AT A TIME WHEN virtually everyone in our immediate area is finding it tough to make a living, and many would be pleased to come out "in the black" at the end of the year, it becomes hard to drum up much sympathy for the striking members of the National Football League.

We don't blame anyone for wanting to make as much money as they possibly can, and particularly to get their pay scale up to the point that they feel they are being paid "what they are worth," but the idea of a strike which could ruin most people's favorite pasttime, goes against the

In the first place, one needs to be reminded that in many cases union demands, and hard-nosed approaches are many times the reasons for certain industries to just close up shop and cease to exist.

The union has been inbedded into the auto industry for a number of years, and while you can't lay the woes of this industry completely at the union's feet, there are no doubt many arguments for the fact that the unions have not helped the plight faced in Detroit and many other industrial cities.

We don't see how the players can expect to have their salaries escalated to the point that every player is in the super-salary bracket.

Professional football is bound to be like every other business today, beset by high prices and inflation on every hand, and there must be a limit as to what they can pay out in salaries. The owners deserve to be able to make this determination, and to deal with each player on an individual basis, according to that player's ability.

It will be interesting to see what develops, in the event that the strike is not resolved between the representatives of the players and the owners prior to this weekend's schedule (which begins on Thursday,

or was to). At least some of the owners feel that they are in the business to provide football for the fans who shell out their hard-earned money to see the professional games, and that even if they have to hire some guys working in parking lots, or bring up all the rookies who had been cut from training camps, they should play the scheduled games.

This point is undoubtedly one that may not find agreement by every team in the league, but it might cause the striking players to call off their treasure hunt, or at least settle at a more reasonable level, if they see some rinky-dink taking their place on Sunday (and especially if the substitute should happen to stand

Somehow, it's hard to visualize the Dallas Cowboys taking the field with a lineup which would not include the likes of Danny White, Tony Dorsett, Drew Pearson and company.

But on the other hand, the owners have an investment and an obligation to fulfill. As Lamar Hunt, Dallas owner of the Kansas City Chiefs said "There's bound to be a number of players out there who want to play and will if offered the opportunity."

Hunt knows his business. In fact, if it were not for Hunt, there would be no Dallas Cowboys team, no Oakland Raiders, San Diego, Denver, Kansas City, New York Jets, and several others. He helped start the American Football League in 1960. (Yes, we know the Cowboys weren't in the AFL-but the NFL finally agreed to a team in Dallas, just to oppose Hunt's venture.)

Hunt had tried unsuccessfully for a number of years to get the NFL to give him a franchise in Dallas, and when they would not, he started his own league (now a part of the NFL). So, if his statements sound a bit rash to this generation of football fans-don't sell him short yet.

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

The Band Boosters will be naming "Top Squad," based on performances at the individual

Richard Shepherd scored two of the team's three touchdowns,

including the winning TD with 50 seconds left to play.

Shepherd got Bovina's first score in the third quarter, on a seven-yard burst with a quick pitchout from quarterback Dale Gilbreath. That cut the Morton margin to 14-6.

Gilbreath then capped a Mustang drive on a one-yard quarterback sneak in the fourth quarter to pull the Mustangs to within two points, 14-12, as both conversion attempts failed.

In the last minute of play, Richard Shepherd figured in the big offensive as well as the big defensive play for the Mustangs. First, he caught a pass from Gilbreath, and ran into the end zone, the play covering 40 yards.

Bovina had taken the lead for the first time at 18-14, as the home fans went wild. The score came with 50 seconds left on the scoreboard clock.

But the ever-dangerous Indians were not ready to roll over and play dead. Morton had shown they could move the ball quickly, with their two first half touchdowns, and they threw a scare into the Mustangs in the final

On the final play of the game, a Morton player made a bid to go in for the winning touchdown, but was forced out of bounds at the one-yardline by Shepherd.

A clipping penalty was called against Morton on the play, which was refused, and that was the ball

"Gilbreath did a great job of leading the team, and Richard Shepherd showed that he is tough. He's a clutch player. Joe Black and Joe Pat Wright didn't have quite as good a night in gaining yardage, but they did a great job of blocking," said

The Mustang coach said it was tough to single out individual players for their defensive play, since everyone played well, but felt that Mark Clayton, Martin Contreras and Jon Riddle paced the second half shut-down on Morton by the

He said that the coaches made "only minor" adjustments to their defensive strategy during halftime. "The kids just outhustled them in the second half," he said.

The Mustangs should not hurt their top offensive rating after the Morton game, thanks to a 327-yard effort which showed balance. The team gained 173 yards rushing and 154 yards passing. That put the team over

Riddle is the team's leading receiver in three games with six catches good for 104 yards.


