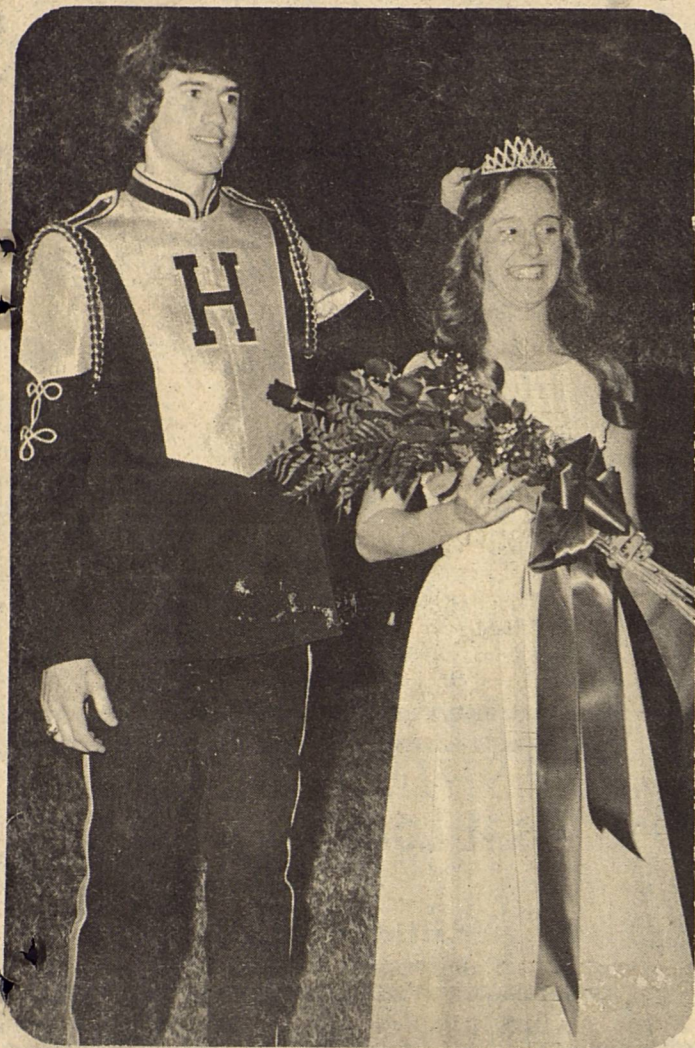

## Voters Approve

### 2, Reject 5

### Amendments

Approximately 705 Haskell County voters approved two State Constitutional amendments Tuesday and refused five more.

County voters approved No. 1 by a vote of 362-338. The amendment will increase the number of criminal appeals judges from five to nine.

County voters also approved No. 3, by a margin of 508-193. The amendment will allow a district court to deny bail to a person accused of a felony committed while he was on bail for a prior felony indictment.

Local voters refused all other amendments. The vote counts are as follows: No. 2, 337-358; No. 4, 223-464; No. 5, 296-391; No. 6, 71-634; and No. 7, 316-380.

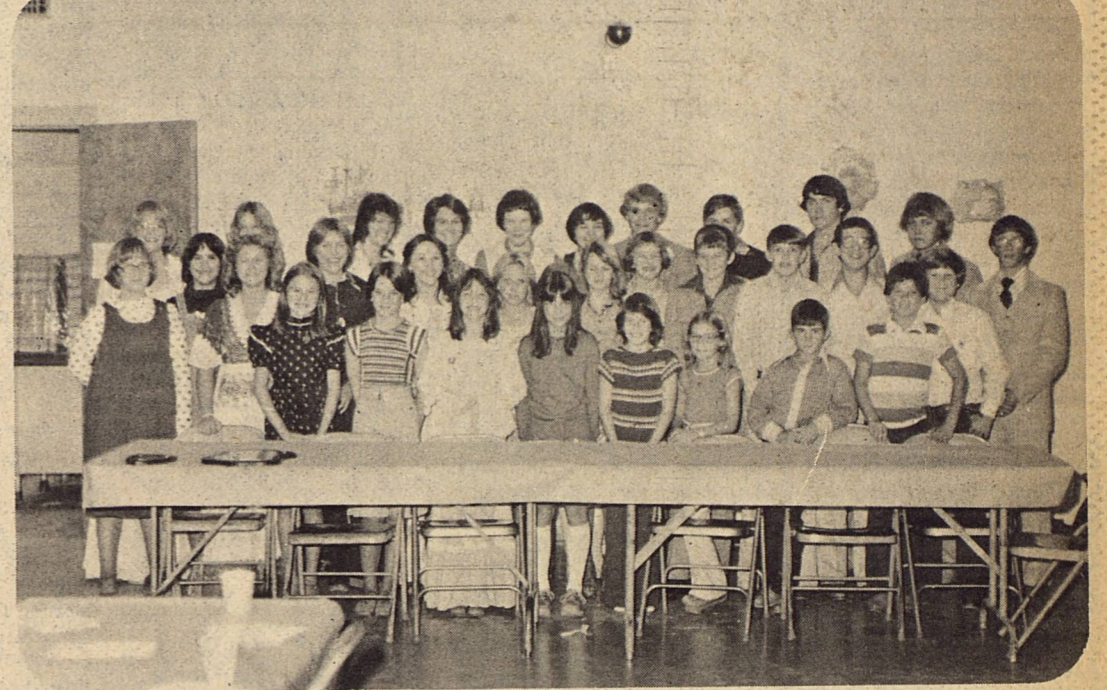
The **Foley Gift Award** is presented to one girl in each county that has accomplished outstanding achievements in Food and Nutrition. The County procedure for select-

