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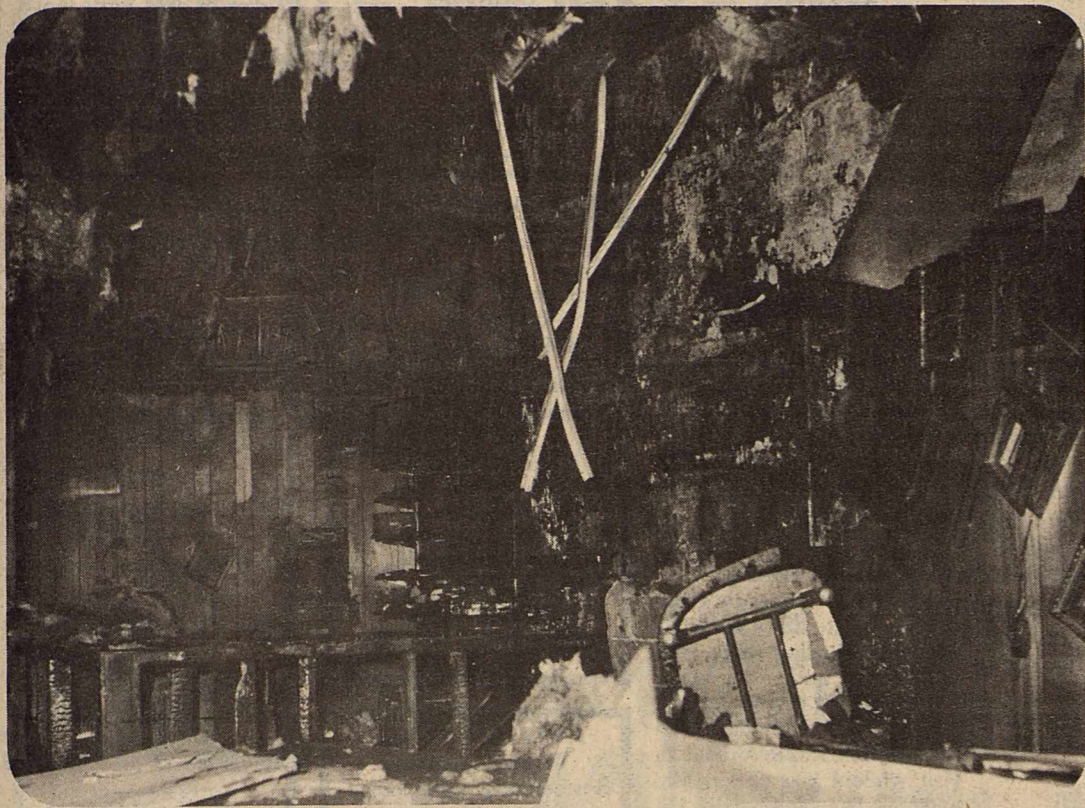

now, all these questions I will answer on Friday night at 7:30 in First Baptist Church and I will show slides of my native land, Ireland, where I lived for 47 years before coming to Texas almost 10 years ago.

St. Patrick amazingly enough was not an Irish man. He was born in Dumbarton, Scotland of very religious parents in the year (as far as we know around 340 AD.) He was taken captive as a young boy by sea pirates who later had a shipwreck near the Irish coast. Patrick found himself later on a beach just off the County Antrim Coast. Later he worked as a shepherd on a mountain (Call Slernish) attending sheep. It was there that God gave him a vision and a love for the Irish pagans. Thousands who were Sun

worshippers, after some years past Patrick was able to return to Scotland but found no rest or peace in his heart until he returned to Ireland as a Missionary again. He was then about the age of 30 and began preaching the gospel.

