issioners View Seal Coating

Members of the Commissioners Court of Haskell County met Tuesday in the County Courthouse with all members present.

Members of the court studied price estimates for an underground lawn sprinkler system for the court house and when the estimates ranged from \$3,000.00 to over \$5,000. 00, members of the Court agreed to look at the possibility of placing pumps in two existing wells and using part time help in watering the lawn. The discussion arose when problems with vandalism made it impractical to leave unattended water hoses and sprinklers at night. The estimates were higher than

expected by the court and alternatives are being sought. The tax rate for 1978 was also discussed and members of the court tentatively agreed to set the tax rate at .75 per one-hundred dollar valuation pending final approval of the

budget. Commissioners voted to close courthouse offices July

4, in observance of Independance Day. Dan Shipley, engineer re-

presenting the West Central Texas Council of Governments, met with the members of the court by request to examine the seal coating project which was underway on the Jim Strain Road in Prec. 3.

Members of the court were not satisfied with the project and while meeting with the contractor, discussed several of the problems which have been encountered. The contractor voiced a desire to be released from the contract after satisfactory completion of the work already underway. Members of the court agreed to consider the request if submitted in writing. The contractor stated that the present project should be completed Wednesday.

City Council **Holds Meeting**

Members of the Haskell City Council met in regular session Tuesday night in the Haskell City Hall with Mayor Belton Duncan presiding and all members present.

Following the call to order the invocation was given by Councilman Loraine Johnson. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and appr-

Billy Jacob representing Yeatts and Decker, met with the council to report on the construction of the new sewer plant. Jacob stated that the plant was over 50 per cent completed and construction He informed members of the council that since a portion of the funds used in constructing the plant are Federal grants, that the method of charging for sewer usage must be changed. He presented a proposed ordinance to the council which will base sewer rates on a portion of the water consumed. The ordinance must be approved by Federal agencies before the council can adopt it and further information will be presented as it becomes available.

Hershall Moore, of Austin, met with the council and entered into contract with the City on behalf of his law firm and the colleciton of delinqu-

ent taxes. Christene Green also met with the council to discuss water, sewer and garbage rates and collection methods at the Oates Drug Store building. She plans to open Potpourri Fashions there soon. The new business will be a beauty shop. Councilman Bob Philpot, water commissioner, agreed to meet at the building to attempt to solve problems encountered.

Members of the Council also agreed to pay raises for city employees. The raises were based on duties performed and the individual percentages varied but amounted to an average of approximately 6 per cent.

Church of Christ Sets Annual Singing School

Students will begin arriving soon for the twelfth annual Haskell Singing School to be held June 4-15th. The school, which is under the oversight of the elders of the Haskell Church of Christ, Haskell. Texas, is anticipating a record enrollment. Last year's enrollment was one of the largest with approximately 150 students. Young people from all sections of the country participate regularly in the school. States represented last year were: Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and California. Students have come from as far away as New Hampshire and Virginia to attend the well-known school.

Holland Boring, Sr. of Bryan will direct this session of the school. He has assumed this responsibility sinced the school's beginning. Other instructors will be: Holland Boring, Jr., minister, Grand Prairie; Bob Connell, minister from Abilene; Tom Chapin, minister from Amarillo and Bobby Simpson of Haskell.

A unique feature of the Haskell Singing School is that all students are housed with local Christian families. In these individual homes they eat their morning and evening meals, rest, prepare for the following day's classes, help with assigned chores and participate in nightly devotionals. In essence, for a two-week period, they become a part of another Christian family whom they learn to love, made up of "fosterparents" and other young people. It is a concept that has proven most successful in the

ten year history of the school. Anyone 10 years of age and older is invited to attend. The purpose of the school is to improve congregational singing by training all Christians interested. Special emphasis is given to song leading. There are additional courses, however, in song reading, rudiments, song writing, etc. The school is for men and women, boys and girls. Cost of

Certification of Crops Required

The Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has recently received notice that all acreages of cotton, wheat, barley, grain sorghum, and corn must be certified by July 15. (THIS APPLIES TO ALL FARMS REGARDLESS OF WHETHER OR NOT THE FARM HAS AN ALLOT-MENT). The reason for this certification of all crops is that the Senate and House of Representatives have proposed farm bills which provide that if a set-aside is put into effect for 1978, the acreage required to be set-aside, as a condition of eligibility for program benefits, may be based on a percentage of the acreage planted for harvest in 1977. Failure to certify could result in the farm being ineligible for program benefits in 1978. ASCS reminds producers that the use of this acreage will depend on the farm program that is finally approved for 1978, and if a

set-aside is put into effect. Reliable sources have informed local ASCS offices that regardless of the program approved, this 1977 acreage will not be used for the purpose of establishing allotments.

Producers are urged to come in to their local County ASCS Office and certify all crops planted for 1977. Each field has to be certified individually and producers are asked to certify as soon as possible in order to avoid the last minute waiting lines.

The Haskell County ASCS Office will be closed all day Monday, July 4, 1977, in observance of the Independence Day Holiday.

TDA To Offer **Pesticide Test**

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will offer testing for area commercial pesticide applicators beginning at 8:30 a.m., June 30, in Haskell.

"The pesticide tests will be conducted following training sessions being offered June 28-29 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown explained. Both the training sessions and testing will be conducted at the Haskell National Bank's Community Center.


