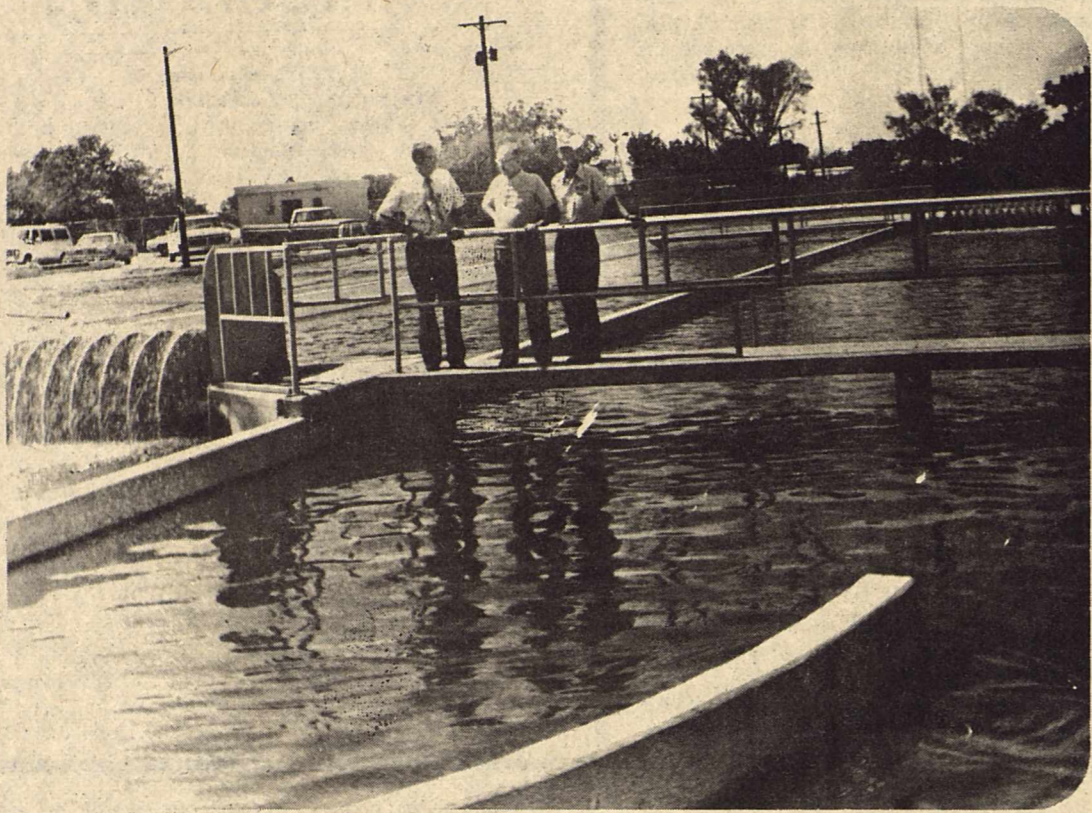

INSPECTING A NEW SEWER FACILITY in Haskell last week were: Billy Jacobs, engineer, Mayor Belton Duncan and Sewer Commissioner Bob Philpot. The facility was recently completed at a cost of approximately \$250,000.00. A Federal Grant paid 75% of the cost of the project.

New Sewer Plant Completed

The City of Haskell recently began use of a new Waste Water Treatment Plant.

The old sewer plant which had been in use for over 50 years, had been under attack for several years by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and other State and Federal agencies.

The old facility did not meet standards set down by EPA and the Federal Government authorized a grant to pay for 75% of the new facility.

Members of the Haskell City Council opened bids in October 1976, and accepted the low bid of B&J Excavation Co. of Dallas. Estimated cost of the facility was \$250,000.00.

Along with the Federal grant of 75% of the cost of the facility, came some government controls, the most important of which will constitute a major change in the method of charging customers for use of the sewer plant.

The Government would not allow a flat rate sewer charge for all customers saying that

low water users could not be charged the same fee as high water users.

Members of the council were told that if an acceptable user charge was not approved, that Federal Funds for the project would be halted and the City would be faced with the full expense.

A proposed user charge was considered by the council basing the sewer charge on the amount of water consumed. Most of the Council opposition to this proposal was based on the fact that during the summer months much water is used in watering lawns and gardens and is

never treated at the sewer plant.

