Construction Begins On New Fire Station

Actual construction on a new fire station in Haskell began this week with official ground breaking ceremonies on the proposed site.

Immediately following the ceremony, work on forms was started and the actual pouring of the foundation was scheduled for Friday or Monday.

The building is expected to be delivered during the week ending July 27 and erection will start upon receipt.

The building fund for the new station has grown to about \$46,000.00 at this time. Of that total about \$5,000.00 is pledges that have not been paid. Members of the finance committee of the building fund, request that all pledges be paid as soon as possible. Pledges can be paid at the fire station or deposited with any teller at Haskell National Bank.

The proposed station will be housed in a steel building, 50x100 feet and will contain housing for up to eight fire trucks, offices, meeting rooms, training rooms, storage, and work areas.

The total estimated cost of the new

facility is \$60,000.00, with department members doing much of the work themselves. The total cost breaks down to about \$12.00 per square foot and department members feel that this is a true bargain when average building costs are nearing \$20.00 for facilities of

In addition to the monetary donations to the building fund many area residents and businessmen have agreed to donate either materials or labor either free, for cost, or at greatly reduced prices.

These donations will be recognized when the materials are received.

Adopt New Policy

School Board members, Tuesday night, adopted a new vandalism policy during their regular meeting.

The new policy came about after approximately \$3,000.00 in damages from vandalism occurred during the past school year.

The new policy defines vandalism as ny illegal entrance into a school building or visible abuse to the outside or inside of a building.

After the first offense a student: shall not be allowed to participate in any extra curricular activity for 60 school days; shall pay all damages incurred; shall be suspended for five days. During suspension, a student shall be subject to work details at school to reinforce pride in school property; shall receive a zero in each class for each day missed with no opportunity for make


After a second offense a student shall be expelled from school for the remainder of the year.

During the past school year about fifteen separate vandalism incidences have been reported. Of the approximate

damages of \$3,000.00, only about \$180.00 has been collected from students doing the damage.

Following a discussion on each aspect of the proposed policy, members of the board voted unanimously to adopt the new policy.

IRRIGATION WATER EXPENSIVE A team of Texas A&M University agricultural economists has put a price tag on irrigation water in 11 highproducing western agricultural states, including Texas.

According to an article released from College Station, and published in the July 1 Abilene Reporter-News, the differences are startling. For instance, the Lubbock area of West Texas and the Oklahoma Panhandle, there is a difference of 160 percent in lue, in only 200 miles.

Dr. Bruce Beattie, economist in charge of the project, indicated that the Texas irrigation water was worth \$13.89 an acre-foot around diminishing returns."

Lubbock, while the Texas -Oklahoma Panhandle area, was valued at \$35.97 an acre-foot. The Rio Grande Valley water value was found to be \$16.19 an acre-foot. An acre-foot of irrigation water is equivalent to three four-inch

Beattie says the figures reflect the value of water at the margin, the maximum amount a farmer could pay for the last increment of irrigation water he applies, assuming it is a typical application on a typical irrigated acre.

Branding with confetti is making things rougher for grain thieves. Grain producers are picking up the old practice of marking small slips of paper with identifying numbers and mixing the con-fetti with their stored grain crop. According to producers who have been using the confetti method for some time, it takes only about seven pounds of the paper to adequately mark and identify 50,000 bushels of grain. Although the small slips of paper are virtually impossible r thieves to separate from the grain, mill operators report they have no problem in removing the confetti during their washing process. Agricultural authorities in areas where the grain identilication program is used extensively report a re-narkable decline in the number of grain thefts.