Testing, coordinated by TDA entomologists, will be provided for four categories:1) general, 2) fruit, nut and vegetable, 3) weed and brush control, and 4) field crop pest control. Applicators wishing to take the tests may sign up during the training session and pay their fees at that time. While there is no charge for the general test, a \$10 fee will be assessed for each other

Individuals who pass the tests will then be eligible to make application for licensing as a commercial or non-commercial applicator of restricted-

use pesticides. By Oct. 21. 1977, a license will be required for purchasing and using restricted pesticides to be identified by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). By the October deadline, the EPA plans to have categorized some 1,400 plesticide ingredients for either restricted or non-restrict-

Screwworm Case Confirm

Mr. Russell Green of the Screwworm Eradication Program of Texas has reported to Max Stapleton, County Extension Agent that a screwworm egg mass has been verified by the USDA Animal Health Inspection Service at Mission, Texas. The speciman was taken from a baby calf June 13th by the Brasdo Cattle Co., nine miles northeast of Stam-

ford in the Paint Creek Community. Mr. Green urges all livestock producers to be on the alert and collect all samples of worms found and send in to Mission, Texas.

Speciman bottles can be picked up at the County Agent's Office.

The Fourth-of-July holiday period was the deadliest 3-day weekend of last year. Fiftyfive traffic related deaths were recorded in Texas. Statistics also show July to be the heaviest traveled month of

Mindful of the long weekend and increased travel. Governor Dolph Briscoe asked Texans to rally to face the problem of traffic accidents. Said Briscoe, "Texans pride themselves on their sense of individual responsibility. If they are properly informed of a problem, it is my conviction they will respond positively and quickly. The fatality rate on our streets and highways during the Fourth-of-July holiday must be considered a critical problem facing all Texans. Any real solution depends on each of us taking full responsibility for his own behavior behind the wheel," said the Governor.

Briscoe's Traffic Safety Representative, Ken Nevil, said if motorists would not rush they would have a much better chance of survival as they travel. "Interstate accidents have increased by 45, percent over last year. This is due to several factors includ-

ing increased travel, disregard for speed limits, heavy alcohol use and the like. Frequently, drivers concentrate on their holiday fun rather than the heavy responsibility of maneuvering an automobile. As drivers, we must anticipate the unexpected and be prepared to react. We must rely upon good judgement and skills. But, we must be compassionate in our driving. The basic rules are: leave early enough for trips, limit the use of alcohol, maintain moderate speed and keep totally alert to potential traffice hazards. The traffic accident problem requires everyone's help, collectively and individually.





The move to the suburbs has created quite a few unexpected problems for many home owners, and one with public health implications is the widespread use of septic tanks.

To their dismay, says the Texas Department of Health Resources, many residents have discovered that their soil won't soak up all the effluent being generated in their homes. This leads to the surfacing of septic tank effluent, which results in odorous standing water and breeding places for flies and mosquitoes. It also permits direct contact with diseasecarrying water by humans and

New standards for construction of private sewage facilities are being developed by the Department of Health Resources. A hearing is scheduled on the proposed standards on July 7 at 10 a.m. at the Texas Department of Health Resources, 1100 W. 49th St., in Austin.

Sherman W. Hart, P.E., Chief of the Plans and Specifications Branch of the Division of Wastewater Technology and Surveillance, says private sewage systems are usually single-owner types. 'In addition to residential systems, however," said Hart, "these can also include a motel, laundry, service station, or other commercial establishment system.'

With very few exception, the typical private sewage system is composed of a septic tank followed by a soil absorption system for the effluent. Normally, this is what the home owner has,' said Hart.

Hart said approximately 20 percent of the Texas population uses septic tanks, and about 95 percent of the private systems use the absorption system with lateral lines leading from the septic tank.

The residents of subdivisions, lake developments and individuals residing in the smaller towns and cities-as well as other rural residentsuse septic tank systems, says

Some of the areas where private sewage facilities are constructed are just not Hart. Under ideal conditions, a septic tank system should be located where soils have good permeability, such as sandy loam and sandy clay. "However," he said, "we're finding that many of the private Williams, and Mrs. Fuller, facilities are installed in rocky areas with no permeability, or in tight clay soils which won't allow passage of water."

"Where you have many residents and business establishments moving into subdivisions or other areas outside cities which have ordinances governing the regulation of private sewage facilities, problems have arisen with developers marketing small lots and contractors providing facilities which do not meet recommended standards. This has resulted in a variety of problems," said Hart.

Home owners find themselves with an individual disposal system which doesn't work, he said. In some cases, residents of these residential areas have had to construct and operate a central, or public, collection system and treatment plant at considerable costs, or tie in with nearly municipal systems, he said, to eliminate

public health nuisances. The new standards offer alternatives to conventional septic tank design, including eliminating wastewater by evaporation and plant transpiration. "This method will work very well in the drier areas of the state." said Hart. Where sufficient land area is available, an inoperative absorptive system can be changed to an evaporative system which has a much better chance of functioning proper-

ly, he said. The construction standards are intended to supply additional information to home owners, home builders and local and state public health authorities in order to upgrade the minimum acceptable standards for private sewage facilities installed in the state and to try to eliminate some of the problems.
