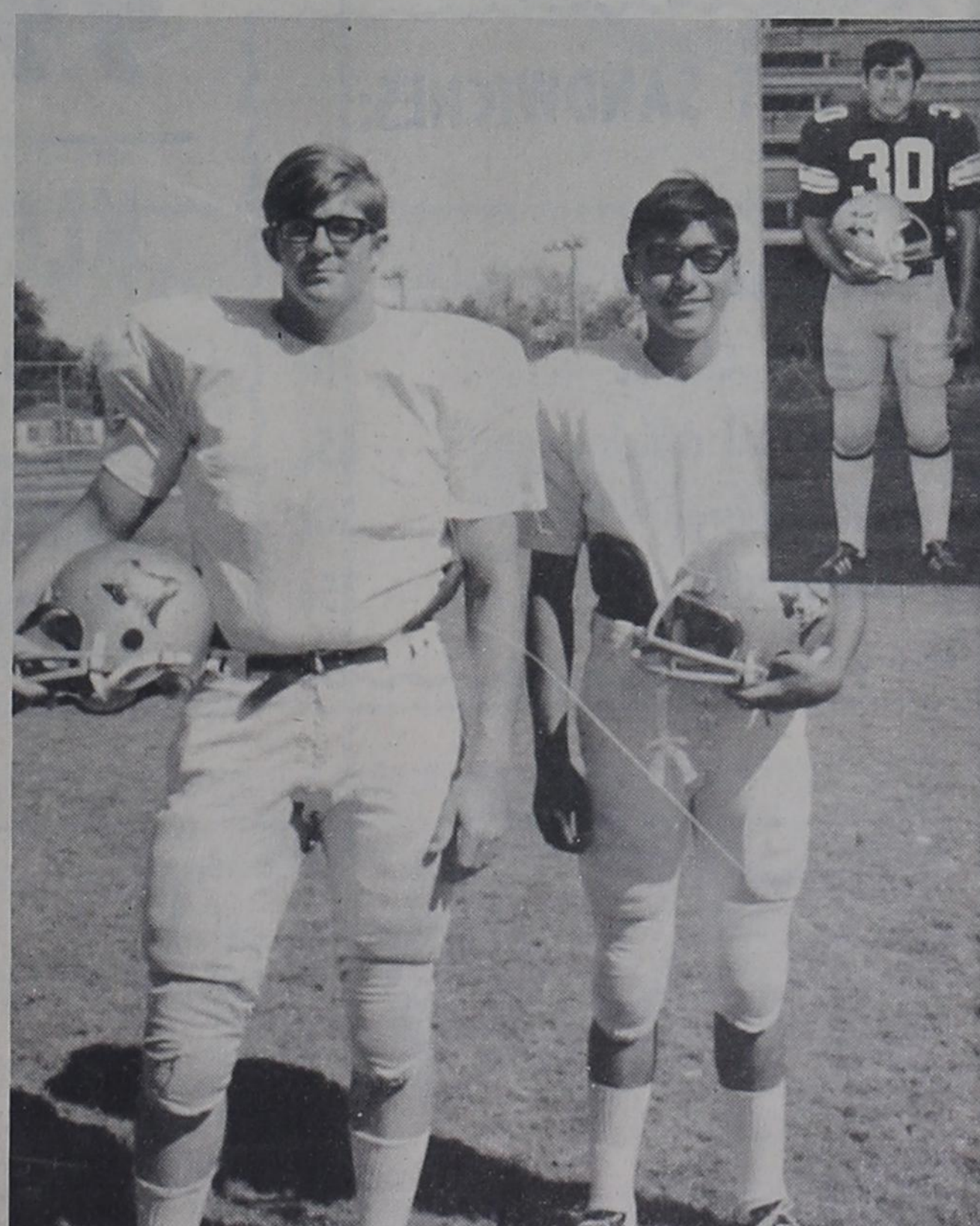
The Eagles received the kickoff at the start of the second half and marched down the field for five consecutive first downs before the Ponies halted their drive on the 16-yard line. Four plays later Hartzog got off a booming kick from the Pony 25-yard line to the Eagle 15. On their second play from scrimmage, the Eagles fumbled with an alert Pony falling on the ball at the two-yard line.

The Ponies put their only TD on the board on the first play with Ray Martinez going over from the two. Tommy DeLeon snagged a pass from Dennis Willard for the extra points and Bovina trailed, 28-8, with 3:24 left in the third period.

