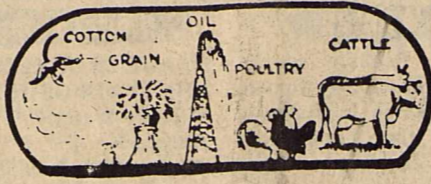

## 17th Cong. Candidates Visit Haskell

Six of the eight announced candidates in the 17th congressional race were in Haskell Monday night to meet and visit with the voters of this area.

Candidates attending the meeting were: Jim Baum, Bill Fisher, Fike Godfrey, Dusty Rhodes, Charles Stenholm and Crews McCulloch. Two

candidates, Jim Snowden and Jim Sharp did not attend the meeting.

The Haskell County Farm Bureau sponsored the meeting and allowed each candidate an allotted time for opening remarks, and specified times to respond to seven questions selected by the Directors of the County Farm Bureau.

The questions were: Define inflation and what do you propose to do about it; what is your general philosophy about farm programs and are there specific changes you would like to make in current farm programs; what is your position on quantity and quality controls on imports which enter the United States;

what is your view on federal gun control; Texas has a right-to-work law which is supported by an overwhelming majority of Texans, will you support a national right-to-work law; exports represent a significant part of the total market for our agriculture production. What are your ideas on expanding our export markets, will you work for expanded export markets; and Americans are constantly harassed by EPA, OSHA, Pure Food and Drug, Labor and other agencies. Do you believe that we are over-regulated and what will you do to reduce excessive government regulations and red tape.

In their opening remarks, Baum, Rhodes, and Stenholm stated their support for farmers; Fisher, the only Republican candidate, expressed his desire to make the country a better place for our children; Godfrey said that all the candidates understood the problems, that the voter should discuss the qualifications of the candidates; McCulloch expressed a desire to represent the entire population of the district.

Baum, Fisher, Godfrey, and Rhodes generally agreed that a balanced budget and reduced federal spending were the best solutions to halting inflation. Stenholm urged the study of government spending and stopping useless government paperwork. McCulloch proposed the halt of deficit spending and improving the balance of trade.

Responding to the second question Baum said that we need farm set-aside programs and that 100% parity could be achieved by acreage controls. Fisher said that the farm program should be stable so that a farmer knew from year-to-year what he had to work with and the USDA should support agriculture and the State Department

should stay out. Godfrey said the farm program is a political football and that the USDA should be responsive to the problems of agriculture and all other political groups should stay away. He also said that a nation which can send people to the moon and bring them back safely should be able to send a farmer to the field and allow him to come back with a reasonable profit. Rhodes said that farmers should be able to produce without a farm program. He said farmers are good managers and that the government should get out of price controls of agriculture products on the international market. Stenholm said that the world market is not a free market and we should regulate supply to meet the demand. McCulloch supported 100% parity and said improving the ag. products exported would have a positive effect in that direction.

All candidates agreed that all products imported should meet the same standards as goods produced in this country.

Baum said he thought we had enough gun control and would oppose any form. Fisher said he was opposed to any federal gun control. Godfrey said our founders put in the Constitution the right to keep and bear arms and we should defend it to our last breath. Rhodes said the Constitution gives us the right to keep arms and he was against gun control. Stenholm said he didn't believe we could take guns out of the hands of criminals and he would be very leary of supporting any type of gun control. McCulloch stated that he was combat trained in the use of most small arms and that he was opposed to gun control.

Godfrey, Rhodes and Stenholm all said they would support a federal right to work law and Baum, Fisher and

McCulloch said that the right to work was a matter which should be left to the individual states. All supported the right to work law in Texas.

While all candidates said that they would work for expanded export markets Godfrey added that he had been working on expanding export markets for the past 10 years.

All six candidates agreed that Americans are over regulated and pledged to attempt to reduce government regulations if elected.

In closing some of the candidates commented on why they got into the race. Baum said he felt that we need to elect more people who were not politicians but people who would stand for what is right. Fisher said he got into the race because he felt we needed young aggressive represent-

ation and to make the country a better place for our children.

Godfrey said that if elected he would do his best to create jobs, increase profits, prosecute criminals and be a congressman we could be proud of. He also remarked that because of his position with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce he would begin effective representation as soon as elected with no adjustment period.

