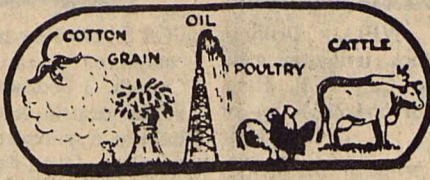

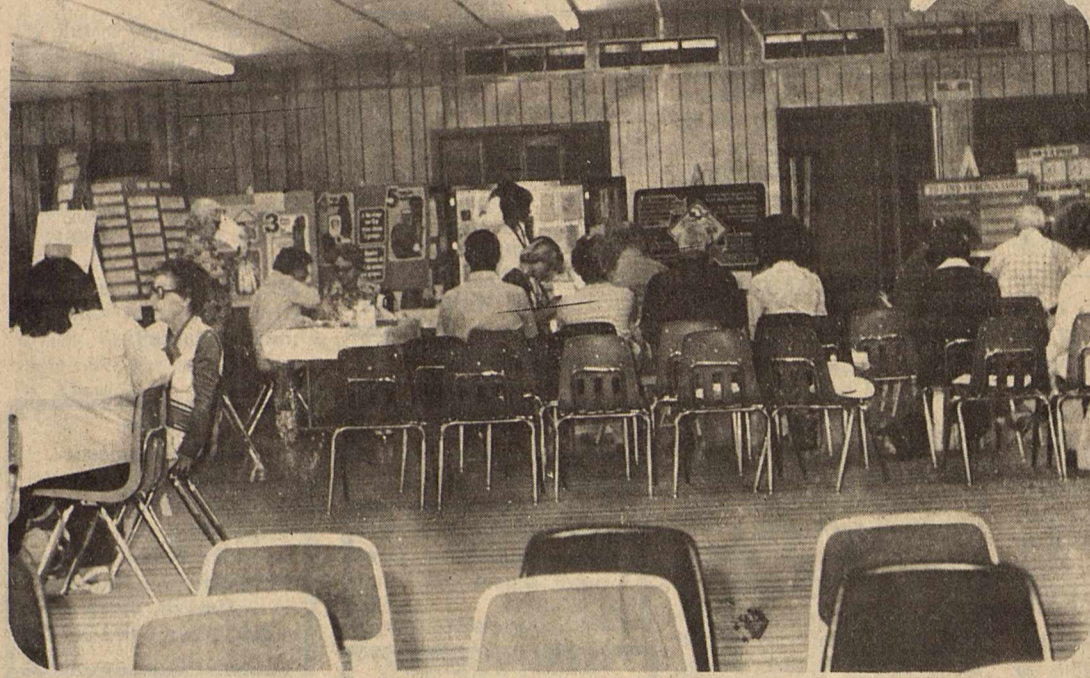

Farm Program Deadline Is Extended

Haskell County Farmers wishing to participate in the Cotton, Feed Grain and/or wheat programs will have an additional two weeks to sign up. Glenn R. Brzozowski, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), announced.

Mr. Brzozowski said that Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, was extending the sign-up period for the programs from May 1 through May 15 because of changes announced March 29 in the program. On that date, Secretary Bergland authorized additional diversion of cropland under the cotton and feed grain programs and permitted wheat program participants to graze out their wheat or harvest hay on a percentage of their planted acreage.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will issue weekly reports each Tuesday until the sign-up is completed, the date of the first report is set for April 25.

There has been no change as of this publication in the dates to certify 1978 wheat, barley and oats acreage. The final date remains May 1. All producers are urged to sign their intentions to participate in the 1978 programs in order to be eligible for all program benefits.

City Council Begins Work On Budget

Members of the Haskell City Council began preparations on the 1978-79 budget during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Each councilman was presented with a copy of the estimated and actual expenses from the last fiscal year. It was requested that the proposed budgets from each department be submitted as soon as possible before the next council meeting.

Mayor Royce Williams reported on the receipt of a sales tax rebate in the amount of \$2,721.93.

Franciene Johnson reported on the recent ambulance board meeting and requested \$500.00 be submitted to the service. Members of the council agreed and discussed the possibilities of increasing collections.

In other action members of the council appointed Tom Watson to serve another two-year term on the board of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. They also agreed to retain the funds from the Williams Construction Co. paving contract to be used toward

completion of the project which was not finished.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Williams, Councilmen, Guy Kennedy, Lorraine Johnson, Bob Philpot, Franciene Johnson, and Joe Cortez, Water Supt. Marvin Collins, and City Sec. Desmond Dulaney.

The next regular meeting of the Council will be May 9.