Religious historians tell us that Patrick was so successful in the hands of the Lord that around 40,000 converts were Baptized in the river Slaney each year. Doctor Edmanson, late President of Wheaton College, Ill. once said, "Patrick was perhaps the most used missionary in the hands of God since the days of the Apostle Paul." He was not a Catholic nor a Protestant but a 'BORN AGAIN' Christian

whose favorite verse was "Christ in you the hope of Glory". In fact on the breast plate which he wore these words were engraved on it. He died and was buried in a church of Ireland Cemetery. (Episcopal) In a place called DownPatrick which of course was called after the famous Saint.

DownPatrick is just 7 miles from the place where I was born and brought up. But more on Friday night at First Baptist Church.

Give Blood March 16

The Red River Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Haskell today, March 16, from 1 to 6 p.m. in the Community Building of the Haskell National Bank.

Goal for the drive is 80 units and members of the Haskell Young Homemakers are acting as chairman for the drive.

The goal of the Red River Red Cross Blood Program is to enable the community to meet the total needs for blood and blood products for all residents of the 41 counties it serves in Northern Texas and Southern Oklahoma through the hospitals in the region.

To meet this need, which is currently 91 units of blood per day, Red Cross relies on the cooperation of the entire community for donor support. To do this involves the participation of organized donor groups among business and labor, industry, churches, schools, fraternal and civic organizations, etc.

Availability of blood to patients is predicated only on need as prescribed by a physician. Neither the Blood Program, the attending physician, nor the hospitals require patients to replace blood used.

Fees connected with blood transfused reflect a processing charge to hospitals which includes Red Cross costs of collecting, processing, and distribution, as well as the hospital charge for transfusion

and laboratory services. These charges are covered, wholly or partially, by most health insurance plans. It must be emphasized that not cost is added for the blood itself and that replacement of blood by individual patients in no way affects either the availability

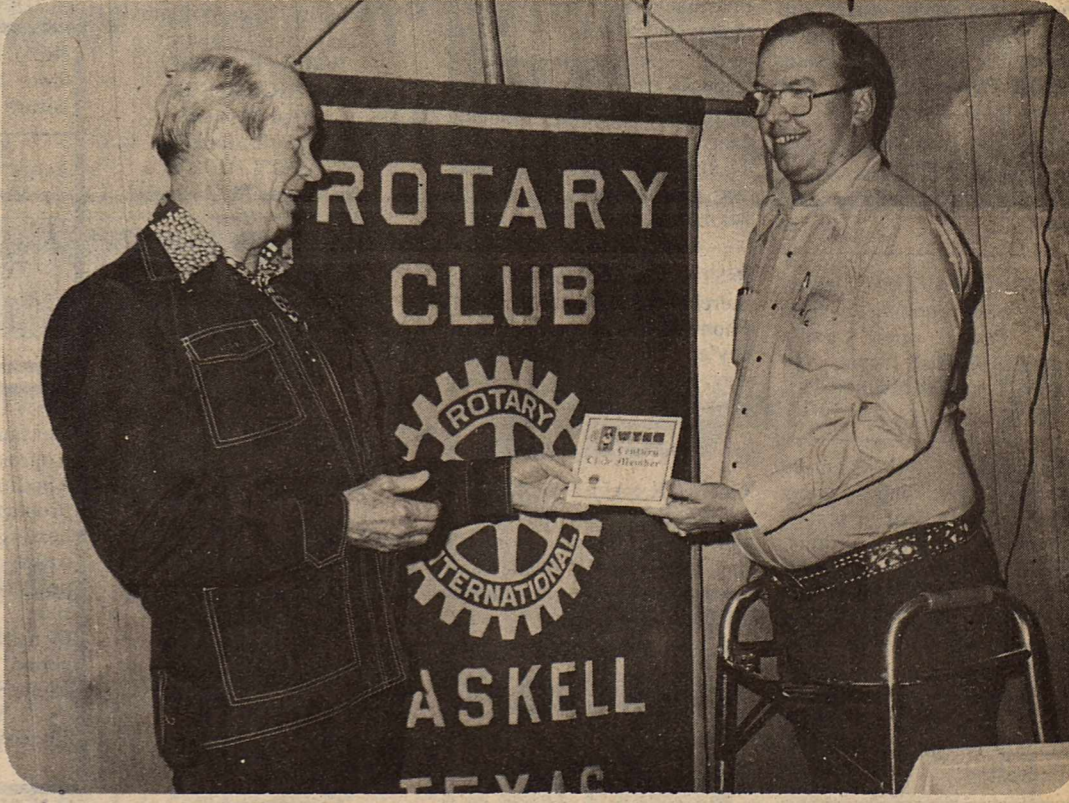
of blood for transfusion or the finances involved in blood usage in hospitals in the region.

