**YOU MAY HAVE MISSED** this item in the news last week. If so, we thought you might be interested in how the U.S. Postal Service is spending part of your recent postage increase. And it may make you fighting mad.

The postal service has decided to destroy 300 million stamps that it recently ordered, at a cost--to us postal users--of \$580,000. And it all involved a tiny factual error dealing with the stamps, that would only have affected mainly postal employees, and would not have mattered in the least, especially not to the tune of \$580,000.

The new stamps were 52-cent stamps, which is the current price for a two-ounce, first-class letter. They were designed to honor the late Hubert Humphrey.

The stamp itself is fine--nothing at all wrong with them. But Postmaster General Anthony Frank had ordered background facts printed in the margins of the 100-stamp sheets, "because some postal clerks didn't know some of the people being honored" in the "Great American" series of stamps.

The kicker came when the biographical material on the side of the 100-stamp sheet on the Humphrey stamp said that Humphrey became vice president in 1964.

Some purist, no doubt a high-salaried proof-reader for the postal printing contractor (or perhaps the printer who lost the bid on the stamps), pointed out that technically Humphrey was elected to office in 1964, but did not begin serving until 1965.

"Big deal," most of us would say. Well, it was a big deal to the Postal Service, who ordered the crisp, new 300 million stamps shredded. Since the stamps were worth 52¢ apiece, that was like shredding up \$156 million in crisp, new bills.

You need to realize that only a precious few mail users would have ever seen the line we're talking about, since it was printed on the margins of the sheets of stamps.

It would take a heavy mail user to be interested in 100 of the 52-cent stamps, especially at the rate of \$52 per sheet. Most mail users in this category have postage meters, and don't even mess with stamps.

So it comes down to the fact that the U.S. Postal Service didn't want to "taint" their own employees with such a horrible error on the new stamp sheets.

How many postal employees would have ever noticed, caught the error, or even cared about it?

Those of us in the printing business live with the possibility of printing errors. Because we're all human (and besides, in this new, modern age we can even blame it on computers), there is an outside chance that there may be a misprint in this very column.

We take every precaution to avoid such errors, but they sometimes happen.

If the Dallas Morning News, in its report of Nolan Ryan's magnificent seventh no-hitter this week, erroneously listed in the small print box score that the game attendance was 35,439 when it actually was 33,439--if this was noticed after the printing was completed, do you think they would trash their entire day's run and start over? Of course they wouldn't.

That's about how this stamp error compares, in importance. Yet, the Postal Service thought it was too big an error.

You may recall that the Postal Service's board of governors really wanted the first-class postage increase to be 30¢ instead of the 29¢ that was granted. This latest faux-pas will just give them more fuel to argue that they can't make ends meet at 29¢ per ounce.

Probably not, if they shred up \$500,000 every so often.

## Excel Makes Plans For Plant Expansion

Excel Corporation has announced an \$11-million expansion of its beef-slaughter and boxed-beef processing facility at Friona that will double the carcass chill-cooler capacity of the plant.

"The expansion and remodeling project will enable us to improve the overall quality of beef products we offer to our customers, while enhancing employee safety and ergonomic design of the carcass cooling area. We'll be able to chill 48 hours' worth of slaughter capacity, or about 8,000 head of cattle when the project is completed in 1992," said Terry Wilkerson, general manager of Friona operations.

Wilkerson said construction is expected to begin within the next two months. He said no change is expected in overall employment at the facility as a result of the expansion. The Friona plant employs more than 1,600 plant production employees.

Wilkerson said the plant has an annual payroll of more than \$25 million and annually buys about one million head of area cattle worth approximately \$800 million.

Excel has another Texas beef slaughter and boxed-beef processing plant in Plainview, which has total employment of more than 1,600 employees. The company also has beef-processing plants in Dodge City, Kansas, Fort Morgan and Sterling, Colorado, and Schuyler, Nebraska; beef further-processing plants in Marysville, California, Booneville, Arkansas, Rock Port, Missouri, and Nebraska City, Nebraska; and pork-processing facilities in Beardstown, Illinois, Ottumwa, Iowa, and Ft. Branch and Anderson, Indiana.

trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self-examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Ages: 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, June 19, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. ## Local Property Tax Increases In 1989-90

Local property tax rates in Texas increased 9.7% in 1989-90. This increase occurred despite a \$15 billion drop in property values, as local governments raised tax levies by \$745 million to a total of \$11.3 billion. The figures were provided by the Texas Research League, an Austin-based public policy research group.