Members of the Council worked closely with Billy Jacobs, Engineer for Yeatts and Decker in Abilene, and took into consideration the high summer consumption and satisfied the government requirements.

The user charge will include a base charge of \$2.10 and an additional charge of .15 cents per thousand gallons of water consumed to a maximum of 30,000 gallons. These rates apply to residential customers and the maximum billing for a residence would be \$6.60. The maximum was based on the

average quantity of water used during a year.

The same rate structure will apply to commercial facilities except that there will be no maximum. The rate will be \$2.10 base rate and .15 cents per thousand gallons of water consumed.

The sewer rate has been \$1.75 per month for residences and the new rate will go into effect on the billing received about November 1.

Examples based on water consumption for residences are: 1,000-\$2.25; 2,000-\$2.40; 3,000-\$2.55-6,000-\$3.00; 10,000-\$3.60; 20,000-\$5.10; 30,000 and over-\$6.60.

Indians Lose Defensive Battle, 7-3

The Haskell Indians lost a defensive duel 7-3, last Friday night to the Stamford Bulldogs.

The only two scores of the game both came during the second period when Stamford scored on a three yard run early in the quarter and Indian Vonnie Hise kicked a field goal from the five in the final seconds of the half.

The Indian field goal came two plays after a 28 yard run by Bruce Enriquez. The run was the longest run of the game for either team. The Bulldog TD came after a pass interception on the Indian 22 yard line. The Stamford scoring drive covered the 22 yards in six plays.

The Tribe defense turned in a fine performance and during the second half, allowed

Stamford only 18 yards total offense.

Offensively, the Tribe got the ball inside Stamford's 20 yard line only one time and scored the field goal.

Hise intercepted a pass, and recovered a fumble, and Rex Pittman and Jimmy Browning both recovered fumbles to stop four of Stamford's drives.

The Indians will meet the Paducah Dragons there this Friday in the first District contest of the year. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Paducah has a 0-3 won-loss record having been defeated by Childress, 40-18; Motley, 14-13; and Spur, 18-12.

The team has 15 seniors and a team that is much better than their record shows. They have good speed and pass about 80% of the time. Most

of their scores have come on long pass plays.

The team runs from a Houston Veer and run the draw play frequently.

Defensively, they run a basic five and stunt frequently.

