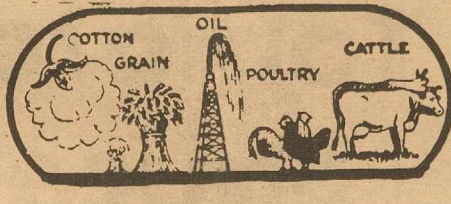

## Pesticide Certification Set For Monday, May 16

Haskell County producers are reminded that certain pesticides will be restricted and available for use legally only by or under the supervision of certified applicators. The classification of certain pesticides as restricted-use pesticides and the requirement for certification are each requirements of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA), as amended, which is scheduled to be fully implemented on October 21, 1977. The law, administered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), was to have been fully implemented in 1976; however, a 1975 amendment delayed the full implementation.

classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person. The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture provides three options for certification of private applicators to include: 1. Completion of an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group. 2. Submission of a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following review of self-study material, and 3. For emergency situa-

tions, a single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification available through the Texas Department of Agriculture. A training program has been set up so Haskell County residences can be certified as a private applicator for the use of pesticides. The program will be conducted at the Haskell National Bank Meeting Room Monday, May 16th, 9:00 a.m. The program will require 3 1/2 hours. The Community Room will only comfortably set 100 people if you wish to attend as a means to be certified, please call my office at 864-2658 to pre-register. We will accept the first hundred on a first come first serve basis. If you wish to choose the

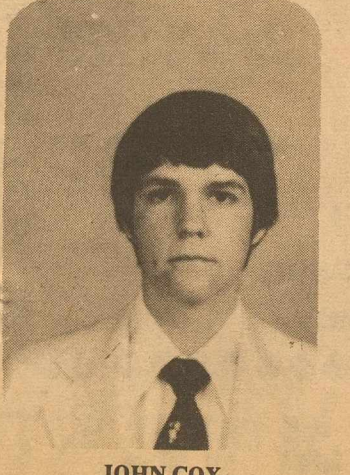

The Texas Pesticide Control Act although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law. The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is

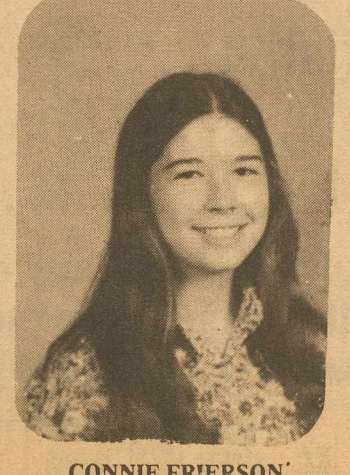
## Two Haskell Students Compete At State

## Soil Stewardship Week Scheduled

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water, and other natural resources, will be May 15-22 this year, Jimlee Baucum, Anson, and L. D. Offutt, Munday, Chairmen of the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Conservation Districts, announced today. "This year's theme, "When We Care", will help each to examine his own motives and actions in the conservation of God's manifold gifts," said Mr. Baucum. Among the churches in the two Districts, it is expected most are scheduling special Soil Stewardship services. "We hope," said Mr. Offutt, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, millions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and proper care of the Lord's earth. The California Creek District is furnishing bulletin inserts to the churches that wish to use them. The Wichita-Brazos District has

furnished booklets on suggested sermon topics to the ministers of churches in that district. This is the 23rd consecutive year that the National Association of Conservation Districts, along with almost 3,000 local Districts throughout the nation, has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week. The custom of setting aside special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France, when French peasants prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

A Food Fair filled with programs, exhibits, lots of people and activities will be held today, Thursday, May 12th at the Haskell County Fair Grounds.