Property taxes in Texas averaged 1.77% of market value (selling price) in 1989-90, but varied widely throughout the state from a high of 2.9% in Crystal City to a low of 1.1% in Highland Park (Dallas).

Locally property taxes were 31.7 per cent of value.

For a single-family house that would sell for \$80,000, the highest tax was \$2,481 in Crystal City and the lowest was a \$842 tax bill in Seminole. If the house were eligible for various homestead exemptions, the lowest tax would have been \$695 in Highland Park compared to a high of \$2,412 in Crystal City.

Additional exemptions were granted to homeowners aged 65 or over which reduced the highest property tax bill to \$1,865 in Crystal City and to a low of \$150 in Irving (in Coppell ISD).

In Bovina, the tax bill on an \$80,000 house in 1989-90 averaged \$254 or \$252 if a homestead or \$252 if owned by a senior citizen.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

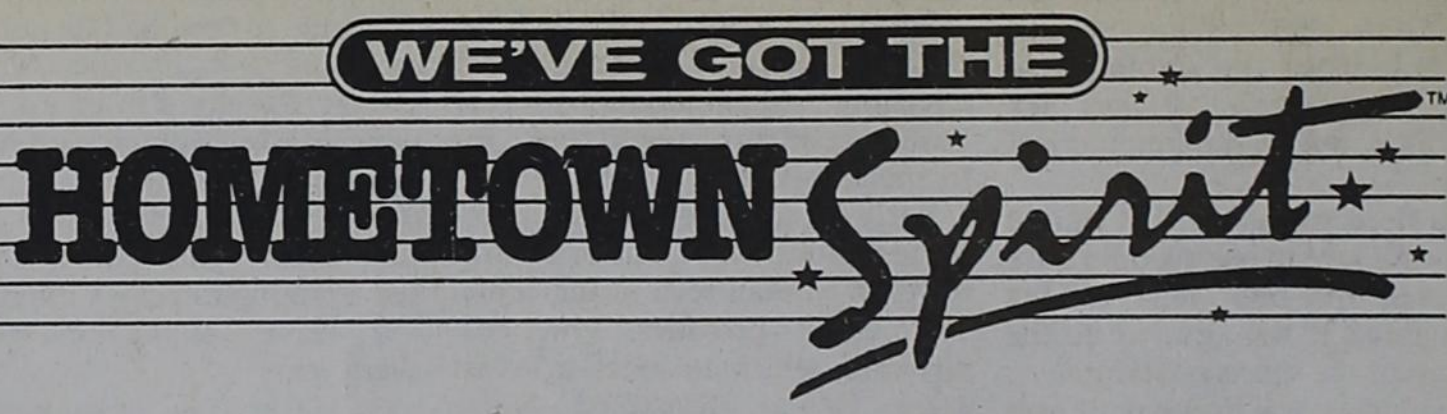

## Lazbuddie FHA Implements Y.E.S. Program Locally

Y.E.S. (Youth Exchanging with Seniors) is an exciting new project for Lazbuddie's Future Homemakers of America and some Lazbuddie 4-H members. It is a program that trains volunteers from youth organizations as providers of daily living and chore services for elderly citizens in rural communities.

Y.E.S. is a joint project of the College of Home Economics of Texas Tech University, the Texas Tech and Health Sciences School of Medicine, and the District 2 Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Co-directors are Sheryl H. Boyd, Ed.D.; Betty Stout, Ph.D. and Kathy Bolanty, Ph.D. Project coordinator is Lora Ann Neill, M.S.

Lazbuddie's home economics teacher, Mrs. Barbara Lust, Rochelle White, C.E.A., and the Lazbuddie FHA Chapter and 4-H Club were selected to head up the Parmer County Y.E.S. project. Lazbuddie has a very active FHA organization, as well as a strong vocational home economics program, directed by Barbara Lust. She has been very much involved in establishing the Parmer County Y.E.S. program during this school year. She said that her Y.E.S. volunteers are beginning to go into client homes now, and she asks that any interested senior citizen in the Lazbuddie area contact her for more information.

Lazbuddie also has an outstanding 4-H Club, and several members of that group have volunteered to be student participants in Project Y.E.S.

Parmer County is part of a twenty county pilot program for Y.E.S. The major funding for the project is through the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. This health-care philanthropy funds over \$100 million yearly grants, most of which address rural health care.

