For County FM Roads

Bids for the reconstruction and improvement of two Farm to Market Roads in Haskell County are expected to be received at the March 14-15 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The existing 18-foot FM 618 will be reconstructed and widened to 20 feet from US 380 to FM 600, a distance of 8

Billy Vernon of Snyder is the department's engineer in charge of the work, while overall project supervision is supplied by Abilene District Engineer Roger G. Welsch.

The existing metal guard fence on FM 600 between FM 618 and FM 2976 will be removed. A foundation course will be installed to provide lateral stability, and a new guard fence of standard height and design will be installed.

February

February, 1978, has proved once again that cold weather and high electric bills go hand-in-hand, according to a spokesman at West Texas

After analyzing February we ther data, Ray Hartt, a W'I'U space engineer, said, Both in degree days and in average temperature, we experienced one heck of a cold month."

Bills currently being issued by WTU are mostly for electricity used during the extreme cold weather, and are producing a flurry of inquiries to WTU local offices.

Hartt said electric usage probably would have been higher if heavy winds had accompanied the cold fronts during the month and if many customers were not practicing conservation.

Fuel costs for February

were slightly lower than in January, which also helped take some sting out of the

The degree day figures, which are an accepted measure of energy requirements, indicated that West Texans needed 85 per cent more energy this February than last February just to keep their homes warm.

The "heating degree day" is the net difference between the average outside temperature over a 24-hour period and a base temperature of 65 degrees. This past February there were 729 degrees in Abilene, compared to 393 in February, 1977.

Hartt said this is about average for WTU's entire service area, which stretches from Shamrock on the north to Persidio on the south with Abilene about in the center.

Farm Bureau To Present **Shock Program**

Farm Bureau will present a program on electric shock for Weinert 4-H at 1 p.m., Monday, March 13th, in the Weinert School Auditorium, according to Danny McGuire, president of the Weinert 4-H Chapter.

Most people do not fully understand the life-or-death facts of electricity. The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Most homes have a number of 15, 20, 30 and 40 ampere circuits, protected with either plugtype fuses or circuit breakers for fire prevention. Fuses or circuit breakers will not prevent electric shock.

Electricity is constantly seeking "ground." Unfortunatley the human body can complete the circuit to ground. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Some of the causes and effect of electric shock to the human body, as well as prevention and protective methods, will be graphically demonstrated by Joe Smetana, Waco, Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau. Smetana uses a couple of 8 foot tables to set up a brightly colored model home, along with props having "special lighting effects", such as a plastic man. The audience actually sees the plastic man light up as Smetana ANI-MATES the injury and deathproducing situations both inside and outside the home. The public is invited to attend.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS, CHANGING AND FIXING THE SPEED LIMITS OF MOTOR VEHICLES ON PORTIONS OF SOUTH AVE-NUE G AND SOUTH AVE-NUE H, WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SAID CITY, PROVIDING THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF, REPEALING ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CON-

FLICT THEREWITH, AND DECLARING **EMERGENCY** BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY

OF HASKELL, TEXAS: SECTION 1: That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle on South Avenues G and H, within the intersections or between the same, as set out in Section 2 hereof, at a speed in excess of the speed limits hereinafter set forth in Section

2 of this ordinance. WIND EROSION

The wind erosion situation in the Haskell S.W.C.D. has been nil during the last reporting period-January and February. This is the first time since 1975 that high winds and blowing dust haven't plagued us in the early months of the

The light showers and snows plus the lack of high intensity winds of long duration can be counted a blessing in more ways than just holding wind erosion in check. In fact, as I write, it is snowing fairly heavy for the Haskell area. As I told a friend earlier, I wished it would snow ten inches, or at least enough to give us some effective moisture.

However, with all good things there is some bad. Freezing, thawing and snow generally pulverize the soil surface to a sufficient depth to leave it in a most hazardous condition, and very suscept-

ible to wind erosion.

Especially, this year, is the erosion hazard very high. With little to no growing small grains as a result of the hard drought conditions experienced läst summer and fall. It is estimated that about 200,000 acres- of valuable Haskell land is in a service condition to blow.

I am urging all farmers to tool up, and be ready to do immediate emergency tillage, using any type of tillage equipment that can travel at good speeds. The usual March and Arpil winds can and will play havoc if we sit back and do nothing.

USDA figures recently released indicate that the average annual soil loss now stands at about 9 tons per acre nation-wide. The safe soil-loss tolerance per acre per year is from 3 to 4 tons. If we are to keep our soil productive and on our own farm, every effort must be made to reduce this annual loss.

