Farm Program Deadline Is Extended

Haskell County Farmers wishing to participate in the Cotton, Feed Grain And/or wheat programs will have an additional two weeks to sign up, Glenn R. Brzozowski, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS), announced.

Mr. Brzozowski said that Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, was extending the signup period for the programs from May 1 through May 15 because of changes announced March 29 in the program. On that date, Secretary Bergland authorized additional diversion of cropland under the cotton and feed grain programs and permitted wheat program participants to graze out their wheat or harvest hay on a percentage of

their planted acreage. The U.S. Department of Agriculture will issue weekly reports each Tuesday until the signup is completed, the date of the first report is set for April 25.

There has been no change as of this publication in the dates to certify 1978 wheat, barley and oats acreage. The final date remains May 1.

All producers are urged to sign their intentions to participate in the 1978 programs in order to be eligible for all program benefits.



proletariat cannot afford them while there are not enough capitalists to buy them. With this overproduction and underconsumption, the economy crisis peaks resulting in a complete collapse of capita-

This is the original Marxian economic view which is the basis for the Communist countries today. But the use of this sort of scientific economics to show the inevitable collapse of capitalsim is a failure. The therory was criticizing capitalism in its early development; the theory is obosolete today. The capability of capitalsim of changing into an entirely different system and overcoming some of its problems could not be predicted. With the rise of trade unionism, the workers have achieved higher wages and shorter hours. The classes have not polarized as predicted; they have develop into classes with varying stratas. Furthermore, we have a very large middle class. The concentration of captial has occurred, but the ownership is diffused (joint-stock compan-

Marx's critique of capitalism is a good critique of the system at the time he wrote it. He failed to recognize the possibility to change. This fact poses the problem to the communists on how to unite that theory with the present world. The theory says that all classes will disappear; no man will dominate another after socialism is achieved. Alienation and frustration will cease, there will no longer be any need for the state. The supposed moral values of socialism lies in the satisfaction of all man's needs; man becomes perfectly free and

has complete self-expression. That's the theory which has never been unified with practice. Why hasn't the Soviet Union withered away? 

USDA Leaflet **Explains RCA**

OF 1977 A new leaflet explaining the Resources Conservation Act of 1977 and the public's role in its implementation is now available at offices of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in Haskell, Texas.

Under the new law, SCS will appraise the nation's soil, water, and related resources; develop a comprehensive 5year strategy to guide conservation efforts; and evaluate Nelson Giant Print Red Letter the effectiveness of ongoing conservation programs. SCS will carry out the work in cooperation with appropriate citizen groups, the Haskell Conservation District; and other federal, state, and local agencies. The appraisal and program will be completed by the end of the 1979 and updated every 5 years.






