The three-day event gets underway at 7:30 p.m. Friday with jam sessions and stage shows by visiting bands.

Shows by scheduled bands begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday and continue until midnight, interspersed with three shows with winsome Wendy Holcombe and three appearances by the "Texas Travelers."

Sunday's schedule includes Gospel shows at 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m., with Wendy Holcombe and the "Texas Travelers" each doing two shows in addition.

Ticket prices are \$3.00 for Friday; \$6.00 for Saturday; \$4.00 for the Sunday Gospel Show; and a special three-day ticket is available for \$10.00. Children under 12 are admitted free. Advance tickets are available at Caldwell Music Company in Abilene and the West Texas Rehabilitation Center.

To date, local contributions total about \$30,000.00 and represent only about 300 individuals, groups and husinesses

If all other area residents who intend to contribute to the fund will do so in the next few weeks, the entire project can

be completed this year.

With present inflation rates the advantages of completing the facility as soon as possible are evident.

It is gratifying to live in a community that will respond to problems with the positive attitude which Haskell has shown toward this project in the past three months. This is the kind of attitude which is helping Haskell to grow and prosper while many other towns this size are slowly dwindling in population.


Stripers Released At Stamford



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



Dryland planting need about 25 inches of rainfall. Jose Tall Wheatgrass has proven to have a good drought and cold tolerance, and is very agressive. Row plantings require 4 to 5 pounds pure live seed per acre, while drilled plantings will require double the rate for row plantings. It should not be considered for use in mixtures, Fertilization should be made according to


soil tests. At the present we can not say where the limits of this specie are going to be. The SCS feels that this grass could be a good plant for waterways, and irrigated pastures. However, only time and trial plantings will prove its best adaptibility to our local soil and rainfall conditions.

Information released by New Mexico University indicates Jose Wheatgrass to be adopted to fine to coarse textured soils, but is best adopted to tight soils. It also performs well in saline or alkaline soils. It requires at least 120 frost free days for seed production, and has been used primarily for pasture and hay.

At the Los Lunas Plant Materials Center in New Mexico, Jose Tall Wheatgrass averaged 51/2 tons of high quality hay per acre when irrigated and fertilized, and cut 2 or 3 times a season to a stubble height of 6 inches. Forage samples clipped to a height averaged 18.6% crude protein and 23.7% crude fiber. As a comparison, Alfalfa hay generally averages about 15% protein and 29% fiber, considering all analysis, according to Morrison's Feeds and

Feeding. It would appear that Jose Tall Wheatgrass has a place in our local conservation activities, and may prove to meet our needs in controlling erosion by wind and water.
