Blood March

The Red River Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Haskell today. March 16, from 1 to 6 p.m. in the Community Building of the Haskell National Bank.

Goal for the drive is 80 units and members of the Haskell Young Homemakers are acting as chairman for the drive.

The goal of the Red River Red Cross Blood Program is to enable the community to meet the total needs for blood and blood products for all residents of the 41 counties it serves in Northern Texas and Southern Oklahoma through

the hospitals in the region. To meet this need, which is currently 91 units of blood per day, Red Cross relies on the cooperation of the entire community for donor support. To do this involves the participation of organized donor groups among business and labor, industry, churches, schools, fraternal and civic organizations, etc.

Availability of blood - to patients is predicated only on need as prescribed by a physician. Neither the Blood Program, the attending physician, nor the hospitals require patients to replace blood used.

Fees connected with blood transfused reflect a processing charge to hospitals which includes Red Cross costs of collecting, processing, and distribution, as well as the hospital charge for transfusion

charges are covered, wholly or partially, by most health insurance plans. It must be emphasized that not cost is added for the blood itself and that replacement of blood by individual patients in no way affects either the availability


finances involved in blood usage in hospitals in the

region. These goals and policies enable persons to participate as donors, with the Red Cross serving as intermediary, in a unique human transaction.

WASHINGTON "As It Looks From Here"

FEBRUARY 24, 1977, we wrote in this space about the snail darter whose habitat is in the Little Tennessee River where a reservoir is nearly completed. A court suit by the environmentalists stopped work on the \$11 million project and it is still in the courts.

A THREE-INCH LITTLE PERCH has now been holding up for thirteen months the completion of the dam. Work stopped four days prior to the date set for dropping the gates and impounding water that would supply electric power at a time when we are short of energy. This is the case of having one law stop a project which other laws have authorized and financed. The Congress asked the General Accounting Office to look into the situation and suggest alternatives. Sure enough, a suggestion cheerfully came that the dam can be dismantled and the site restored to its original condition for around \$16 million. This saga of the snail darter takes on the proportions of Moby Dick or the Loch Ness Monster. IN ADDITION TO THE

Taxpayers can prevent possible slower processing of their tax returns and delay in issuance of refund due by double checking their returns before filing, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Some of the most common taxpayer mistakes, according to the IRS, include arithmetic errors, use of the wrong filing status, failure to sign the return and especially to provide two signatures in the case of a joint return, and failure to attach all necessary. documents.

The IRS also urge taxpayers to use the peel-off label that comes with the tax package on their returns in order to avoid possible social security number errors. Taxpayers can also save time and speed up processing by ma returns in the coded, preaddressed envelope found in their tax packages, according

AUSTIN-Few consumers "peak" (high traffic) periods realize when they purchase and "off-peak" (low-traffic) plane tickets-whether for periods. Sometimes there are business or pleasure-that separate fares for "shoulder" they are taking part in a (moderate traffic) periods. consumer transaction. Fewer -Excursions: These are still realize that they can exercise some control over the

round-trip discount plans that often specify a minimum and maximum number of days between outbound and return flights. If you cancel your reservation for an excursion flight you may have to pay a penalty. -Tour fares: These fares are

part of packages that include air transportation and such ground accommodations as hotel rooms and bus service.

-Group fares: Discounts are often available to groups. The cost per person depends on the size of the group.

Since it is difficult for the average consumer to keep up with the latest regulations of the Civil Aeronautics Board, the federal agency that deals with all U.S.-certificated airlines and foreign airlines that serve within the country you'll probably want to rely on a travel agent. It's important when you do to explore the alternatives. What are the lowest fares on the route you

want to take? What do you have to do to qualify? Would it pay to take a more circuitous route? Would it be worthwhile to sign up for a tour? What happens if you cancel out, or want to change your plans?

Also, if things go wrong with your trip, it will help to know what your rights and alternatives are. Here are some guidelines offered by our Consumer Protection Division lawyers for coping with the most common problems:

-Delays and cancellations: Airlines have the right to cancel flights without prior notice. When a flight is cancelled, the airlines is required to get you on the next available flight to your destination. There's no extra charge even if you have a coach ticket and wind up in

-Bumping: If you are bumped, you may be entitled

to "denied boarding compensation." The compensation doesn't always apply to foreign airlines, and it never applies to intrastate airlines. The most you can collect is \$200. You don't have to accept it if you prefer to sue.

-Lost or damaged baggage: Report damage or loss immediately. The airline will send you a claim form within a few days. Baggage is often located within 24 hours, but if your baggage is permanently lost the airline will cover your loss up to \$750 per bag.





