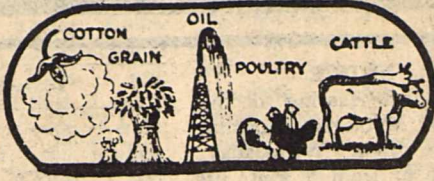

## Haskell Falls To Stamford

The Haskell Indians suffered their first defeat at the hands of the Stamford Bulldogs last Friday night 28 to 20. The Indians were on the lip of the goal when the game was over but were not successful in getting the possible tying touchdown over the goal line. The Indians were hampered all night with fumbles and untimely penalties. Also, the Bulldogs were successful in moving the ball with dives and counterplays. Stamford had very quick backs who several times simply darted by the Haskell defense.

The Indians open their quest for a district championship against the Paducah Dragons at Haskell at 7:30 Friday. Paducah is rebuilding this year. However, they do have good speed in their backfield. Paducah has a new head coach, Judd Parker, former asst. coach at Stamford. The conference race is shaping up as a horse race between 3 and possibly 4 teams. The Indians are expected to be right in the thick of the fight, but need all the encouragement and fan support they can get. Hopefully everyone can turn out for the game Friday night and the pep rally at 3:00 Friday afternoon.

Last Friday night the Indians received the kickoff but fumbled it away to Stamford starting the trend of the evening. However, the Haskell defense stiffened and held on downs. The Indians then took the ball and ripped for 3 1st downs before being forced to punt. This drive was stopped by a fumble. However, the Indians again played tough on defense, stopped the Bulldogs and forced a punt. Then on the first play of the next series Kelvin Marshall swept left end behind a wave of excellent blocks, outran the Stamford secondary for a 55 yd. touchdown. Gary Mc Adams kicked the extra point which made the score 7 to 0 at the quarter.

The Bulldogs then took the ball and marched over 80 yards to score and tie the score. On the 1st play after the kick-off, Kelvin Marshall swept right end for 55 yds. and another touchdown. The PAT was blocked; score 13 to 7 Haskell. However, Stamford came back, sustained another drive and scored again tying the score 13-13. The Indians then lost the ball on a fumble and were forced to make a goal line stand as the half ended.

The Indians started the 3rd quarter with a fumble; but the

defense stiffened and held. The Indians then sustained a nice drive with Archie Crim making several tough runs to march downfield and score. Gary McAdams sneaked over the goal line, score: 20-13. The next Haskell possession ended with still another fumble. The Indian defense was again successful as the Bulldogs fumbled. The Indians started a short drive, took a clipping penalty, and then fumbled the ball deep in their own territory. The Bulldogs scored on the following drive and a two-point conversion put Stamford ahead, 21-20. Haskell's next possession ended with a pass-interception, which Stamford converted into another TD and the good extra point made the score 28 to 20.

However, the Indians were not finished as they moved the ball over 70 yds. in less than 2 minutes mostly on McAdams' passes. Unfortunately, they were forced to use all their time-outs and when the clock ran out, the Indians were trying to get off a 1st play from the Stamford 2-yard line. It was not to be.

The Indians did not play

their usual hard hitting, sure tackling game and were hampered all night by turnovers—6 of them, but the Indians kept coming back, overcoming hardships all evening and showed some fine character which could stand them in good stead for opening conference play next week.

Outstanding Indian on offense was Kelvin Marshall, TB, with 158 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Outstanding Indian on defense was Vonnie Hise.