These goals and policies enable persons to participate as donors, with the Red Cross serving as intermediary, in a unique human transaction.

The only reason for giving blood is to support the survival of someone seriously ill or injured. Since persons in good health are the only source, we urge you to promote participation in the Red Cross Blood Program in your local community.

Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service
Assisting

"Wildlife Needs You" is the theme of the 1978 National Wildlife Week March 19-25.

The conservation endeavor is sponsored by the National Wildlife Foundation with the help of the Sportsman's Clubs of Texas, Inc.

The Soil Conservation Service is cooperating with the observance by offering publications about wildlife to interested people.

All of us in SCS have a keen

appreciation of wildlife. Wildlife provides esthetic, environmental, economic, and other benefits. Since they need food, cover, and water, the best way to help wildlife is to provide adequate habitat.

Most wildlife in Texas inhabits privately owned farms and ranches. This land provides hunting, fishing, and other values inherent in a well-balanced landscape and the fish and wildlife it supports. For that reason, farmers and ranchers play a key role in maintaining wildlife populations.

Single copies of the following publications can be obtained at the Haskell SCS Field Office:

INVITE BIRDS TO YOUR HOME-lists 20 plants that can be grown in landscape plantings in Texas and gives the member of bird species that use each variety.

CATFISH FARMING-This USDA publication, written by SCS biologists, tells how to grow channel, blue and white catfish in ponds, raceways, or cages.

GRASSLAND RESTORATION AND WILDLIFE-tells how to manage grasslands,

brush management patterns and wildlife use.

There are many other publications available through SCS and the Extension Service on wildlife. Most will have to be special ordered. We will be glad to order any publication on wildlife that is not available locally.

The SCS has a small staff of biologists especially trained in wildlife and fisheries that we can call on to help assist landowners improve their wildlife habitat.

Wildlife habitat can be anything from an odd area in the corner of a field to native grassland pastures hundreds of acres in size. Many thousands of acres of Haskell County land has been designated by the landowners as wildlife land. Most of it has a secondary land use of wildlife land while serving a primary land use of grazing land. Very little, if any, effort is required to establish wildlife habitats. Supplemental feeding of quail and dove will naturally invite these species onto your land if you will only provide cover and water for them.

Let us assist you with planning for wildlife on your farm or ranch.

