

# Indians Upset Munday, 17-13

When the going gets tough, the tough get going... and so it was last Friday night as a tough Haskell Indian team upset the Munday Moguls, 17-13.

The Tribe received the opening kick-off and moved the ball only 19 yards before punting to Munday. The Moguls picked up 7 yards on their first offensive attempt and then Robert Spells broke loose for 47 yards and the first score of the game. The PAT was good and with less than three minutes gone in the game the Tribe was behind 7-0! The Munday score was the first TD scored against the Tribe in district play.

Less than three minutes later, Indian Jimmy Browning carried the ball in from the 8 yard line to put Haskell on the score board. The PAT by Robert Rodriquez tied the game. The Tribe defense held

Munday on their next series and the drive was halted when Mark Wallace recovered a fumble.

Six plays later on a fourth and four situation, Hise kicked a 28 yard field goal to give the Tribe a lead that they would not relinquish throughout the remainder of the game. The second quarter proved

to be a preview of the defensive battle of the last half with neither team even threatening until with 16 seconds left, Mark Wallace took a hand off from Quarterback Rex Pittman, and tossed a 32 yard touchdown pass to Robert Rodriquez. Rodriquez kicked the extra point to give the Indians a 17-7 half time lead.

During the third quarter, the Tribe defense held Munday on two fourth down plays and stopped drives. Near the end of the quarter Munday got

the ball on the 13 yard line and Spells carried for the Moguls on the first play from scrimmage. The run for two points failed and finalized the scoring at 17-13.

The Indian offense couldn't seem to get untracked early in the last quarter and were forced to punt twice to Munday.

The Tribe defense rose to both occassions and stopped Munday once on a fourth and one play and once on a fourth and seventeen play.

The Indians took over on their own 24 yard line with about four minutes left in the game and moved the ball 66 yards in 14 plays to consume all but 10 seconds of the time left. Some confusion arose when, with 10 seconds left, and facing a fourth and one play, the officials signaled that Haskell had called a time out. The plan at that point was to run the clock out and not until the official signaled that the time-out was charged to Haskell because a player did not have his mouth piece in. Time ran out during the next play and the Haskell Indians found themselves sitting at the top of District 7-A.

The Indians finished the game with a bunch of tired players, a few brusies, scrapes and score muscles but no serious injuries.

The Tribe defense turned in one of their best performances of the year during the game.

The statistics don't show this when compared to other teams Haskell has played this year. Consider the fact that Munday was undefeated until last Friday and that they have averaged scoring over 25 points per game this year. Munday's offense moved the ball for almost 400 yards the week before against Rotan and the Tribe defense held them to just over 200.

Offensively, Jimmy Browning carried 31 times for the 116 yards for an average of 3.8 yards per carry, and Vonnie Hise carried 13 times for 78 yards and an average of 6 yards per carry.

The defense again seemed to get better during the second half, and allowed Munday only 76 yards as compared to 131 the first half.

The Tribe will face Hamlin this Friday night at 7:30 there. Hamlin has a record of 1-6, having beaten Stamford 14-12 and lost to Abilene Wylie, 12-7; Anson, 19-7; Munday, 14-8, Knox City, 15-12; Paducah, 22-7; and Aspermont, 14-0.

They have been plagued with injuries all year and have been forced to move players from one position to another because of this. Their quarterback has been out but is expected to be back this week.

The Haskell 9th grade will meet Seymour here Thursday at 6 p.m. in a game which was scheduled earlier in the week.

#### **Conservation Viewpoints USDA Soil Conservation Service** Assisting Haskell Soil and Water **Conservation District**

A long hot and dry summer has set back fall growth of native range grasses and improved varieties of dryland pasture grasses. All pastures and native ranges have been sorely hurt by the prolonged dry weather and intense heat, and are badly in need of an adjustment in grazing use. Our range conservationists are telling us that each producer should be urged to take a real close look at the remaining tonnage of available forage resources on their pastures, making necessary adjustments in stocking rates. We certainly do not want to go into the winter months ahead without sufficient forage to

carry through the next spring. Take a close look at your drought plans. Do you have enough hay or stored feed to sustain a long dry winter? Don't count on any small grain grazing, unless you have irrigation. The small grains won't be grazable until December or January, if then, even if it were to start raining now.

To save your pastures, I would recommend that severe culling be considered. Every rancher and livestockman has some unthrifty and old head on the range or pasture that could be culled out. Every animal unit that can be removed will allow about 20

acres more to be divided among the remaining head retained.

Remember the old adage I've used many times-"Take half and leave half." Judge the weight of total annual production this year, and remove no more than 50 percent by weight. You'll be glad you did next spring.

Do not wait until its too late. Now is the time to start your analysis of forage resources available, and what livestock can be disposed of without resulting damage to your grassland.

# **Peach Trees**

The peach tree borer causes heavy damage to peach trees

in Haskell County each year. Often its damage goes undetected until the tree begins to die. Peace trees should be inspected now to determine if the peach tree borers are causing damage and if control measures are needed.

If peach tree borers are of the tree covering the present there will be large masses of gum mixed with brown frass or sawdust at the

Infestations that are allowed to continue their damage will eventually girdle the tree, killing it. Peach tree borers can be controlled during the period from October 20 to November

15 with an application of paradichlorobenzene crystals. To prevent injury to the tree care should be taken to make sure no crystals are placed in direct contact with the trunk.

When applying the crystals the soil should be dry, free of weeds and leveled one foot around the trunk. The amount paradichlorobenzene cryof stals to use is based no the size of the tree: Use one half ounce on 2 to 3 year old trees, three fourths ounce on 4 to 5 year old trees and one ounce for older trees.

Place the crystals around the tree about 2 inches from the trunk and mound clean soil 6 inches high around the base crystals.

In late March or early April the soil should be raked back from the trunk of the tree.

## A Banker's Viewpoint....

On November 8, 1977, you will have the opportunity to decide, via Texas Constitutional Amendment whether your financial affairs remain your own private and personal business, or whether they will be open to scrutiny by Government on all levels and the private sector at various levels due to Electronic Funds Transfer. In its simplest definition, E.F.T. is a system designed to replace checks and deposit slips in personal banking. Mr. Verne Atway, a member of the Presidentially appointed National Study Committee on Electronic Funds Transfer (E.F.T. for short), had the following to say about E.F.T.: "E.F.T. will cause information to be created where none existed before. Although a check contains the payer, amount, and date, E.F.T. transactions involving a purchase would also include not only this information, but in addition, it may include the time of day, location, and a transaction number. In an E.F.T. system these financial records will be maintained in an electronically readable form, thus making them easily retrievable." The real problem lies in his phrase "easily retrievable." Even after your bank gets a court order to produce check information, the check copy must be looked up by hand. This effectively makes government and private "snooping" very difficult indeed and is a real plus for handwritten checks. Even more fundamental to the problem is the fact that a computer controls access to, and information from, this Electronic Funds Transfer (E.F.T.) system. The computer tells the salesperson whether your account is good or bad, the computer tells you your "secret" code which must be used for each purchase or withdrawal of cash outside of your bank (and the computer supposedly keeps the code secret), and the computer makes the immediate transfer of cash from your account to that of the merchant. By the way, in the last instance, the computer will essentially keep you from writing a check and then running down to the bank to keep it from bouncing in case you were a bit short of cash. For those of you who have had the misfortune of trying to straighten out a billing error in a book or record club with computerized billing, you will readily understand the potential problem areas. Remember this. . . a check is your written instructions to your bank and is made out and signed by you.
