Kindergarten

Pre-Registration

Set May 9

Kindergarten pre-registration will be held at the Haskell Elementary School on Wednesday, May 9 from 9:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 3:45 in the principal's office.

In order to be eligible for Kindergarten this coming fall, a child must be five years of age on or before September 1.

Parents will need to bring birth certificates and immunization records. Children must have received immunization for polio, diphtheria, pertussis tetanus (D.P.T.), measles and rubella, and "booster" polio and D.P.T. Immunizations must have been received since the child's fourth birthday.

Mumps vaccine for all Early Childhood, Kindergarten, and First Grade students will be required by September 1, 1979 in order to be eligible for enrollment in school. One more grade will be added each year.

Donations this week to the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department Building fund were almost \$4,000 which brings the total received to date to \$15,439.

Department members are excited about the response of local residents and confident that the first stage of the goal can be reached.

The first stage of the building project is \$38,000 which will pay for the foundation, building, doors, erection and insulation.

Department members received a bid on these items and the prices quoted were good for sixty days. That deadline is fast approaching and department members are concerned that many of the costs will increase if the quote deadline is exceeded.

Persons who would like to donate or pledge funds to the drive are asked to contact any member of the fire department, go by the fire station, or make their deposit with any teller at Haskell National Bank.

After the building order is placed, it will be approximately eight to ten weeks before delivery and pledges will be collected at that time.

Following the erection of the building, members of the department will do interior work including building offices, restrooms, and training and meeting rooms. These portions of the building project will be completed as funds for materials are available and as the volunteers have time.

Department members are currently in the process of contacting persons for donations but request that area residents make their donations without being contacted to help meet the first portion of the goal.

Current donations and pledges total \$15,439 and funds expected from debris clearance from Rice Springs Creek will boost the fund about \$10,000 more, leaving the fund about \$13,000 short of the amount required for the first portion of the project.

School Accreditation Underway

The Haskell Independent School District has recently completed phase I of the school accreditation process. This new accreditation procedure, enacted by the Texas Legislature in 1975, requires all school districts in the state to receive accreditation annually from the Texas Education Agency in Austin. Superintendent Kenneth Sams pointed out that without this accreditation, the Haskell schools would lose nearly \$600,000 in state school funds, and the graduates of Haskell High School would be placed at the bottom of college placement programs.

Over 300 faculty, students, and citizens of the Haskell community have

worked during the last year to develop student outcome goals for the Haskell Independent School District. The Education Goal Committee began meeting in October and November of 1978 to identify tentative goals for consideration. Citizens who served on the committee were Mr. James Lanier, Chairman, Raymond Andrada, Kathy Bartley, Janice Browning, Jimmy Bynum, Kay Campbell, Joe Cortez, W.O. Holt, Wayne Lehr, Becky Richardson, and Sonja Tidrow. The committee presented these goals to the Board of Trustees for their discussion. These goals were adopted by the Board of Trustees to provide a framework for

improving educational opportunities for the students of this community.

The results of community opinion concerning these goals were presented to the Board of Trustees at their regular meeting on April 10, 1979. The student goals which were identified as important need areas were:

- The individual should develop the necessary communicative skills.
- The individual should understand how education, interests and experiences affect the kinds of pursuable employment.
- The individual should develop the necessary skills in Math and Financial management.

The Board of Trustees and Administration wish to thank all who participated in the survey and returned their questionnaires. Their cooperation will assist the schools in making plans for the future and insure the continued accreditation of the Haskell Schools.

All club members will be participating in the project led by these committee members: Marijane Cunningham, Paul Everett, Louise Thornhill and Sheila McMeans.

