The Texas legislature recently passed Senate Bill 1256 which will become effective August 29, 1977 and will change the present uninsured motorist coverage (coverage U) on your family automobile policy to "Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist" at the date of your next renewal.

Present uninsured motorist coverage provides 10/20 (\$10,000 per person/\$20,000 Per accident) bodily injury limits for the occupants of your car in the event that your

car is hit by an insured or an unknown (hit-and-run) driver. Bill 1256 makes the following modifications to the above outlined coverage: (1) An uninsured motorist coverage for property damage to the vehicle has been added subject to a \$250 deductible. (2) Limits of 10/20/5 (\$10,000

per person/\$20,000 per accident/\$5,000 property damage) must be offered on all policies written or renewed on or after August 29th whether or not you now have coverage U. In addition, increased limits of. the new "uninsured/underinsured" coverage will be available up to your present limit of bodily injury and property damage liability coverage. EXAMPLE: If you now have LIABILITY limits of 25/50/10, you have the option of buying any limits of uninsured/underinsured motorist protection from 10/20/5 up to 25/50/10. (3) Coverage U has been broadened to include an UNDERinsured motorists provision which applies when the amount of coverage under the liable party's bodily injury and property damage liability coverage is less than the limits of your coverage U. EXAMPLE: The other driver, who carries 10/20/5 liability limits, is legally liable in an accident with you. You carry 25/50 coverage U bodily injury limits. You sustain extensive injuries in excess of the other driver's \$10,000 liability limit. Your \$25,000 limit on cover-

age U will cover your injury costs for an additional \$15,000. When you receive your automobile insurance renewal notice, you will have three options: (1) you may reject coverage U (uninsured/underinsured motorist) completely, (2) You may reject the property damage section of coverage U, (3) You may accept Coverage U completely. Let me stress that unless you reject this coverage it will be automatically added to your policy at renewal. I hope this brief summary helps give you a clear understanding of the new Coverage U requirements. If you become confused or have any questions, the best thing to do is take your renewal notice to your local insurance agent. He will be happy to make any further explanation of coverage U and can give you advice on what

Significant changes are on the horizon for researchers working on agricultural projects. Underlying factor for these changes is the growing concensus among scientists that current research with its aims at yield increases through better fertilization and cultivation technique may be nearing its peak. In short, there is a growing feeling that we are reaching the stage of making a plant produce all that is possible. That's the reason for the change in direction. Scientists are now beginning to experiment on changes in the biological potential of plants. Basic changes in photosynthesis are being considered. Methods of limiting a plant's respiration are under study and the strange yield increases of some plants when exposed to carbon dioxide are being examined. In short, the new direction for research involves changing the plant itself in ways which could develop new and much
