MOST OF MY readers know that Ye Editor is the official weather recorder in Friona, which also serves as Parmer County's weather station.

Although I have only been the National Weather Service recorder for the past five years, I have always had an abiding interest in the weather, which probably stems from being raised on a farm in this area, and then living in this agricultural community just cemented the interest.

We have had some beautiful winter weather--it has almost forgotten to be winter for the most part; the only drawback being the fact that we're getting 'way overdue for some moisture.

But did you know that the all-time national high temperature for the month of January hit 92 degrees on January 31, 1911 in Weatherford and Cloud Chief, Oklahoma?

On the other side of the coin, the mercury fell to 47 degrees below zero at Washta, Iowa on January 12, 1912. That's a swing of 139 degrees in the same month of the year in states not too terribly far apart.

The record low temperature for the continental United States was minus 70 (that's actual temperature, not wind chill!) at Rogers Pass, Montana, on January 21, 1954.

Talk about not knowing how to dress: On a day in January, 1943, the temperature in Spearfish, South Dakota rose 49 degrees, from -4 to 45 in a two-minute period. The mercury later fell 58 degrees in 27 minutes, from 54 degrees to -4.

We think that we can have a lot of wind in the Texas Panhandle--and we can. But on January 17-18 in Anchorage, Alaska, wind gusts of over 100 miles per hour were logged. Several homes were destroyed. The wind chill factor was not given, but we suppose it had to be over 100 degrees below zero.

The Dallas-Fort Worth area doesn't get much snow and ice, but when it does, the people there just about go crazy when they get out in their cars. They're just not used to driving in such conditions. The all-time record snowfall for the D-FW metroplex was a 12.1-inch recording on January 12, 1964.

In 1978, Ohio was hit by its worst blizzard of the century, with winds over 100 miles per hour which piled a foot of snow into drifts of up to 25 feet. Fifty-one people died. Temperatures fell to zero. Drifts measured 50 feet high in Michigan, where 120,000 vehicles were abandoned.

On January 28, 1887, at Fort Keogh, Montana, snowflakes "larger than milkpans" were reported. They measured eight inches thick, and made patches all over the fields within an area of several square miles.

And they say it never rains in Southern California! The state's 24-hour precipitation record was set when Hoegees Camp in the San Gabriel Mountains measured 26.12 inches. We have a lot of calendar years (in fact, most) with less rain.

A meteor of remarkable brilliance was observed in January, 1883 in parts of the Midwest and Ohio Valley. Its trail remained visible for 20 to 30 minutes.

A wall of water up to 40 feet tall rushed across parts of the Society Islands in the South Pacific in 1903, killing 1,000 people.

Washington D.C.'s largest snow hit in 1922, dumping 28 inches. A theatre collapsed, and 100 people died.

Well, we need some moisture in Parmer County, but we'd be extremely satisfied with something in between what we've been having (nothing), and some of these reports.

Have a good 1994, and here's hoping the rest of it contains more moisture than we've seen during the past month.

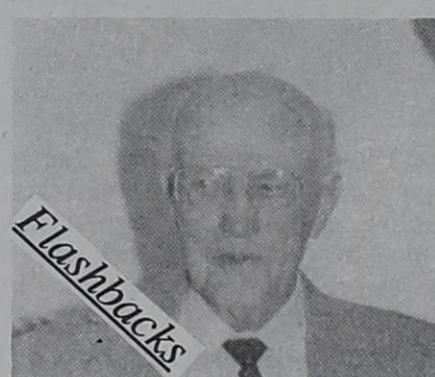
## Grandparents' Brag Page Is Set For Valentine Issue

