As in past years, the contest is not intended as an J. C. Yeary, Jr. additional activity of the regular school program, but as a program that can aid in the general instructional program.

The purposes of the Conservation Poster Contest is to stimulate a greater interest in the conservation of our natural resources. The Directors have arranged to give some appropriate awards to the winners of the first three places in each division or grade.

The four phases of conservation to be considered in preparing the posters are wildlife, plants, water, and soil. The rules ask that each least three of the four phases. Posters will be judged on (1) appropriate treatment of subject matter - 50%, (2) originality - 30%, and (3) neatness - 20%.

IRS Gives Tax Hints

The Internal Revenue Service has some consumer advice for people shopping around for a tax return preparer. Whether you seek help from an accountant, an attorney, an enrolled agent, a tax return preparation service. or someone else in the business, shop and select carefully and especially beware of extravagant advertising claims. While most preparers are ethical and honest. there are some who are not.

Avoid the preparer who 'guarantees'' refunds or demands a percentage of your refund, the IRS says. Likewise, be wary of tax preparers who hint at a special relationship with the IRS, such as having inside knowledge of audit selection standards or computer processes, and similar claims.

The IRS points out that income tax return preparers are now regulated by disclosure and other rules imposed by the Tax Reform Act of 1976. For example, paid preparers may be penalized for failure to sign income tax returns or claims for refund they prepare, failure to furnish completed copies of returns or claims to their clients, and failure to enter their Social Security number along with their signature on each return or claim.



agricultural land on the basis of productivity. (2) Increase the State