## Indians Down K.C., 56-0, Decide District Friday

The Haskell Indians trounced the Knox City Greyhounds 56-0 last Friday and are now within one game of being the District 7-A champions.

The Indians will meet Crowell this Friday at Indian Field at 7:30 p.m. to decide which team will represent the district.

Crowell has one loss, to Munday, and a win Friday will give them the same record as Haskell. If Crowell should win the game, they will represent the district because they beat Haskell and both teams have the same record.

A Haskell win would give the district title to the Indians with a perfect 7-0 record.

Last Friday nights win over Knox City ended up being a lot easier than it started out to be.

There were four punts and (one fumble during the first quarter with both teams swapping the ball back and forth.

The second period started out like the first, but on Haskell's first offensive play, Quarterback Rex Pittman, carried the ball 35 yards for a TD only to have the run erased by a penalty. Jimmy Browning moved the ball 14 yards on the

next play and Vonnie Hise carried for 32 on the next to move the ball to the 18 yard line. Haskell fumbled the ball to Knox City at that point and got it back on the next play when an Indian pounced on a KC fumble. Browning scored two plays later from the 7. PAT failed.

The clock showed 9:08 remaining in the first half when the Indians scored the first TD. Four minutes and 42 seconds later, the Indians were ahead 29-0.

The Indians recovered a KC fumble on the kickoff after the first score and four plays later Browning scored again from the seven. The two point conversion was good on a pass to Robert Rodriguez.

Two plays later, Rodriguez intercepted a KC pass and a 59 yard run by Hise gave the Tribe 6 more. PAT was good.

The Greyhounds tried three offensive plays and punted the ball to Haskell. On their second play, Rodriguez carried 60 yards for another TD. Browning carried the ball over for the two point conversion completing the first half scoring at 29-0.

Early in the second half, Richard Amaro recovered a fumble on the 23 yard line. Two plays later Pittman connected with Bruce Enriquez for a TD. The PAT was good.

Knox City fumbled the ball on their second play and five

plays later, Pittman carried in from the 4. The PAT was good.

Near the end of the period, Amador Benevides recovered a fumble to set up a four yard score by Mark Wallace. PAT failed.

Wallace scored again on a two yard run early in the final period and the kick completed the scoring at 56-0.

The Indian defense held Knox City to 101 yards rushing and 39 yards passing. The defense also recovered five fumbles and intercepted a pass for their part in the victory.

Offensively, the Tribe covered a total of 422 yards and gave the ball up only two times on fumbles.

Crowell has an 8-1 season record and a 5-1 district record. Their only loss was a 21-0 game with Munday.

They run a straight T offense with two tight ends and have good size in the offensive line which averages 171 pounds. Their backs are fairly small but have good

speed and are well coached.

The team doesn't pass much but has a very dominating ground game.

Haskell beat Crowell last year and knocked them out of a district championship and it's a sure bet that they'll be trying to do the same thing to us this year.

Haskell's 7th and 8th grade teams will play in Olney Thursday at 5 and 6:30 and the JV team will play Olney here at 6:30.

Head Coach Don Flippin said that the excited and enthusiastic crowd against Munday was a definite advantage and he asked that the fans will come to the game and cheer the Indians on to a district championship.