The teams traded possession of the ball via a fumble on the Eagles first play and an intercepted Willard pass on the Eagle 10-yard line.

A fumbled punt in the Mustang backfield later gave the ball to the Eagles on the Bovina 38-yard line and seven plays later, faced with a fourth and six situation, Witt set sail around right end for a 21 yard scoring run. The Ponies drew a penalty on the first extra point attempt and a second passing

# City Taxes Due Total \$31,714

City tax statements were mailed in Bovina the first week in October. Those paying their taxes within the next three months will receive a discount, says City Secretary Mary Ruth Martin.

Total tax due by the deadline of Jan. 31 is \$31,714.61 from valuations of \$2,746,539.00. The rate remains at \$1.15 per \$100 valuation, the same as in 1972.

The tax roll for 1972 was \$30,974.61 from valuations of \$2,696,751.00.

Those paying city taxes in October will receive a three per cent discount; in November, two per cent; and in December, one per cent.

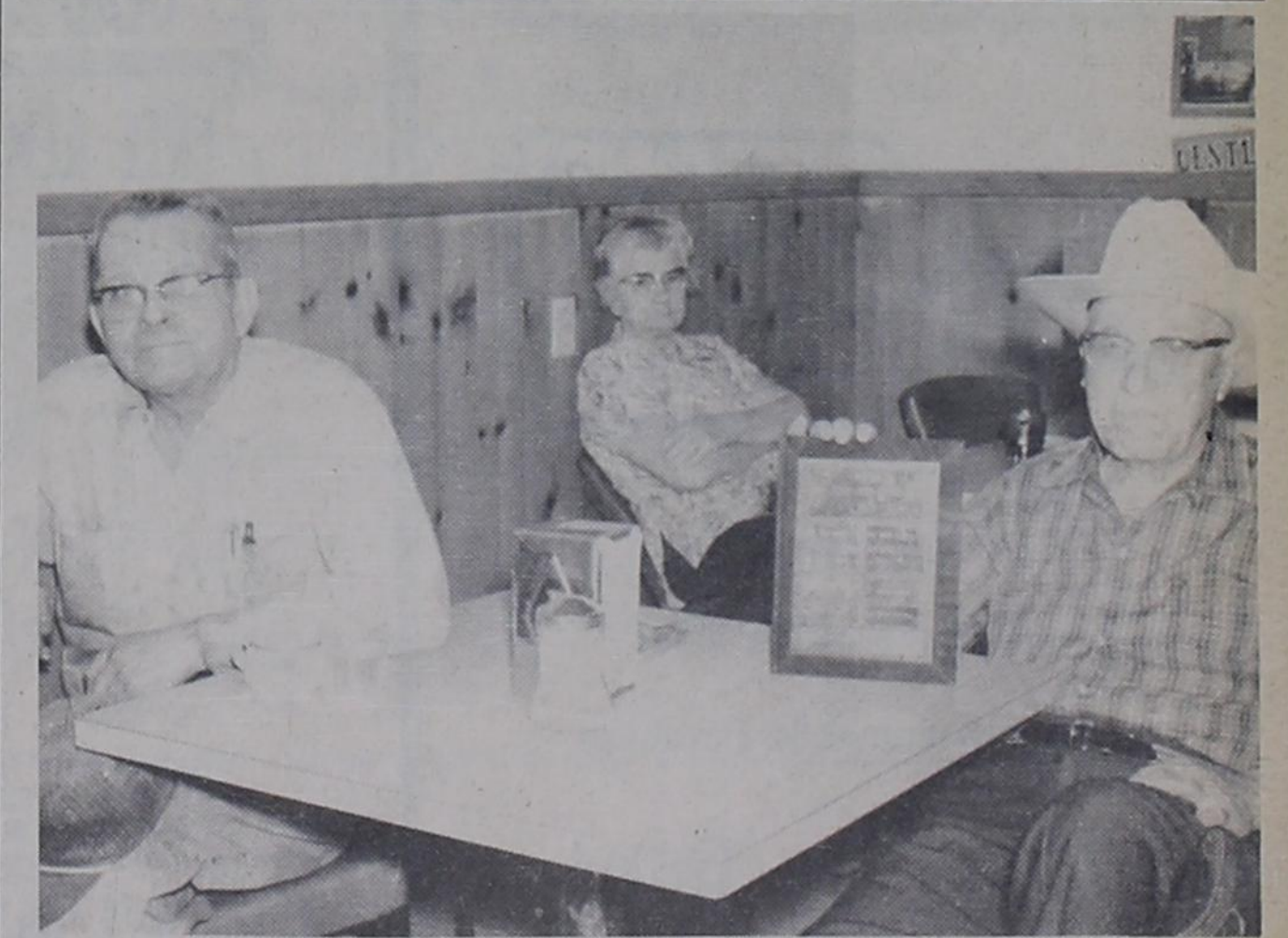
No discount is given in January and after the Jan. 31 deadline, penalties will be charged, points out Mrs. Martin.