Rhodes said that as an attorney he had represented people in the court house for 20 years and that he knew how to represent the people of this district.

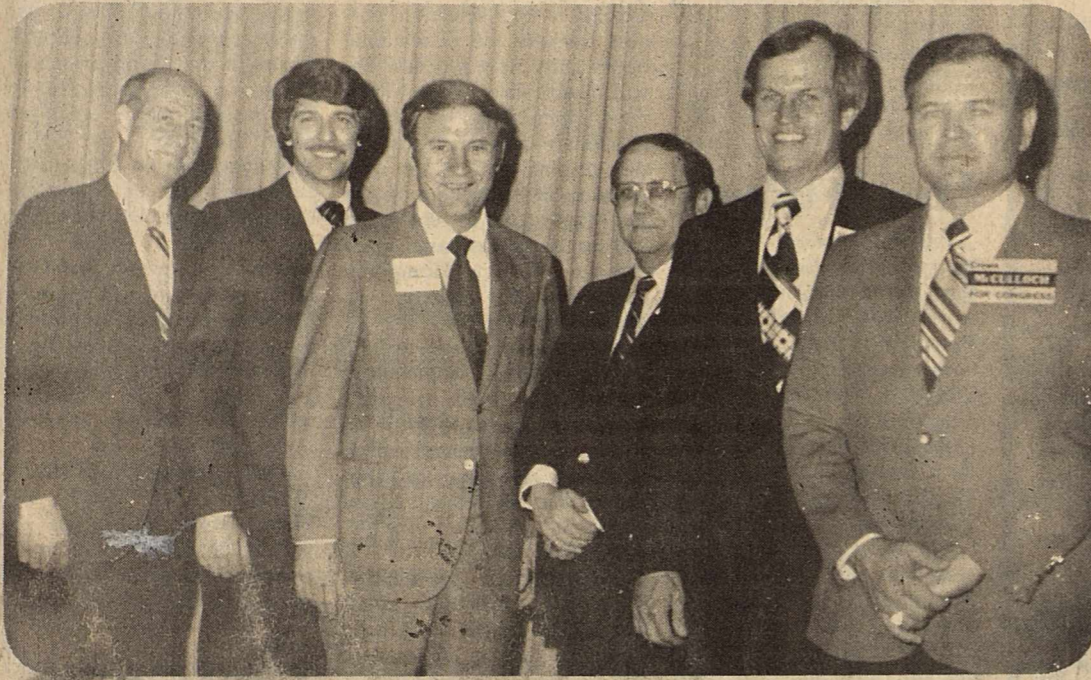
Stenholm expressed his desire to represent the entire district.

McCulloch said he was opposed to special interest groups outside the district contributing to candidates, that he had no such contributions and would represent us because we sent him.

Approximately 100 persons attended the meeting and Baum said that it was the third such meeting and the best attended.

## City-School Elections Set

Haskell County residents will have an opportunity to elect City and School officials this Saturday.

Residents in the City of Haskell will choose two councilmen. The terms of Earl Proctor and E.J. Stewart expire. Proctor has announced for a second term and Stewart did not seek re-election. Royce Williams is unopposed in his bid for the office of Mayor vacated by Belton Duncan who did not file for re-election.

Candidates listed in the order they will appear on the ballot are: W. Dee Larned, Ralph Merchant, Joe Cortez, David Davis, Charles Reed, Franciene Johnson, and Earl Proctor.

Persons residing within the boundaries of the Haskell Independent School District will elect three school board members. Voters will fill two-three year terms and one two year term. The terms of Raymond Andrada, Becky Richardson and Bobby Whisenhunt expire. Of the

three only Andrada is seeking re-election.

Candidates listed in the order they will appear on the ballot are: Wayne Lehrer, L.L. Hise, David Jim Strickland, Raymond Andrada, Wallace Bird, Cliff Morris, Johnny Wheatley, Pat Henry and James Davis.

Voters in the Paint Creek School District will elect two board members with three persons on the ballot. Billy Middlebrook and Walter E. Fischer have announced for re-election and Robert Mickler has also announced. All other county school elections have unopposed candidates.

Rule residents will elect a mayor and two councilmen.

Tom Kutch is unopposed for the office of Mayor and Gary Fannin has announced for re-election. A.D. May is not seeking re-election. Joe Stuller and Leo Nunn have also announced.