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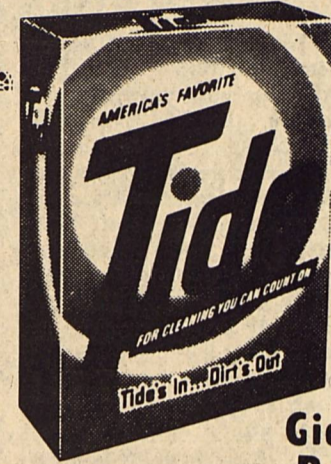

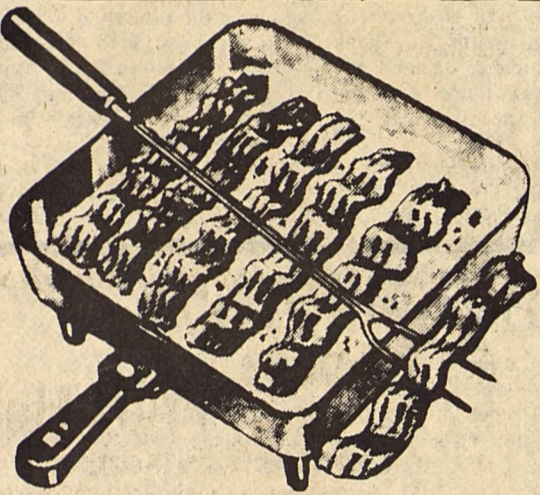

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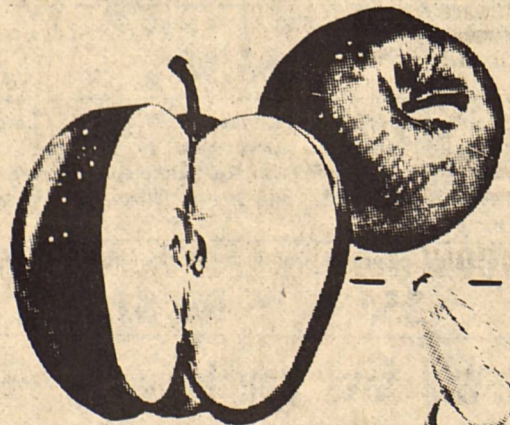

Ratliff gave some interesting information concerning the speaker.

Dale King, is Field Representative for Congressman Omar Burleson. Mr. King is a native of Jones County. He attended Anson Public Schools, and both he and his wife, Ruth, are graduates of Abilene Christian University. They live on a farm northeast of Anson. The Kings have two children, a son and daughter. They have two grandchildren.

Mr. King's responsibilities involve traveling over the 17th District helping Congressman Burleson serve his constituents.

Walter Grubbs, District Manager with offices in Abilene, coordinates all work in the District, including scheduling the activities of Congressman Burleson when he is in Texas. With such a large District, the staff work here and in Washington is varied and sometimes hectic.

Mr. King is very busy with his work with Mr. Burleson, but he is still more interested in the work for the Lord. Mr. King, is a very active minister in the Church of Christ.

In his address Mr. King gave the following facts concerning the 17th Congressional District; the District includes 33 Texas Counties, cover 30,000 Square Miles, has a population of 466,432 (1970 census) 11.5% of Total Texas Area.

The economy of this Congressional District is compatible and represents a close community of interests. The economy includes: cotton, cattle, oil, grain, peanuts, pecans, military, education, industry, transportation, wool, mohair, recreation, tourism, processing, research, and history.

This fact was given, the voices of The Metropolitan Areas Are Heard In Washington. Rural Areas are greatly out-numbered and they have little chance of recognition. There are only

three Congressmen in Washington, who know, or care anything about agriculture. We should carefully investigate those we send to Congress.

This bill was discussed. President Carter signed into law Tuesday the biggest increase ever in the minimum wage, requiring most employers to pay their workers annual minimum salary of about \$7,000 by 1981. The law requires that the minimum wage an hour will be raised to \$2.65 Jan. 1, 1978, and then in three annual steps to \$3.35 an hour by Jan. 1, 1981. This is based on a 40-hour week. Farm workers, will receive the same as most other workers under the new law.

Under the speakers opinion, the Federal Government cannot afford to let Social Security fail. Both Houses are working on this important issue. Any new law adopted will mean higher taxes.

In a question asked concerning our hospital, this was the answer: If the Federal Government is not stopped, they will close all small hospitals. Haskell Memorial Hospital will be closed, and Haskell would have only a First Aid Station. Interested citizens must fight a long hard fight to keep our hospital. We must make our voices heard in Washington.

This information was also given, Congressman Kennedy has introduced and is pushing the bill. This would mean Socialized Medicine in America. This must not be allowed. The Kennedy Bill.

In regard to Amendment 6, the Metropolitan Banks are in favor of this Amendment, but our smaller banks are against the Amendment. It would be very harmful to our smaller banks, a very great burden. Haskell National Bank Officials are against this Amendment.