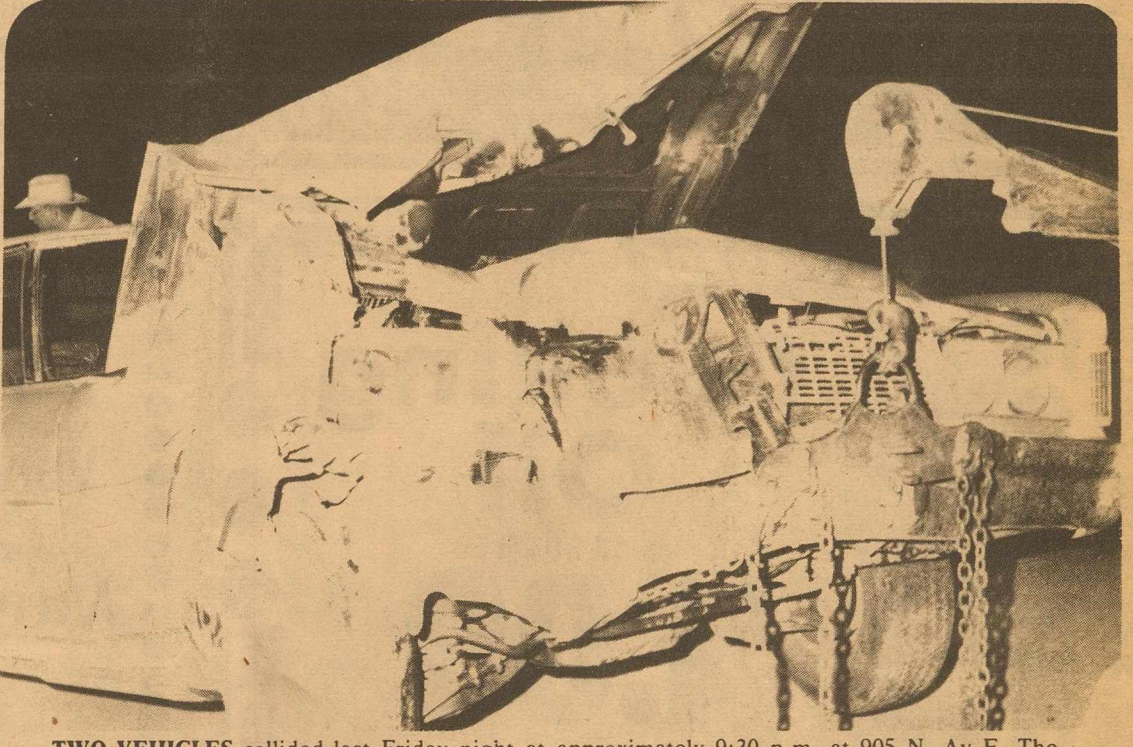

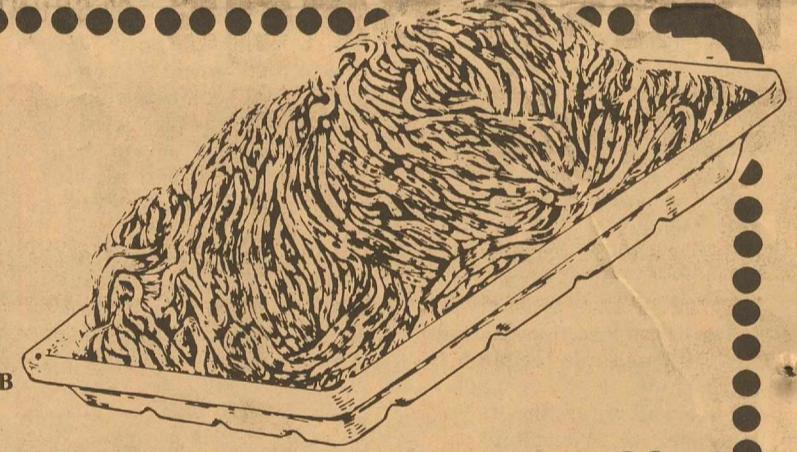

self study option as an alternative to be certified you must complete and submit a questionnaire to the Department of Agriculture following a review of self study material which is available at the County Agent's Office.

The single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification will be available as restricted-use pesticides are marketed.

The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act is scheduled for October 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted-use pesticides.