Four persons have announced to fill three places of the Weinert City Council. Candidates are: Tiffen Mayfield, Donald Griffis, W.M. Pheonster, and Ed Murphy.

## Church Dedication Set Sunday

The Haskell First Assembly of God Church will have an open house and dedication service this Sunday at 2:30 p.m.

The Church was organized in 1922 and at one time had an average attendance of about 200. This was during the mid 1950's.

Pastor J.C. Amburn told the Church committee that he had a vision of a new church in Haskell when he was interviewed in December 1972. He began talking about the new Church shortly after his appointment on December 10, 1972 and construction of the new facility was begun in March 1976.

The building, fixtures, and land have an appraised value of approximately \$180,000.00. The construction was completed with only about \$3,000.00 of hired labor. All other construction was done by church members, the pastor, and donated by friends.

The first service in the new building was held the last Sunday in May 1977 but construction has continued until just recently. The pastor and his wife grew up in Jacksboro and frequently attended youth rallies in Haskell in the 1950's. His ambition is to return the church to the attendance at that time.

Assembly of God Church members from other churches donated labor and money and many businesses and individuals in Haskell not associated with the church donated supplies, materials, fixtures and money.

In addition to the sanctuary which seats 230, there is a kitchen and rooms for eight classes and a nursery. Originally Church members purchased 3 1/2 acres and have recently purchased an additional 1/2 acre south of the church.

The old church building was offered for sale until last week with the church members voted unanimously to begin a

Spanish Mission. The Mission should begin about May 1.

The Church members are also sponsoring a Black Mission which has been in operation for about three months.

In addition to the dedication and open house there will be a week of celebration April 2-9

with special services at 7:30 p.m. nightly.

Three former pastors, Rev. S.M. Malone, Rev. Cecil Vaughn, and Rev. Troy Frazier, one of the church family. Rev. Thural Reid, an Irving pastor, Rev. Don George, and the Assistant

Superintendent of the North Texas District, the Rev. James Bridges, and Rev. H.S. Earp of Abilene will all present messages during the celebration.

The Rev. E.R. Anderson, Superintendent of the North Texas District will present the dedication message.

Leta is a Sr. forward and has played for the Pirates all four years in High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Winifred Dodds.

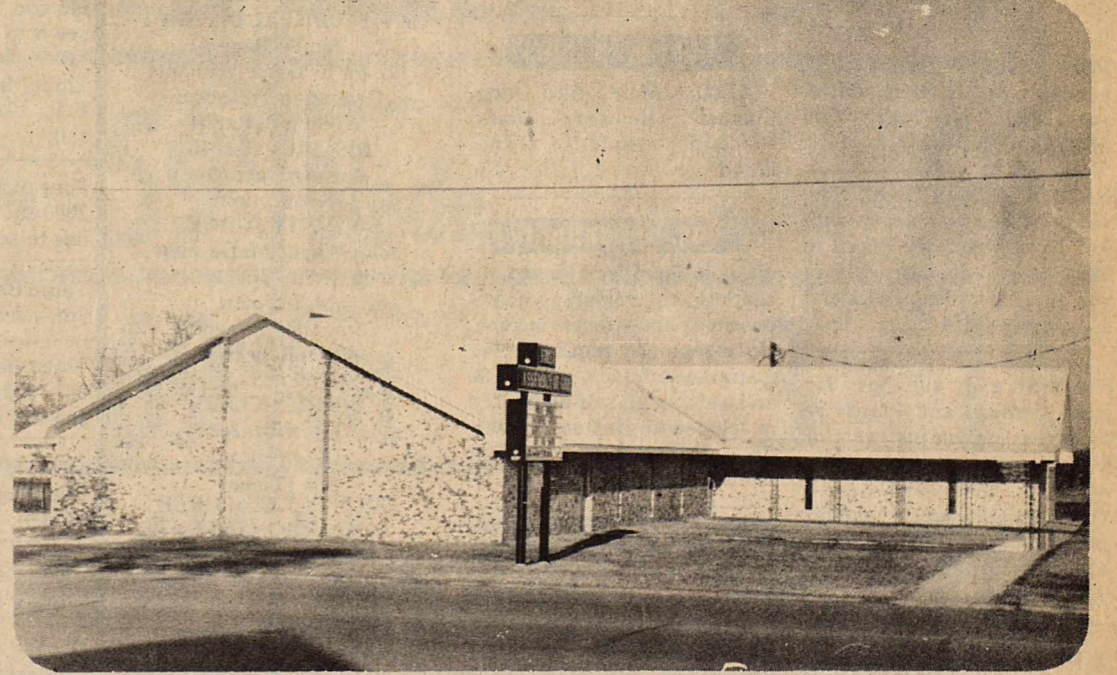
Gena is a Junior guard for the Pirate team and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Fischer. She has played for three years.