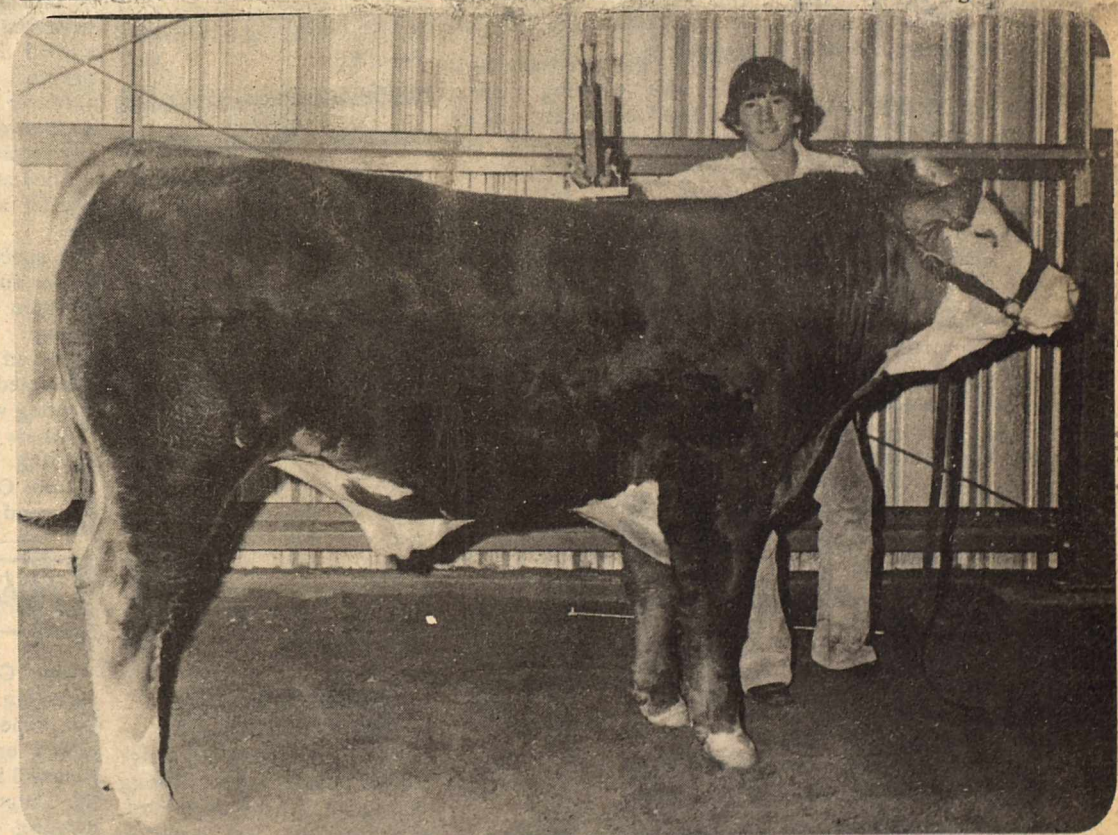

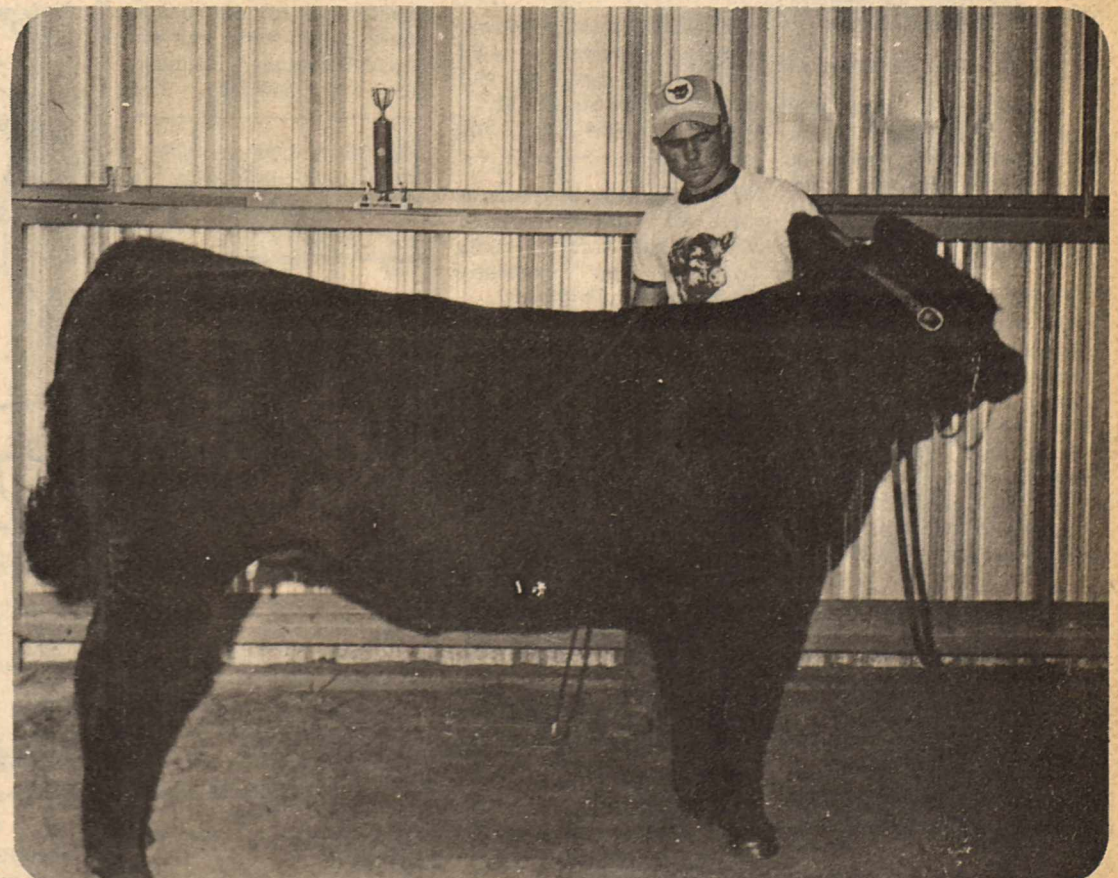

**Mental Retardation**

Editor— This is one of a series of articles about Mental Retardation prepared by Mrs. Eugene Cochran and the Public Education Committee of the Texas Association for Retarded Citizens.

**"How To Provide For Their Future" Diagnostic Evaluation—The Base For Planning**

A thorough diagnostic evaluation to determine accurately the condition, degree of retardation and capability for self-management is as important in planning for the future as it is for guiding the course of his present life. It will enable you to clarify his present and future potential under the laws of the state in which you reside or own real property.

There are substantial variations in the laws of different states pertaining to the procedure and showing to establish mental competence. A legal declaration of incompetence carries severe civil disabilities for the individual so classified. However, such a step may be indicated where the degree of retardation is severe, and medical and psychological evaluations support the need. **Minority vs. Adulthood**—While a minor—under 18 years of age in most states—a retarded child enjoys the protection of laws safeguarding all children. If a retarded child is an orphan, the juvenile, probate or other appropriate court will step in to insure proper care for him and to protect his property rights. Once majority is achieved, however, the law assumes that he is capable of managing his own affairs independently UNLESS it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that he is "mentally incompetent" to do so.

In the case of a retarded adult who does not have funds or property and who lives with his family, the question of establishing mental incompetence may not come up immediately. It may arise, however, if he survives his parents and is incapable of managing his property or caring for himself. **Need for Professional Counsel-Planning** should be done only after consultation with a competent attorney. He will be able to help you arrange proper legal safeguards and suggest alternative plans for the future care and management of your retarded child. However, since the type of plan he proposes may depend on the degree to which the child can care for his own needs, it is important that he be given medical and psychological information on the degree of mental retardation of your child. Therefore, it would be wise for you to have the Social Worker, Physician or Psychiatrist familiar with your child consult with your attorney.

If it seems possible that your child may require residential care, either now or at some future time, you should confer with an official of your state mental retardation program. You will thus be able to learn what facilities are presently available and what new facilities and programs are being planned for the future in this fast-changing field. These individuals should be contacted if there are relevant questions you need answered.
