

Bloodmobile Quota Is 80 Units

The Red River Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Haskell today. June 22, from 1 to 6, p.m. in the Community Building of the Haskell National Bank.

Goal for the drive is 80 units and members of the Haskell Young Homemakers are acting as chairmen for the drive.

The goal of the Red River Red Cross Blood Program is to enable the community to meet the total needs for blood and blood products for allresidents of the 41 counties it serves in Northern Texas and Southern Oklahoma through the hospitals in the region.

To meet this need, which is currently 91 units of blood per day. Red Cross relies on the cooperation of the entire community for donor support. To do this involves the participation of organized donor groups among business and labor, industry, churches, schools, fraternal and civic

organizations, etc. Availability of blood to

patients is predicated only on need as prescribed by a physician. Neither the Blood Program, the attending physician, nor the hospitals require patients to replace blood used.

Fees connected with blood transfused reflect a processing charge to hospitals which includes Red Cross costs of collecting, processing, and distribution, as well as the

School Board To Re-value Property

At a called meeting, the Board of Trustees of the Haskell Independent School District awarded a contract to McMorries and Company of Hereford, to appraise all of the real and commercial personal property in the district for the year 1979.

The meeting was held June 13, and all members of the board were present. They voted unanamously to enter into the project.

A group was recently in Haskell and researched records of sales in the district and arrived at a fair market value for the district. It is now required that the district raise funds based on this value to pay the local share of operating the school.

To arrive at the fair market value of the district, the board could have used a percentage increase of all properties but they felt that this would only

City Receives Sales Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that city sales tax allocations for the first half of 1978 are running a healthy 17.5 percent ahead of last year.

The City of Haskell has received a check in the amount of \$4,060.99

Bullock announced that his office has sent checks totaling \$60.9 million to 900 Texas cities as their June share of the local option one percent

The latest checks raise the cities' share to date this year to \$196.5 million, compared to \$167.2 million for the first half of last year. That's a 17.5

percent increase. Of the state's larger cities, Houston continued to chalk up the biggest percentage in crease in city sales tax

collections. The city received a check for \$12,356,904, bringing its total for the year to \$40.8 million, a 20 percent increase over the same period last year.

City sales tax allocations for the year are up 11 percent in Dallas, 15 percent in Fort Worth, 10 percent in San Antonio and 17 percent in

The tax is collected by local merchants along with the state sales tax and is rebated to the cities monthly by the Comptroller's office.

A loan officer will be present to explain SBA's disaster loan program as it affects Texas farmers in the 106 drought-declared count-

The physical disaster loan program includes unrecovered production costs on the 1977 crops at 3 per cent interest on the first \$250,000 and 65/8 per cent interest thereafter to a maximum of \$500,000. At least 50 per cent of the loan must be held for production costs in the new crop year, with the remainder available to pay outstanding obligations and for reasonable operating expenses including living ex-

President, the USDA, and the Australians knew in March that the Australian cattle producers would be in trouble at the end of May if US import

quotas were not raised. Although Australian beef exports were up 15% over last year, Australians are eating 41,000 tones less beef. Perhaps this confirms the rumors of "meatless Tuesdays" so Australia can meet her export quotas. The Beef Fact Sheet presented to Carter before he made his decision to open the door to more beef imports to the US showed that the US gets about half its imported beef from Australia.

The President said he would only allow 200 million pounds to come into the US. Oddly enough, only a few days before the President's annoucement, the USDA Farmers News Line released the fact that only 200,000 lbs were Available as additional imports. So, in other words, the President opened the door wide enough to let in all the meat available for import, yet tried to tell Americans he was not throwing the doors wide open. Many Congressmen and Senators have been very critical of the administrations actions to increase beef imports.

It disturbs me when the President and the administration takes meat off the Australian's tables in order to help the Australian farmer's and rancher's and yet they are cutting the American farmer's and rancher's throats. If the President and the Administration are true Americans, why aren't they trying to help us instead of making us dependent on another country for our food as they have done to us

The results of this study appear to provide scienific support for the increasingly popular notion that divorce is the most desirable course of action for couples who are experiencing conflict in their marriages. According to this new philosophy, if a marriage is ill, a lot of unwanted pain can be avoided simply by ending it. "It is even better for the children," the New Virginia study seems to suggest.'

Earlier generations in our society placed a dehumanizing stigma on divorce. The Motto their was "hold a marriage together, whatever the cost." I do not believe this attitude was healthy or realistic. Some age and family therapy (and a

doubtedly so destructive to all middle-class family intermembers of a family that views). divorce can only be considered the lesser of evils. And the Virginia Study is probably correct in suggesting that a marriage should not be held together solely for the benefit

of the children. I believe, however, that the divorce as a panacea for resolving marital conflict is equally unhealthy and unrealistic. It turns the Marriage Commitment "until death do us part" into a temporary pact "until we decide to call it quits." And provides the marriage partners with a way to avoid dealing with the sources of their conflict.

There are no perfect marriages-devoid of conflict and pain-just as there are no perfect human beings-devoid of self-centeredness and inner struggle. Marriage is not a contineous romantic adventure, but a commitment of two persons to face life togetherfor better, for worse, For richer, for poorer, in sickness and health". Regardless of what scientific studies may suggest, I believe that most marriages are worth saving, and most marital conflicts can be resolved if the marriage partners take their vows seriously. Agricultural authorities in areas where the grain identification program is used extensively report a re-markable decline in the number of grain thefts.