Upon graduation, he joined General Telephone Company of the Southwest as a console operator. The following year

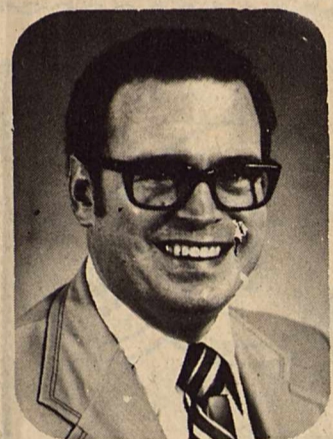

# GED Test Set Saturday

The General Educational Development (GED) Tests will be given at the Haskell High School Official Testing Center, Haskell, Texas, on Saturday, April 1, beginning at 9:00 a.m. The fee for the battery of five tests is \$20.00.

The GED Program provides a means for determining the

educational level of adults who have not completed a formal high school education. A certificate of high school equivalency may be issued to adults who successfully complete the GED examination, verifying that the holder has demonstrated a level of competence on the examination which is equivalent to that of a high school senior.

The program is administered nationally by the American Council on Education, Washington, D.C. The Texas Education Agency authorizes accredited high schools and institutions of higher education to serve as testing centers. The centers administer the GED test to adults who are eligible and report the scores of successful examinees to the Texas Education Agency, which issues certificates of high school equivalency free of charge.

The test has five parts: Correctness and Effectiveness of Expression, Interpretation of Reading Materials in the Social Studies, Interpretation of Reading Materials in the Natural Sciences, Interpretation of Literary Materials, and General Mathematics Ability. The test questions are multiple choice. There is no time limitation but most examinees take approximately eight hours to complete the test battery.

Persons eligible for testing must:

-be a resident of Texas or a member of the Armed Forces stationed in Texas;

-be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year. (Applicants who have attained their 17th birthday and will enter the Armed Forces may test immediately after with-

drawing from high school: -be 18 years of age and officially withdrawn from school.

To receive a certificate of high school equivalency, the examinee must:

-complete the examination with a minimum standard score of 40 on each of the five tests or an average standard score of 45 on all five tests;

-have attained at least their 17th birthday prior to date of testing and be out of school for one calendar year;

-have attained their 18th birthday and be officially withdrawn from school.

Applicants must wait six months before retesting. If the applicant is tutored by a certified teacher of participants in an adult education program, retesting may occur when the instructor determines the applicant is prepared.

Applicants are advised to bring their Social Security Number and their driver's license as proper identification.

## Council Holds Meeting

The regular meeting of the Haskell City Council was held Tuesday night at City Hall with Mayor Pro-Tem Loraine Johnson presiding. Councilman Guy Kennedy gave the invocation.

Water commissioner Bob Philpot, introduced Clyde O'Bar, who discussed the purchase of new water meters for the city. The Councilmen agreed to let Philpot begin formal plans for the replacement program.

George Fouts and Barney Fraizer met with the council to request that the alley behind the west side of the square be paved. They were told that the policy of the City in the past has been to do the dirt work preparatory to paving and to pay 1/2 the cost of the paving. The other 1/2 of the paving should be paid by the adjoining property owners. Members of the council also agreed to do repair on the alley while the affected businessmen discuss the paving project.