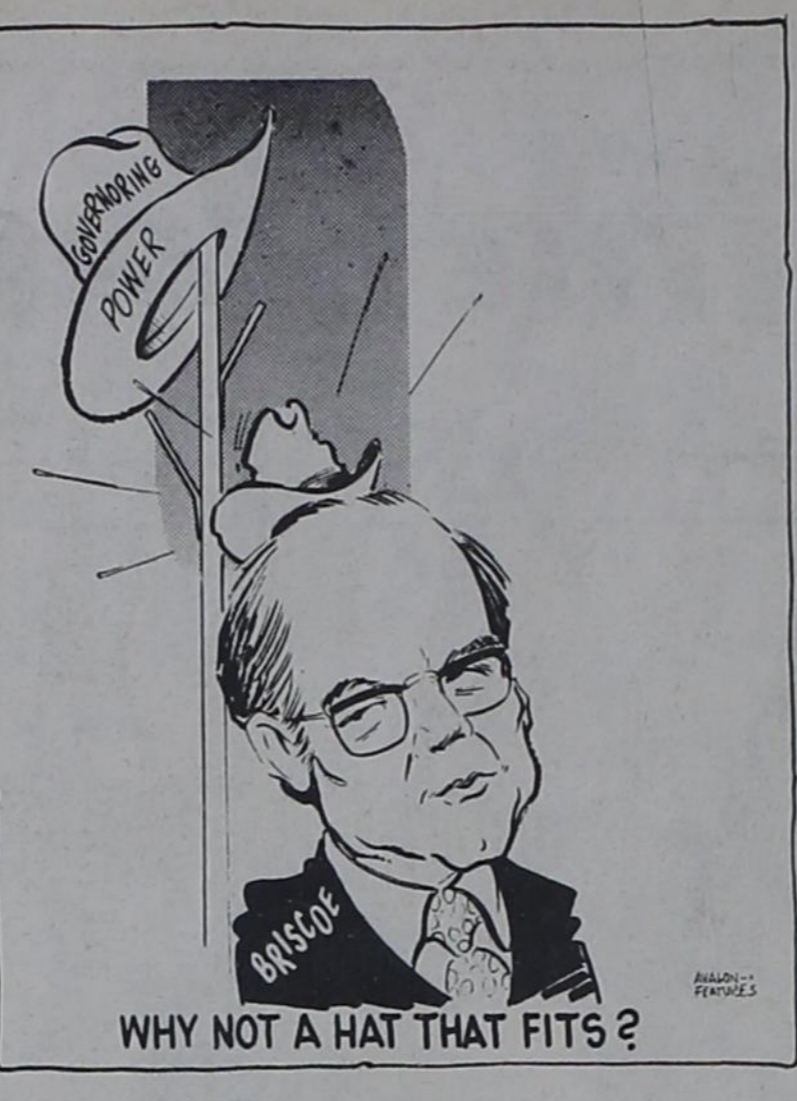
Bob Fillpot is the new owner of Bovina Insurance Company, having completed the transaction this week with Jim Ware, who has owned the company since 1962.

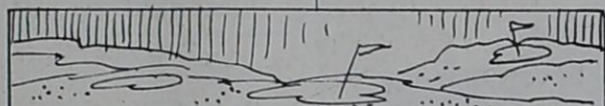
Home Economics Education, Pennsylvania State University. In addition they will participate in a tour, view exhibits and attend a fashion showing.

A DIRT AIR CLEANER can cut engine performance drastically.

Since a tractor or combine engine takes in about 9,000 gallons of air for every gallon of fuel it burns, it's important that the air cleaner be serviced regularly.

In dusty conditions, dirt can ruin an engine in less than a day's work, if the air is not filtered.

