WASHINGTON-Farm labor contractors must obtain information that the migrant workers they recruit or supply to growers are not illegal aliens, the Labor Department announced.

Under new regulations clarifying the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act amendments of 1974, acceptable evidence of legal employability includes: a birth certificate, certificate of citizenship or naturalization, U.S. identification card, passport identifying the worker as a U.S. citizen, consular report of birth or, in the case of an alien, an alien registration receipt card.

The 1976 edition of the 57-page publication reflects the latest information and changes in VA benefits programs, including medical care, pension, disability compensation, GI home loans, life insurance, burial benefits, the GI Bill, vocational rehabilitation programs and dependents' education assistance.

The pamphlet also summarizes certain benefits for veterans administered by other federal agencies. These include Labor Department job finding assistance, Civil Service job preference and Small Administration Business loans.

The "IS-1 Fact Sheet" features a handy timetable indicating time limits on applying for benefits, and it contains a list of VA offices to which applications should be






"Another problem with lump-sum settlements is that approximately one-fourth of the worker's settlement goes to pay for attorney fees," Gray said.

"Since 1969 the dollar income to attorneys in these cases has nearly doubled. We propose a limit of 15 percent be set on the lawyer's share of

the settlement." To prevent fraudulent claims, TAB recommends that any person who lies about an injury or illness on the employment application form be denied payment.

TAB suggests "total permanent disability" be rede-

fined as any mental or physical impairment which prevents - a person from working. Also, the organization wants vocational rehabilitation offered to workers receiving compensation.

Gray said that Texas is the only state in the nation which does not allow responsible employers to self-insure against workers' compensation claims.

'TAB believes employers who can meet the financial requirements of the Insurance Commission should be allowed to self-insure," he said. 'As it stands now, the Insurance Commission sets the rates statewide and there is no price competition.