## Lawrence Widner Is Recognized At BJHS

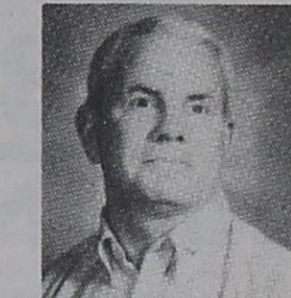

LAWRENCE WIDNER

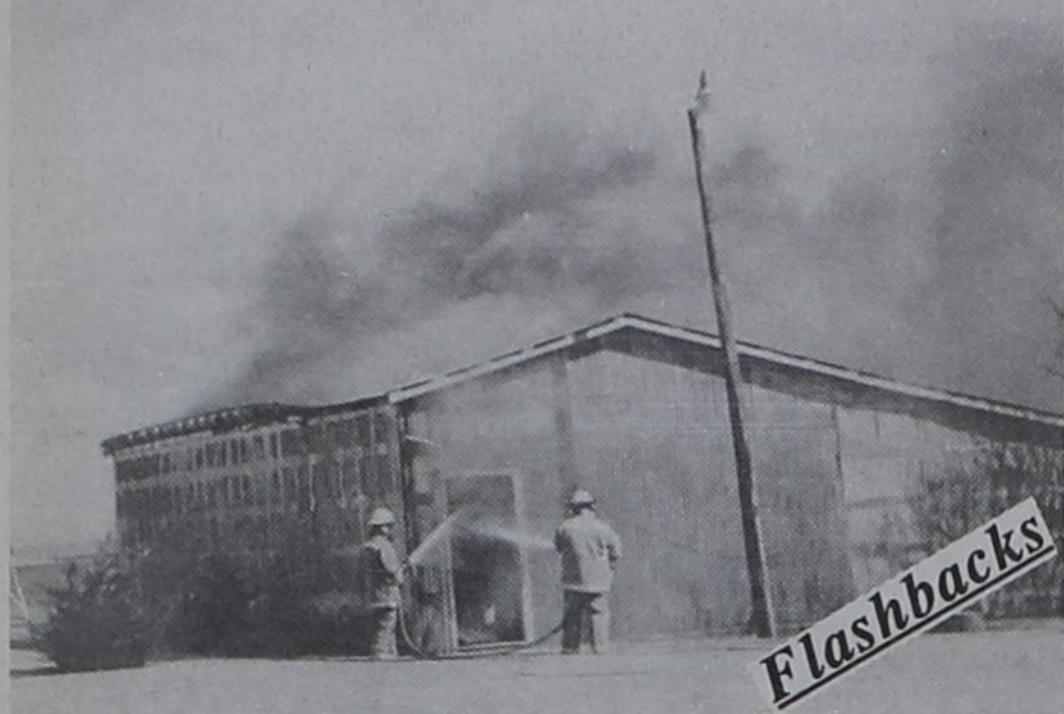
teaches second grade in Bovina. They have three children: Amber, Trey and Christy.

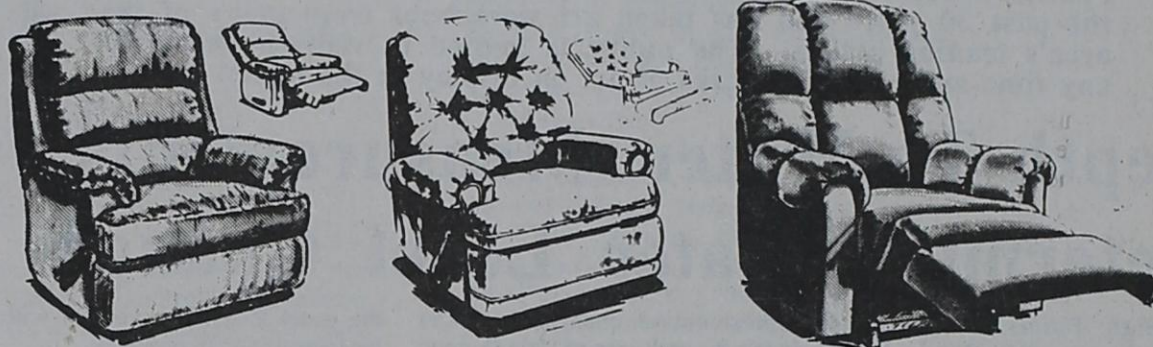

## Depth-To-Water Measurements Determine Water Level Changes

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Technical Division staff are making annual depth-to-water measurements to determine the effect of 1993 pumpage on ground water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer within the 15-county Water District service area.