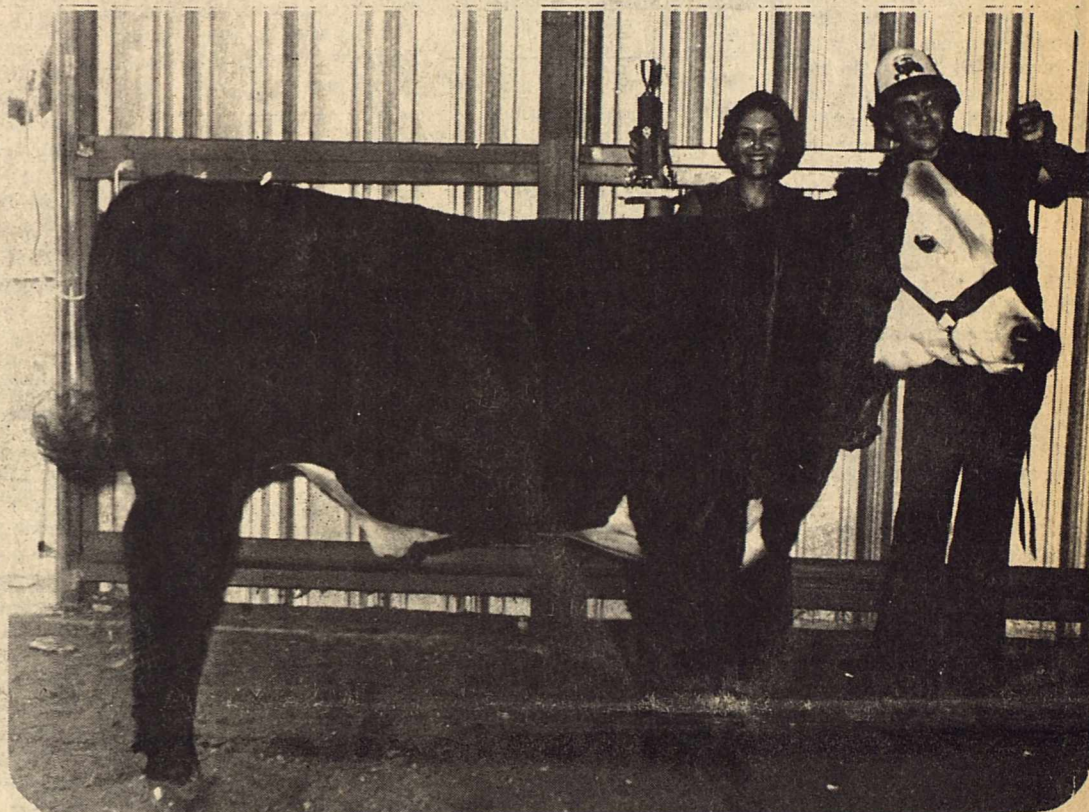

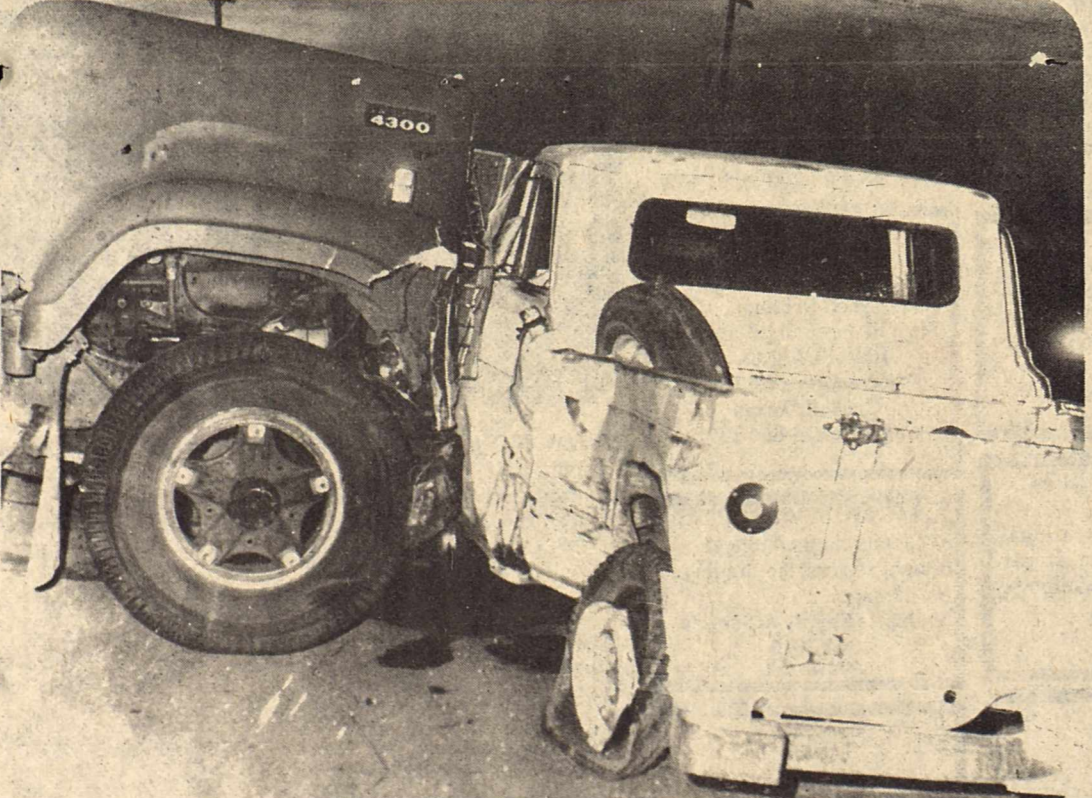

The water is mailed to Abilene-Taylor County Health Department and is tested for bacteria and other growth.

County Extension Agents, Max Stapleton and Barbara Elliott will recommend a procedure for sanitizing a well upon completion of the test, if necessary.

ABE Classes To Begin October 10

The Adult Basic Education classes will be offered again this year. Registration will begin at 6:00 P.M. Monday night, October 10th, at the Haskell Junior High School library, and classes will be held each Monday night. Classes will be held for three hours from 6:00 to 9:00 P.M. each week.

The program is open to anyone, aged 17 or older. All materials are furnished free to those attending.

Adults may register for one of three levels of instruction. Basic level (grades 1-3) will be

for those who have little or no schooling, need English as a second language, or are working toward U.S. citizenship. Intermediate level (grades 4-6) is for those who have completed the basic level or have had some formal education. Advanced level is for those who have completed the intermediate level or have some junior high or senior high school education. The advanced level also prepares the student for the General Educational Development (GED) high school equivalency test.