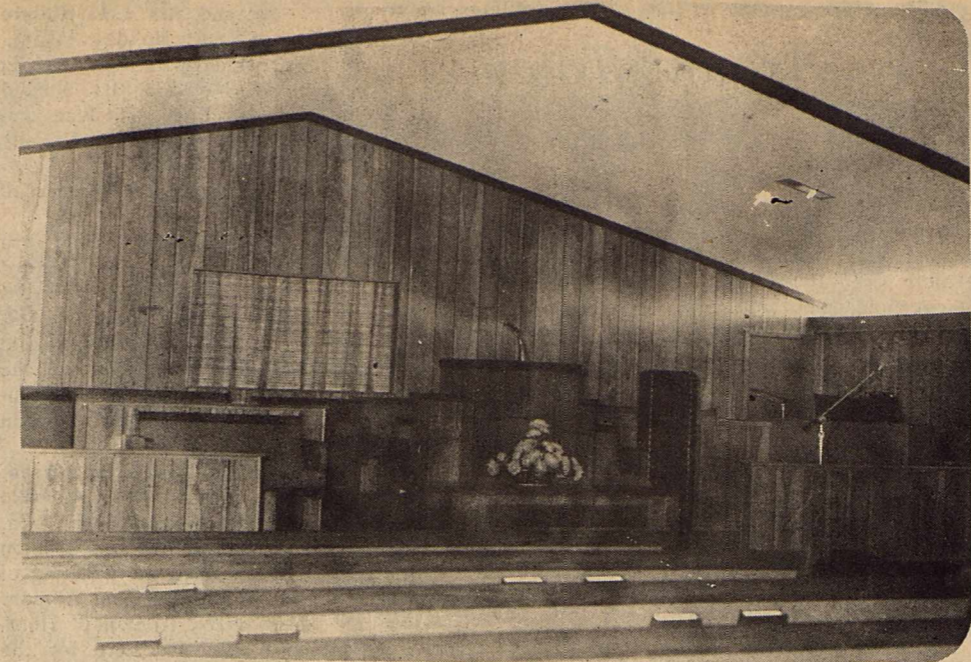

## Commissioners Discuss Grant

Members of the Haskell County Commissioners Court discussed improvements scheduled at Scott Memorial Park. It was announced that two grant applications had been filed with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and that hearings on the applications were to be held the first part of April.

Commissioners agreed to postpone work on the park until word is received about the grant applications. The county should be notified about the outcome of the hearing within a week. It was also announced that concerned citizens could write letters to: J.M. Beall, Chief, Boat Ramp Division Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and to John C. Mead, Grants in Aid Branch, TP&WD, Austin, Texas 78744. The letters should express the need for the improvements at Scott Memorial Park. The two grants are separate and would give between 50 and 70% funding for the projects.

In other court action County Clerk Jenny Brazell reported on the microfilming project and said that the project should be completed within the next two weeks.

Members of the court voted to issued two time warrants in the amount of \$5,000 each, one each to Prec. 2 and 4, for the balance of the purchase of a used dozier to be used by both precincts. A \$15,000 down payment from the revenue sharing funds was

also used to pay for the machine.

Members of the court also voted to install another master

control in the County Jail Communications System. The system is required by the jail standard act.

Commissioners also discussed the purchase of a vehicle to be used by the experienced citizens center. The Court had accepted bids on a six passenger car and were then told by the state agency which was to pay for the vehicle that they were to purchase a van. Originally the county was told they could buy whatever vehicle suited their local needs. Members of the court authorized the County Judge to contact the State and request that they approve the purchase of the car.

Hospital board members were appointed for two year terms. Three members were appointed and all three are currently serving on the board. They are: Mrs. Frank Campbell, Sam Neinst, and Buck Everett.

Members of the Court also voted to allow General Telephone to install buried cables in Precs. 1 & 2.

Cardboard chewing cattle may become more common during the next few years. Researchers say cellulose in cardboard provides a much better diet for cattle than newsprint materials which were experimented with for several years. Giving the new product the title, "Rumose", promoters are pushing for acceptance of treated corrugated boxes as a viable feed supplement in the feedlot for commercial feeders. Developers advocate grinding or pelleting of the boxes, then mixing with whey (waste material from cheese making) or other materials to make the boxes more palatable. One of the key researchers for this project is Dr. John Campbell of the University of Missouri. Dr. Campbell says the process of manufacturing the boxes may increase their digestibility which "approaches or even exceeds the digestibility of common forages". For cattle, "box" lunch may take on a whole new meaning.

