



# Indians Open '77 Season Friday

The Haskell Indians will open the 1977-78 season this Friday night in Anson. Game time is 8 p.m.

The Tribe scrimmaged Archer City last Friday and scored five times. Head coach Don Flippin said that the coaches

thought the team had shown good improvement during the week since the first scrimmage with Spur. Flippin also said that Archer City was a little stronger than Spur and he was pleased that the Indian defense held them scoreless

and only allowed them across the 50 yard line a couple of times.

Johnny Yeary, starting wingback, received a broken bone in his hand during the scrimmage and will probably not be able to play for three to five weeks.

All other members of the team seem to be in good shape both physically and mentally and should be prepared for the season opener this Friday.

Scouting reports show that Anson has a big team with fair speed. The basic Anson offense is a Houston Veer and their defense is a five-four.

Wooten of Haskell, Texas with 95's. After two rounds of overtime-25 targets each-Wooten out-last May 24-24, 25-25.

## Wheat Variety Demonstration Results


Results of a Wheat variety demonstration were announced Tuesday by County Extension Agent Max Stapleton.

The demonstration was conducted on the farm of Donnie Bowman northeast of Weinert and south of Goree.

Nine varieties of wheat were planted December 1, 1976. There was good moisture at the time of planting and the varieties were planted in one acre plots. Forty-five pounds of anhydrous ammonia and forty pounds of 18-46-0 was put down at the time of planting.

Round-Up Chairman C.A. "Charlie" Morris reports 132 individuals from 79 Texas towns will seek livestock donations for the fall sales. The animals will be auction-

ed off with all proceeds going to help support the operations of WTRC facilities in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder.

The cattle sale is set for 1 p.m. Monday, Sept. 26, at Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction in Abilene; the horse sale is set for 1 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 1, at the Abilene Livestock Auction; and a special sale is planned for 1 p.m. Oct. 5, at the Coleman Livestock Auction.

WTRC is now in its 25th year of serving the handicapped of all ages.

WTRC Board President Harwell Barber states that the 1977 Round-Up needs to be the "best ever" if the Rehab Center is to keep pace with the increasing number of patients being admitted plus the fact of inflation which has resulted in an increased operational budget of \$1.4 million for the year.

The Twelfth Annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon Against Muscular Dystrophy will be broadcast in the Abilene area September 4-September 5.

Held to benefit the research and patient service programs of the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA), the marathon TV spectacular, originating from Las Vegas will be carried by a coast-to-coast "Love Network" of some 200 TV stations, and will also be seen in Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and Guam. In this area, the supershow will be broadcast by KTXS TV-Channel 12.

Once again this year members of the Haskell County Jaycees will answer phones in Haskell to take pledges for the Muscular Dystrophy drive. Local Jaycees will man the phones from 8 p.m. Sunday to 5 p.m. Monday and all local residents who wish to make a pledge are asked to call 864-2477.

The Jaycees will also have their annual Labor Day Rest Stop this weekend in front of the Chamber of Commerce office.

Last year the Telethon produced a record \$21.7-million for the national health agency's work. Ed McMahon will again serve as Jerry Lewis' anchorman.

Arthur Forrest, the show's producer-director, has been working closely with Jerry Lewis since March 31 on plans for the 1977 Telethon. Mr. Forrest said, "Jerry loves to invent new ways to make his fans part of the MDA family. I'm sure he has some

surprises up his sleeve, but he's not talking yet! But I can say this: We'll have more top talent on this show than we ever had before—and there will be some sparkling surprises. The only thing we still haven't figured out is how to cram it all into 21-1/2 hours."

KTXS will "cut away" from the network show approximately fifteen minutes every hour to present eyewitness reports of MDA activities in the Abilene area supported by the Telethon and the Annual March Against Muscular Dystrophy. The health agency operates a summer camp for children with muscular dystrophy and related diseases at the Brown-wood 4-H Camp, and supports research on muscular dystrophy and related disorders throughout Texas.



## Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:  
The Texas legislature recently passed Senate Bill 1256 which will become effective August 29, 1977 and will change the present uninsured motorist coverage (coverage U) on your family automobile policy to "Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist" at the date of your next renewal.

