

Haskell County residents will have an opportunity to elect City and School officials

this Saturday. Residents in the City of Haskell will choose two councilmen. The terms of Earl Proctor and E.J. Stewart expire. Proctor has announced for a second term and Stewart did not seek re-election. Royce Williams is unopposed in his bid for the office of Mayor vacated by Belton Duncan who

did not file for re-election. Candidates listed in the order they will appear on the ballot are: W. Dee Larned, Ralph Merchant, Joe Cortez, David Davis, Charles Reed, Franciene Johnson, and Earl Proctor.

and coaches next Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the City Hall. Business will include plans for the field and everyone is urged to what is your view on federal gun control; Texas has a right-to-work law which is supported by an overwhelming majority of Texans, will you support a national right-to work law; exports represent a significant part of the total market for our agriculture production. What are your ideas on expanding our export markets, will you work for expanded export markets; and Americans are constantly harrassed by EPA, OSHA, Pure Food and Drug, Labor and other agencies. Do you believe that we are over-regulated and what will you do to reduce excessive government regulations and red tape.

In their opening remarks, Baum, Rhodes, and Stenholm stated their support for farmers; Fisher, the only Republican candidate, expressed his desire to make the country a better place for our children: Godfrey said that all the candidates understood the problems, that the voter should discuss the qualifications of the candidates; McCulloch expressed a desire to represent the entire population of the district.

Baum, Fisher, Godfrey, and Rhodes generally agreed that a balanced budget and reduced federal spending were the best solutions to halting inflation. Stenholm urged the study of government spending and stopping useless government paperwork. McCulloch proposed the halt of deficite spending and improving the balance of trade.

Responding to the second question Baum said that we need farm set-a-side programs and that 100% parity could be achieved by acreage controls. Fisher said that the farm program should be stable so that a farmer knew from year-to-year what he had to work with and the USDA should support agriculture and the State Department should stay out. Godfrey said the farm program is a political football and that the USDA should be responsive to the problems of agriculture and all other political groups should stay away. He also said that a nation which can send people to the moon and bring them back safely should be able to send a farmer to the field and allow him to come back with a reasonable profit. Rhodes said that farmers should be able to produce without a farm program. He said farmers are good managers and that the government should get out of price controls of agriculture products on the international market. Stenholm said that the world market is not a free market and we should regulate supply to meet the demand. McCulloch supported 100% parity and said improving the ag. products exported would have a posi-

tive effect in that direction. All candidates agreed that all products imported should meet the same standards as goods produced in this coun-

Baum said he thought we had enough gun control and would oppose any form. Fisher said he was opposed to any federal gun control. Godfrey said our founders put in the Constitution the right to keep and bear arms and we should defend it to our last breath. Rhodes said the Constitution gives us the right to keen arms and he was against gun control. Stenholm said he didn't believe we could take guns out of the hands of criminals and he would be very leary of supporting any of gun control. McCulloch stated that he was combat trained in the use of most small arms and that he was opposed to gun control.

Godfrey, Rhodes and Stenholm all said they would support a federal right to work law and Baum, Fisher and

McCulloch said that the right to work was a matter which should be left to the individual states. All supported the right to work law in Texas.

While all candidates said that they would work for expanded export markets Godfrey added that he had been working on expanding export markets for the past 10

All six candidates agreed that Americans are over regulated and pledged to attempt to reduce government

regulations if elected. In closing some of the candidates commented on why they got into the race. Baum said he felt that we need to elect more people who were not politicans but people who would stand for what is right. Fisher said he got into the race because he felt we needed young aggressive represent-

## Church Dedication Set Sunday

Haskell Assembly of God Church will have an open house and dedication service this Sunday at 2:30 p.m.

The Church was organized in 1922 and at one time had an average attendance of about 200. This was during the mid 1950's.

Pastor J.C. Amburn told the Church committee that he had a vision of a new church in Haskell when he was interviewed in December 1972. He began talking about the new Church shortly after his appointment on December 10, 1972 and construction of the new facility was begun in March 1976.

The building, fixtures, and

land have an appraised value of approximately \$180,000.00. The construction was completed with only about \$3,000.00 of hired labor. All other construction was done by church members, the pastor, and donated by friends.

The first service in the new building was held the last Sunday in May 1977 but construction has continued until just recently.

The pastor and his wife grew up in Jacksboro and frequently attended youth rallies in Haskell in the 1950's. His ambition is to return the church to the attendance at that time.