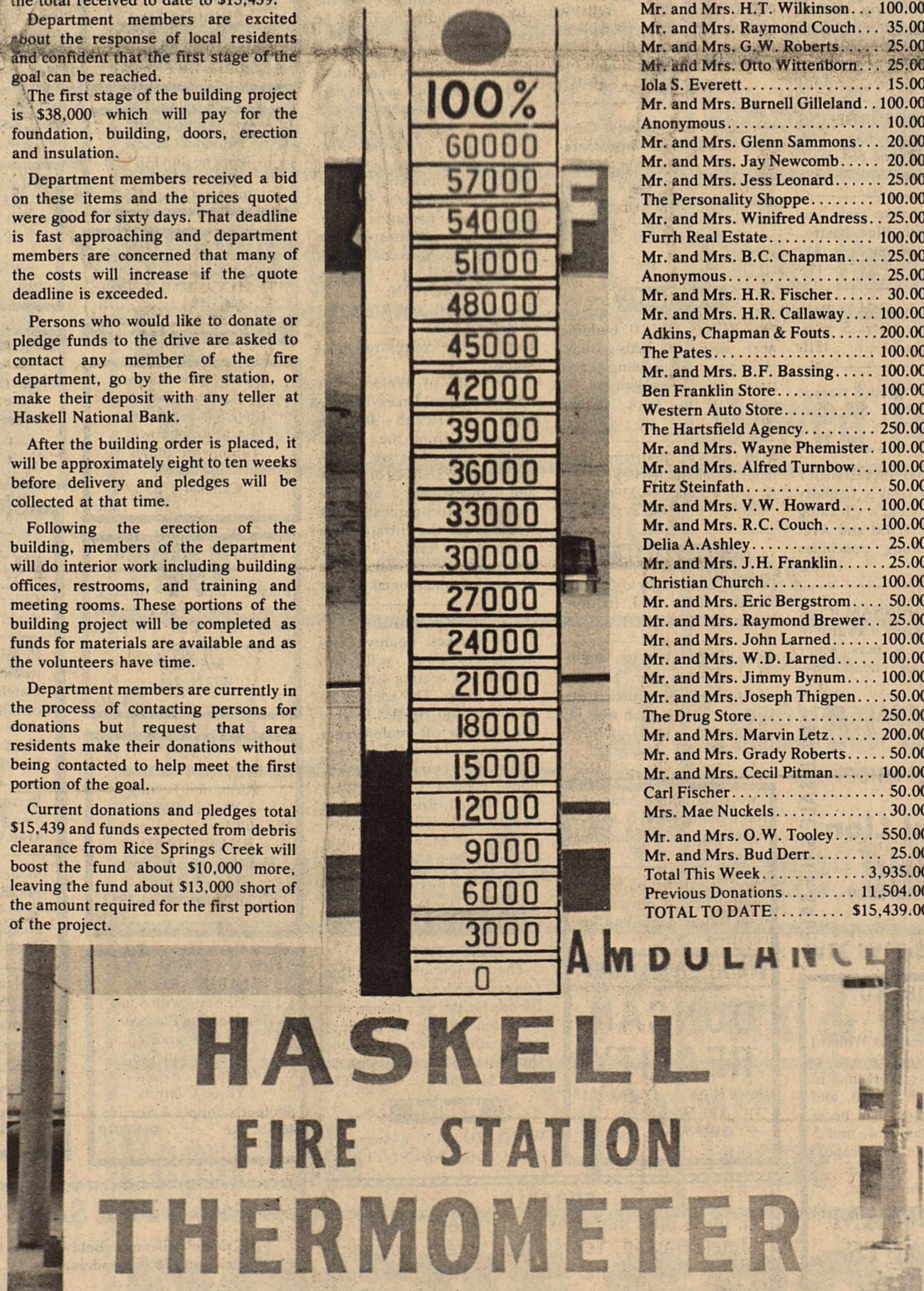
Members were encouraged to complete their part of the door to door fund collection this week, April 23-28. All funds collected will go directly to the American Cancer Society.

which is published weekly from Iredell by editor and publisher Micki Nellis. This newspaper was begun fifteen months ago and has a circulation of 14,000 throughout the United States.

**The Texas State ASCS office of the USDA has now sent out a letter to county ASCS offices asking them to make certain affected producers are aware of the provisions of the law, paragraph 8, 1-LP of the ASCS handbook, that allows them to repledge their commodity for an additional nine month loan. Deadline for this action is May 31, 1979.

Many county ASCS offices had already sent producers letters or cards telling them they had two options—repay their loan or forfeit their commodity. Many producers had already responded to the

first notice and sold or forfeited their commodity.

Mike McCathern, Texas State AAM office, investigated further and found that actually producers have 5 options: (1) repay the loan (2) liquidate by forfeiting warehouse receipts to CCC (3) delivery of warehouse receipts for purchase (4) extend the loan for 6 months (5) repay the loan and repledge the commodity.