The Adult Education Program in Haskell is coordinated through the Sweetwater Adult Education Co-op and the Texas Education Agency. Mrs. Betty Davis, Program Director, has announced that the instructors for the Haskell program are Mrs. Christie Stapleton and Mrs. Cathy Bartley.

VA News

Contrary to a misconception held by many, last wills and testaments cannot change beneficiaries named on life insurance policies issued to eligible veterans by the Veterans Administration. According to C.H. Herren, Veterans Service Officer for Haskell County, there are currently about 4.7 million veterans who have active insurance policies which were issued by the Veterans Administration, and all policyholders should make certain that persons they wish to receive their insurance benefits are named on their policies.

Veteran policyholders who fail to make certain their beneficiary designation is in order could add to the emotional stress of survivors and cause unwarranted financial hardship. 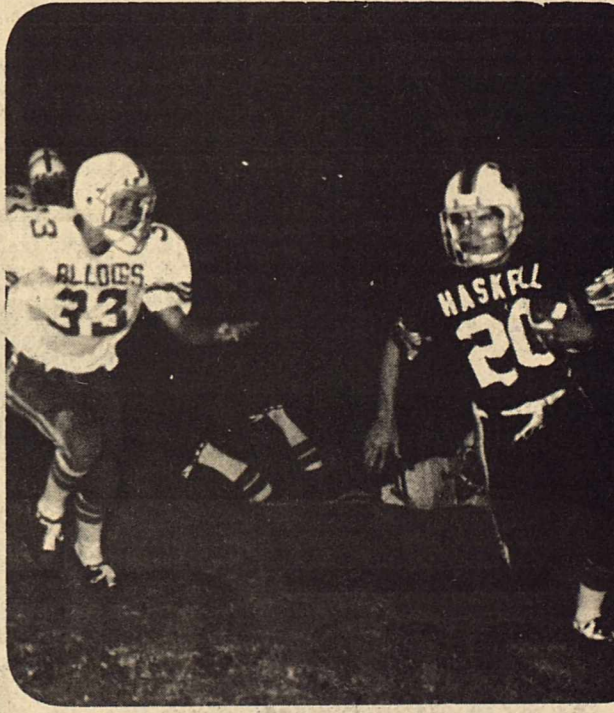

All veterans who have Government insurance policies in force should review their beneficiary designations periodically. When a change is indicated, the appropriate forms may be obtained from the Veterans Administration or from the local Veterans Service Office. In the event a policyholder is not certain whether his designation is correct, he should not make inquiries to the VA, but rather should complete a new designation form without delay. All beneficiary designations become effective on the date of the official postmark shown on the envelope used for mailing. Individual postmarking can be obtained at all U.S. Post Offices upon request, if such action is of any importance to the policyholder.