Measurements are taken in more than 1,100 privately-owned wells in the District's observation well network. These wells are spaced at a density of about one well per nine square miles throughout the District.

"We have established observation well sites for the newly-annexed portions of Cochran and Lynn counties," says Don McReynolds, technical division director. "In the portion of Hale County added to the Water District in August, we plan to measure depths-to-water in wells currently included in the State of Texas ground water monitoring program."

In future years, some of these wells will be dropped and new wells added as efforts are made to build the best program possible to reflect

representative changes in water levels for each area of Hale County.

Water District staff take the measurements by lowering a steel tape to the depth of the current static water level inside the observation well. The lower ten to fifteen feet of the tape is coated with blue carpenter's chalk. When the chalked tape comes in contact with the ground water, it turns a darker shade of blue. This section of wetted tape is subtracted from the total length of tape lowered into the well to determine the depth-to-water from land surface.

After the depth-to-water level measurement is taken, the data is recorded and a vinyl sticker showing the well number, the depth-to-water measurement, and the date the well was measured is affixed to equipment at the well site.

Water District staff will begin making water level measurements in the northern portion of the District and will work their way south. Blue and white District vehicles are easily identified, and personnel will be glad to discuss

the water level measurement with landowners and/or operators.

After the observation wells are measured each year, the data collected is compared with that of previous years to determine any changes in the ground water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer. This data is used to construct maps showing changes in water levels and the saturated thickness of the aquifer within the Water District.

Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the District are traditionally published in the April issue of the Water District's monthly newsletter, *The Cross Section*. Along with the maps, tables listing the observation wells in each county and the depth-to-water measurements for one year (1993 to 1994), five year (1989 to 1994) and ten year intervals (1984 to 1994) will also be printed.

# SWPS Files Protest To CSW Application

Southwestern Public Service Company (NYSE: SPS) has filed a protest to Central and South West Corporation's attempt to force transmission access through SPS under Section 211 of the Federal Power Act.

SPS is responding to a CSW request filed with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission as part of CSW's effort to acquire the bankrupt El Paso Electric Company.

"Our greatest concern is that CSW will get this application through the regulatory process before the utility industry, the relevant state and federal regulatory bodies, and the EPE region realize all of the anti-competitive consequences," said SPS chairman Bill D. Helton. "The issue is much broader than just the EPE bankruptcy."

CSW is a large utility holding company based in Dallas, Texas. On December 7 it received approval from a federal bankruptcy court for its plan of reorganization for EPE, and now must seek state and federal regulatory approval. Federal law requires that the systems of a utility holding company be interconnected. CSW is not interconnected with EPE.

American Free Trade Agreement is being implemented. It also would limit electric power competition in much of the southwestern United States;

"Tie up critical transmission capacity and thereby severely limit competition specifically from SPS, which is one of the lowest-cost producers in the region;

"Jeopardize reliable electric service to SPS's existing customers, by failing to provide adequate compensation for system modifications. SPS's actual experience and preliminary technical studies show there are substantial system constraints to CSW's proposal. Proper system modifications to ensure reliability could cost SPS's customers millions of dollars--CSW itself initially estimated that modifications would cost \$40 million.

"This case will affect the long-term survival of smaller, low-cost utilities like SPS and the future of meaningful competition in the electric power industry," Helton said.

"Section 211 of the Federal Power Act was intended to encourage competition by increasing access to utility

transmission lines," Helton said. "The CSW proposal would have the effect of limiting competition."