**Jerome Friemel sent a letter to Bob Bergland requesting the names of the 800 greedy farmers.

Friemel was referring to Bergland's statements reported in the Texas Farmer-Stockman. Bergland was quoted as saying "Our family farm is the most efficient producer in the world."

A questioner asked "You said farmers are greedy." Bergland conceded that in haste, he said that. "We have 2.8 million farmers and they are hard working," he replied. "Only about 800 are greedy."

Friemel sent his letter notarized, registered, return receipt requested, and sent it as a Democratic Party National Platform Advisory committee member, which he is. Jerome formally requested, under the Freedom of Information Act, the names of those 800 greedy farmers.

**Texas became the 11th state to pump gasohol April 17 when state Ag Commissioner Reagan Brown officiated at pumping ceremonies, Governor Bill Clements and other

legislators got free gasohol to build up enthusiasm for the gasohol bills about to be considered by the Texas Legislature.

At present, it is illegal to make alcohol in the state of Texas. The bills would remove that law, guarantee state loans for alcohol plants, and in general make it easier to comply with regulations and make alcohol. The only opposition has come from the distillers industry. The bills are expected to pass and Governor Clements says he will sign them.

Spokesmen from American Agriculture, Farmers Union and Farm Bureau shared the same microphone and endorsed gasohol at a news conference in Austin before the pumping.

Representative Dan Kubiak has been a big booster of gasohol.

**A resolution in support of agriculture failed to pass the Texas State Teachers Association convention held recently in Houston.

The resolution was introduced by Sue Duncan of Lubbock and Dick Powell of Arlington. Joel Painter of Tyler and Mark McClelland of Liberty County spoke against the resolution.

The resolution, which did

not pass, read: We, the educators of Texas, recognizing agriculture as the largest industry in our state and realizing that agricultural taxes support education, and realizing further that the deteriorating economic condition of agriculture and its related industries restricts the further improvement of educational standards in our state: Be it resolved that TSTA go on record supporting a strong and healthy agricultural industry, returning fair and equitable prices at the marketplace, assuring a continued supply of wholesome food at reasonable prices while bringing a stable economy to our state and nation.

Rule Sets New Rates

Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. Tractor Safety Meeting

"Farm tractor and machinery mishaps take the lives of 800 to 1,000 people each year on our U.S. farms and ranches," said David Bohac, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau. He will present a program on tractor safety to the Haskell FFA Chapter Friday, April 27th, at 9:15 at the high school.

The Farm Bureau hopes to aid in reducing the needless loss of life, time, and farming equipment by encouraging

greater caution and protective equipment. Bohac will discuss ways in which many Texas farm and ranch people have been fatally injured (30 to 50 annually) in past years. They include overruns, horseplay, speed, extra passengers and refueling accidents. He estimated that both the (1) injury rate and the (2) fatality rate could be reduced by 40 to 50% through the use of protective equipment. Using model equipment.

Bohac will illustrate the importance of protective equipment such as bump hats, gloves and snug fitting clothing were listed as being very important, too. When on a road or highway proper lighting and marking will be discussed, including SMV emblems. The SMV emblem is to be placed on the tractor, or self-propelled equipment that by engineering design was designed to travel 25 MPH or less.

The relatives, notified of her whereabouts, said they had been trying to locate her for years. Visits by the family and volunteers succeeded in bringing Mrs. Jacobs out of

her shell. In an effort to make people aware of the important activities of volunteers in the state,

USDA Soil Conservation Service

GREAT PLAINS PROGRAM
Available funds for certifying GPCP contracts are currently not available, but hopefully this fall will see a change in the funding situation. It may be for the better, it may be worse.

The proposed 1980 Fiscal Year budget for Great Plains, nation wide, has been made at \$8.4 million. This proposed budget is \$10.3 million below the 1979 fiscal year funding for Great Plains.

According to releases from the Environmental Protection Agency, the use of chemicals 2, 4, ST and Silvex is exempted from EPA regulations and controls when the chemicals are to be applied on native grasslands.

Applications for assistance are to be made at the Haskell County ASCS office during the May 3-May 9 period. The target date to start application is May 17. This only leaves a few short days to spray before surrounding field crops are up