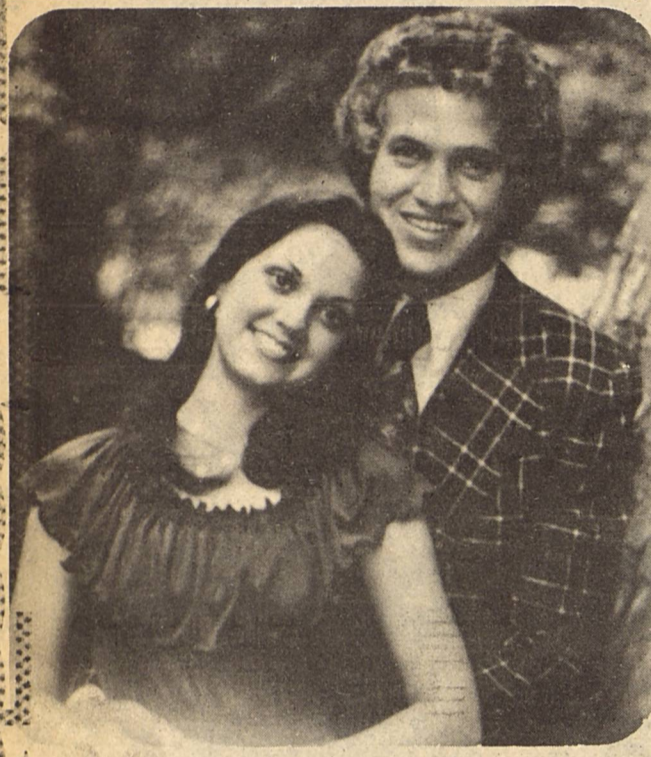

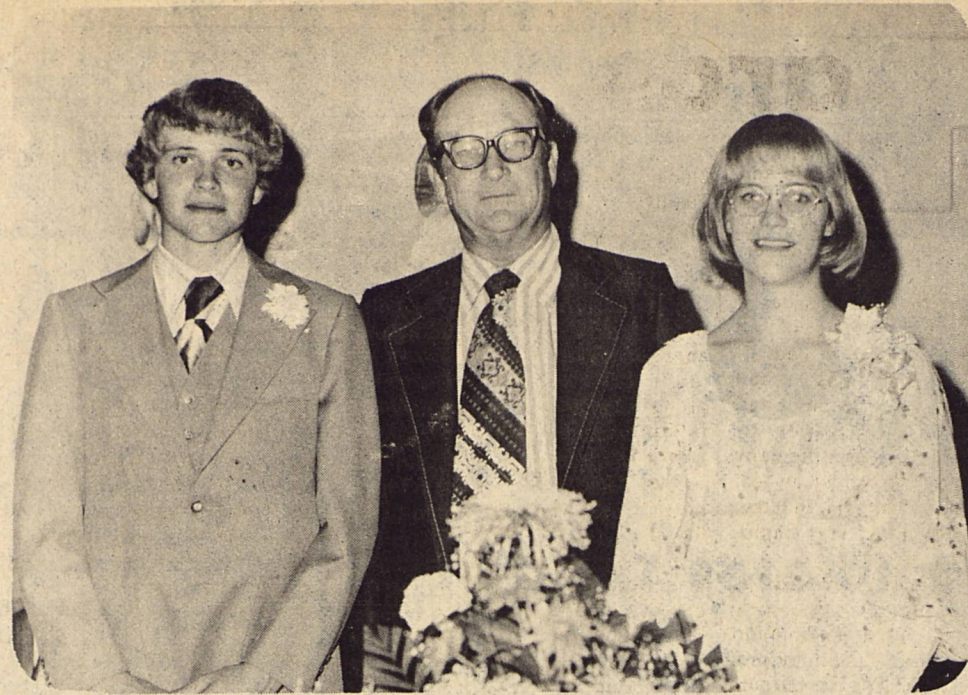
A graduate of the University of Missouri at Kansas City School of Dentistry, Dr. Kemp practices general dentistry in

## COTTON CLASSING

**MUNDAY**  
Prices to growers declined last week, according to Sidney Ferrell, in charge of the Munday Classing Office. Prices offered ranged from 250 to 350 points above Government loan prices for grade 32 and lower. Demand is very light. Light Spotted cotton increased again with grade 32 accounting for 70 percent of the cotton classed. Grade 31 accounted for 14 percent and grade 42 was 10 percent. Six percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Staple lengths remained about the same with staple 31 accounting for 53 percent and staple 32 at 43 percent.

Micronaire readings in the 3.5 to 4.9 range accounted for 96 percent of the cotton tested. Pressley strength readings averaged 89,000 pounds per square inch.

About 10,700 samples were classed by the Munday Classing Office during the week ending November 4. The season total is now 63,500 samples, as compared to 1600 at the same time last year.

