
Construction Underway On New Fire Station

Fashion Revue Winners To Compete At District

Charges **Filed After** Shooting

Members of the Haskell County Commissioners Court met in special session Tuesday to officially petition Gov. Bill Clements to open any called session of the legislature to consideration of restoring appropriation of County Lateral Road Funds.

Gov. Clements recently line-item vetoed to funds from the appropriation bill and in so doing will keep Haskell County from receiving approximately \$28,000.00 per year in funds for maintenance of County roads.

In a letter to the Governor, the County Judge and Commissioners stated that Haskell County has been receiving these funds since 1933 and that the funds were needed to keep county roads maintained.

The county will receive \$27,610.23 this year from the fund and if the Governor's veto is not changed in a special session, the county will not receive the funds in the future.

Gasoline poisoning has in-creased "tenfold" recently, according to Mike Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center, and Ellis says the upsurge seems to be directly related to the gasoline shortage in the area.

Ellis says his department is receiving an average of 10 calls a day about gasoline poisoning. "This time last year," he admits, "we were only getting about one call a day for the same thing."

The increased practice of siphoning, Ellis thinks, is a major connection between the rising number of gasoline poisoning cases and the gasoline shortage. He says adults, because of the shortage, are siphoning gas from car to lawn mower, from car to can to other car, and he calls this practice "dumb at the very least."

Gasoline siphoning can cause a person at least two major problems, he says. Ellis says a person can swallow gas while transferring it, and the effects can be serious, even deadly. 'Gasoline can go innto the stomach," he says, "if the epiglottis slams shut and does not allow it to go into the lungs," In the stomach it will be nauseating and may cause vomiting, he says.

Upon entering the trachea and lungs, the gasoline is quite irritating. "The lung tries to take care of the irritating liquid by diluting it. The most severe effect of gas aspiration, however, is that the oil-based product physically spreads out and coats the lungs. "Depending on how extensive the coating is," Ellis says, "will deter-

"Children," Ellis says, "are more likely to aspirate petroleum products than adults." Ellis recently watched two 15 month-old girls, in unrelated cases, die of petroleum distillate aspiration. 





USDA Requesting Comments On 1980 Wheat Program

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has asked the public to comment on proposals for the 1980 wheat program. These comments should be sent by August 6, 1979.

Bergland asked for comments on whether barley and oats should be included in the 1980 Feed Grain Program and whether program decisions on Barley and Oats should be announced at the same time as for the wheat. The Department of Agricul-

ture proposed to make the following determinations: The amount of the national program acreages.

The reduction from the previous year's harvested acreage required to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage.

Whether there should be set-aside requirements and, if so the extent of the set-aside. If a set-aside or land diversion program is required, whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage. Whether there should be a

so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment.

The loan and purchase levels for 1980 crops of wheat, barley, oats and rye.

Whether the special wheat acreage grazing and hay program should be implemented.

whether an announcement of storage requirements, premiums and discounts and other provisions as may be necessary to carry out the program.

Most of these determinations for wheat are required to be made by the Secretary on or before August 15. Normally a decision on the inclusion of barley and oats in Feed Grain program is made at the same

time. The corn and sorghum program decision is made prior to November 15, as some barley is planted in the fall and does compete with wheat for the same acreage, the land diversion program and, if Secretary is considering

the 1980 Barley and Oats program provisions along with the 1980 wheat program announcement is appropriate.

Before reaching his decision the Secretary will consider any recommendations and views regarding these items.

Farmers Should **Still File**

Although July 15 was the deadline for filing priority requests againsts curtailments of natural gas, farmers can go ahead and file a request with their supplier after this date. according to Glenn R. Brzozowski, Haskell County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Users of interstate natural gas have been certified by the Secretary of Agriculture to be protected up to the full requirement against curtailment.

Requests should include: name and address; intended end user of volumes of natural gas needed; natural gas purchases for most recent 12 months for which records are available; documentation to support calculation of needs; standard industrial classification (SIC) code numbers such as 01 for crops and 02 for livestock; signature swearing or affirming to accuracy of the request; contacting local natural gas suppliers concerning procedures for obtaining agricultural priority.

Requests should be filed, in written form, with suppliers and if assistance is needed state and county ASCS offices will soon have information regarding eligible "Essential Agricultural Uses" as well as suggested format for filing.

Stressing the fact that even though July 15 was the last date, farmers should go ahead and file requests after this date, Brzozowski said. "Also, if there is an interstate line involved, it could move them from a lower priority to a higher priority.



Little Village Is Unique


SAN ANTONIO-Many reasons are given by residents and visitors for their ove of San Antonio, which prides itself one being one of America's most interest-

Dating back to the Spanish grants of the 18th Century, the La Villita area played a role in much of San Antonio's early history. South Alamo Street, at the main entrance of the Plaza Nacional, has been a part of the Mission Trail since the missions were founded in

"Providing that consumer acceptance meets expectations, the new dollar should generate significant savings." she said. The Treasury Department is already saving 60% of the cost of minting dollar coins when comparing production costs of the large Eisenhower dollar to the Anthony dollar. As the coin displaces the need for the dollar note, the Federal Reserve System could achieve dollar savings as high as \$50 million a year through reduction of printing, processing and destruction costs for dollar bills.



Significant changes are on the horizon for researchers working on agricultural projects. Underlying factor for these changes is the growing concensus among scientists that current research with its aims at yield increases through better fertilization and cultivation technique may be nearing its peak. In short, there is a growing feeling that we are reaching the stage of making a plant produce all that is possible. That's the reason for the change in direction. Scientists are now beginning to experiment on changes in the biological potential of plants. Basic changes in photosynthesis are being considered. Methods of limiting a plant's respiration are under study and the strange yield increases of some plants when exposed to carbon dioxide are being examined. In short, the new direction for research involves changing the plant itself in ways which could develop new and much greater yield increases.
