## Taxes-Budget Are School Board Topics

Over one half of Tuesday's school board meeting centered around possible ways to trim the operating budget and the extreme likelihood that taxes would have to be raised.

Board members looked closely at an early estimate of the 1979-80 proposed budget, which lists expenditures of \$1.1 million.

The largest portion of the budget is payroll costs which amounts to approximately \$813,000.00. This amount is up \$63,000.00 from the 1978-79 budget. Included in the payroll costs are the salaries of about 80 employees of the school.

Other preliminary budget items which showed a marked increase were items containing funds for payment of utility bills and fuel for busses. Most other budgetary items increased about seven to 10%.

Also explained during the meeting was a \$27,000.00 item for debt service. This amount is to pay bonded indebtedness on the Gym and elementary school. For the past ten years, the school has received special state funds because of the Mattson consolidation which have been used to pay these bonds. The 1978-79 school year was the last year these funds will be available. Another large item in the budget was the expenditure of approximately \$33,600.00 for the valuation of all

property in the school district.

In discussing revenue to meet the proposed budget, it was noted that homestead and over 65 exemptions lowered the tax roll by approximately \$8 million. The change from market value to ag use value of rural land in the district reduced the tax roll by another \$14 million.

Board members were told that even though many groups and several state officials are saying that the school will be reimbursed for all taxes not collected

on the homestead and over 65 exemptions, the school will only receive 45% of the taxes lost by these exemptions. This will amount to only about \$25,000.00 in funds instead of \$56,000.00 which would have been received if the exemptions were not allowed.

The ag use value lowered agriculture property in the district by almost one half, from approximately \$29,000,000.00 to \$15,000,000.00.

Based on a 95% collection rate, the amount generated last year from local taxes was \$311,515.00. The amount needed under the proposed budget would be approximately \$386,202.00, or an increase of \$74,687.00. Reducing the increase by the amount required for the bonded indebtedness and the one-time expense of the appraisal, the actual increase in the proposed \$1.1 million budget is only slightly over \$14,000.00.

The rate needed to generate these funds is .75 per \$100.00 valuation.

All members of the board were provided with a copy of the proposed budget to study until a budget hearing scheduled for Aug. 16, at 6 p.m. in the administration office.

Also on August 16, at 7 p.m. the board will also hold a public hearing on their intent to increase taxes.

The public is invited to both hearings and citizen input at the meetings is encouraged.