Present uninsured motorist coverage provides 10/20 (\$10,000 per person/\$20,000 per accident) bodily injury limits for the occupants of your car in the event that your car is hit by an insured or an unknown (hit-and-run) driver. Bill 1256 makes the following modifications to the above outlined coverage: (1) An uninsured motorist coverage for property damage to the vehicle has been added subject to a \$250 deductible. (2) Limits of 10/20/5 (\$10,000

per person/\$20,000 per accident/\$5,000 property damage) must be offered on all policies written or renewed on or after August 29th whether or not you now have coverage U. In addition, increased limits of the new "uninsured/underinsured" coverage will be available up to your present limit of bodily injury and property damage liability coverage. EXAMPLE: If you now have LIABILITY limits of 25/50/10, you have the option of buying any limits of uninsured/underinsured motorist protection from 10/20/5 up to 25/50/10. (3) Coverage U has been broadened to include an UNDERinsured motorists provision which applies when the amount of coverage under the liable party's bodily injury and property damage liability coverage is less than the limits of your coverage U. EXAMPLE: The other driver, who carries 10/20/5 liability limits, is legally liable in an accident with you. You carry 25/50 coverage U bodily injury limits. You sustain extensive injuries in excess of the other driver's \$10,000 liability limit. Your \$25,000 limit on coverage U will cover your injury costs for an additional \$15,000.

When you receive your automobile insurance renewal notice, you will have three options: (1) you may reject coverage U (uninsured/underinsured motorist) completely, (2) You may reject the property damage section of coverage U, (3) You may accept Coverage U completely. Let me stress that unless you reject this coverage it will be automatically added to your policy at renewal. I hope this brief summary helps give you a clear understanding of the new Coverage U requirements. If you become confused or have any questions, the best thing to do is take your renewal notice to your local insurance agent. He will be happy to make any further explanation of coverage U and can give you advice on what action and limits you should take.

## 4-H Council Budget Set At \$8 Million

CHICAGO—At its annual meeting in May, the board of trustees of the newly formed National 4-H Council approved a budget of \$8,322,421. The budget is the largest in the 56-year history of national 4-H private support.

The Council, with offices in Chicago and Washington, D.C., represents a merger of the National 4-H Service Committee and the National 4-H Foundation. Supported by the private sector, the Council administers numerous educational programs in behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Several hundred businesses, foundations and individuals support the Council's efforts to provide educational, informational, technical and service functions to some 5.8 million 4-H members, their volunteer leaders and extension professionals.

Council services to 4-H include a broad offering of educational programs emphasizing citizenship and leader-

ship development, international understanding, staff development and training, and incentives and recognition for increased learning at all levels.

The Council also produces educational literature and visual aids, operates the National 4-H Center and National 4-H Supply Service, conducts National 4-H Congress, publishes *National 4-H News*, and provides year-round information and public relations support to 4-H.

The Council is governed by a 20-member board of trustees made up of representatives of business, education and government. Board chairman and president is Omer G. Voss, executive vice president, International Harvester Company. Vice chairman are Robert J. Hampson, executive vice president, corporate staffs, Ford Motor Company; and Dr. J. C. Evans, chancellor and vice provost, University of Wisconsin.

Other board officers are: treasurer, Richard L. Thomas, president, The First National

Bank of Chicago; secretary, Norman A. Sugarman, attorney and partner, Baker, Hostetler & Patterson; executive vice president and assistant secretary, Norman C. Mindrum, National 4-H Council; and executive director and assistant treasurer, Grant A. Shrum, National 4-H Council.

Dr. George Hyatt Jr., director of Extension Service, North Carolina State University, and Walter R. Peirson, president, Amoco Oil Company, join Voss, Evans, Hampson and Sugarman as members of the board's executive committee.

Board member Robert G. Laidlaw, president of Coats & Clark Inc., heads the 17-member national 4-H resource development committee. The committee which coordinates the development of private support for 4-H at the national level, expects to raise nearly \$4 million in 1977 and looks ahead to doubling contributions from the private sector within the decade.


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## Presidents in Texas drama play different offstage roles

**GALVESTON** — Three presidents march across the stage in "The Lone Star," the new outdoor musical drama running this summer in the amphitheatre in Galveston Island State Park.