Why sit idly by and let your farm blow or wash away. Lake Stamford, Miller Creek Lake and the Brazos River doesn't need anymore silt. Your wife and my wife do not need any in the house. You and I, and our families do not need to breathe dust polluted air anymore than we need to eat or drink polluted foods and

So, wind erosion control rests solely in your hands. Don't let the winds that are to come cover us up with dust and soil particles.

Most visitors to Carlsbad Caverns National Park in southeast New Mexico come with camera at the ready.

A few bring along an array of paint brushes, acrylics, oils, water colors, easels, canvas and similar paraphernalia. The intricate formations in the park's caves and the cactusstudded backcountry landscapes have long been favorite subjects of Southwestern art-

And since 1972 these artists have been able to display their paintings in the Carlsbad Caverns visitor center during an annual art show.

This year park superintendent Don Dayton scheduled the art show from March 22 through April 4 and artists from throughout the region are again expected to enter and compete for the top prize--a blue ribbon.

So if you are planning a visit to the park during the show and don't have time for a backcountry visit, let the backcountry come to you through the paintings. And you can help determine the winner by casting a vote for your favorite.

Late March and early April is an excellent time to visit Carlshad and the nearby Guadalupe Mountains National Park in West Texas--the days begin to get warm without being hot.

After enjoying the art show, take a stroll through the Caverns. The walk-in trip begins at the natural entrance near the visitor center and usually takes two and a half to three hours. You can start the trip anytime between 8 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. daily in winter and 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in summer.

The first mile and a half of the trip features an 830-foot descent, then an 80-foot ascent known as Appetite Hill before reaching the Underground Lunchroom where elevators are located. Everybody rides back to the top.

If you don't think you can handle the walk-in, you can go down in the elevator for the shorter Big Room tour.

As you enter the Caverns, you'll be given a radio receiver and along the way you can pick up messages that tell about the features you are near. You may set the receiver on any of three channels--one broadcasting in English, one in Spanish and one with a

special script for children. There are rangers strategically stationed along the way to answer questions or help you in any way.

The visitor center is located seven miles west of Highway 62-180 at the end of State Route 7, 27 miles southwest of Carlsbad, N.M. and 150 miles east of El Paso, Texas.

The park is a Designated Fee Area and the visitor center is the place to pay the daily entrance fee of \$3 for private non-commercial vehicles or \$1 per person for those arriving by commercial carrier. Golden Eagle and Golden

Age passports are honored. Be sure to wear low-heeled, rubber-soled shoes for the Cavern trip and a light sweater.

If you are planning a park vacation, write the National Park Service, P.O. box 728, Room N-13, Santa Fe, N.M. 87501 for a free trip planning guide which lists NPS areas within an easy drive of your home and charts facilities and services available at each.

Reagan Announces **Bill Fisher Support**

Governor Ronald Reagan was the featured speaker at a noon luncheon Thursday, February 23, endersing Bill Fisher, the Republican Congressional Candidate in the 17th District. Governor Reagan's purpose in Abilene was to endorse and support Fisher in his campaign and urge people to vote for him in the coming election.

Governor Reagan said Fisher would be especially valuable in understanding and supporting a 30% across-theboard tax cut bill. He said, "It would be a proposal that over a three year period could give us an across-the-board income tax cut that will reduce taxes about one-third for all of us." He warned of the recently passed Social Security Tax that will increase the deficit and create more of a budget imbalance. He said that we will find that "the most gigantic tax increase in history, the Social Security Tax, still won't save the program or alter the imbalance, just postpone it.

Governor Reagan drew applause several times with appeals to reduce government regulations on our lives, such as OSHA, Occupational Safety and Health Administration, reorganization of Social Security and limiting regulating

agencies. Those in attendance at the luncheon apparently agreed with the Governor when he said, "It is Republicans who have offered a constitutional amendment to say the government, except in the time of war, cannot engage in deficit spending."

Governor Reagan urged better communications between Republicans, Democrats and Independents in order to unite all those with the same thoughts about his country. Governor Reagan said his main concern was that the Republican Party was being squeezed out of the political scene. "I have a fear that one of the great dangers confronting us in America today is the loss of a two party system",

After his luncheon speech, Governor Reagan attended a reception in his honor.

Fisher, the lone Republican in the race for Congress in the 17th District, said Governor Reagan was an indirect reason for him being interested in politics. "A televised speech in 1964 that Governor Reagan made on behalf of Barry Goldwater, made a lasting impact on me and had a significant impact on my decision to get involved in politics at some future time".