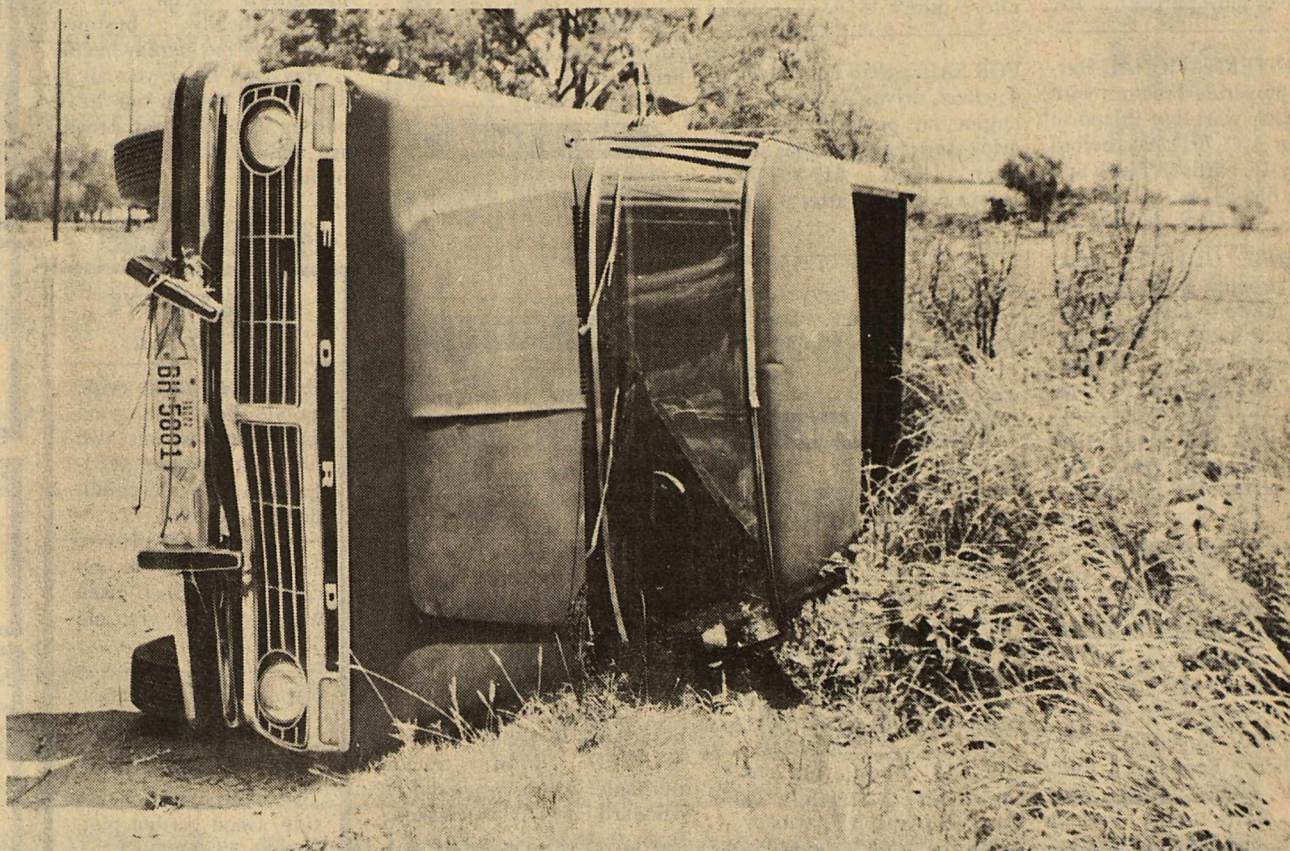

## \$10,000 Needed To Complete Project

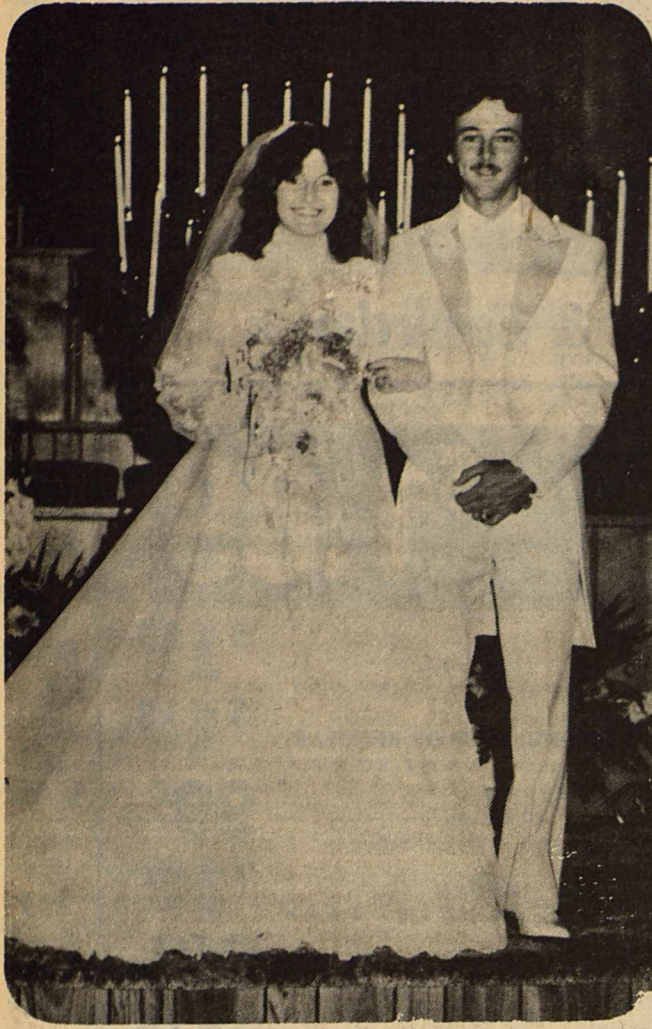

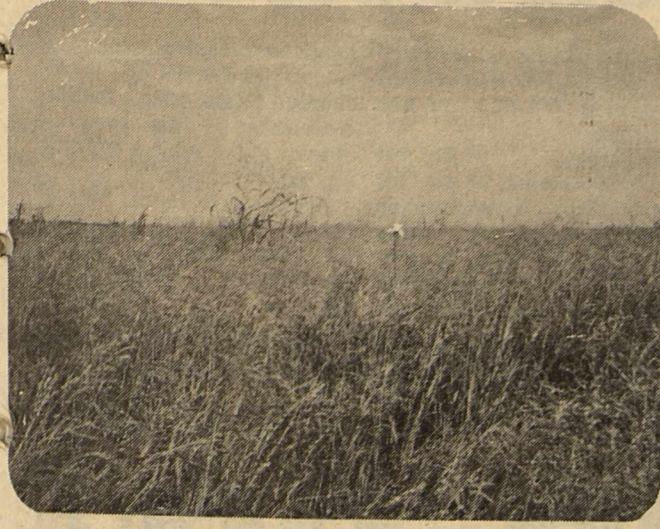

## Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service



**KLEINGRASS**

Kleingrass on the S. L. and Dan R. Griffith farm 1 mile west of the Paint Creek School.

The seed for these plantings were home-grown seed. Dan Griffith established 34 acres of kleingrass several years ago, and harvested his first crop of seed last year.

These plantings on the old Haynes farm were made on April 26 and 27, this year. Seeding rates of six (6) pounds per acre were used even though four (4) pounds per acre is recommended. Griffith had the seed so he went the heavier seeding rate which actually has paid off.

The kleingrass was fertilized the last week-end in July, just in time to receive the rains of July 30 & 31. An average of 167 pounds of 24-34-0 fertilizer was applied - 40 pounds of nitrogen and 56.8 pounds of phosphate per acre.

The white flag on stake top is at three feet. The stake was marked at one-foot intervals, but the kleingrass is so thick the one-foot flag can not be seen. Ninety percent (90%) of the grass will average 2½ feet

in height.

Weed control was done early before kleingrass started to "boot" out, but further control has been delayed now to allow seed maturity. Griffith has 67 acres of waterways and pastures on the Haynes farm, and 34 acres of waterways on his home place, all seeded to kleingrass.

The success of any grass planting is good seedbed preparation, weed control to keep competition down, and proper fertilization. These areas on Griffith's farm were tandem-disked twice, then drag-harrowed. Seeding was done with a culti-packer type seeder.

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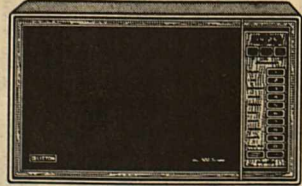
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# Collins Named Outstanding Educator

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article appeared in the June issue of Texas School Business, when Robby Collins was named Educator of the month. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Collins of Haskell and was a 1959 graduate of Haskell High School.)

Robby Collins totally immerses himself in whatever he's doing at the moment—whether it's helping an employee develop a plan to get out of financial hot water, meeting with the lieutenant governor of Texas or pursuing his latest hobby. He ferrets out every bit of available information in his myriad areas of responsibility and interests—an approach which has earned him a reputation as an expert on collective bargaining, employee relations and school legislation throughout the State of Texas and beyond.

The youthful deputy associate superintendent of management for the Dallas Independent School District is always on the lookout for a challenge. For example, a favorite family pastime is camping. But Robby always wants to "fight the elements." His idea of a great time is camping out in the bitterest cold, reports his wife Brenda, a former teacher.