Taking a punch at public opinion, Nobel prize winner Dr. Norman Borlaug speaking recently in Houston, said the basic attitude toward farmers has been a hindrance to greater food production. Borlaug, now associated with the Rockefeller Foundation in Mexico City, said the public does not understand the necessity of the profit motive to increase production. The Houston Chronicle quoted the scientist as saying, "If a farmer can't improve his standard of living, he will not adopt the new technologies." He said the hope of feeding a growing world depends on technological advances. Pointing to last year's uproar over foreign grain sales, Borlaug said the public talked about "our grain" as though it was public property. This in effect was making a decision which affected the income of the producer without consulting the producer himself.

## Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service  
 Assisting  
 Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District

It was in 1937 when Hugh Hammond Bennett, first Chief of the Soil Conservation Service began to visit various areas of the nation to help farmers make plans for developing soil conservation districts.

The first efforts were in Anson County, North Carolina when 30 landowners started circulating a petition to try to improve their own and neighboring land. These early day conservationists had no thought of making history, but history is what they did make. They were simply interested in fighting the erosion plaguing their farmlands.

Today, forty years, later, the nation is covered with a little over 3000 local soil and water conservation districts. Over 99 percent of Texas land is under soil and water conservation districts.

What is a soil conservation district? Essentially it is a cooperative association of landowners who will be engaged in carrying out a conservation program. The people involved will help solve their own problems. It is a process of human as well as

material conservation. Since the operation of such a program can be genuinely effective only if it meets the wholehearted support of land operators, each step in the organizing and continued operation of a conservation district rests with the people themselves. Control of the district and the direction the district takes comes from the people themselves, almost completely eliminating any tendency toward governmental bureaucracy.

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District organized in September of this year is no exception to the way districts operate. At present, approximately 70 percent of the landowners and operators of Haskell County are cooperating with the district program. More and joining monthly. Many present cooperators with the district are adding new land to their existing cooperative agreements.

There is still many landowners and operators in Haskell County that are not cooperating with the District program. It is the sincere

hope of the Board of Directors that sooner or later 100 percent of the landowners and operators in Haskell County will become cooperators with the conservation program.

Directors W.L. Ballard of Rochester, M.W. Phemister of Weinert, Milton Christian of Haskell, R.V. Earles of Paint Creek, and F.A. Ulmer of Sagerton will be happy to talk with you concerning your conservation problems. Or you may come by the Soil Conservation Service Office in Haskell, and we will assist you anyway that we can.

Everyone is invited to attend the meetings of the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District Board. Meetings are held on the third Wednesday mornings monthly in the Chamber of Commerce Board Room in Haskell. Meetings will start at 9:00 a.m.

Assistance will be furnished to everyone requesting help, regardless of race, creed, color, sex or national origin. Individuals not farmers or ranchers are invited to bring your conservation problems in, the SCS Technicians will help if within their realm of knowledge. Units of Government such as cities, schools, etc. are also welcome.