The three have in common one thing—all are political men.

Then they part company as they enter their off stage roles.

Bob Turbiville, who appears as President Santa Anna in this saga by playwright Paul Green about the Texan struggle for independence from Mexico in 1836, becomes another member of the cast when he leaves the stage.

Not so George Phener, who plays President Andrew Jackson, or Edwin Child, seen as David G. Burnet, elected president of Texas at its constitutional convention in 1836.

Phener becomes the professional photographer for the show, shooting not only personal pictures for cast members, but also shots for "The Lone Star" media file. But he is only an amateur photographer—so he says.

He has retired from Monsanto Chemical Company in Texas City and feels he would have to live to be at least 105 to do everything he wants to do.

By the time he was 21, he had visited 38 foreign countries as a merchant seaman. When World War II came along he traded his lifeboat for a parachute and joined the Air Force.

Most members of "The Lone Star" company are under 30. Phener and Child, both in their 50s, are considered the cast's senior citizens.

Phener got into acting because of a daughter who was playing with the Texas City Little Theatre. At one point he was asked, as a production of "Life With Father" was coming up, to take the role of Father one week before opening. He did and got "best actor" award for that year.

"That hooked me on theatre," he said, and from that time on he started working in theatre as a volunteer.

"I worked in community and college theatre, building sets—I got into the whole thing. I left the frustration of administration and the limitations of industry behind me."

Child's experience with theatre is quite different. With him it always has been a way of life.

He now is the producer and owner of the National Children's Theatre Association which tours the Midwest and has its home office in Dallas.


He has a company of five, including himself, who pile into his station wagon, together with costumes, painted drops for scenery, and recordings for music and other sound effects.

Child's shows are geared mainly to elementary school children. In spite of television's far-reaching programs, he has found that the enduring classics—"Heidi," "The Sleeping Beauty," "Dick Whittington and His Cat," seem to be their favorites.

Child has owned and operated summer stock theatres too, and says proudly of his Dixfield Summer Theatre in Maine, "One of my girls was 'Mother Nature' on TV (that's the margarine commercial that had Mother Nature shaking the earth when she was offended) and one of the men, James Coco, has been in several Broadway shows.

And this summer, besides shouldering the role of President Burnet, Child is business manager for "The Lone Star." His tasks range from answering the box office phone to hiring ushers and parking lot attendants to handling publicity material distribution.

In their theatrical roles, Child and Phener probably could be replaced easily, but to paraphrase a play title, in their "Man for All Purposes" roles, they would be exceedingly hard to replace.

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## Insulate Unfinished Attics For Savings

Homeowners can insulate their unfinished attics with a few tools, the correct amount of insulating material, strict safety precautions and several easy preparation steps, says Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Extension Agent.

Necessary tools are temporary lighting, temporary flooring (such as 1x12" boards or plywood laid across ceiling joists), duct or masking tape (2" wide), a heavy duty

staple gun and staples or a hammer and tacks, and heavy duty shears or linoleum knife to cut the insulating materials.

Insulation is available in batts, blankets or loose fill—and it's important to know which ones include a vapor (moisture) barrier or

which ones need it. Batts and blankets are made of glass fiber, rock wool, or cellulose—and loose fill is generally made of rock wool, glass fiber, and cellulose fiber.

Batts are generally 15" or 23" wide precut in 4' or 8' lengths. Blankets 15" or 23" wide, in long rolls, can be cut by the installer. They are compressed and will expand when wrappers are removed. Loose fill comes in bags.

When selecting insulation, consider composition, fire safety, moisture resistance, odor, corrosiveness, thermal performance (or R-value), cost, and installation forms and methods.

If you choose batts and blankets, buy the width that will fit snugly within the joist spacing.

A vapor (moisture) barrier prevents most of the moisture in the house from getting into the insulation and reducing its effectiveness. Between home laundry, cooking and bathing, about 18 gallons of water can be produced each week.

For un-insulated attics, select batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor barrier—or if you select loose fill insulation, a vapor barrier of heavy polyethylene sheeting is necessary.

If the attic already has some insulation—and you are simply adding to it, no additional vapor barrier is necessary. However, if batt or blanket insulation with an attached vapor barrier is all you can buy for the new job, its barriers should be slashed approximately every six to twelve inches.