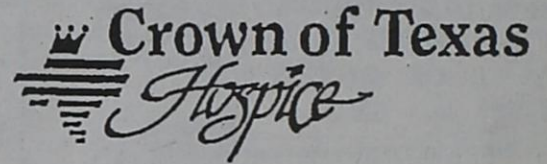
"For CSW, we are the competition," Helton said. "We are the ones who can provide lower prices--if we're not cut off from the market."

Based on these unresolved issues, and the broad general scope of the effect this wheeling would have on the entire region, SPS requests that FERC either dismiss the CSW application--or schedule an evidentiary hearing and combine it with CSW's merger application, since many issues overlap. These broad issues cannot be resolved through a "technical conference" as requested by CSW. A technical conference would address only the engineering issues, while ignoring issues related to competition and the public interest.

Southwestern Public Service Company primarily provides electric service in a 52,000-square-mile area comprising much of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas. Corporate headquarters are in Amarillo, Texas.

- 1-1/2 cups cold water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup ice water
- 1/3 cup vinegar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 cup Miracle Whip
- 1-1/2 cups finely shredded cabbage
- 1-1/2 cups finely chopped celery
- 1 cup grated carrot
- 1/2 cup diced green pepper
- 2 diced pimientos

Sprinkle gelatin on cold water in sauce pan. Stir constantly over low heat about 3 minutes or until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat. Stir in sugar and salt. Then add ice water. Blend vinegar and lemon juice into Miracle Whip, then blend into the gelatin mixture. Chill until partially jelled then add remaining ingredients. Complete chilling and unmold onto serving platter. Serves six.

Tangy "Vegetable Salad" comes from the collection of Lunell

Horton, who published a very fine cookbook a few years ago.

- Mix and bring to boil:
- 3/4 cup apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup Mazola
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper

Cool mixture. Chop finely:  
1 cup green pepper  
1 cup celery  
10 ounces Del Monte white whole kernel corn

- 1 small jar pimientos
- 1 can French green beans
- 8 fresh onions with tops

Put first mixture over second mixture and let set overnight. Drain before serving.

Lunell says, "The recipe really isn't mine. I borrowed it from my sister, Gay Ann Cranfill."

A recipe, which Luann Hough uses often is very tasty and may be served any time but is especially good for a noon luncheon, is called "Simply Chicken Salad."

Mix together:  
2 cups cooked chicken, which has been cubed

- 1 cup grated American cheese
- 1/2 cup blanched almonds
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 large can crushed pineapple, which has been drained
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce
- 1/2 cup salad dressing
- 1 small jar pimientos

Serve as individual salads or in a salad bowl, which has been lined with lettuce leaves.

If your main dish is rather weak and needs a boost, you might like to try Pat Fleming's recipe for "Nancy's Hot Potato Salad." You will need:

- Six medium size potatoes, which have been cooked with the jackets on
- 1 pint salad dressing
- 1/2 cup Carnation milk
- 1/4 cup sweet pickle juice
- 2 tablespoons Durkee's dressing
- 1 teaspoon liquid sweetener
- 1/2 teaspoon celery salt

- 1/2 teaspoon salad herbs
  - 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- Mix ingredients, except potatoes, well. Peel and dice the potatoes as quickly as possible as they must be hot to absorb the dressing. Also, dice three hard cooked eggs while the dressing is hot. Then add diced celery, pickles and onions to suit your taste. Let set at room temperature two hours before chilling or serve warm.

A quick and easy salad, which Wyona Clark of the Hub community enjoys serving when she has guests or when it is just a family meal is called "Very Easy-Very Good Salad."

- 1 can Eagle Brand milk
  - 1 can cherry pie filling
  - 1 can coconut
  - 1 cup miniature marshmallows
  - 1 cup pecans
  - Juice of one lemon
  - 1 large carton Cool Whip
- Mix all ingredients except Cool Whip, which is folded in gently just before serving.

One of Peggy Monroe's favorite Jello salads is "Lime Jello Salad."