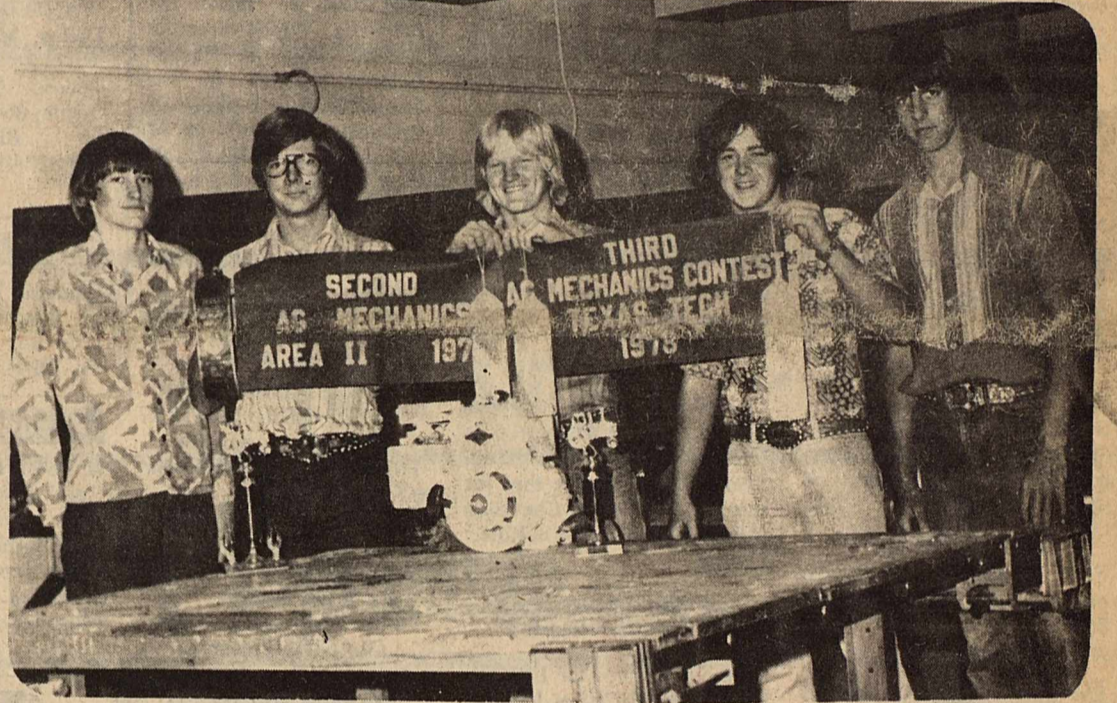

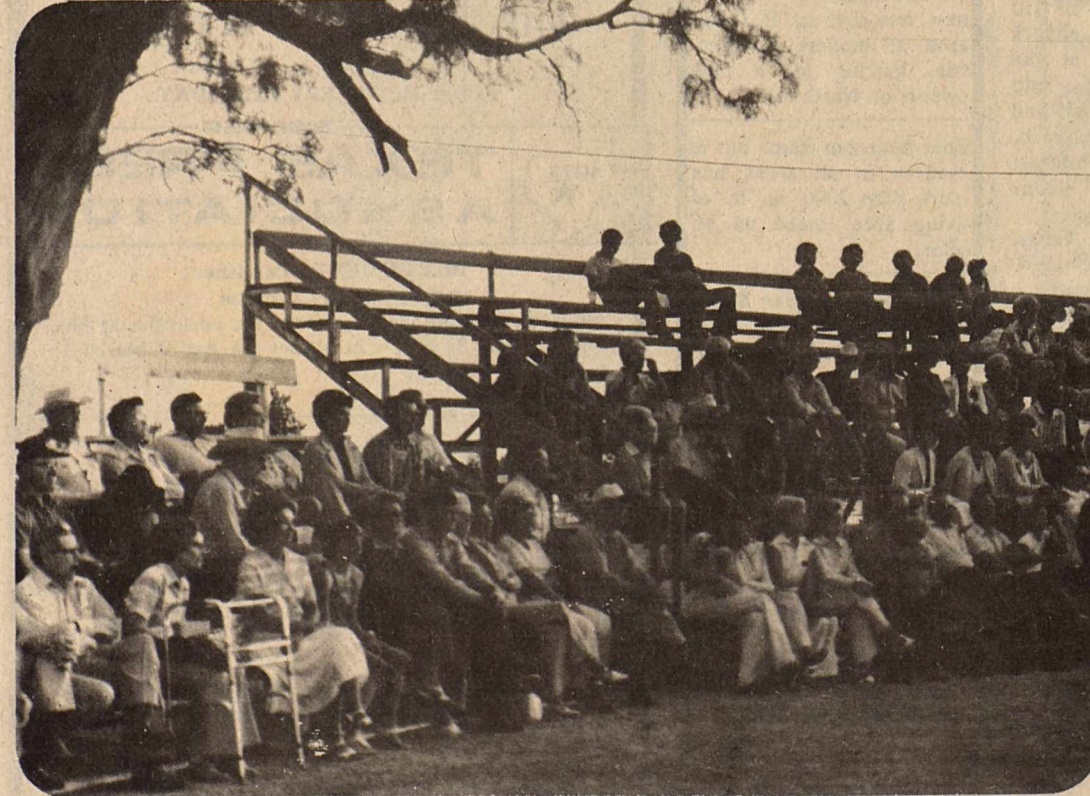