Proper care of the air cleaner results in better economy and insures longer engine life. An efficient air cleaner removes dust particles that grind away engine parts such as cylinders, rings and bearings. A clogged air cleaner will choke the engine, causing loss of power and excessive gas use.

After about every 10 hours of engine operation, the oil bath air cleaner cup should be removed and supplied with new oil. Scrape the dirt from the bottom of the cup and wash in kerosene or solvent before refilling.

Dry paper filters on newer tractors function much like air filters on automobiles. These filters can be blown out a couple of times with an air hose, but be careful not to puncture them. Clean and replace often when working in dirty conditions.

NEVER BEFORE have soil tests been as important to Texas farmers as they are today.

With limited supplies of nitrogen and phosphorus, nutrients must be applied where they are needed to maintain production and profits.

A reliable soil test is the best place to start, and fall is the best time to collect samples. Early sampling gives time to make plans and place fertilizer orders early.

To provide a valid guide for fertilization, soil samples must be collected carefully. A slice or core of soil should be taken from 10 to 15 spots in each field to get a good sample. For field crops, the slices or cores should be taken to plow depth, while a depth of 3 to 4 inches had given best results for perennial forages.

Put the soil in a clean plastic bucket, mix it thoroughly and remove a pint box full to send to the laboratory. Information sheets should accompany each sample to show past history and plans for the next crop. These plus mailing cartons for the soil samples are available at the County Extension Office.

Act now to insure that your fall and spring fertilization programs are based on a soil test.

# Mustang II Highlights Ford's 1974 Line

Mustang II, the most changed car in the auto industry this year, were shown along with other new 1974 Ford cars at Friona Motors in Friona on Friday, September 21 and trucks were shown on Friday, September 28.

The Mustang II is a small, sporty and luxurious car that Ford expects to be the forerunner of a new class of cars. It is 19 inches shorter than the 1973 Mustang and seven inches shorter than the original Mustang introduced in April, 1964.

"With the growth of the small car market, Mustang II seems to be coming at the right time," said Troy Young, manager of Friona Motors.

"It brings to the booming small car market the luxurious touches and smooth ride of much larger, more expensive cars," he said.

"Mustang II is a car for the Seventies. The gas mileage of its base engine is especially timely in these days of gas shortages, and the small size and handling make it an especially maneuverable car," Young added.

Standard engine for Mustang II is Ford's new 2.3-liter (140-cubic-inch), four-cylinder overhead-cam powerplant, the first metric engine ever built in the United States. Optional is the 2.8-liter (171-cubic-inch), V-6 engine built by Ford of Germany. Mustang II will be the only U.S. car to offer V-6 performance in a small car.

Included as standard equipment on Mustang II are front bucket seats which provide exceptional lateral support, cut-pile carpeting for the floor and lower door, tachometer and full instrumentation, simulated burled walnut accents, European arm rests and door pulls, and full-width headrests.

Also standard are rack-and-pinion steering, front disc brakes, and a unique sub-frame that provides a big-car ride that helps isolate noise, vibration and harshness from the passenger compartment.

Mustang II offers 45 options, including a digital clock,

sunroof, AM/FM multiplex radio and stereo tape, air conditioning, left and right-hand remote control mirrors and steel-belted radial-ply tires.

Among the other Ford car lines, Torino receives the biggest change with new front and rear bumpers, grille, taillights and new sheet metal in the rear. Also available on Torino are luxury interiors, a large 460-cubic-inch V-8 engine, sunroof, opera window on two-door models, and fender skirts.

All Fords, Thunderbirds and Torinos, equipped with the 460- or 400-c.i.d. engines will feature solid state ignition. A new front seat occupant restraint/starter interlock system will be on all models to provide greater driver and passenger protection.

