December Last Month For Filing Medicare Claims On Some Bills

Every one of the some 1,600 Callahan countians covered by the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare since 1966 should spend part of this December reviewing whether the program owes him some money.

That is the advice of R. R. Tuley Jr., Social Security's Abilene district manager, who added that this is most important for those older people who had medical expenses between October 1, 1966 and September 30, 1967. Any claim for payment of such expenses must be filed by December 31, 1968.

Tuley pointed out that, in the past, some Medicare beneficiaries who were unable to supply evidence of having paid the doctor or the medical supplier, thought they could not file a claim. "These people are in danger of short-changing themselves," Tuley said. "The 1967 amendments of the Medicare law provide that an itemized bill, showing the services or medical goods received and the charges therefor, even if unpaid is now sufficient for collecting from Medicare."

He issued a reminder that if the annual \$50 deductible is not met until in the last 3 months in any year, that part can be carried over to the following year as part of the deductible for that year.

All social security offices are now prepared to help people make these last minute claims for doctor bill insurance payments on services and goods received between October 1, 1966 and September 30, 1967, on which no Medicare claim has been filed.

AUSTIN — When Preston Smith becomes governor on January 21, it will be to the tune of marching bands and at least five dance orchestras. Smith has revealed plans for a gala inauguration reminiscent of the 1950's.

A big Congress Avenue will follow his swearing-in at noon that day, and after a brief rest Governor and Mrs. Smith will lead off the dancing at a grand ball. They'll be honored with a least four other balls during the evening.

Last time the capital witnessed such a celebration was when Price Daniel took office in 1957. Then more than 20,000 well-wishers danced 'til dawn. But inaugurations have been rather sedate since then. Governor Smith said he'd reveal more details of his inauguration in a couple of weeks.

SMITH PREPARES FOR OFFICE — Gov-Elect Preston Smith says Harold K. Dudley will be his top assistant and that he will beef up the Texas governor's staff dealing with federal programs.

Dudley, 44, Smith's chief campaign organizer, was manager of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Smith said he "will have to have some additional" staff members to work with rapidly-expanded federal-state relations issues. He revealed that Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge, who is Governor Connally's Washington liaison man, can stay if he wants to (as can several other middle-echelon Connally aides), but that the Washington office must be expanded to do an effective job.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo may also be tapped for government duties in the new administration, Smith indicated -- though probably not as secretary of state. He is considering "three or four" for that post.

Smith pledged to continue his "open door" policy as governor and to hold regular weekly news conferences.

COCKTAIL CLUBS — Proposed new rules for drinking clubs were shelved in public hearing by 11 bistro operators who urged different categories of regulations for a wide variety of es-

tablissements catering to the cocktail trade.

Texas Liquor Control Board took the issue under advisement and will hand down its ruling at an early date. Meanwhile, its proposed requirement that payment for mixed drinks be made in cash and strict definition of club "guests" remains under court attack.

Witnesses at hearing in the state capitol made these principal suggestions:

That rules be geared to types of operations in 1,335 clubs over the state (344 of which are in dry areas).

That record-keeping requirements be kept as simple as possible.

That they be punished only for "knowing" violations.

There are obviously several kinds of private clubs, all trying to operate under one broad definition. Comprehensive regulations might include clear-cut definitions of the various kinds or classes of clubs. This would, of course, involve a classification system, testified Royce Chaney of Dallas, representing the Texas Lone Star Chapter Club Managers Assn. of America.

Other club operators suggested separation on lines of non-profit and strictly-business clubs -- or those which have relatively static membership and the rapid turnover clubs such as those in motels and hotels.

"No matter what regulations are adopted," maintained the president of a large San Antonio club, "there will be confusion under present laws." He suggested liquor by the drink legislation is the only answer. A new push for that (probably via constitutional amendment) is expected to be made in the next legislative session which starts next month.

COURT'S SPEAK — Federal judge here dismissed the suit by a Port Hood nuclear weapon repairman to keep his commanding officer from transferring him to Fort Sill, Okla. Employee claimed his security clearance was being taken away without due process of law.

Court of Criminal Appeals applied retroactively a U. S. Supreme Court decision that indigents must have legal counsel in all stages of criminal proceed-

ings, and granted a new trial to a San Antonio man sentenced 13 years ago to life imprisonment for robbery by assault.

State Supreme Court upheld an injunction against a Lubbock man for engaging in the unauthorized practice of law.

Court of Civil Appeals here declined to enjoin Tarry House Inc., from operating as a private club in the Lake Austin residential area.

CANAL SYSTEM PROPOSAL — Texans and their Legislature will be asked to give approval and support to the huge \$10 billion Texas Water Plan through legislation and a vote in November of 1970.

Texas Water Development Board plans to reveal details of the plan this month. It is known that it will propose two huge canal systems to carry surplus water across North Texas to the Plains, and down the Gulf Coast to the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Board asked a legislative study committee to endorse a proposal to increase the present \$400 million water development fund bond program to a figure in the range of \$2 to \$3.5 billion. It said it wanted advice from legislators on how much state financing, through loans, should be put into the program, before setting a precise figure. But it did suggest that the matter be submitted to the voters for approval or disapproval at the election in November, 1970.

It also asked that the Legislature make a number of policy decisions giving the board and other state agencies the authority, and the direction, to carry out jobs of pollution control, recreation and park development, water rights control, planning and contracting for the massive job which lies ahead.

