Conduct Unusual Patrol From Plane

Santa Fe Railway officials and Texas Department of Public Safety helicopters and highway patrol units combined forces to make a survey of railroad crossing violations in this area last week. This was an effort to determine how the railroad and highway patrol could be more effective in controlling railroad crossing mishaps and near-misses. Eight "near-misses" were

reported between Hereford and Farwell in a five hour perios of surveillance, L. E. Sankey of Amarillo, superintendent of special service with Santa Fe, and Ernest Raschal of Amarillo, Sankey's assistant, alternated riding in an unmarked DPS helicopter with a DPS pilot, co-pilot and officer.

Sgt. Bill Wells, who is in charge of the DPS office in Hereford, and officer Roger Hagood alternated in the helicopter also.

Highway patrol units drove along with the train and the helicopter radioed reports of crossing violations. No tickets were issued to violaters, but were warned about future vio-

Sankey said one of the "almost accidents" reported to his office concerned a school bus between Hereford and Friona. "We think that's the worst possible," Sankey said, "The railroad is highly concerned because we certainly don't want to hit anyone. There's no way one of our engines can avoid higging someone on the cross-ing. He's got at least 500 tons behind him, going 60 miles per hour, and he has no choice, no alternative he can take. 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