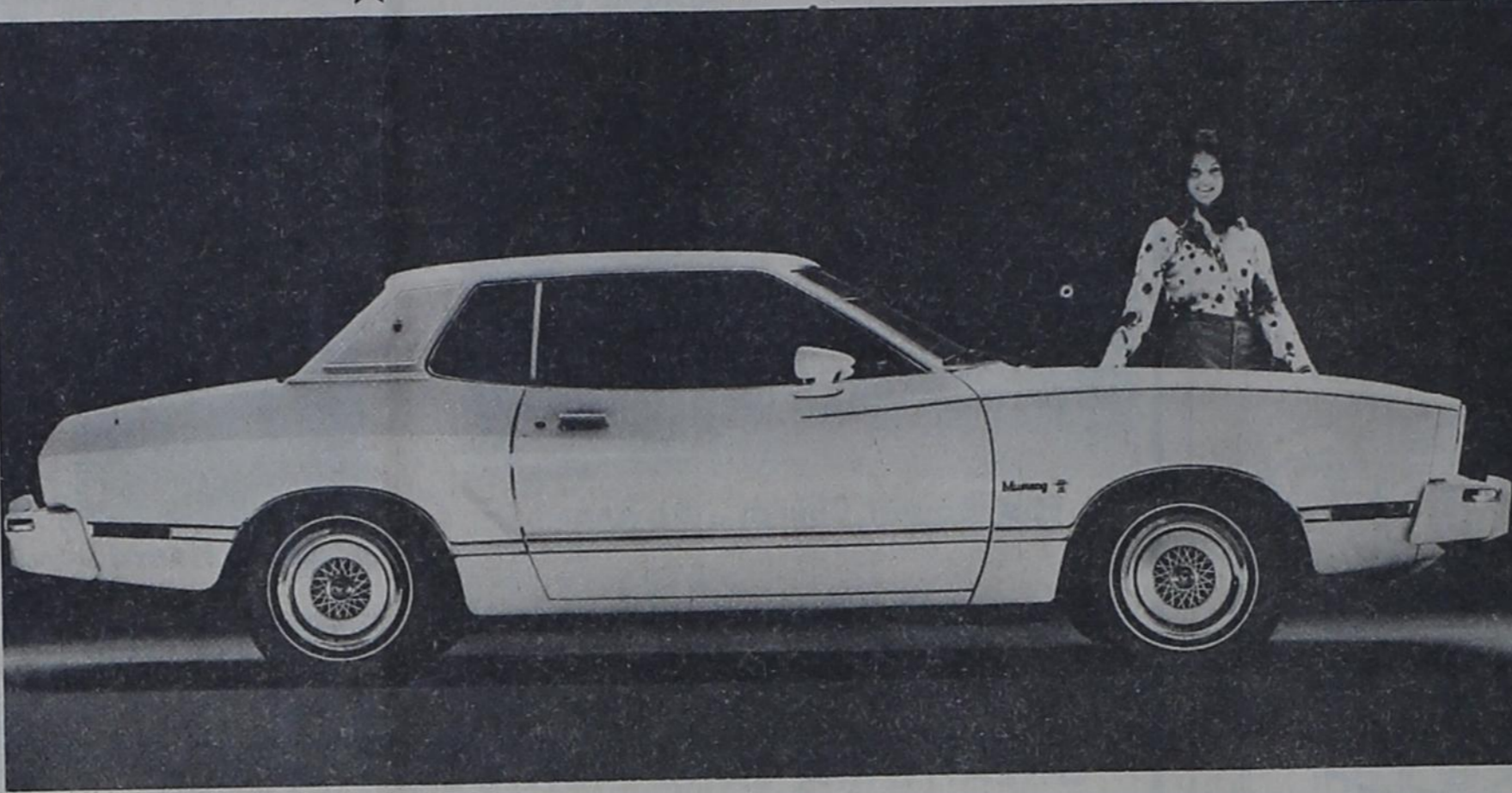
New options, refinements on light trucks and expanded heavy truck engine availability highlight Ford Division's truck lineup for 1974.

The pickup, new in 1973, has new features for added versatility. They include the 460-4V V-8 engine, optional for the first time in all pickup

models, and the two-seat, four-door crew cab F-250 and F-350 available for the first time as a regular production item.

Ranchero has a new front end and new options for greater luxury and performance. The 1974 Bronco retains its 92-inch wheelbase and standard two-wheel/four-wheel-drive. A new engine option, the 300-1V Six, for the E-100 and E-200 Club Wagon and Van, highlight new Econoline features. The 1973 Courier, introduced in May, is carried over into 1974.

In heavy trucks, the NTC-350-horsepower diesel is newly available for the W-9000 and LT-9000 trucks. The V-555 medium-duty 210-h.p. diesel is optional for all 8000-series trucks beginning in October. Ford's C-6 automatic transmission is a new option on the C-600 medium truck.

"Improvements all across the board add value to all our car lines," says Glenn Reeve, local manager.