Farm Bureau Supports Bill

The American Farm Bureau Federation supports the concept in a one-year, land-retirement bill that could put money into farmers' hands in the next few weeks, according to the president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart said Thursday the AFBF Board of Directors has endorsed the concept of the Talmadge-Dole Bill (S.2690). The Board's recommendation also encourages Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland to use his discretionary administrative authority to proceed with this bill as a guideline to activate an effective set-aside program, the TFB president

Chaloupka is a member of the AFBF Board which met in the nation's capital March 6-9. The adopted proposal carries out set-aside recommendations made by the TFB and

other state Farm Bureaus.

The proposal, introduced by Senator Robert Dole (R., Kan.) Senator Herman Talmadge (D. Ga.), would pay farmers some \$2.3 billion to withhold from production not less than 31 million acres of cropland that otherwise would be harvested or planted in wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, cotton, and soybeans.

Taking a punch at public opinion, Nobel prize winner Dr. Norman Borlaug speaking recently in Houston, said the basic attitude toward farmers has been a hindrance to greater food production. Borlaug, now associated with

the Rockefeller Foundation in Mexico City, said the public does not understand the necessity of the profit motive to increase production. The Houston Chronicle quoted the scientist as saying, "If a farmer can't improve his standard of living, he will not adopt the new technologies". He said the hope of feeding a growing world depends on technological advances. Pointing to last year's uproar over foreign grain sales, Borlaug said the public talked about "our grain" as though it was public property. This in effect was making a decision which affected the income of the producer without consulting the

(1) The program would be voluntary. Each farmer would be free to participate or not to participate.

(2) The 31 million acres to be set-aside would be in addition to the land that would be set-aside under the programs already announced for wheat and feed grains. In order to qualify for payments under this program, a farmer would have to participate in the set-aside programs the Secretary has already announced.

(3) To prevent the benefits of the program going only to landowners, the Secretary would have to promulgate regulations that provide adequate safeguards to protect the interests of tenants and sharecroppers.

(4) The payment limitation provisions of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977 would not be applicable to payments under this program.

(5) The acreage specified in the bill would only be a minimum. The Secretary could require that more land be set-aside to achieve reasonable price objectives.

(6) The Secretary would be required to administer the program in such a manner as to avoid the destruction of crops already planted to the extend possible.

(7) The Secretary would be required to limit the total acreage in any county or local community so as not to adversely effect the local economy.

(8) The amounts that would be paid to individual producers would be determined through the submissions of bids. However, it is estimated that the national average of payments to producers would be about \$75 an acre.

(9) The Secretary would be required to make partial payments under the program immediately after contracts with the producers are consummated.





Each person makes choices that influence health--both physical and emotional--and some of the most important choices involve the individual's lifestyle, she says.

Life style is often linked to the diseases which now are taking the greatest toll in lives and suffering, the agent explains.

We may decide our own link to those diseases by how we eat, drink, smoke and exercise and how we handle stress, anger and other emotions, she says.

Some choices an individual can make to ensure health start with five "take care of yourself" guidelines, many of which focus on lifestyle, Mrs.

She recommends the following: -Establish sound health habits, such as balanced nutrition, regular exercise and careful dental hygiene. -Recognize early warning signs and symptoms of disease and take action to prevent extreme consequences of the disease. -When necessary, use the health-care system efficiently by carefully selecting qualified physicians, by seeking diagnosis early and by bolling through on recommended treatment. - Use health care products effectively.

That includes following label instructions on over-thecounter drugs and physician's instructions on prescription drugs. - Learn and apply correct health-care procedures such as cardiopulmonary resuscitation, in cases of



We are still learning more, day by day, about what these Treaties ultimately might cost the American taxpayers," Godrey, who resigned last fall as executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to seek the 17th District seat being vacated by U.S. Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson.

'But one thing definitely is clear: as written, these Treaties would prohibit us from negotiating with other countries in Central America to build a similar canal." said Godfrey. "There should be no such stipulation in any Treaty concerning the Panama Canal.

'It seems ironic to me that Panama's leftist dictator, Gen. Omar Torrijos, has the nerve to warn us that if the U.S. Senate amends the treaties, he may have to ask the people of Panama to vote on them again. Their vote would be on whether to accept our gift of the Canal, and the cash we

would give them to take it. "But in this country, our people are not permitted to vote on giving the Canal

House of Representatives is not allowed to vote on the Treaties," said Godfrey.

'The main argument for giving away the Panama Canal appears to be that we cannot defend it. I am not willing to accept that premise and, even if I could, I do not believe I could go along with the idea that this is a legitimate reason for giving it away.

Furthermore, we should be wise enough by now to know that any 'guarantee' we may obtain from the present dictator of Panama, on such things as future use and defense of the Canal, is meaningless, for all practical purposes," said Godrey.

'These Treaties would bind future generations of Americans to an agreement which might be demolished by the next dictator of Panama," he

Godfrey, who spent part of his U.S. Navy service during World War II in the Canal Zone, and his wife have visited 24 foreign countries during recent years.

'I have some strong feelings about foreign affairs," said Godfrey, "and one of them is not to trust such dictators as General Torrijos."