If the water is to be where it is needed in the years ahead, to allow all parts of Texas to grow and prosper, detailed planning work must be begun in 1969, the board said. The Texas Water Plan will be the biggest public works job ever undertaken, nearly four times as large as the \$2.5 billion California water project now under construction.

A legislative committee headed by Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake took the request under study. It will make its recommendations to the Legislature in January.

Former Resident Buried Sunday

Funeral services for Mrs. Loyce Avanel Davis, 52, were held at 2 p. m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Carroll Green, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Ross Cemetery under direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Mrs. Davis died Friday, Nov. 29, at Midland Memorial Hospital in Midland.

Born Dec. 1, 1915 in Baird, she married Howard B. Davis in 1933. The couple moved to Abilene, residing there for 15 years before moving to Midland in 1957.

C. B. Edgar of Abilene completed two wells 9½ miles southeast of Baird in the Marge, East (4,040) Field.

Both are on the Guy Caldwell, et al, lease.

Location for No. 2 Caldwell is 1,980 feet from the south and 511 feet from the west lines of Section 13, Block 5, SP Survey.

Daily potential was 34 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke with 300 to 30 pounds tubing pressure. It is producing from perforations at 4,086-91 feet, treated with 500 gallons of 15 percent mud-cut acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,137 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,140 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,900-1.

It is the third well as a 1-2-mile west extension of the field.

Other well is No. 3 Caldwell, 1,990 feet from the south and 2,000 feet from the west lines of Section 13, Block 5, SP Survey.

No. 3 Caldwell had a daily potential of 60 barrels of 40 gravity oil, flowing through an 18-64-inch choke with 200 lbs. tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 4,074-70 feet, treated with 500 gallons of 15 percent mud-cut acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,140 feet, two feet off bottom. Gas-oil ratio was 1,990-1.

It makes the fourth well and is a 1-4-mile west extension to the field.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

During 1967 Internal Revenue audited the tax returns of 3.1 million taxpayers. 52.4% or 1.6 million were found to owe an additional \$3,313,800,000. However, 40.2% or 1.3 million, had no change in their returns. (These people had obviously kept good records and followed the tax instructions). About 200,000, or 7.6% of those audited had the happy experience of receiving refunds amount to \$190,600,000. (Of course these taxpayers had overpaid their tax to start with and would never have known of the \$190 million if they had not had the good fortune to get a tax audit.)

Correcting tax returns is a necessary part of the Internal Revenue Service's business to assure that each of us pays his fair share. However, if 7.6% of us pay more than we owe, the Internal Revenue Service may not find time to audit our returns and send the money back. It just might be a good idea to read the instructions a little more carefully this year.

MAILING SUGGESTIONS OFFERED BY YOUR LOCAL POSTOFFICE

Christmas is just around the corner! That is the reminder that the Postmaster is giving out to the patrons today.

Gift packages to distant points in the United States should be placed in the mails immediately, and greeting cards of great distances should be in the mails by December 10, the Postmaster said. And he added: "Be sure and include the Zip Code in all addresses." He gave assurance that all postal personnel will be glad to assist in this area.

He pointed out that every post office in the United States has received a supply of the 1968 Christmas stamp. This stamp is designed and planned for use during the Holiday season. It has a reproduction of a portion of the Dutch artist, Jan van Eyck's The Annunciation for its

subject matter. Eyck produced this masterpiece about 1425-30, and the original was presented to William II of the Netherlands in 1819. Czar Nicholas of Russia acquired the painting in 1850. In 1937 the USSR sold it to Andrew Mellon of Pittsburgh, and since then has been placed in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D. C.

The stamp will be welcomed by collectors and especially those who collect plate blocks. The stamp is printed in five colors, and each major color required a different plate number; consequently the entire end of the Christmas sheet has seven plate numbers, intermingled three times with the slogan "MAIL EARLY." In all likelihood the most popular method of collecting these stamps will be by strips of ten instead of the old standard blocks of four.

Since the new Christmas card rate is 6c for the 1st two ounces, or 6c first class, the New Christmas stamp will add color and meaning to the Christmas greetings of 1968. The Postmaster recommends that you check your needs now for this very colorful stamp and be sure you have sufficient numbers to care for your Christmas mailing.

Social Security Asks You For Proofs Of Age, Earnings, Kinship

Social security benefits don't start automatically for you and your family when you retire. This may seem strange since the social security contribution comes out of the pay check without the worker requesting it, but the monthly retirement benefits do have to be requested. Along with the application certain proofs have to be furnished, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., district manager of the Social Security Administration. What does a person need to get his retirement check started? Proof of a person's age should always be brought with him when he files, said Tuley.

Most people decide to file a claim the first trip to see a social security representative after they see how simple it is, he went on, even though they were just inquiring about how to file. If the spouse and children are also claiming benefits, they will need proof of their age and relationship.

Since most people in this area don't have a birth certificate recorded near the time of birth, they usually need two documents showing their age - the older the document the better. Baptismal records, family Bibles, school records, insurance policies, marriage licenses, and practically any other old document showing the person's age can be used to establish his date of birth.

Tuley says that your last year's W-2 Form, or tax return, if you were self-employed, should also be brought with you when you plan to apply for social security. The W-2 form is the statement of earnings furnished to employees at the end of each year by the employer.

A representative of the Abilene district office will not be in Baird in December. Anyone wishing to see a social security representative may come to the Abilene district office. The office is open Monday through Friday, except national holidays, between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m., except Tuesday when the hours are 9 a. m. to 7 p. m.