- 1 package lime Jello
- 1 cup water
- 12 large marshmallows
- 1 three ounce package cream cheese

Combine in saucepan and cook over low heat until marshmallows and cream cheese are melted. Cool mixture, then add:

- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
  - 1 small can crushed pineapple, which has been drained
  - 1 carton whipping cream
  - Pecans, if desired
- Cool until firmly set.

The following recipes are from the collections of present or former residents of Bovina:

- Here is Anne Corn's "Famous Pumpkin Cake" recipe. Combine:
  - 3 cups sifted flour
  - 3 cups sugar
  - 2 teaspoons cinnamon
  - 2 teaspoons soda
  - 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- Add:

- 1 cup salad oil
  - 2 cups canned pumpkin
  - 1/4 cup sour cream
  - 1-1/2 teaspoons butter flavoring
  - 4 eggs at room temperature
  - 2 teaspoons vanilla
- Beat three minutes, then combine:

- 1 cup chopped walnuts
  - 1 cup raisins
  - 1/3 cup sifted flour
- Mix well, then fold with first mixture.

Use a tube or bundt pan, which has been greased and floured, for baking. Bake 1 hour in 350 degree oven.

Lillian Warren's favorite recipe is for "Potato Cake." Combine:

- 1 cup Crisco
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 1 cup potatoes, prepared for eating
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 2 cups flour
  - 1/2 cup Hershey's cocoa
  - 4 eggs
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Spices to suit your taste

Cream Crisco and sugar together. Mix in eggs and potatoes. Combine dry ingredients. Mix with first mixture well. Add vanilla and blend in.

Bake in tube pan in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes, then at 325 degrees for an additional 15 minutes. Test for doneness with toothpick. Glaze or frost cake.

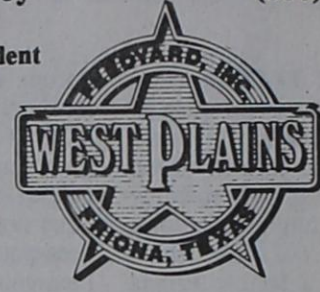

## Fire Department Receives Truck

The Rhea-Hollene Volunteer Fire Department received a truck to pull their tanker trailer from Texas Forest Service on December 15, 1993.

The truck was acquired at no charge to the Department by applying to Texas Forest Service under the Federal Excess Property Program. Equipment acquired under this program is designated for fire control use.

A fire department is responsible to insure and maintain the equipment under contract with Texas Forest Service. Title to the equipment remains as federal property during use by the department.

The truck received is a 6x6, five ton, Kaiser-Jeep 1969 year model, in very good condition.

The Rhea-Hollene Volunteer Fire Department has received much help from Texas Forest Service programs since their start in

January, 1992. They have received a 5,000 gallon tanker, a 1977 Dodge 4x4 pickup, cost share of \$1,431.33 for a pump unit for the pickup and cost share of \$241.81 for dry hydrants.

They have also purchased new bunker gear at wholesale prices under the Fire Safe Fund program. Texas Forest Service programs helped build Rhea-Hollene Fire Department by giving them needed equipment and saving money.

Texas Forest Service funding has been cut by the last two Texas legislatures and Congress.

"T.F.S. can't help all fire departments with needed equipment when funds are continued to be cut. When this happens, costs for needed equipment has to come from other local sources," says Glen Schueler, fire chief.

"Help continue this program for fire departments by Texas Forest Service by calling or writing your local, state, or Washington Representative and Congressmen."

The department has also been awarded an EMS Local Projects Grant for \$683.00 to purchase first response medical supplies, oxygen inhalator unit and bag resuscitators.

This grant will cover the period of September 1, 1993 through August 31, 1994. A contract that details the performance required is being developed. The fire department will be contacted by John Rinard, EMS System Development, program administrator, with additional details. The costs incurred prior to November 15, 1993, cannot be reimbursed.

The award is from the Texas Department of Health.