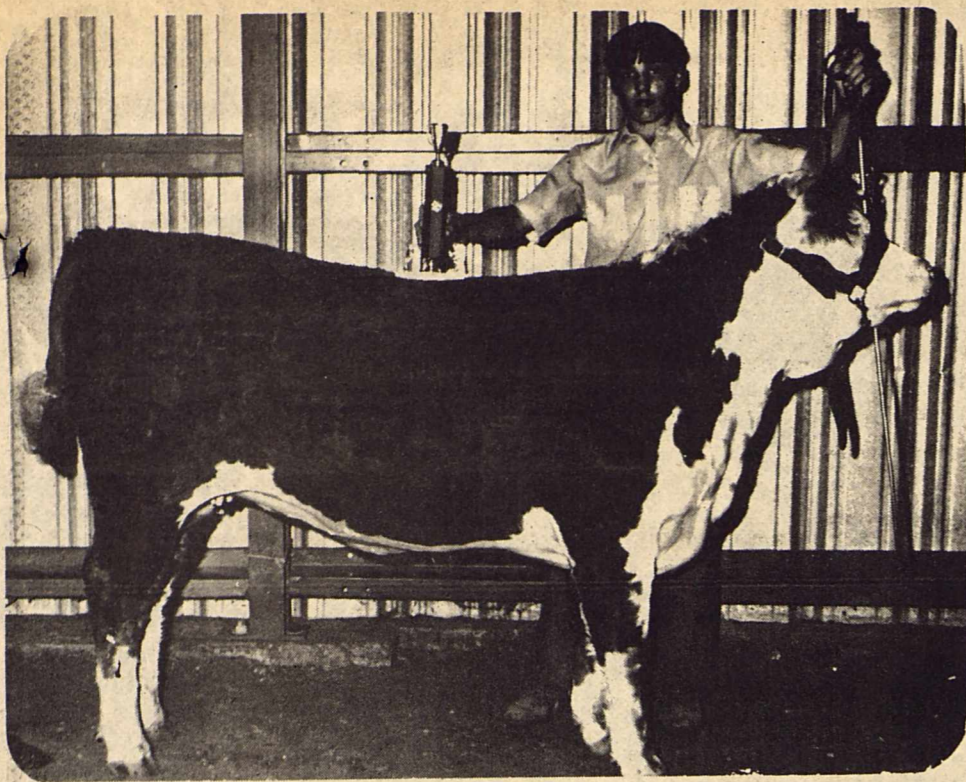

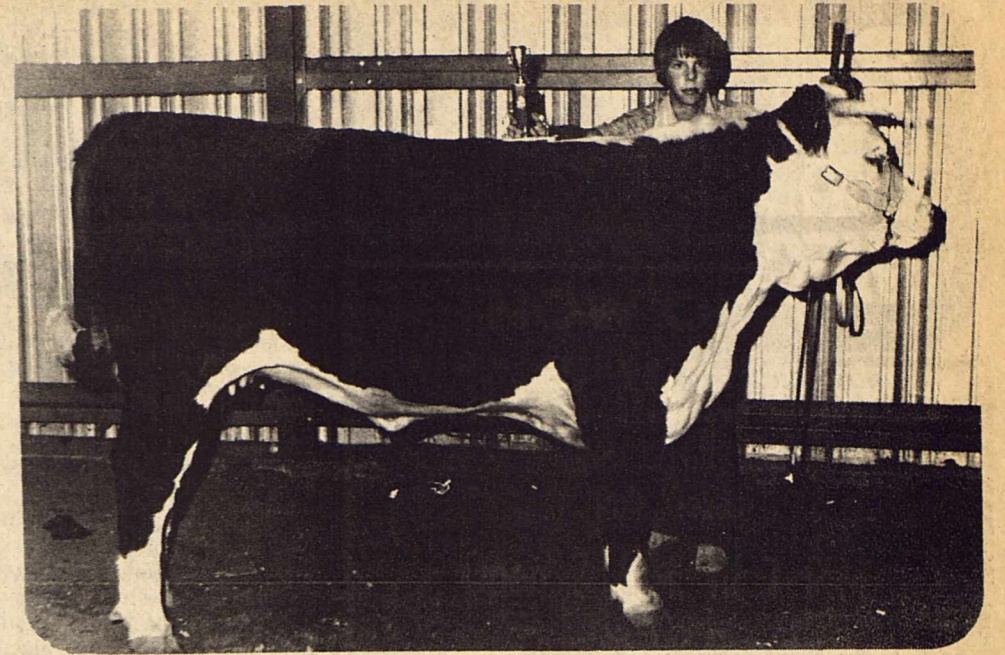

"I've been talking with businessmen, farmers and ranchers, elected officials, and hundreds of friends from all walks of life," Rhodes said.

"The campaign is off to a great start. Support is strong in every county," he added.

"Wherever I go," Rhodes said, "the issues that people

raise run along similar lines." "The economy, especially energy, is on everybody's mind," said Rhodes, "and so is agriculture—farm price policy."

"But the one thing that people feel strongest about is the amount of red tape and governmental control over more and more aspects of people's lives."

"I hear people say, 'We aren't going to ask you to get the government to give us anything—we just want you to go up there and hold the line—do all you can to cut back on spending and federal control.'"

Rhodes said a number have asked him how long it will take as a new congressman to have any influence in Washington.

"My answer is that seniority is on the way out in Congress. In recent years the rules have changed to take much of the power away from committee chairmen.

"Today it's more what you know than who you know and a willingness to be active, creative and work hard that helps a congressman to be effective."

Rhodes said he felt the issue

of leadership would be paramount in the coming election campaign.

"This district needs a representative who knows the people, who believes what they believe, who will be aggressive on their behalf," Rhodes declared.

"In my practice and in my businesses, I have become closely involved in the lives of thousands of people through the years.

"For me, politics will always be a personal thing. I believe I can make a difference in Washington."