The Parmer County Y.E.S. team includes: Barbara Lust, home

economics teacher; Rochelle White, county Extension agent; Dr. Paul Spring, health care representative; and Lori McBroom, youth representative. Lana Copp and Pat Randolph are adult leaders and home visitors. Marca Morris, Debra Redwine and other adult leaders in the community are assisting in training of student volunteers and other project work.

Y.E.S. student volunteers are trained in necessary skills to provide service for senior citizens of personal care, chores around the house and lawn care. The students will be monitored by adults. These assisted-living services will fill a need that has been lacking in rural communities, will help to keep the elderly living in their homes and will become community service activities for 4-H and FHA students.

While the project will insure the continued independence of some of the elderly, other positive outcomes are also expected. Project Y.E.S. will transcend young/old stereotypes, break down generational barriers, increase trust, utilize local resources more cost effectively, strengthen family, school, and neighborhood relationships, provide needed volunteer power and regenerate a sense of community involvement.

One of the goals of Y.E.S. is a joint senior citizen/youth volunteer project for the improvement of the community. Mrs. Lust said that her Y.E.S. students have already discussed a possible project for the community.

Mrs. Lust and the Lazbuddie FHA are making Y.E.S. a top priority project. She is very excited about Y.E.S. and sees it as a real need in rural communities. She is happy to take a leading role in establishing the county program, which is still in its infancy, and predicts that it will grow into a

very important and rewarding experience for all concerned. She believes that the benefits to both young and old will only become more fully appreciated as the project develops with time.

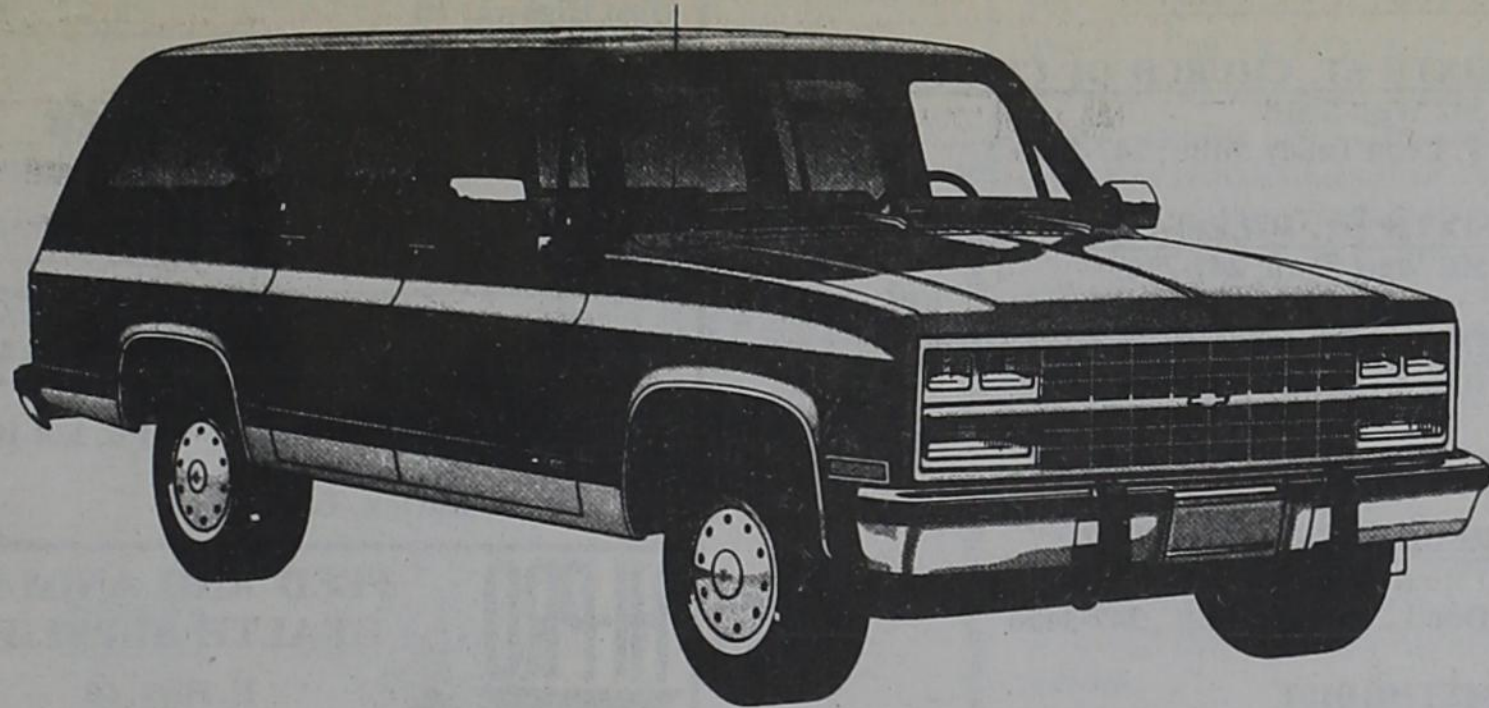
Lust said that she is now taking names of senior citizens who would like to be involved in Y.E.S. Trained youth are presently going to senior client homes. "Work has begun to expand the Y.E.S. program to Friona, and we hope eventually to include all of the towns in Parmer County in the program," said Lust.