He enjoys a good verbal

skirmish and a battle of wits even in casual conversation. And, of course, his responsibilities in handling EEOC claims, working with employee organizations, influencing legislators and putting out fires in the ranks and in the community give him fertile opportunities for matching wits.

Former Dallas superintendent Nolan Estes describes him as having "an unquenchable dissatisfaction with the status quo." Robby first came to his attention as a "young upstart" when he was 2nd vice president of Classroom Teachers of Dallas. In that position, Robby had helped develop a salary schedule index to put every teacher on the proper step. When it came time to implement the new index, he was offered the job as wage and salary administrator.

Dr. Estes says he has "leaderly skills possessed by very few." The past few years he has been placed in key positions of leadership giving him the opportunity to develop those skills. Those areas include employee relations, employee benefits and legislative liaison with the Texas Legislature.

A steady thread through his variety of responsibilities has been an uncanny ability to develop rapport and credibility with a diverse assort-

ment of people. His approaches to achieving this goal have been creative and varied.

For example, as a high school teacher of problems of democracy, he memorized the entire Declaration of Independence to impress his students with his knowledge of the

subject and to get their attention.

Linus Wright, new general superintendent of the Dallas schools, points out that one of the ways Robby made himself a "sought after individual" with legislators and members of the executive branch of state government was because

of his reputation as a good writer. "He became known as someone who could translate the critical needs of public education into legislative language," Wright says.

Too, he does his homework. "Lawmakers know he can supply them with credible information to aid them in making decisions," Wright relates. He also has provided Dallas and other school districts a model to substitute for collective bargaining.

In order to get a real feel for the problems leading up to teacher strikes, Robby visited a number of school districts all over the country in the throes of teacher walkouts. He walked picket lines and talked with teachers about the problems that led up to the strike. A common denominator, he discovered, was lack of communication and an adversary relationship between teachers and administrators.

His approaches to keeping lines of communication open and solving problems before they become major breeches have placed him in great demand as a workshop leader on employee relations. He has led approximately 50 workshops for groups such as the Texas School Management Team, National School Board Association, National PTA Executive Board and various TEA regional service centers and individual school districts. He also has taught several university courses on school finance and conflict management.

One of his most successful

approaches to managing conflict is the Employee Relations Program. An important component is the Ombudsman Program which provides the services of five ombudsmen—each assigned to one of the DISD's sub-districts. They visit the schools on a regular basis to talk with teachers about any problems they may have. They are also on call to assist in any kind of emergency, such as a teacher injury or even personal problems which may be affecting the employee's work. Robby says, "There is no need for any employee of this school district to feel that a problem has gone unresolved."

Robby gets into the act, too. He says everybody has a story to tell. He's never too busy to talk with an employee about a problem—whether it's a cafeteria worker, a teacher or a high level administrator. His associates say he has a heart of mush under a cool exterior. For instance, when he learned a clerical employee was about to lose her job because she didn't have money to buy gasoline to get to work or even buy food for herself and her daughter, Robby sent one of the ombudsmen out with money out of his own pocket to tide her over. He also helped her get a loan.

Robby also serves as the superintendent's representative and chairman of the District Communications Committee. This committee is composed of representatives from all employee groups and works on salaries and employee benefits. Although

### Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C. — Twenty-five years ago the U.S. Supreme Court issued one of its most famous decisions in the Brown v. Board of Education case. The Court stated that American public schools should be desegregated "with all deliberate speed." The underlying purpose for this decision was the recognition that every American has a fundamental right to a decent education and an opportunity to be productive and successful. It is my firm belief that a country that is based on the principle that "all men are created equal" should not use race as a basis in determining a man's character or his potential worth to society. Every person should have an equal opportunity for an education or a job. If we wish to attack racism, we must eliminate race as a standard for determining anything.