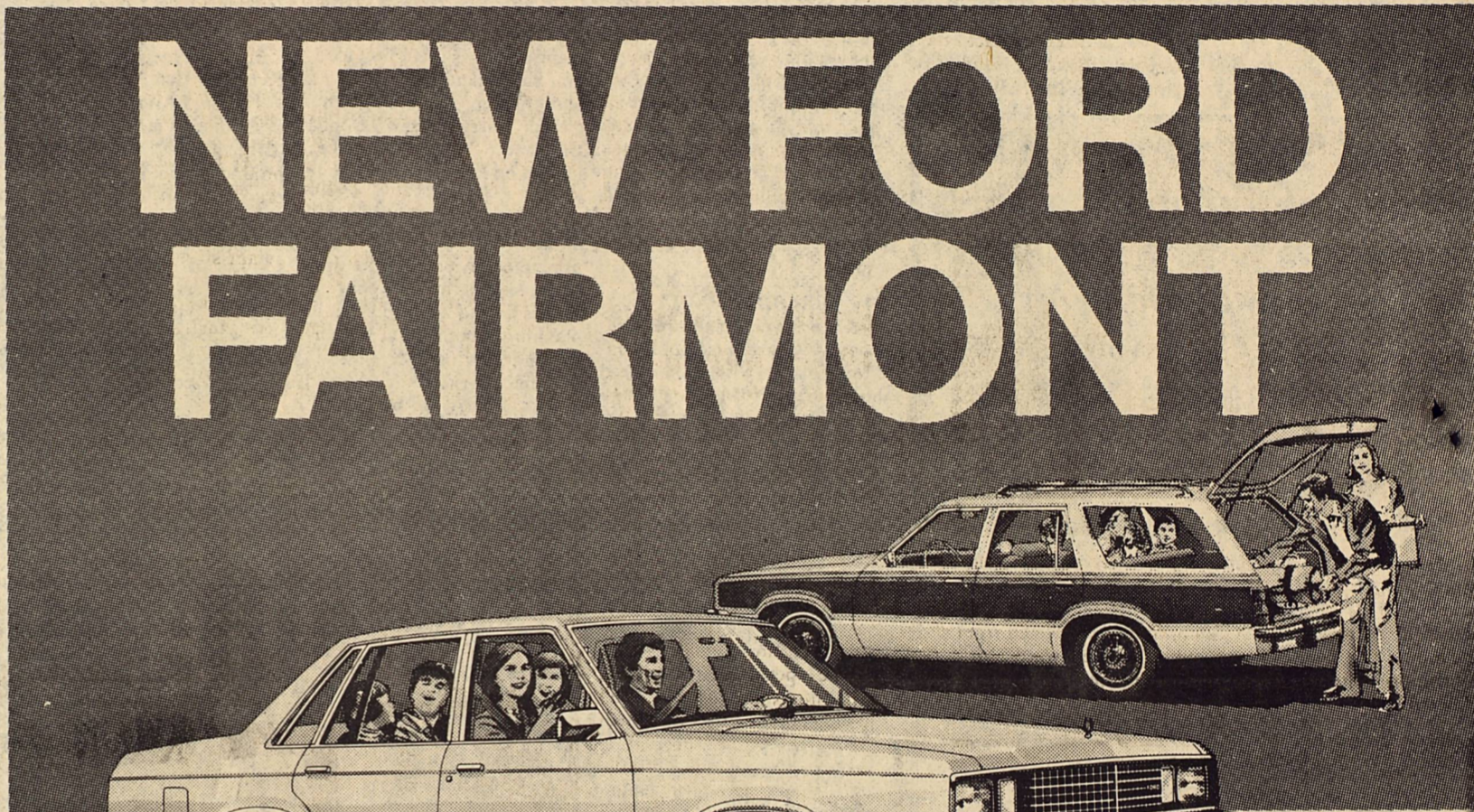

## Best Year For Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday his auditors compiled one of their best records yet in Fiscal 1977, uncovering an additional \$81 million in taxes owed the state.

That amounts to more than \$191,800 for each of the 420 auditors employed by the Comptroller's Office, Bullock noted. The 1977 fiscal year ended August 31.

"That \$81 million in additional taxes owed the state is tax money that otherwise would have gone uncollected," Bullock said.

He pointed out that for every \$1 it cost Texas taxpayers to fund his office's expanded audit staff, \$10.55 was returned to the state treasury in the form of additional taxes.

"We think that's a pretty good return on the investment even by Texas standards," the Comptroller said.

Bullock said that more than \$14 million of the \$81 million detected by field audits was assessed firms headquartered in other states, but who do business in Texas.

In the year before Bullock took office in January 1975, Comptroller's Office auditors turned up only \$18.8 million in additional taxes owed the state.

"We've increased that amount more than fourfold and we believe we can do even better," Bullock said.

He also noted that his 40 enforcement offices across the state collected \$93.2 million during the past fiscal year—more than double the amount anticipated.

"More than a third of that money was in the form of delinquent taxes—money we really had to work to collect," he said.

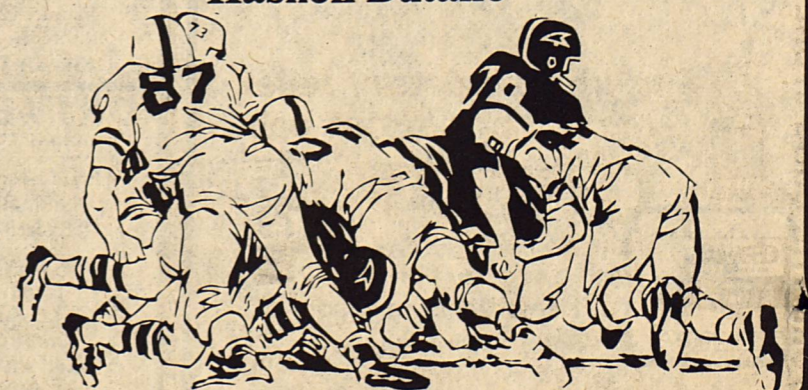

# Fike Godfrey Announces For Congress

Fike Godfrey, a Kent County rancher and businessman who has served as Executive Vice President of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the past seven years, recently took the first official step toward seeking the 17th Congressional District seat being vacated next year by U.S. Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson.