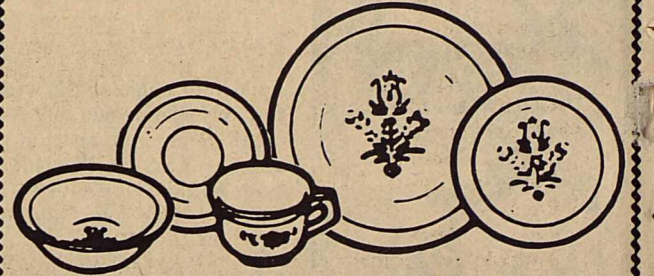

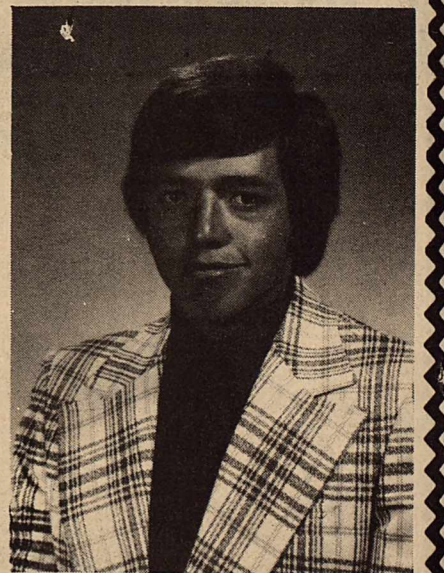

## Service Available In Haskell Area

There has always been a tremendous need for our clients who needed skilled nursing service by a LVN or a RN, but they were ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing need did not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care". Seeing this special need the MBFA Foundation (More Benefits For The Aged), began a new service as of February 1, 1978 to meet the needs of these special clients. Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines or those who need skilled care, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no means of insurance, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of the MBFA Foundation. An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B 12, or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by their attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans, or private insurance of any kind, and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient could have the visits by the LVN or RN in their home at a reduced rate based on their individual financial status. This service will also be most helpful in the instance of the patient who has been on the home health service under

Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client himself can pay a reduced rate and remain on the service under this new system, through the Texas Homemaker Service. This service should not be confused with regular homemaker services, as this is still skilled nursing care given by a LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient. You may discuss this with your physician or you may call the home health center in Seymour for more information. The phone number to call is 888-5505, or in Haskell, Bertha Pelsue, LVN, at 864-2439 will be happy to answer any questions you or your physician may have regarding this new service. The goal of the Foundation is to be able to meet the total medical needs of their clients, and this new service will provide another means to our clients towards better and more complete medical care. The MBFA Foundation's motto is a "Vision With A Task" and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve.

# WTU Chairman Retires After 45 Years Service

Randal Meador, director of engineering and a veteran of 29 years with WTU, was elected a vice president and also was elected to the Board.

Glenn Rosilier, who is controller and director of accounting and finance heads the company's financial operations, assumed the additional

title to treasurer. Former treasurer was David Webb, who has resigned after seven years with the company to enter private business as a realtor and certified public accountant.

Don Shahan, administrative assistant in federal taxes and financial analysis, was elected an assistant secretary. George Woodfin, assistant to the treasurer, was elected assistant treasurer.

Re-elected were: Chalker, president and chief executive officer; G. Holman King, vice president and director of corporate affairs, W.P. (Bill) Sayles, vice president and director of customer services; Jerry Johnson, vice president and director of administrative affairs; LeVerne Grace, secretary and assistant treasurer; and Ann Hawk, assistant secretary.

Kennedy, who is well known throughout the electric utility industry and in Texas business and publishing circles, is WTU's senior employee in length of service.

He joined the company in 1933 as a part-time mail clerk while attending Hardin-Simmons University. When he graduated in 1934 with a BA degree, he went to work fulltime in the Treasury Department and the Advertising Department before joining the Army in 1943 during World War II.

After duty as a public relations officer, Kennedy rejoined WTU in 1946 and served successively as veteran affairs coordinator, advertising manager and manager of the Public Sales Dept. He was elected a vice president in 1961 and a director in 1965.