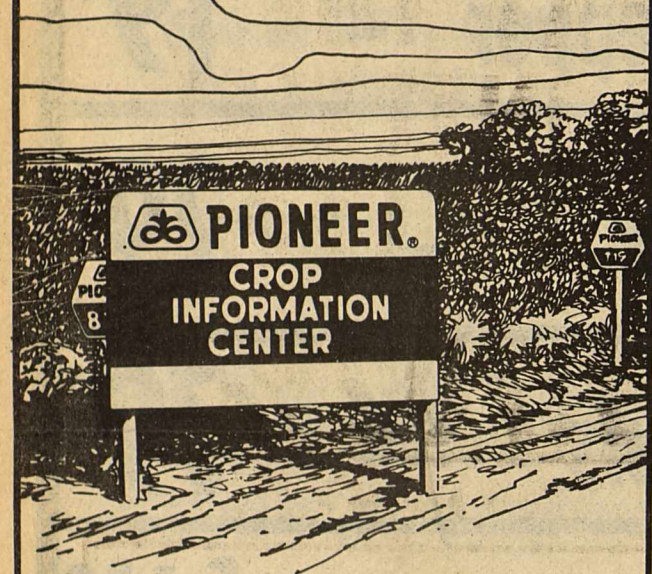
In an effort to make up for past discrimination to minorities, we have tried many programs. Several proposals have met with some degree of success while others have been miserable failures and sometimes even made the problem worse. Over the past several years the Judicial Branch has initiated a policy of busing school children "to achieve a racial balance." This program has been controversial since its inception and has been opposed by the vast majority of both blacks and whites. Pro-busing advocates have defended this policy on the grounds that the transportation of students would rectify unjust policies of racial isolation without unnecessary additional injury to the public welfare. Most reasonable people would agree that this has not occurred.

Busing stimulates the flight of whites to suburbs outside

the economic reach of most minorities. The evidence shows no measurable improvement in the quality of education available to all children. Our busing experience shows little contribution to racial harmony and, in fact, has produced strains and divisions in many cities. Also busing is a needless expenditure of funds, energy, and time. This extra time needed to bus students would be better spent in the classroom and these funds should be used for improved facilities instead of unnecessary transportation.

On July 24 I supported a Constitutional Amendment to ban forced busing. I was concerned over this important issue being considered by way of a proposed Constitutional Amendment. Certainly, it could have opened the door for many other single issue groups. I did honestly have reservations about solving this problem in this manner. The fact remained, however, that any number of other legislative approaches had been attempted over the past years and, for the most part, had received little consideration by the Judiciary Committee. The most expedient means remaining for bringing this to the Members was by way of a Discharge Petition, and I did sign Discharge Petition Number 1 for this purpose. Though it did fail, I believe it is necessary to continue to search for better alternatives. Education is a local concern and should not be subject to the heavy hand of the Judiciary or the Federal Government. The teachers and administrators in the individual communities should make decisions on school policy and not a Federal District Judge. Local people know best how to educate all of our students.

Taking a punch at public opinion, Nobel prize winner Dr. Norman Borlaug speaking recently in Houston, said the basic attitude toward farmers has been a hindrance to greater food production. Borlaug, now associated with the Rockefeller Foundation in Mexico City, said the public does not understand the necessity of the profit motive to increase production. The *Houston Chronicle* quoted the scientist as saying, "If a farmer can't improve his standard of living, he will not adopt the new technologies". 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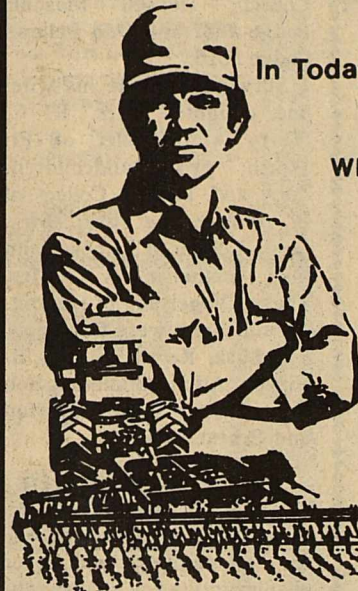