The slash in the new layer of insulation prevents moisture from being trapped in the first layer of insulation.

To determine the amount of vapor barrier material and insulation material to buy, you don't even have to go into the attic. Just follow these two steps:

Step 1. Measure the area of the first floor of your house—not counting garage, porch and other unheated areas. The first floor area will be the same as the attic area.

If it is a rectangle, measure length and width in feet (to the nearest foot) and multiply—

Length x Width equals area. If it is a combination, break it down into rectangles; find the area of each one; then add the areas to get the total.

Step 2. Figure the estimated insulation area by multiplying .9 times the total attic area (90 percent of the total area). In other words: .9 x total attic area equals estimated amount of insulation material (and vapor barrier material) needed.

Do nothing until you have carefully read these safety rules. 1. Provide good lighting. 2. Lay boards or plywood sheets down over tops of joists

or trusses to form a walkway—the ceiling below won't support your weight. 3. Be careful of roofing nails protruding through roof sheathing. 4. If you use glass fiber or rock wool wear gloves and breathing mask, and keep the material wrapped until you are ready to put it in place. 5. Work when temperature in attic can be tolerated—winter, nights, cool weather.

After installing temporary lighting and flooring—before insulating, check for leaks and make necessary repairs. Also, seal all places where pipes or wires penetrate the attic floor.

### Dove Season Opens Today

All-day shooting for mourning doves has been approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department with the season running from Sept. 1, 1977 - Oct. 31, 1977.

The daily bag limit of 10 birds and a possession limit of 20 birds is the same as last year and should furnish hunters with plenty of chances to bag the fast-flying dove with shooting hours from 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

Most counties of northwest Texas are reporting good populations of doves with Andrews county in the south-west corner of the South Plains, Scurry and Mitchell counties in the Southeast corner of the South Plains and Wheeler county in the eastern Panhandle reporting excellent populations of doves.

Only Hale, Motley and Deaf Smith counties are reporting poor populations of birds for the coming season, but, cool weather could affect all these areas.

The passage of cold fronts in late August and early September through Texas has as much affect on the local dove population as any one factor. An increase in the sunflower acreage in some counties should help to hold the birds a little longer than normal.

Sportsmen are reminded that only shotguns not larger than 10-gauge plugged to hold no more than three shells in the magazine and chamber combined are legal. No rifles or pistols of any type are legal for dove hunting.

No hunting will be permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, or from any public road or road right-of-way. Citations issued by Texas game wardens in 1976 included many for shooting from the road.

Sportsmen are required by law to get permission to hunt from the landowner prior to the hunt. A violation of the landowner's property rights will only result in a possible citation and more no-hunting or no-trespassing signs next year.

Sportsmen can help improve the relationship between the landowner and the hunter by being courteous, considerate, capable and, most of all, careful. These sportsmen will have an excellent chance at being invited back to hunt next year.

### Teal Season Set For Sept. 10-18

A nine-day teal season has been set for Sept. 10-18, 1977, and lakes with ample water are scattered across the Panhandle and South Plains.

According to waterfowl biologist Max Traweck the rains have been spotty this summer with some areas of the eastern Panhandle receiving record amounts of water.

Traweck is reporting more green-winged teal than normal this year in his surveys of the area. Normally, the blue-winged teal is most abundant species during the early duck season.

The daily bag limit of four with a possession limit of eight teal can be bagged from sunrise to sunset. The later shooting hours should help hunters identify the small, fast teal from the other larger ducks such as mallards, gadwall, and pintails that might be in the same area during the September hunt.

The three species of teal which can legally be taken during this early hunt are the cinnamon, blue-winged and green-winged teal. Teal hunters will be required a federal migratory waterfowl stamp which can be purchased at U.S. Post offices for \$.55. The stamp must be signed in ink across the face of the permit by the holder.

Shotguns used to bag teal must be plugged to hold no more than three shells including two in the magazine and one in the chamber. Rifles are illegal for teal hunting.

Teal by the thousands should be filtering down into Texas as the season nears and sportsmen should have plenty of opportunities to try their luck this fall.

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