On Jan. 1, 1975, Kennedy became chairman and chief executive officer. He relinquished the chief executive post in 1976 after suffering a heart attack, and was elected

chairman of the board. Kennedy has been prominent in civic affairs, both in Abilene and in the state. He has been a member of the board and executive committee of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. He served on the Board of Directors and is a former vice president of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, has been a director and vice president of the Texas Manufacturers Assn. and a director and president of the Texas Public Relations Assn. He also has been chairman of the Information Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Meador is a native of Fort Chadbourne in Coke County, a graduate of Bronte High School and a World War II Marine Corps veteran.

He joined WTU in 1949 after earning an electrical engineering degree from Texas A&M University. He was named director of engineering in 1977.

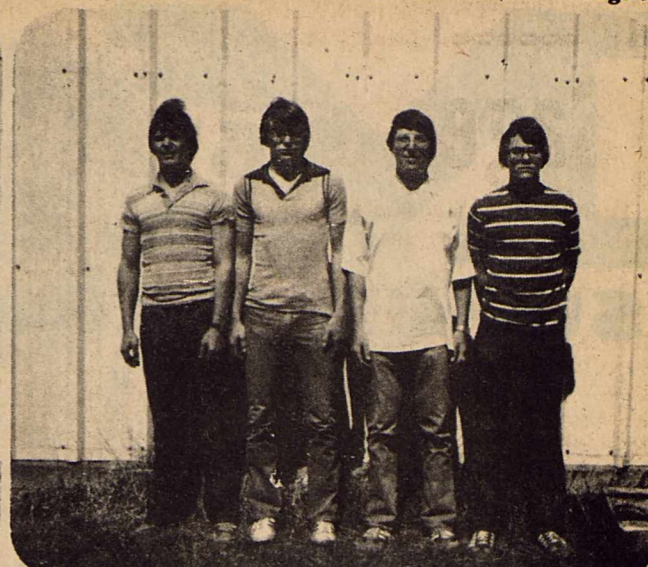

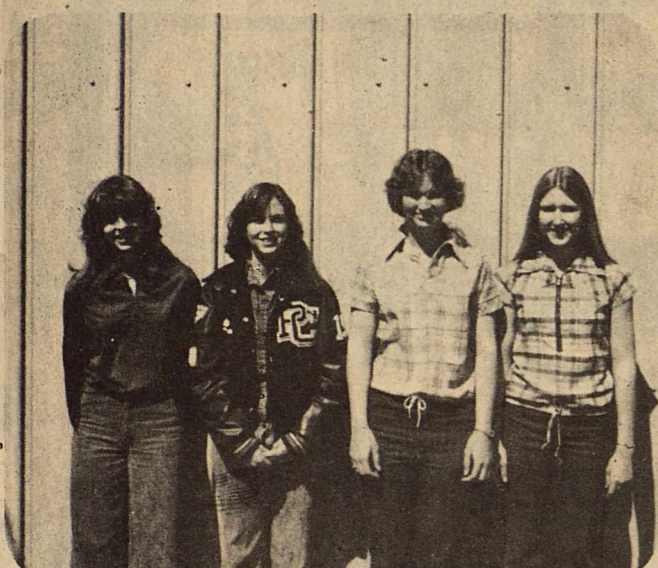

**Conservation Viewpoints**  
USDA Soil Conservation Service  
Assisting  
Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District

President Carter has signed the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (Public Law 95-192). This is a most significant piece of legislation concerning soil and water conservation districts and the Soil Conservation Service. It will guide the future of the nation's soil and water conservation movement.

"It is our task to carry out PL 95-192 to help insure that every American is aware of the need to wisely use soil and water resources and to offer the most effective methods to do the job. Your ideas and full support are needed in carrying out this task", said George C. Marks, State Conservationist.

Mr. Marks went on to state that a major requirement in implementing the Act is to provide for public participation. "We plan to do this by holding two statewide meetings and request that each soil and water conservation district host a similar one at the local level", Marks said.

Additional information and assistance will be provided to

you by our office as it becomes available.

This is a joint effort with conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, Soil Conservation Service, and other organizations.

R.M. Davis, Administrator, Soil Conservation Service said that the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 will attune SCS programs more closely to the nation's conservation needs, help conservation districts make their local programs more effective, and give more citizens a chance to share their ideas.

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District will encourage public input by conducting open meetings to explain the upcoming resources appraisal, to discuss conservation needs, and to solicit ideas we can use in developing policy and carrying out our mutual work. We will keep you posted.