Assembly of God Church members from other churches donated labor and money and many businesses and individuals in Haskell not associated with the church donated supplies, materials, fixtures and money.

In addition to the sanctuary which seats 230, there is a kitchen and rooms for eight classes and a nursery.

Originally Church members purchases 31/2 acres and have recently purchased an additional 1/2 acre south of the church.

The old church building was offered for sale until last week voted unanimously to begin a

Spanish Mission. The Mission should begin about May 1.

The Church members are also sponsoring a Black Mission which has been in operation for about three



WASHINGTON, D.C .- reme Court in years. WHEN THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1964 WAS PASSED. Congress made it law that each individual seeking employment should be judged on his or her merit and ability to do a job--not on the basis of his race, creed or color.

AS IS THE CASE IN MANY INSTANCES, FEDERAL AGENCIES HAVE DE-VISED PROGRAMS which judge a person solely on the basis of a certain group or race. Affirmative action, in terms of expanding opportunities and making sure that qualified minorities are fairly treated in the selection process for jobs and educational opportunity, is a process that will benefit every one. When rigid numerical ratios or quotas are applied, it distorts the original intent of this concept. In the debate on the Civil Rights Act in 1964, such stalwart supporters as the late Senator Hubert Humphrey spoke on the question of quotas and expressed a clear opinion that he did not think the Act required an employer to achieve any kind of racial balance in the work force by giving any preferential treatment to any individual or group. We see today Federal programs in direct conflict

with this intent. Dear Editor:

On our recent trip to Washington, D.C., Rick Rodgers, Oregon delegate, spoke to the crowd at the rally Thursday, March 16, before we marched to the Capitol and the Department of Agriculture building. Rodgers said he had spoken many times on parity, but said he had "disparity" today because the farmers were not getting their fair "In the early 1950's, certain

powers wanted free trade in this country. The only way they could get it was to break agriculture's back with the importation of cattle in this country. They imported over 7 billion pounds annually over what we were exporting. They kept importing cattle till they broke the American grain farmer, because when you don't feed cattle, you build up reserves of grain. By having reserves of grain, they were able to ship cheap grain overseas, take the foreign labor out of the fields who were feeding themselves, and put them in manufacturing, so and ship back to America. They did two things-broke the American farmer, and broke the American manufacturer's

'We find out why they wanted to do this. In the early 1950's, Chase Manhattan of New York, Citibank of New York, and Bank of America had 25% of their income as foreign investments. Today those very same people have 76%, 68%, and 58% of their income as foreign invest-

What they do is sell our wheat from Oregon to Japan and make \$3.53 a bushel off it. They bring in foreign automobiles, television sets and everything else you can dream of, and they make a profit off that. And then, in turn, on top give. Even our time, our love of all that, when I don't make any money I have to borrow money and pay interest on it. Today in America, 26c of every dollar you spend is to She instilled into our hearts, pay interest costs. We feel the

greatest debt-ridden society even known has been created just to finance the whims of a

few certain people. 'The other day we were over here in the Capitol trying to talk to people about what was right and what was wrong. It really disgusted me when I found out the American farmer was only worth 50c a bushel compared to 5 Panama Canal votes to trade away our country. I did not realize how bad America

was until the other day.' Rodgers explained that American Agriculture was in Washington to demand an opportunity to feed their families under the free enter-

prise system. 'I feel we are no longer an Agriculture Movement-we've got to become an American Movement. We're fighting for the survival of our farms and our families, and also every bit of freedom this nation has ever known. Very soon in this country, there will no longer be any middle class Americans. There will be a lot of poor Americans and a lot of super-rich Americans. I do not think in those plans, there is any place for the American farmer to fit in. What we are talking about is trying to save America!"

"It is our task to carry out PL 95-192 to help insure that every American is aware of the need to wisely use soil and water resources and to offer the most effective methods to do the job. Your ideas and full support are needed in carrying out this task", said George C. Marks, State Conservationist.

Mr Marks went on to state that a major requirement in implementing the Act is to provide for public participation. "We plan to do this by holding two statewide meetings and request that each soil and water conservation district host a similiar one at the local level", Marks said.

Additional information and assistance will be provided to

you by our office as it becomes available.

This is a joint effort with conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, Soil Conwater conservation districts servation Service, and other organizations.

Davis, Administrator, Soil Conservation Service said that the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 will attune SCS programs more closely to the nation's conservation needs, help conservation districts make thier local programs more effective, and give more citizens a chance to share their ideas.