Earlier in the school year, Lazbuddie's home economics class, the FHA chapter, and Barbara Lust were asked to participate in a training film promoting the Y.E.S. project. A professional filming crew has visited the school's home economics department twice, taking footage of Mrs. Lust and her students re-enacting class projects and including interaction with senior citizens in the Y.E.S. program. There will be five films in all. The first has been completed, and work has begun on the second. Mrs. Lust is currently working to set up a time for those interested to view the film. If you are interested, please contact her or Lana Copp.

Mrs. Lust stated that vocational home economics is an essential part of a total school curriculum and that it is growing stronger in Texas. Y.E.S. co-director Betty Stout said, "The reason we are interested in Y.E.S. from the home economics side is that our ambition is to improve the quality of individual and family life."

"That's what vocational home economics is all about," said Lust.

Dear Mr. Ellis:

Rural health systems are changing dramatically as hospital bed usage drops in favor of complex outpatient treatments. Few rural communities can recruit or afford to furnish all the services desired.

Health services must be delivered through a regional health "system," whether recognized as such or not. Many expensive specialty services can only be delivered safely or economically for rural residents in medical centers where the volume justifies the investment.

local services which can be realistically recruited and economically supported.

The name "hospital" over a door does not make it one. New quality standards have been imposed on all hospitals by accrediting agencies, insurance companies, Medicare and Medicaid. When a hospital offers a service it must meet uniform quality standards, whether rural or urban. Otherwise, it might not get paid, or it could even lose its license.

Northwest Texas Hospital accepted invitations to assist some Panhandle hospitals to get back on their feet, then left after accomplishing the missions: Memphis created a hospital district, levied taxes and also had to make large local donations to keep the hospital open--Dumas formed a hospital district covering parts of three counties. Other hospital district variations are being tried. Borger's investor-owned hospital closed for several months until a hospital district was organized to take over. Yet, smaller rural areas continue to face increasing burdens, both in governing and in financing increasingly complex, costly health systems.

No outsider group can impose a solution on the citizens of a county. Each must decide for itself then vote locally on any proposal involving the creation of a hospital district, whether a single county or parts of counties or other hospital districts. A local vote must first be based upon a special bill approved by the State Legislature describing the locally-chosen plan, or upon an existing generic bill which might fit.

It may be possible to join with a larger hospital district so its specialists can help furnish those services you can realistically finance. Hospital districts have been proven to be accountable to all the citizens, not just one vested interest group.

It seems to me to offer citizens the best chance for ensuring the delivery of appropriate health services through thick and thin as needs change. The relationship could be by contract or by a merge.

A multi-county hospital district concept, whereby a metropolitan tertiary medical center hospital district joins with a cluster of nearby rural counties to ensure care for all, has not yet been fully tried to my knowledge. But I predict that this will ultimately be the system of choice for many rural counties, in spite of the obvious political challenges which would be presented. Rural citizens will demand to have quality health

services which they can afford and are willing to support at home on a shared basis. They want to be assured of needed emergency and primary care services. Each county would decide whether to participate.

...A hospital district-financed program for the poor could save much in the long run by sending them to appropriate services on a timely basis. A hospital district also relieves the county commissioners court from responsibility for indigent care.

Citizen study groups from Parmer County might wish to talk with the new State Rural Health office in Austin, also with hospital systems in the region to determine health system alternatives. You are to be congratulated for taking a realistic look at your hospital's role.
