


charmed the boys and girls of the Bovina area. He distributed bags of candy to all the children, assisted by members of Bovina Lions



Reveals Research

For the first time, results from an irrigation-fertilizer study on corn at the High Plains Research Foundation has placed a value on irrigation water in relation to the farmer's pocket

The study was conducted by

Jim Valliant, Foundation soil scientist, in cooperation with Iowa State University and the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation. In the study, five irrigation levels with five different levels of fertilizer applications were used on Pioneer 3306 hybrid corn planted April 17 singlerowed on 40-inch spacings with a plant population of 26,000 per

"Two irrigation methods produced the best results," Valliant said. For identification, these methods are labeled 1 and 2.

In Method 1 corn plots were irrigated at germination, tassel initiation (four to five weeks after germination) three weeks after initiation, tassell, silk, milk and soft dough stages for a total applied irrigation of 39.2

Method 2 had irrigations at germination, silk and milk stages for a total irrigation application of 21.6 inches.

Corn under Method 1 in the five fertilizer levels showed an average yield of 148.2 bushels per acre with the highest yield of 155 bushels produced from the 150-100-0 fertilizer preplant application plus 100 pounds of nitrogen applied as

Under Method 2, corn yields on the five fertilizer plots averaged 132.8 bushels per acre with the highest yield of 148.4 bushels coming on the same fertilizer application as in Met-

Valliant pointed out that the corn yield at the 250-100-0 fertilizer level in method 1 was 3.96 bushels per inch of irrigation water applied while Method 2 produced 6.87 bushels per acre inch of water.

By figuring the cost of pump-ing an acre inch of water at \$1.07, Method 1 had \$41.94 in irrigation pumping costs while Method 2 cost \$23.11.

THE WOMEN

Your office has been recommended to me for assistance in this time of need. I have received an audit letter for Internal Revenue Service and since this is my busy season, I thought you could handle the matter for me.

First of all they have questioned my deduction for uniforms. 



ist, is an emphatic "NO." Research has shown that there can be as much as \$175 difference between two beef carcasses of the same weight. Of course, this is a very unusual difference but differences of \$30-\$50 are not uncommon. The USDA reports that for each one per cent increase in the percentage of edible meat from the chuck, loin, rib and round, there is a value diffe-

rence of nearly \$2 per hundred-



amount of fat on the outside and inside of the carcass. The USDA vield grades assigned the carcasses were based on the above information. These yield grades are 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, with the lower numbers indicating carcasses with the highest percentage of lean-fat

According to USDA figures, approximately 21 per cent of the quality graded beef in the U. S. is also yield graded; however, in Texas more than half of the carcasses are also yield graded which indicates wide usage of this grading sys-

OF INTEREST TO CATTLEMEN AND FEEDERS OF LIVESTOCK

Livestock is to be rendered as personal property. While there is often a question as to the fairness, tax laws in the State of Texas are very definite as they pertain to livestock. Thus we have no alternative but to adhere to the laws as they exist.

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owner's residence. All livestock in the Bovina School District on January 1st of this year must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE CHARGE OR POSSESSION OF SOMEONE OTHER THANTHE OWNER SHALL BE ASSESSED TO THE PERSON HAVING IT IN CHARGE OR POSSESSION. (Art. 7160, 7152.) Therefore, if you have cattle on your property or if you are looking after someone else's cattle, you are responsible to this office for the owner's name and address and the number of cattle. Please get this information to this office as quickly as possible so that we may get the ownership confirmed or these cattle may be charged to you. As soon as the ownership of the cattle in your possession is confirmed you will have discharged your responsibility for the tax.

Since by law, the rendering of property is the responsibility of the owner, it is hoped that the livestock will be properly rendered to the Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected. This will prevent inconvenience and liability for feed lot operators and others in charge.

WHENEVER THE TAXPAYER REFUSES TO MAKE RENDITION OR TO SUBSCRIBE TOTHE OATH, THE ASSESSOR SHALL PROCEED TO ASSESS THE PROPERTY OF SUCH TAXPAYER, AND THE ASSESSMENT SO MADE SHALL BE AS LEGAL AND BINDING AS IF RENDERED BY THE TAXPAYER. (Art. 7193.)

Program Extension Helps Great Plains

Conservation Program in legislation recently enacted by Congress can mean a doubling of the needed soil and water conservation work on Texas farm and ranch lands, State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service says.

The law extending the program, which was launched in 1957 to give landowners in the Great Plains help in building greater stability in farming and ranching enterprises, was signed by the President on Nov. 18. The program had been scheduled to end Dec. 31, 1971 but

has now been extended to 1981. The legislation authorizes an additional \$150 million in Federal funds for the cost-sharing of conservation measures.

In addition to cost-sharing regular soil and water conservation work, the broadened program will provide for the en-

Antique Clocks Occupy Corbin's Home, Interest

Two years ago Monty Corbin

became a clock collector. Already, he has acquired about 20 antique clocks, some

of them considered "rare." He and Mrs. Corbin, who live at 603 Eighth Street, had been interested in antiques for some time. His brother-in-law and partner, Don Chapman of Hereford, was a clock collector and his interest intrigued

the Corbins. It wasn't long before the family was picking up clocks in antique shops on their trips to Colorado, Dallas, Amarillo and other points.

All of his clocks are in running condition, although Corbin says he doesn't keep them running because the noise of their ticking and chiming would be

too much. They only buy clocks they like --- not necessarily of any certain country or vintage. Since many have been bought,

their value has already doubled. A tour of the collection revealed a miniature coo-coo clock, about 1900 variety, bought in Colorado. Their oldest clock, an 1858 Jerome and Company, is rose wood and American made. It hangs in a prominent place in Corbin's den.

A German clock with Westminster chimes is treasured by the family, as well as a Sessions "Regulator" school house clock, American made.

A glass and brass dome 400day clock from Germany features perpetual motion. while a nearly perfectly matched pair of Gilberts, 1906 and 1908, stand nearby. The pair was purchased for the Corbins' sons, Greg and Glenn.