Godfrey, whose resignation from the WTCC post became effective Sunday, named Dwight L. Kinard, an associate of an Abilene accounting firm, as his campaign treasurer.

Godfrey said he will make his final campaign announcement within the next month and begin spelling out in detail exactly where he stands on the crucial issues facing the nation and the 33 West Texas Counties in the 17th District.

"My wife, Naomi, and I enjoy working with West Texans and these past seven years in Abilene have been the happiest of our lives," said Godfrey. "Washington certainly holds no glamour for me and no personal attraction, except as the place where decisions are being made that will determine whether our nation and the American free enterprise system will survive."

"We are fortunate in having had Omar Burleson representing us in Congress for so many years. He has done an outstanding job and, frankly I was among the many people who urged him to seek reelection for at least one more term. But he has served us long and faithfully and I certainly understand his de-

sire to step down", said Godfrey.

"These are critical times for the nation and for West Texas," he declared. "These are times in which we cannot afford the luxury of 'on-the-job training' for Congressman Burleson's replacement. We must have someone who knows his way around Washington and the halls of Congress, who is thoroughly familiar with the people and the problems of every county in this district, who has experience in working with organizations and individuals of all political persuasions, who knows what it means to meet a payroll, who has managed to earn a living off the land and who has a grasp of foreign affairs."

"When Congressman Burleson made final his decision to retire, some of my friends and associates were kind enough to note that my training, background and experience qualified me on all of those counts," said Godfrey. "They reminded me that I have been urging businessmen and all good citizens for many years to become more involved in government and to offer themselves for public service."

"I want to make it clear that I am not claiming to have been 'drafted'. If that were the case, I don't suppose any campaign would be necessary and I intend to wage a vigorous, full time campaign, with the aid of my wife, family and friends. It will be costly, because I intend to make my views known on every issue throughout this huge district."

"I can assure you that no one will ever have to guess how I stand on any issue because I am not going to dodge any of them," he declared. He and his wife, the former Naomi Sweeney of Phillips, have visited 24 foreign countries, in the last six years, during their vacations and have gained a keen insight into America's relationships with the people of other nations.

As executive vice president of the WTCC, Godfrey has worked closely with all 26 members of the Texas Congressional delegation even though he did not always agree with the stand taken by some of them.

He is particularly proud of his leadership in bolstering the West Texas economy and creating new jobs in the 132 counties served by the West Texas Chamber. West Texas had the lowest unemployment rate in the nation during the last recession and Godfrey believes common sense decisions in Washington, including those that will reduce the amount of government regulations in the every-day lives of the people, can produce more economic growth throughout this district.

# New Vehicle Registration System Announced

Texas motorists will get their first exposure of year-round motor vehicle registration beginning January 1, 1978.

Registrations will begin a month earlier this year because of anticipated unfamiliarity that may slow the initial year's collections.

For the first time registrations will be issued on a monthly expiration basis, instead of having some 11 million all expire at midnight April 1 each year as before.

Spreading registrations through 12 months is expected to reduce or minimize the annual long, frustrating waiting lines stretching from county tax assessor-collectors offices.

Immediately after Christmas new registration application forms will be mailed to vehicle owners in preparation for "System '78" as it is described by the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Tax collectors and their staffs throughout the state have been preparing for this moment for the last year. Intensive workshops, seminars and individual meetings with department field supervisors have centered on the new procedures.

The department has been working up the overall operational plans for some three years. Other states—including California, Washington and Kentucky—already have initiated year-round registration programs.

Another first will be the appearance of two validation stickers on the multi-year license plates, first issued in 1975. The new stickers will represent month of expiration and year of expiration for that vehicle.

"System '78" will be relatively simple for the motorist submitting his application for registration. The real complications fall in the tax assessor-collectors' offices, primarily because of accounting procedures incident to collection and reporting of

