Polio Survey To Be Made In County

A countywide survey to discover the current rehabilitation needs of all post-polio patients will be conducted by the Callahan County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Fred Goble, chapter chairman appropried today.

chairman, announced today.

The local survey is part of a nation-wide project by the National Foundation to compile a comed and Tom Dawkins, San Antonio, responded. Talks were made by Fred Cook, Putnam; Joe Steadham, Austin; Bob Nor-rell, Baird; and R. L. Westerman of Christoval, during the foreroster of polio cases of all ages and degree of disability, regard-less of date of onset. The can-vass here is to be completed by

"Modern medicine has made impressive strides in developing in recent years," Mr. Goble said.

"Pilot surveys already undertaken show that there are thousands of pollo-handicapped in the United States who have not yet had an opportunity for medical evaluation to determine if they might benefit from these new techniques.

"Some of the techniques employed today for those disabled by pollo and other causes were unknown and unused as recently as 10 or even five years ago.



Wheat farmers won't lose pro-duction history. Land put in the wheat Acreage Reserve will be counted as land devoted to the prodution of wheat in the determination of future form, county, or State wheat acreage allotments.

Farmers who sign agrements before October 4, 1957, may can-cel or replace their agreements up to that date. After the winter wheat Acreage Reserve sign-up is completed, agreements cannot be conceled by the wheat producers

Failure to comply with wheat and all other acreage allotments assigned to a farm will make the operator ineligible for payment. Farmers who are not in com-pliance with certain provisions



Ed West, vice president in charge of the firm's Albuquer que headquarters said Cantrell was employed by Ferguson-Steere in March. "He was typical of the high calibre of men that we try to attract. Our drivers are not directly instructed to help stranded vehicles," West said, "but are told to use their own judgement in such cases." However, he pointed out that his office frequently receives letters of gratitude from persons whom his company's drivers have assisted in similar circumstances.

"At our regular safety meetings we stress courtesy as a major contribution to overall safety on the hoghways." West said, "It's ironical that another of our drivers was recently presented a 'Knight of the Road' sward for performing the same act of courtesy that cost Cantrell his life."

Cantrell, like most of the company's 180 drivers, averaged about 5,000 miles per month. His accident-free record was in-