The 45-year-old Rhodes is a senior partner in the Abilene law firm of Rhodes, Doscher, Chalk and Heatherly.

He is also engaged in a number of business enterprises in West Texas, including banking, oil and gas, farming and ranching, and retail merchandising.

He serves on the board of directors of Citizens National Bank in Abilene, and also on the board of Connally Oil Co. of Abilene.

He is chairman of the board of Gibson's of Duncanville, and also board chairman of Hale Farm Supply in Haskell. He is president of Big Ed

Oil Co., and the Christiti Co., Inc. He is a member of TIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners).

Rhodes was born into a farming family in Hugo, Okla., and has wheat farms in Oklahoma. He also has a cotton farm in Haskell County and Charolais and Hereford cattle in Taylor and Bosque Counties.

Rhodes is active in numerous community activities, including the boards of the Abilene Philharmonic, the Abilene Zoological Society, and the West Texas Rehabilitation Center.

He is a frequent speaker for older citizens groups, and recently won a state award for service on the governor's senior citizen symposium, the Generation Connection.

Rhodes is married to the former Nancy Fanson. They have four children: Ed and Christi, students at Abilene Christian University; Annette, and Abilene High School junior; and Sherry, a ninth-grader at Lincoln Junior High.

The family are members of the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene. Rhodes serves the congregation as a deacon and a Bible class teacher.

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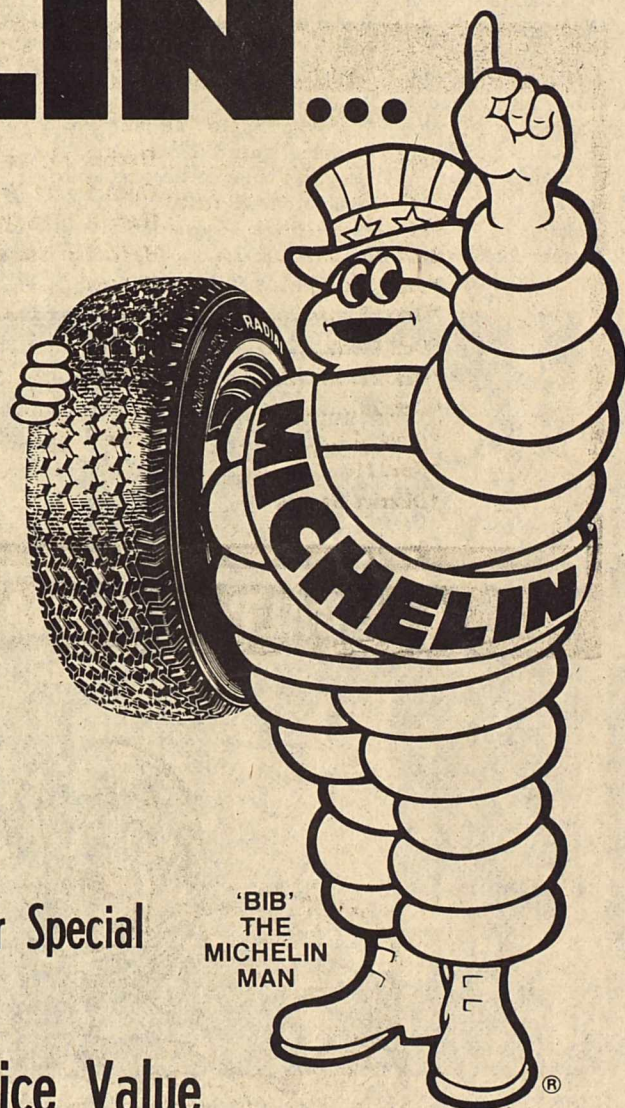

Plastic food has come one step closer with the successful marketing of a new human food protein called "Torutein." This latest step away from natural protein is a derivative of petroleum grown as a yeast from a culture of ethyl alcohol. Most of the buyers will be food processors trying to enhance the flavor of simulated foods now on the market and running into consumer resistance because of taste. Another major market will be bakery products where the oily invader has the extra advantage of a nutritive complement in addition to protein (its only high amino acid, lysine, is desirable in most bakery products). If nothing else, the time and money which went into the research and marketing of an oil-derived protein should illustrate to everyone the critical importance of research to develop and enhance all food-protein sources.