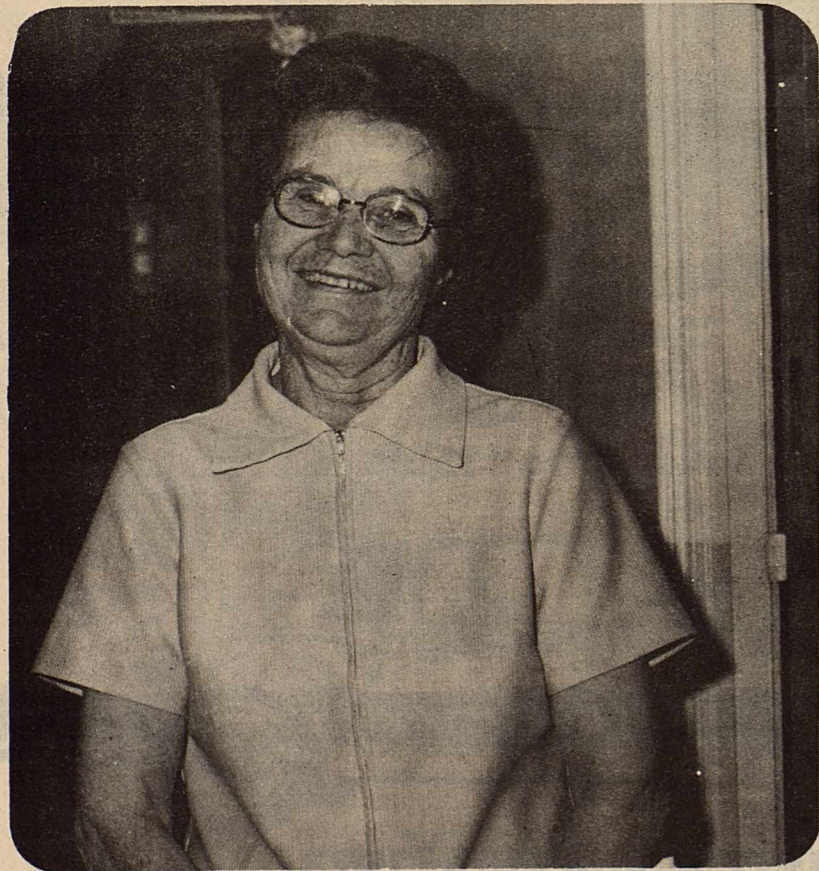

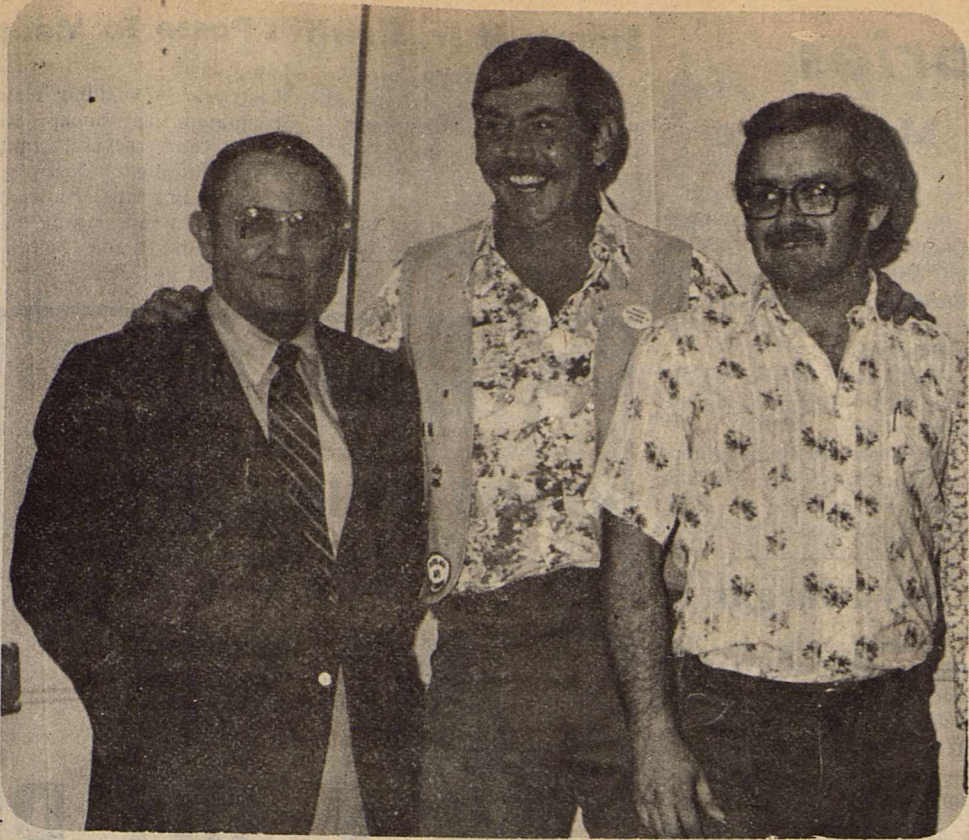