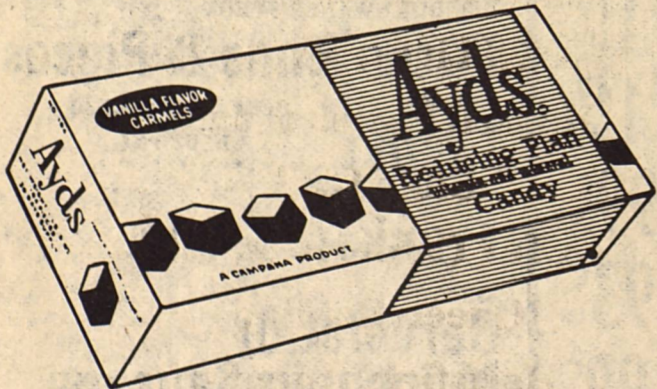

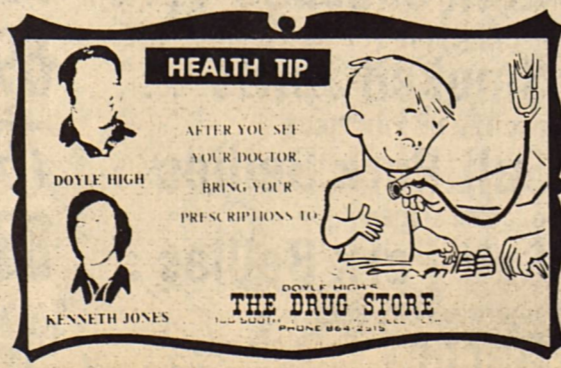

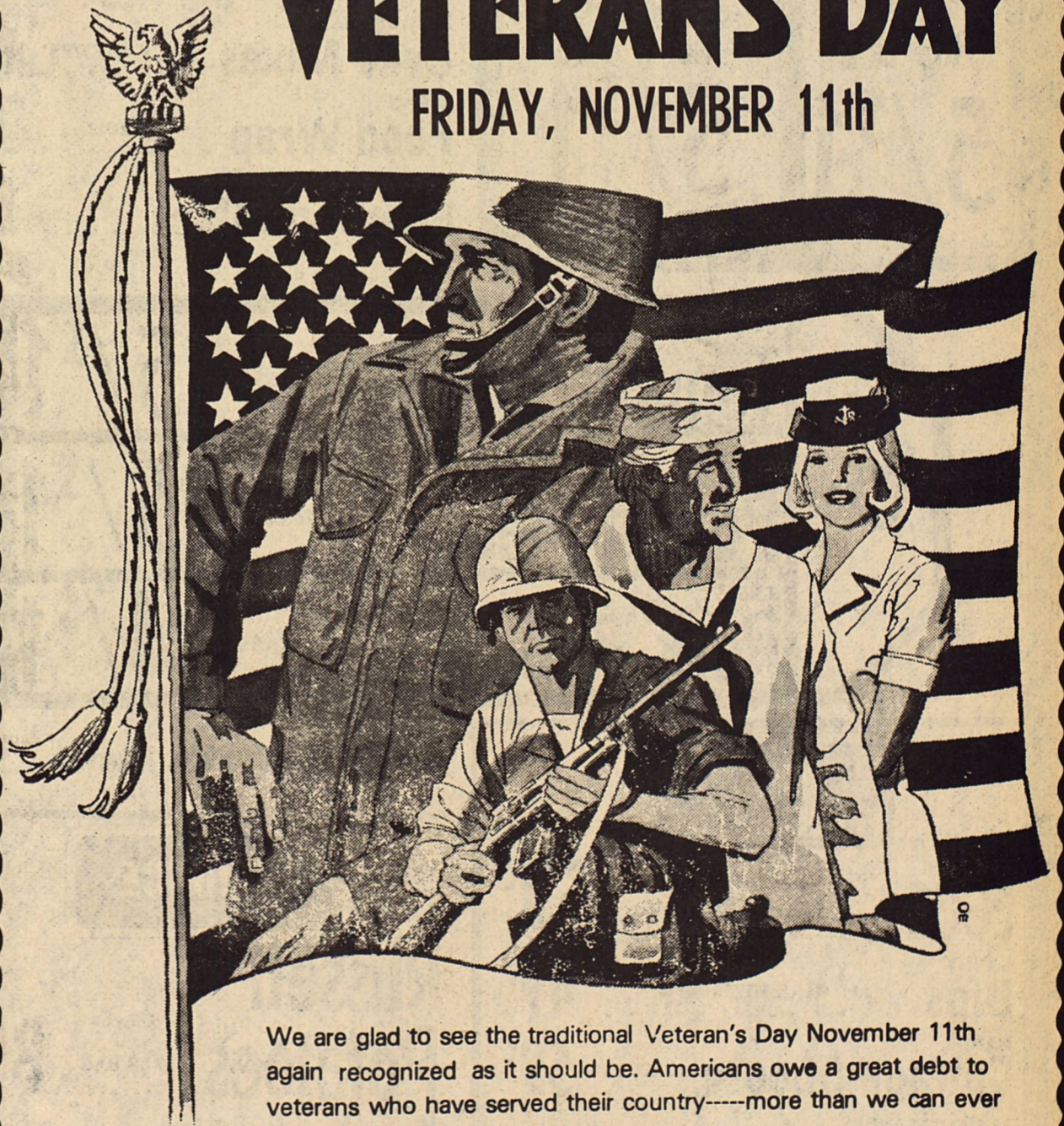