"Later in mid-year of the 1974 model run," Reeve added, "further excitement will be added with the introduction of the special performance Cosworth Vega. Heart of this limited production option," he said, "will be the Cosworth

**Vega engine with dual overhead camshafts and 16 valves—four per cylinder.**

In addition to the various styling and mechanical advances, Chevrolet is equipping all cars in 1974 with a sequential ignition interlock in the seat belt system that calls for the driver and front seat passenger to be seated with belts buckled before the car will start. Seat sensors and buckle switches operate sequentially to help prevent defeating the system.

### BUMPER CHANGES

There are three distinct bumper systems on Chevrolet cars in compliance with the more stringent government impact regulations.

They include the hydraulic-pneumatic energy-absorbing systems on the regular Chevelle, Chevelle, Monte Carlo and Nova; the new spring-mounted aluminum bumpers with resilient impact strips on Camaro and Vega; and the body-colored urethane "soft" bumper covers with aluminum and cast iron reinforcement and draw bolts on the Corvette.

Engine power ranges from the Vega's aluminum alloy block four-cylinder 140-cubic inch power plant and the standard 250-cubic inch six-cylinder on up to an optional 454 cubic-inch V8.

In compliance with emission standards, California engine availability will be different from the rest of the nation.

Basically, all California V8s will have four-barrel carburetion. Additionally, Chevrolet is making a four-barrel 400 V8 standard for all big Chevrolet wagons and a two-barrel 400 V8 standard for Chevelle wagons... both for improved performance.

Various sizes of steel-belted radial ply tires are standard on Corvette, Monte Carlo and Laguna Type S-3 and available as extra cost options on all others.

Headlining the broad variety of other Chevrolet developments for 1974 are new front and rear styling for standard-size cars; new styling for the Chevelle and Vega lines; new front and rear appearance for the Camaro; and styling refinements for the Monte Carlo.

The five coupes in the standard Chevrolet and Chevelle series have new roof designs. There are new bumper systems using for the first time extruded aluminum bumpers for Camaro and Vega.

Important chassis and structural improvements for greater driveability and durability also have been engineered into many 1974 models.

Other features for 1974 include wear sensors and indicators for disc brake lining and front suspension ball joint; new battery flame arrestor caps; a low internal resistance battery and a more simplified air conditioning system.

# Ponies Seek Revenge Against 5-A Cowboys

Revenge for last year's 14-0 shutout by the Plains Cowboys is the primary concern in the Bovina Mustang's camp this week as the winless Ponies prepare for their final non-district clash of the 1973 season. The game will be played at Plains with kickoff time slated at 8 p.m.

Mustang fans will remember last year's game against the highly-touted Cowboys as a frustrating experience. The Ponies owned a decisive edge in every statistic but the number of points on the scoreboard. From that game, the Ponies went on to win five consecutive

district tilts before losing to Hart in the season finale.

Although the District 5-A Cowboys have a season record of three wins against one defeat, the team has come up with only one decisive victory this year, that one against neighboring Farwell two weeks ago.

Plains upset Cooper, a Class

AA squad, 3-0; lost to District 3-A Sudan, 8-0; defeated Farwell, 27-6; and edged New Deal, also a Class A squad, 15-7.

Last year's edition of the Cowboys went to the state semifinals before being eliminated, but Coach Earl Miller has only five returning lettermen from the championship.

The number-one returnee is Jeff Gentry, 6-2, 200 pound All-State fullback-linebacker. Gentry has been tabbed by some area sportswriters as perhaps the best football player, regardless of classifica-

tion, in this area of the state. Another star player for the Cowboys is Mike Blount, 5-10, 155 pound senior halfback who was chosen as All-District and All-South Plains last year.

The Cowboys run out of a split-T formation and according to Mustang scouts pass the ball frequently.

Mustang Mentor Roger Ezell says, "We think we can play with Plains, especially if we have our injured starters back this week."

"We were encouraged by our defensive play last week," said Ezell in regard to the Sanford-Fritch game. "We had some people that played excellent ball Friday night." Ezell singled out the performances of seniors Dannie McKay, Joe Delgado and Tony Serna as outstanding for the Ponies. On offense, Ezell said, the boys were playing their positions for the first time and had trouble with their timing and hitting the open holes in the line.

Billy Shelby, the Mustangs stellar linebacker and offensive back, is expected to be back in action for the first time since the opening game of the season in which he suffered an ankle injury. Two other starters, Elbert Shelby, sophomore running back, and Alton McCormick, junior running back, are listed as probable

starters, depending on their condition following workouts this week.