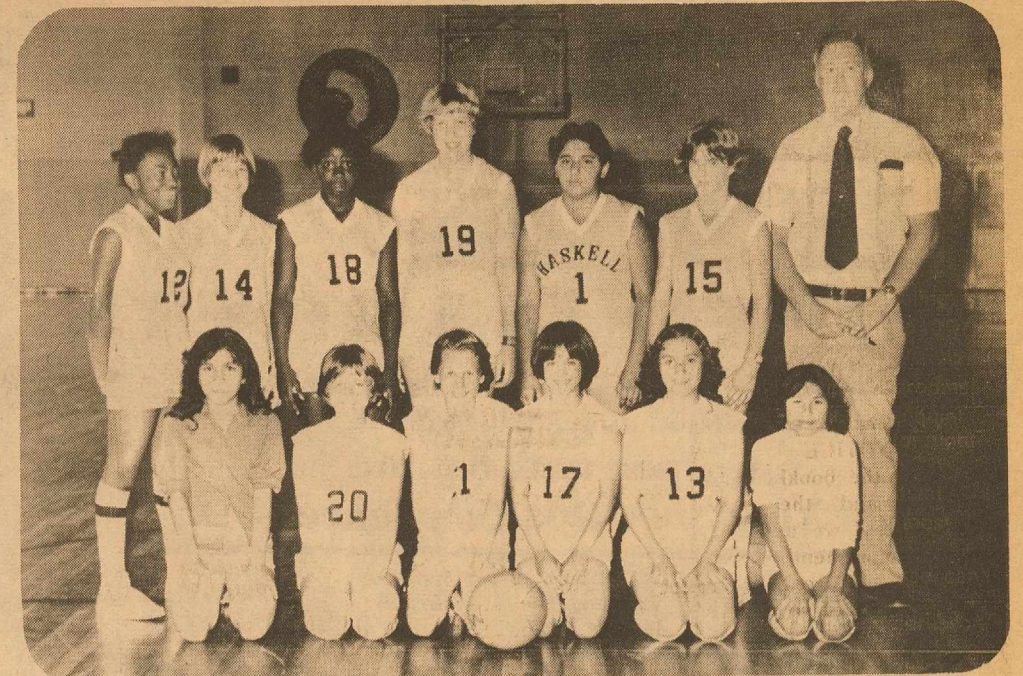

Fortunately, there are still millions among us who believe in the goodness of the land, who oppose and resent its waste, and who subscribe without question to the Biblical instruction that we should press it and keep it. These are the men and women, and young people too, who speak up for conservation of the soil, who denounce its misuse, and who grasp each opportunity to elevate the priority of the Lord's fruitful earth.

our own sake, for the neighbor's sake, and for the sake of generations to come."

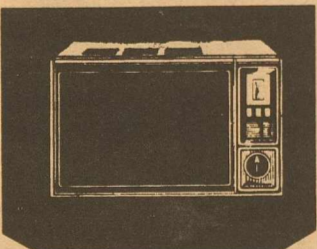

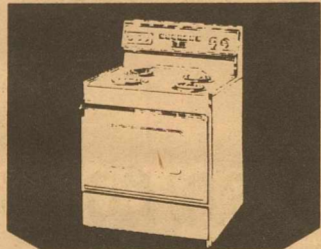

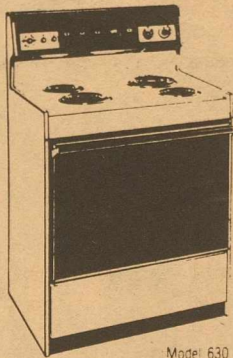

## RECOGNITION BANQUET

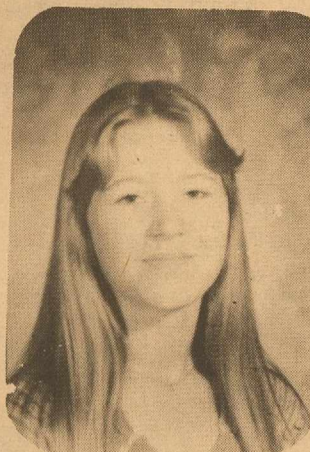

### Old Glory To Honor Maxine Klump

Sunday, May 15th, will be Maxine Klump Day in Old Glory. All patrons of the community, past and present, students and ex-students, teachers, relatives and friends are invited to meet in the school cafeteria at 2 p.m. that day to honor this great lady who is retiring from the teaching profession this year.

Mrs. Klump came here 41 years ago and has spent 38 of those years in the Old Glory High School teaching English. Not only has she taught English in junior high through high school, but has fulfilled countless other duties, such as directing plays and speech activities, sponsoring classes, often acting as a counselor in a school too small for a regular guidance program, and many others.

She was Maxine Wheeler when she came here. She grew up and attended school in Stamford, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wheeler. She received her

B.A. Degree from Abilene Christian College in May 1936 and that fall came to Old Glory to teach in her first and only school. She married Cecil Klump two years later and they settled down in a new little home on his parents farm about two miles southeast of town.

Recalling her first year at Old Glory, she remembers that was the year the school house burned on December 13th, and from then until the end of the term, students and teachers were found having school in odd places. She and her English classes shared an old one room church building with several others. Sheets were draped for partitions, and they were not exactly sound proof besides being filled with peep holes to further distract the students. In those years Old Glory's classes were packed with students. Five buses went out every morning and came back filled to capacity.

During World War II she took three years leave to accompany her husband while

he was serving in the U. S. Air Force. Once the war was over, she came back to resume her teaching duties in the fall of 1946.

She knows most of her students from the time they are only a few weeks old and keeps an active interest in them right on through college and as they go out to take their place in the world. Many are second generation students and she not only knows their strengths and weaknesses, but she remembers if their parents were so inclined before them. It is perhaps this genuine interest along with a never failing sense of humor, more than anything else, that has endeared her in the hearts of her students and the community.

In 1960, Mrs. Klump won the Valley Forge Freedom Foundation Award for exceptional work in behalf of teaching responsible citizenship and understanding of the American Way of Life.

She is a member of the Old Glory Church of Christ and the

Beta Chi Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma.