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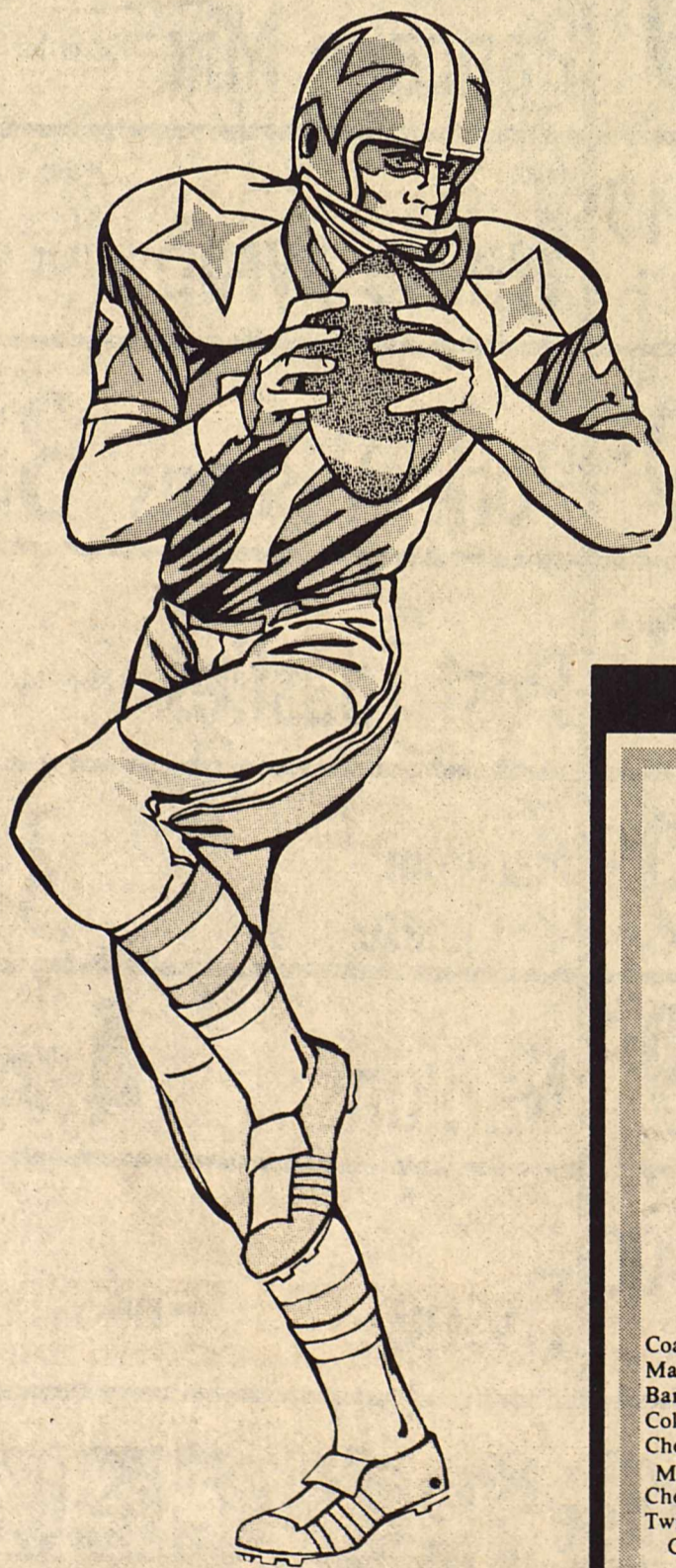

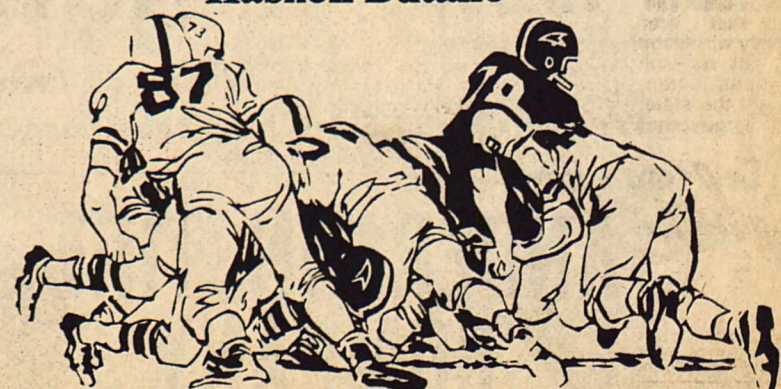
